Season Outlook

New Jersey Institute of Technology gained an enthusiastic, energetic young leader when it promoted **Brian Callahan** to head baseball coach last summer at age 25. And upon inheriting a program coming off a 4-34 season and with 13 freshman among its 22-man roster, Callahan will need every bit of en-

ergy and enthusiasm he can muster, along with some patience.

"This is a chance not too many people my age get," said Callahan, now 26. "My goal right now is to be a better team in May than when we started practice on Jan. 27. Hopefully that will equate to some wins, but I want to see the freshman grow and adjust to collegiate baseball."

BATTERY -

Freshman right-hander **Dan Raczynski** from Cohoes, N.Y., is likely to open the season as the number-one starting pitcher. He will be backed by two more young righties, sophomores **Andre Narvaez** and **John Coleman**, who were first and second on the team last year in innings. Position players **Chris Schwartz**, a freshman, and senior **Rich Livolsi** will also take turns in the rotation.

Callahan will look to freshman southpaw **Seth Powers** to start the season as his bullpen closer. Likey to assume middle-relief roles are newcomers Kevin McCarthy, Camilo Serrano, and Anthony Dasti and sophomore Rob Olohan.

Another rookie, **Cole Cicatelli** of Teaneck High, will start at catcher. Cicatelli, who has been impressive with both his bat and arm in the preseason, hopes to play a key role in nurturing a young pitching staff. Classmate **Ryan Held** will push Cicatelli for playing

time.

INFIELD

Middle infielders and team captains **Chris Lyons** at second base and Livolsi at shortstop are returning starters and expected to be steady. A pair of freshmen will man the corners, Schwartz at first base and **Steven Kosinski** of Elizabeth High at third.

Freshman **Ryan Wendolowski**, NJIT's biggest player at 6-

foot-4, 245 pounds,


Co-captain **Chris Lyons** should be a steadying influence for a young NJIT team.

will play first base when Schwartz pitches. McCarthy, Olohan, and freshman **Josh Palombo** provide depth around the diamond.

OUTFIELD – This is NJIT's most experienced unit with juniors **Tom Lemanowicz** in left field and **Scott Mataya** in center and senior **Pete Nalbach** in right. Speedy freshman **Marcus Caamano** is a likely late-inning defensive replacement and centerfield candidate, and fellow newcomer **Jesse Gargano** will back-up at the corners.

Administration

Dr. Saul K. Fenster is the sixth president of New Jersey Institute of Technology. Prior to joining NJIT in 1978, he served in various faculty and administrative capacities at Fairleigh Dickinson University, including six years as provost of the Rutherford campus.



Fenster is a mechanical engineer. He earned a bachelor's degree from the City College of New York, a master's degree from Columbia University and a Ph.D. from the University of Michigan. He has authored and co-authored two textbooks and numerous research papers and technical articles. His industrial experience includes a period as senior research engineer with the Sperry Rand Corporation and as a partner in an industrial consulting firm.

Fenster has served on many statewide task forces, commissions and committees. He is currently the chairman of the New Jersey Commission on Science and Technology, Research and Development Council of New Jersey.

DR. JOEL BLOOM Vice President, Academic and Student Services

Dr. Joel Bloom has worked at NJIT since July 1990, and is currently vice president for academic and student



services. Among his student services responsibilities is overseeing the department of athletics and physical education.

Bloom is also the

dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College, which enrolls 460 students from 15 states and several foreign countries.

Prior to NJIT, Bloom spent seven years as assistant commissioner in the New Jersey Department of Education. He currently chairs the State College Advisory Bound Board and the Newark Consortium Board for Pre-College Education.

Bloom earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Hunter College, and holds a master's and doctorate from Columbia University Teachers College.

LENNY KAPLAN Senior Administrator, Athletics, Physical Education, Recreation and Intramurals

After serving 11 years in the athletic department at Division-I Manhat-



tan College, **Lenny Kaplan** was appointed in August 2000 to NJIT's newly-created position of senior administrator for athletics,

physical education, recreation and intramurals.

Kaplan is a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletic administration. After three years as Manhattan's director of operations, he spent the last eight as an assistant athletic director. At NJIT, he reports to Dr. Joel Bloom, vice president for academic and student services.

Kaplan is a native of Commack, Long Island, and attended Commack High School South. He resides in Manhattan with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.

Division-I St. Peter's College in Jersey City. As a senior for the Peacocks, he was a Metro-Atlantic Athletic Conference all-academic selection. From 1996 to 1998, he served as a graduate assistant baseball coach and assistant sports information director at his alma mater.

A graduate of Bayonne High School, Callahan spent the 2000 baseball season with NJIT as an assistant to Dave Sawicki. He was hired as the fulltime head coach in the summer of 2000. He has also been an assistant at Ferris High School and Felician College.

Callahan received a bachelor's degree in history and elementary education in 1996, graduating magna cum laude, and a master's in education adminstration and supervision in 1998 from St. Peter's. He resides in Bayonne.

3 MIKE ZADROGA Assistant Coach

Mike Zadroga enters his first season of collegiate coaching by joining Callahan's staff.

Zadroga is a former assistant coach to his father with the baseball program at Hudson Catholic High School. He has also been an assistant wrestling coach at his alma mater, St. Peter's Prep.

Zadroga, 27, lettered three times as an outfielder for the University of Scranton before graduating in 1996 with a double-major in philosophy and English. He is currently a guidance counselor at St. Aloysius High School and resides in Jersey City.

20 JEFF SONNEMA Assistant Coach

Jeff Sonnema is in his second season as an assistant men's basketball and baseball coach at NJIT.



A former pitcher and first-baseman, Sonnema led the Highlander staff in both wins (3) and earned run average (3.55) in his senior season of 1999. He also hit

.309 that year with four home runs and 27 runs batted in. For his efforts, he was chosen team MVP and NJIT Outstanding Senior Male Athlete.

Sonnema, who was also the men's basketball MVP in 1997, lives in North Haledon.





NJIT Athletic Facilities

The NJIT baseball team plays most of its home games at Lubetkin Field, a lighted, natural-grass campus facility adjacent to the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center.

Lubetkin, which is also home to the Highlanders' men's and women's soccer teams, contains a scoreboard and pressbox facilities, and has seating to hold approximately 1,000 spectators. The field is also used for physical education and intramurals.



The NJIT men's and women's basketball and volleyball teams play their home games at **Entwisle Gymnasium**, the main facility in the Fleisher Center. Entwisle seats approximately 1,500 spectators. The back bay, "C gym," area can be sectioned off from the main floor, making the entire gymnasium useful for intramural events, physical education classes, and campus recre-

ation time, and able to host multiple events simultaneously.

The baseball team also has access to all of the other facilities in the athletic center. These include the fitness area (containing computer controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units, and an indoor track), weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), a martial arts center, and an aerobics/ dance studio. A six-lane swimming pool is home to NJIT's men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads host meets and practices at four lighted outdoor hardcourt tennis courts behind the building.

NJIT also offers several club sports, including bowling, cricket, golf, judo, men's lacrosse and wrestling. The Hazell Student Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.

Physical education offerings include aerobics, archery, bowling, dance, fencing, golf, karate, learn to swim, skiing, strength training and conditioning, volleyball and water safety.



NJIT and the CACC

When NJIT reclassified its athletic programs to NCAA Divison II from Division III in 1997, the Highlanders joined the New York Collegiate Athletic Conference (NYCAC). After three years of NYCAC play, the Highlanders begin a new era in 2001 as members of the **Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference** (CACC).

NJIT is the only school in the 12member CACC with full NCAA membership. The other member institutions possess provisional NCAA status, as they are in the process of switching affiliation from the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA).

CACC baseball-playing members for 2001 include Bloomfield College, Caldwell College, Dominican (N.Y.) College, Felician College, NJIT, Nyack College, University of the Sciences in Philadelphia, Teikyo Post University, and Wilmington (Del.) College. Due to its NCAA status, NJ cannot participate in the CAC postseason tournament until 2003. The Highlanders are eligible for both the NCAA and ECAC Division-II playoffs on an at-large basis.




