Season Outlook

NJIT second-year head baseball coach Brian Callahan inherited a squad which had earned just four victories in 2000 and led it to a 14-23 record last season, the most wins in the program's four years in NCAA Division II. With a full recruiting year under his belt and 10 starters returning, Callahan is ready to gradually raise his team's expectation level.

"If we could turn last year's record around, I would consider the season highly successful," Callahan said. "Our basic team goal is to give our best effort every single day. Complacency is the enemy."

While the Highlanders are more experienced than a year ago, they are still a predominantly young squad. The 24-man preseason roster includes eight freshmen and nine sophomores, and just two of eight field positions will have the same starter as a season ago.

BATTERY: Four of the six projected starting pitchers are returnees. At the top are right-handers Dan Raczynski, a sophomore, and junior André Narvaéz. Narvaéz led NJIT with 15 appearances last year, while Raczynski made a team-high eight starts.

Sophomore righty Ryan Wendolowski becomes a full-time pitcher after spending some time at first base last season. Freshman Chris Legiadre was impressive in fall and earned a starting role, and two-way player Chris Schwartz and freshman lefthander Mike Palomino round out the rotation.

Sophomore Jesse Gargano, a reserve outfielder as a freshman, will be given a chance to earn the closer role. Schwartz and Palomino will also pitch in short relief between starts. Right-handed bullpen depth comes from junior Rob Olohan, transfer Steve Craig, and freshman Marty Potoczniak. From the left side are sophomore Seth Powers and transfer Joseph DeJager.

Sophomore Cole Cicatelli is the incumbent behind the plate. Due to injuries, Cicatelli caught all but two games in 2001, but help should come this season from freshman Philip Resciniti. Sophomore Ryan Held is recovering from injuries which ended his 2001 season prematurely, and is also being considered for designated hitter duties.

INFIELD: It will take some time for Highlander fans to recognize the starting infield, as all four positions have a new face. Legiadre will start at first base. with freshman Erik Hansen getting the nod when Legiadre pitches. Firstyear junior J.J. Samolowicz has won the second-base job. The left side features veterans in new spots, with sophomore co-captain Steven Kosinksi moving over from third base to shortstop and senior Scott Mataya coming in to third from the outfield. Freshman Ryan Blair can also play third, while Craig and sophomore Josh Palombo are utility infielders.

OUTFIELD: This unit should pack tremendous punch in the line-up, and features three strong throwing arms. Schwartz, moves from first base to left field. Senior co-captain Tommy Lemanowicz is back in center, and freshman Daniel Lupo, last year's Passaic County player of the year out of West Milford High, gets the nod in right. Gargano and newcomer Mike Morgan are the reserves, with Morgan the likely starter when Schwartz pitches.

DR. SAULK, FENSTER

President

Dr. Saul K. Fenster is the sixth president of New Jersey Institute of Technology. Prior to joining NJIT in 1978, he served in various faculty and administrative capacities at Fairleigh Dickinson University, including six years as provost of the Rutherford campus.



Fenster is a mechanical engineer. He earned a bachelor's degree from the City College of New York, a master's degree from Columbia University and a Ph.D. from the University of Michigan. He has authored and co-authored two textbooks and numerous research papers and technical articles. His industrial experience includes a period as senior research engineer with the Sperry Rand Corporation and as a partner in an industrial consulting firm.

Fenster has served on many statewide task forces, commissions and committees. He is currently the chair of the New Jersey Commission on Science and Technology, and the Research and Development Council of New Jersey.

DR. JOEL BLOOM

Vice-President for Academic and Student Services

Dr. Joel Bloom has worked at NJIT since July 1990, and is currently



vice-president for academic and student services. He is responsible for nine divisions of the university, including physical education and athletics

Bloom is also the dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College, which enrolls 460 students from 15 states and several foreign countries.

Prior to NJIT. Bloom spent seven vears as assistant commissioner in the New Jersey Department of Education. He currently chairs the State College Advisory Bound Board and the Newark Consortium Board for Pre-College Education.

Bloom earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Hunter College, and holds a master's and doctorate from Columbia University Teachers College.

Senior Administrator for Athletics, Physical Education, Recreation and Intramurals

After serving 11 years in the ath-



letics department at Division-I Manhattan College, Lenny Kaplan was appointed in August 2000 to NJIT's newly-created position of senior administrator

for athletics, physical education, recreation and intramurals

Kaplan is a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration. After three years as Manhattan's director of operations, he served as an assistant athletics director from 1991-2000. At NJIT, he reports to Dr. Joel Bloom, vice-president for academic and student services.

Sharon Manning Beverly was ap-



pointed assistant director of athletics and senior woman administrator in January 2001. She has also been NJIT's head women's basketball coach the last three

seasons, posting a record of 30-51.

Beverly has been a collegiate head coach for 22 seasons with 269 career victories. She is the all-time winningest coach at Fairleigh Dickinson University, where she spent 11 years.

JOE CAIOLA

Assistant Director of Athletics/ Business, Facilities & Event Management

Joe Cajola filled several roles in the



NJIT athletics department before being awarded his current position of assistant director of athletics for business, facilities and event management in January 2001.

Caiola is one of only three Highlander men's basketball players to score at least 40 points in a game. He received a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering in 1980 and a master's in management from NJIT in 1984.

In the three years before his promotion. Caiola had served as assistant men's basketball coach, marketing director, recruiting coordinator, and sports information director. He lives in Edison with his wife. Carol. and sons Joseph, 13, and Anthony, 11.

JIM CASCIANO Assistant Director of Athletics

Jim Casciano was tabbed as as-



sistant director of athletics and head men's basketball coach in July 2001. In his first season, he led the Highlanders to a 15-12 record and a second-place finish in

the Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference, and was named CACC Co-Coach of the Year.

Casciano has 161 career victories in 13 seasons as a senior college coach, including stints at Castleton State College, St. Michael's College, and King's College. Additionally, he posted a 50-19 record in three seasons at Wayne Valley Military College of the NJCAA, where five of his players earned Division-I scholarships.

While at St. Michael's, he was the Mideast Collegiate Conference Coach of the Year in 1985-86. His 2000-01 King's team won the Eastern College Athletic Conference Division III South Championship.

Casciano played collegiately at Drexel University, earning bachelor's degree in business administration in 1974. He and his wife. Daphne, reside in Basking Ridge.

KATHLEEN HEITZMAN Assistant Director of Athletics/ NCAA Compliance & Eligibility

Kathleen Heitzman became NJIT's



first full-time comofficer pliance when she was hired in August 2001.

Heitzman joined the Highlander staff after two years as assistant athletics director and senior

woman administrator at San Francisco State University. Prior to that. she was the compliance coordinator at California State University-Northridge. She has also completed internships with the NCAA and the Metro-Atlantic Athletic Conference.

A native of Nampa, Idaho, Heitzman is a 1990 graduate of the University of the Redlands, earning a bachelor of arts degree in sociology/ anthropology. She received a juris doctorate from Marquette University Law School in 1994 and currently lives in Cranford.



Head Coach

In his first season as a collegiate head coach, Brian Callahan turned in a 14-23 record, the most victories for the Highlanders in their four years as a member of NCAA Division II.

Callahan, 27, was one of the nation's youngest head coaches when he was hired in the fall of 2000. He had spent the previous spring with NJIT as an assistant to Dave Sawicki. He has also



been an assistant at Ferris High School and Felician College.

Callahan was a four-year letterwinner at Division-I St. Peter's College in Jersey City. As a senior for the Peacocks, he was a Metro-Atlantic Athletic Conference allacademic selection. From 1996 to 1998, he served as gradu-

ate assistant sports information director and assistant baseball coach at his alma mater.

A graduate of Bayonne High School, Callahan received a bachelor's degree in history and elementary education in 1996, graduating magna cum laude, and a master's in education adminstration and supervision in 1998 from St. Peter's. He resides in Bayonne.

Ed Ward joined the NJIT baseball staff in the fall of 2001.


Ward was the first-ever head coach at Felician College, going 34-42 in two seasons. During his tenure,

About NJIT

NJIT's history spans from the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age. Newark was a factory town when the tuition-free evening school was founded in 1881 to support local industries. From the early days, science and techology have been the engines fueling the university's developement.

Over time, the university both anticipated and responded to change by expanding its curriculum and mission. Most notably, in 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By 1975, NJIT offered a broad range of undergraduate and graduate degrees. All programs included significant research and public service components with the goal of providing an academic environment that fostered intellectual depth and breadth, as well as social responsibility.

Today, continuing a fourfold mission of instruction, research, economic development and public service, NJIT is among the leading comprehensive technological universities in the nation. The university has stateof-the-art facilities with more than 2,000,000 square feet of space located on a 45-acre campus in Newark, a Technology and Engineering Center at our 125-acre campus in Mount Laurel shared with Burlington County College, and a solar observatory in Big Bear, Calif.

NJIT's Six Colleges

While there has been tremendous growth and diversification at NJIT. its roots are in engineering education. For more than eight decades. Newark College of Engineering (NCE) has been preparing engineering students to use science, mathematics, technology and problem-solving skills to design, construct, test and maintain products, services, and information systems.

The New Jersey School of Architecture, established in 1974, is one of the largerst architecture schools in the nation and is nationally recognized for the innovative integration of computer technology into the design curriculum.

The College of Science and Liberal Arts (CSLA), established in 1982, is moving into the forefront of many national research activities from solar astronomy to computational and mathematical modeling. CSLA provides students with the skill sets for the professional marketplace including literacy in the computer, mathematical, physical and biological sciences, as well as the traditional liberal arts disciplines.

The School of Management, established in 1988, combines the best of the traditional business disciplines (e.g., finance, marketing, accounting, e-commerce) with the power of information and technology management to develop professionals who can manage and communicate effectively.

The Albert Dorman Honors College, established in 1993, offers one of the nation's leading technologically oriented honors programs for students who are prepared to undertake a rigorous and individualized course of study.

The College of Computing Sciences, established in 2001, encompasses a department of computer science, focused on both the theoretical areas of computing and the development of new computer technology, as well as a department of information systems, concentrated on applications involving people and organizations.

Facilities

The NJIT baseball team plays most of its home games at Lubetkin Field, a lighted, natural-grass campus facility adjacent to the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center.

Lubetkin, which is also home to the Highlanders' men's and women's soccer teams, contains a scoreboard and pressbox facilities, and has seating to hold approximately 1,000 spectators. The field is also used for physical

education intramurals.

The NJIT men's and women's basketball and volleyball teams play their home games at Entwisle Gymnasium, the main facility in the Fleisher Center. Entwisle seats approximately 1,500 spectators. The back bay, "C gym," area can be sectioned off from

the main floor, making the entire gymnasium useful for intramural events, physical education classes, and campus recreation time, and able to host multiple events simultaneously.

The baseball team also has access to all of the other facilities in the athletic center. These include the fitness area (containing computer-controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units, and an indoor track), a free-weight room and a hammer-strength weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), a martial arts center, and an aerobics/dance

studio. A six-lane swimming pool is home to NJIT's men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads host matches and practices at four lighted outdoor hardcourt tennis courts behind the building. The Hazell Student Center houses six requlation bowling lanes.

Riverfront Stadium



For the third consecutive season. the NJIT baseball team will play selected home games at Bears & Eagles Riverfront Stadium in downtown Newark.

NJIT will play 11 games on seven of its 2002 home dates at Riverfront. by far the most in its three-year association with the facility. Riverfront, located just a mile from the NJIT campus, is home to the Newark Bears of the independent Atlantic League of Professional Baseball Clubs. Opened in July 1999 at a cost of \$30 million. Riverfront seats 6.200 spectators.

NJIT was 14-23 overall last season, but 3-1 at Riverfront.

"Over the past two seasons we've had a winning record at Riverfront," said second-year NJIT head coach Brian Callahan, who was an assistant in 2000. "The team seems to raise its level of play there. By playing more games at Riverfront this season, we should feel even more at home there, and hopefully continue our winning wavs."

When NJIT reclassified its athletics programs to NCAA Divison II from Division III in 1997, the Highlanders joined the New York Collegiate Athletic

CENTRAL ATLANTIC

Conference (NYCAC). After three years of NYCAC play, the Highlanders began a new era in the fall of 2000 as members of the Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference (CACC).

NJIT is the only school in the 12-member CACC with full NCAA membership. The other institutions

possess provisional NCAA status, as they are in the process of switching affiliation from the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA).

The CACC has allowed the Highlanders to save tremendously on travel time and costs. NJIT is centrally located in the conference, and four other member schools are in New Jersey, allowing the opportunity to foster local rivalries.
