
NEW OFFICE BUILDINGS.

THE New York Law School Building is located on Fulton Street, facing St. Paul's Church yard. The size of the lot is 55x80 feet and the open floor area is 2,512 square feet. There are eleven stories. The building was erected in seven months without overtime.


The law school will occupy the eighth, ninth, tenth and eleventh stories, the tenth and eleventh stories, being used for lecture halls, with proper ante rooms, toilet rooms, coat rooms, etc., and the ninth story will be used entirely as the law school library. The eighth story is to be used for the private offices and a small lecture room.

There will be four Otis passenger elevators equipped with special safety de-




Light Standard in Vestibule. Lighting Fixtures:





Typical Plan.











The Columbia Bank Building takes its name from the bank which occupies the ground floor. The structure is built upon a lot 35x130 feet and is 150 feet high with a ten-foot basement. There are twelve stories, the ground floor being of extra height, having a mezzanine in the banking room. There are two passenger and one freight elevators. The architects of this building were Buchman & Fox.

The new building for the Mutual Benefit Life Insurance Company, located on Broad Street, Newark, N. J., on the diagonally opposite corner from




TYPICAL PLAN OF COLUMBIA BANK.








Stained Glass Window at End of Hall-World Building. Ornamental Window: Heinigke & Bowen.

the Prudential Building, is a very creditable example of the work of George B. Post & Sons. The design follows Corinthian precepts.

The World Building, known for many years as one of the most famous office buildings in New York City, has been recently doubled in size by an addition to the rear of the old building which extends down Frankfort Street to North William and along North William to the Brooklyn Bridge. As shown in the illustration, the addition almost obscures the dome of the old building from the Brooklyn side.

The new building is modern in every respect. Several floors will be devoted to the editorial rooms, printing and engraving plants of the "World," and the balance will be let to tenants.
