

### WHY THE HIGHLANDERS?

The area on which the NJIT campus sits, now known as University Heights, was formerly called the Newark Highlands. The mailing address of the University used to be on High Street, until the road was re-named Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard. New Jersey Institute of Technology is without its top two hitters from a year ago, but the Highlanders, under sixthyear head coach Brian Callahan, are a "program" in the best sense of the word, with quality players ready to take on added responsibility as their college careers progress, filling the shoes of those who went before them.

Having improved their Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference finish in each of Callahan's first five seasons, capped by last year's regular season CACC crown, the Highlanders enter 2006 with back-toback 20-win seasons (school-record 23 wins in 2004 and 22 wins in 2006). NJIT has never had three 20-win seasons in a row.

Pitching should be a strength, with two seniors—all-CACC starters Chris Legiadre and Rob Forbes—back, along with seven other returnees, including all-CACC sophomore reliever Pete Rivera.

Legiadre, a two-time all-CACC pick, was 7-3 with a 3.38 ERA last year and has remarkable control, issuing only 27 walks in more than 200 career innings. The hard-throwing Forbes (5-3, 3.48 ERA) has averaged better than a strikeout an inning for his career (140 Ks in 130 IP).

Rivera (4.15 ERA, 1-0, 4 saves) is part of a right-left tandem with classmate, LHP Cory Kuzmik (3.77 ERA, 1-0, 3 saves), offering coach Callahan extraordinary late-game options.

Senior Brian Ascolese was a swingman last year, while Chuck Leppo had a 2.51 ERA in 2005 and soph Danny Kapica is back, too. The freshman class is deep and talented, with Matt Melody, Spiro Molfetas, Chris Parenti and PJ Saporito all possibilities either as starters or regular relievers from the outset. A big personnel loss from last season's CACC regular season champs is catcher Phil Resciniti, who was all-CACC, all-ECAC, all-state and all-region after leading NJIT in batting (.36-1), doubles (11), homers (4) and RBI (33). Senior Jeff Potter, sophomore Matt Schlitter and freshman Chris Bacque will contend to fill the crucial vacancy.

Quality veterans are available around the infield, with sophomore Mike Turner (.297, 2 HR, 24 RBI) at third; Justin Racz, with nearly 100 starts in three years, at shortstop; Dan Morogiello (.256, 21 RBI) back for his third year starting at second; and junior Austin DeRogatis and Forbes (when he doesn't pitch) available to play first. DeRogatis and Forbes combined for 20 RBI in 2005. Veterans Jeff Schaffer, Chris Cardone and Tyler Hamilton could also be in the mix, along with rookie Craig Binkiewicz, who is also an outfield candidate.

Things are less settled in the outfield, leaving opportunity to a combination of newcomers, veteran reserves and people who will also compete for work in the infield.

Two-year captain, senior Anthony D'Agosta, could start in his final season. Rob Pietrocola, a sophomore who also pitches, will be a corner outfielder. The aforementioned freshman, Binkiewicz, as well as classmates Garrett Hauck and Tom Farina are vying for playing time, too.

A player to watch is junior Derrick McCain. Undeniably talented, with a combined 41 steals, four homers, 12 doubles and 31 RBI, McCain's biggest problem through his first two seasons has been avoiding injuries that have plagued his college career.

Division 1

New Jersey Institute of Technology athletics is on the move to the top level of college athletics--NCAA Division I.

The exciting news came this summer, when the NCAA gave NJIT the green light to reclassify its entire athletics program from Division II to Division I, a four-year process that will bring all Highlander sports to full Division I status and championship eligibility in 2009-10.

Two sports—men's soccer and women's soccer—are paving the way under NCAA rules that allow Division II or Division III schools to elevate one sport in each gender to Division I in a process that takes two years to complete.

NJIT men's soccer is already a full member of NCAA Division I, having arrived at championship eligibility in the 2005 season. The men's journey to the top level began in 2003, under the NCAA's two-year single-sport per gender reclassification process. Highlanders women's soccer is beginning a similar two-year process in 2005, with full Division I status and championship eligibility arriving in the 2007 season.

The larger process of advancing the entire program to NCAA I takes four years to complete and includes application, a detailed strategic plan and in-depth annual review of the institution's progress in moving toward its goal of complying with NCAA Division I rules and building a strong, broad-based athletics program. New Jersey Institute of Technology's move to Division I has moved quickly since the November 2002 discussions among President Robert A. Altenkirch, Vice President Joel Bloom and Athletics Director Lenny Kaplan.

From there, came a proposal from Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I. Little more than two years later, the NCAA has approved NJIT's proposal to advance its entire 15-sport program to Division I.

Along the way, scholarship and operating budgets have been enhanced, with expanded coaching staffs, increased scholarship dollars and upgraded facilities for competition and practice.

Upgrading athletics has been a priority for Dr. Altenkirch since he was selected as the seventh President of NJIT in May 2002.

"As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university athletically with our academic peers," said Altenkirch. "It will also enable us to recruit the best and brightest student-athletes, improve athletics facilities available to the entire NJIT community, gain regional and national visibility, and build strong linkages with students that will carry over to their days as alumni."



Administration

### Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch

President

Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch, formerly vice president for research at Mississippi State University (MSU), joined NJIT as the university's seventh president in July 2002. During his tenure as MSU vice president for research, science and engineering, expenditures as reported to National Science Foundation (NSF) increased dramatically—75% from 1997 to 2001.

Prior to his appointment as vice president at MSU, Altenkirch served as professor of mechanical and materials engineering and dean of the

College of Engineering and Architecture at Washington State University. From 1988 to 1995, he was professor of mechanical engineering and dean of the College of Engineering at MSU. He also served as professor and chair of mechanical engineering at the University of Kentucky.

In addition to the research program, his responsibilities encompassed congressional relations, intellectual property management and economic development. While dean of engineering at MSU, he led the effort to secure National Science Foundation funding for the establishment of the MSU NSF Engineering Research Center for Computational Field Simulation in 1990. Additionally, the Center was instrumental in helping the State of Mississippi attract a \$1 billion Nissan manufacturing plant.

Altenkirch holds a PhD from Purdue University, an MS from the University of California, Berkeley, and a BSME from Purdue, all in mechanical engineering. He is the author of over 50 publications and nearly 100 presentations in combustion and heat transfer and served as principal investigator for ten Space Shuttle experiments investigating the spread of fire in reduced gravity. He is a Fellow of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

### Dr. Joel Bloom

*Vice President of Academic and Student Services* 



Dr. Joel Bloom has worked at NJIT since July 1990. In his current position, he is responsible for nine divisions of the university, including Physical Education and Athletics. Dr. Bloom is also

Dean of the Albert

Dorman Honors College, which enrolls more than 525 students who are typically in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class.

Prior to NJIT, Dr. Bloom spent seven years as assistant Commissioner in the New Jersey Department of Education. He is currently the Chair of the NASULGC Council of Chief Student Affairs Officers and the Newark Consortium Board for Pre-College Education.

Dr. Bloom earned his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees from Hunter College, and holds a Master's and Doctorate from Columbia University Teachers College. Lenny Kaplan Director of Athletics



After serving 11 years in the athletics department at Division-I Manhattan College, Lenny Kaplan was appointed in August 2000 to head NJIT's division of physical education and athletics.

Kaplan is a 1988

graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration. After three years as Manhattan's director of operations, he served as an assistant athletics director with the Jaspers from 1991-2000.

Kaplan is the Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference Executive Committee Supervisor for men's basketball, and serves on the NCAA Division II nominating committee, the D-II Women's Soccer Regional Advisory Committee, and the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association Executive Committee.

Kaplan resides in Merrick, New York, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.

# Brian Callahan

Head Coach

New Jersey Institute of Technology baseball has achieved the rare feat of improving its conference finish in each of Brian Callahan's first five seasons, culminating in the 2005 Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference regular season title with an 18-6 league mark.



In his first season (2001), the Highlanders placed seventh in

the CACC, before advancing to sixth, fifth, second and then first in 2005. Along with 2004's second-place finish, the Highlanders set a new school record with 23 overall wins. As a result, Callahan was voted by his peers as CACC Coach of the Year, a feat he repeated in 2005.

Callahan, 31, was one of the nation's youngest head coaches when he took the NJIT helm in the fall of 2000 after a year as an assistant. In 2003, his third season, the team qualified for its first CACC playoff berth, returning in 2004 and 2005.

Callahan, who has an 84-116 overall record, has coached 16 all-conference and two all-region players, as well as a conference Player of the Year. The 2005 Highlanders won the CACC Team Sportsmanship Award.

A graduate of Bayonne High School in his hometown, Callahan received a bachelor's degree in history and elementary education from Saint Peter's College, graduating magna cum laude in 1996. He later earned a master's in education administration and supervision from SPC in 1998.

A four-year baseball letterwinner at Division I Saint Peter's, Callahan earned Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference all-academic honors as a senior. From 1996 to 1998, he served Saint Peter's as graduate assistant sports information director and assistant baseball coach. He is also a member of the Saint Peter's Intramural Hall of Fame.

#### **Ed Ward** Assistant Coach



Veteran coach Ed Ward joined the NJIT baseball staff in 2001, having spent 12 seasons as an assistant at the NCAA Division I level and then successfully starting a Division II program as head coach.

Ward's NJIT duties include instructing the hitters and in his first season the team batted a school-record .308. Previously the bench coach, he was named third base coach for the 2006 season.

He also oversees the program's recruiting and outfield instruction.

Ward was the first head coach at Felician College, which won 34 games in his two seasons. His teams defeated three nationallyranked Division II opponents and one Division I squad. Prior to Felician, he spent 12 years as an assistant at Division I FDU. Eighteen of Ward's recruits have gone on to sign professional contracts.

He recently completed his eighth season as a men's basketball assistant at Montclair State, as he led the Red Hawks into the 2005 conference playoffs. In 2002-03, he aided head coach Ted Fiore when Montclair won the NJ Athletic Conference title.

Ward, who has coached high school baseball and basketball, is a certified baseball umpire and directs the Highlander Winter Hitting Camp, the Highlander High School Baseball Camp and the Golden Falcon Baseball Camp.

The Elizabeth, NJ, resident received a Bachelor of Arts degree in physical education from Kean College in 1981.

#### Dan Morogiello Volunteer Assistant

Former major league hurler Dan Morogiello began sharing his wisdom with the NJIT pitchers when he joined the coaching staff in 2004-05.



Morogiello was a 1976 third-round draft choice of the Atlanta Braves and played a total of 10 professional seasons, reaching the majors with the Baltimore Orioles in 1983. That season, he

posted a 2.39 earned-run average in 22 relief appearances, helping Baltimore to the World Series championship.

Before turning pro, Morogiello pitched two seasons at Seton Hall, leading the Pirates to the College World Series in 1975. Following his professional career, he pitched 10 more years in the Metropolitan Baseball League and was inducted into the Bergen County (NJ) Hall of Fame. He is still active in over-30 leagues. Morogiello was pitching coach at Hunterdon Central Regional HS from 1999-2002.

He and his wife, Nancy, have two daughters, Vanessa, 24, and Jenna, 12. Son Dan is the starting second baseman for the Highlanders.

#### André Narvaéz Volunteer Assistant

André Narvaéz, a 2004 NJIT graduate, is in his third season as the team's first base coach. He will also assist with the pitchers and outfielders.



Narvaéz posted three victories and two saves in his four-year college career, including a shutout of Teikyo Post in 2001. He resides in Belleville with his wife, Melissa.

# About NIIT

NJIT's Campus Center, opened in September 2004, is the final phase of a three-year, \$83.5-million campus makeover. It is designed to be the focal point of a vibrant campus life. The center features a soaring, two-story circular dining hall, sheathed in gleaming, double-pane, energyconserving glass.

The construction program encompasses two tall multi-story buildings – the East Building, housing the Albert Dorman Honors College, the Department of Biomedical Engineering, and administrative offices, and the center itself, featuring dining facilities, student offices and lounges, game rooms, campus store and ballroom. The two buildings are connected by a sky bridge, and a European-style piazza featuring a 55-foot clock tower.

In an effort to improve communication and socialization on the 45-acre urban campus, the architects scaled the complex to create the feel of an outdoor room and give more spatial definition to the campus. "To promote socializing, we wanted to encourage people to move through spaces, not around them," said Thomas Levering, associate partner at the architectural firm.


The new round campus dining hall adds height and verve plus doubles the dining space. Its smoky gray glass provides a strong presence on the campus green. A 28,000 square-foot, rooftop grass terrace crowns it. Paths around it reroute traffic to the center. The clock tower stands adjacent to one entrance to the center. The donated tower features a carillon that will chime hourly.

The construction represents a major portion of more than a \$100 million facilities improvement plan. Completed are additional residence space and an additional building for the business incubator program. Upgrades in the works include two of NJIT's oldest buildings, Cullimore and Eberhardt halls, located adjacent to the complex.

"A good-looking center tells a visual story," said Levering. "A center with the right stuff says life outside the classroom is as important as life within it."



About NIIT



NJIT's history spans from the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age. Newark was a factory town when the tuition-free evening school was founded in 1881 to support local industries. From the early days, science and techology have been the engines fueling the university's development.

Over time, the university both anticipated and responded to change by expanding its curriculum and mission. Most notably, in 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By 1975, NJIT offered a broad range of undergraduate and graduate degrees. All programs included significant research and public service components with the goal of providing an academic environment that fostered intellectual depth and breadth, as well as social responsibility.

Today, continuing a fourfold mission of instruction, research, economic development and public service, NJIT is among the leading comprehensive technological universities in the nation. The university offers 92 degree programs in 33 undergraduate majors, 40 masters and 19 doctoral programs. It has state-of-the-art facilities on a 45-acre campus in Newark and a solar observatory in Big Bear, California.

### **NJIT'S SIX COLLEGES**

While there has been tremendous growth and diversification at NJIT, its roots are in engineering education. For more than eight decades, Newark College of Engineering (NCE) has been preparing engineering students to use science, mathematics, technology and problem-solving skills to design, construct, test and maintain products, services, and information systems.

The New Jersey School of Architecture, established in 1973, is one of the largest architecture schools in the nation and is recognized for the innovative integration of computer technology into the design curriculum.

The College of Science and Liberal Arts (CSLA), established in 1982, is moving into the forefront of many national research activities from solar astronomy to computational and mathematical modeling. CSLA provides students with the skill sets for the professional marketplace including literacy in the computer, mathematical, physical and biological sciences, as well as the traditional liberal arts disciplines.

The School of Management, established in 1988, combines the best of the traditional business disciplines (e.g., finance, marketing, accounting, e-commerce) with the power of information and technology management to develop professionals who can manage and communicate effectively.

The Albert Dorman Honors College, established in 1993, offers one of the nation's leading technologically oriented honors programs for students who are prepared to undertake a rigorous and individualized course of study.

The College of Computing Sciences, established in 2001, encompasses a department of computer science, focused on both the theoretical areas of computing and the development of new computer technology, as well as a department of information systems, concentrated on applications involving people and organizations.

### NJIT: NEW JERSEY'S TECHNOLOGICAL RESEARCH UNIVERSITY

NJIT plays a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future. As a major public technological university, NJIT is an important conduit through which technology flows into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university hopes to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In addition to its degree programs, the university offers a full spectrum of resources in technological specialties including:

- enrichment programs for professionals through the Division of Continuing Professional Education.
- programs designed to attract elementary and high school students through careers in technology.
- . extensive eLearning courses.
- selected courses available at locations throughout New Jersey.

A strong applied research program is the very core of the technological research university, generating the advances that fuel a knowledge-based economy. NJIT's research programs have grown exponentially over the past 25 years, from a total expenditure of \$500,000 in 1978 to more than \$75 million today. The university conducts cutting-edge applied research through multidisciplinary centers of excellence, specialized high-tech labs, and partnerships with industry to develop commercially promising new technologies.

NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark, New Jersey, and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies become more productive, profitable, and globally competitive.

NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element. The university's research centers work in collaboration with corporate partners to speed technology transfer, and numerous outreach programs help businesses become more productive. Extensive initiatives in transportation research based at the university focus on the infrastructure New Jersey needs for a thriving economy.





NJIT and Rutgers students have library privileges at both campuses. NJIT students may also enrich their educational experience by enrolling in Rutgers-Newark courses and in full degree programs in disciplines not offered at NJIT, such as art, music, geology and psychology.

Each year the two universities co-sponsor a common season of theatrical productions, as well as 'World Week,' a joint program of honors colloquia, and a variety of other cultural and social activities.

### NEW JERSEY/NEW YORK METROPOLITAN REGION

The NJIT campus is in one of the nation's most exciting cultural and business regions. Advantages include:

- Minutes from New Jersey Performing Arts Center, Liberty Science Center, Meadowlands Sports Complex, Manhattan and all of its attractions, Newport Center Mall, and Secaucus Outlet Center.
- Discount tickets for Broadway shows, museums, concerts, and sporting events.
- Weekend trips throughout the Northeastern United States: skiing, boating, swimming, hiking, and more.
- The spectacular Jersey shore is less than one hour away.

Athlotics Facilities

The Highlanders baseball team plays its home games at Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium in downtown Newark, NJ, minutes from NJIT's University Heights campus. The stadium, also home of the professional Newark Bears, opened in 1999 and built at a cost of \$30 million, is one of the finest home fields for college baseball anywhere in the country (to read more about NJIT baseball and Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, see page 26).

In addition to playing home baseball at the 6,200-seat downtown stadium, the NJIT soccer teams play their home games at Lubetkin Field, a lighted campus facility with a newly-installed SprinTurf surface adjacent to the Athletic Center. Lubetkin contains a scoreboard and press box facilities and has bleacher seating for approximately 1,000 spectators.

Renovations in the summer of 2004 added the artificial grass, a walking track and new landscaping. Lubetkin is also used for club sports and intramural events, as well as by the NJIT baseball team for practice.

The Highlanders' men's and women's basketball and men's and women's volleyball teams play their home contests in the main gymnasium of the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center, which offers seating for approximately 1,500 spectators. Renovations, funded by private donations, and expected to include new seating, a new





floor and a new sound system, are slated to begin in the summer of 2006. The back bay, "C gym," area can be sectioned off from the main floor, making the entire gymnasium useful for intramurals, physical education classes and campus recreation time. It is capable of hosting simultaneous separate events.

The baseball team, which conducts winter drills in the gym, also has access to all of the facilities in the athletic center. These include the fitness area (containing computer-controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units, and an indoor track), a free-weight room and a hammer-strength weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), and a martial arts/fencing center.

A six-lane swimming pool is home to NJIT's men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads utilize the four lighted outdoor hardcourt tennis courts behind the building. The newly-renovated Campus Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.



### Bears & Cagles Riverfront Stadium



Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium: Home of the NJIT Highlanders

New York Yankees manager Joe Torre visited New Jersey Institute of Technology on December 8, 2005 to herald a new partnership between NJIT's baseball team, the Highlanders, and the Newark Bears.

Torre was on hand as the Highlanders signed a 10-year contract to play their home games at Bears & Eagles Riverfront Stadium in Newark. "I think this partnership is nothing but aces," Torre said during the press conference at NJIT. "It's a partnership between two class organizations that will make for nothing but a lot of fun for everyone."

The Highlanders have played at the stadium since 2004, but the new 10-year commitment comes as NJIT elevates its winning baseball program from NCAA Division II to Division I play for the 2007 season.

"NJIT is bringing Division I baseball to this great stadium," said NJIT President Robert A. Altenkirch, "which will generate the highest level of excitement. It's a great partnership that allows NJIT to play intercollegiate baseball in a great facility, maybe the best for college baseball in the country."

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the Newark Bears, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999. With a seating capacity of 6,200, "The Den" affords fans an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major league-caliber press box featuring two radio booths and two television booths.

The name, Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, honors Newark's rich baseball history. The original Bears were a farm team for the New York Yankees up until 1949 and the Eagles were a very successful Negro League team that played in Newark until 1950.

"I have watched closely what (NJIT) means to Newark and to New Jersey," said Steve Kalafer, Bears co-owner, at the December 8 press conference.

The speakers noted that the greatest beneficiary of the partnership between NJIT and the Bears is the city of Newark. "NJIT's continuing and growing partnership with the Newark Bears is an integral part of our effort to be fully engaged with our host community in Newark and Essex County," Altenkirch said. "Our students enjoy coming here to watch their team, as well as the Bears, play in this great stadium - a keystone of Newark's renaissance."

ROUTE 78: Follow Route 78 East until it splits near Newark Airport, Stay right and follow Routes 1&9 South to Route 21 North (McCarter Highway). You will travel across the viaduct into downtown Newark. After crossing the viaduct stay in the left hand turn lane and at the first light make a left onto Miller Street. Make a right hand turn onto Broad Street. Follow Broad Street for about 20 blocks. Make a right on to Bridge Street.

#### FROM THE NORTH, NORTHEAST & NEW YORK CITY

FROM NEW YORK CITY: From GW Bridge or Lincoln Tunnel follow signs to the NJ Turnpike South. Take NJ Turnpike South to exit 15W. From the Holland Tunnel follow signs to the NJ Turnpike North. Take NJ Turnpike North to exit 15W. Follow directions from exit 15W below.

NEW JERSEY TURNPIKE: Follow NJ Turnpike South to exit 15W (Newark / The Oranges). After the toll booth Route 280 West to exit 15A (Route 21 - Downtown). Follow signs to Route 21 South (McCarter Highway). Make a right onto Route 21 South, (McCarter Highway), at the 2nd light make a right onto Bridge Street.

GARDEN STATE PARKWAY: Follow Garden State Parkway South to exit 145. Follow signs to Route 280 East. Follow Route 280 East to exit 15 (Route 21 South - Downtown). Make a right at the bottom of the ramp onto Route 21 South (McCarter Highway), at the 2nd light make a right onto Bridge Street.

#### VIA PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

The following New Jersey Transit buses provide direct service to Newark Broad Street station, which is less than one block from the stadium: 11, 23, 27, 39, 41, 42, 43, 72, 76, 78, 108, and the Penn Station-Broad Station Shuttle.

Broad Street Station can also be accessed by any train on the Essex County Line. Any New Jersey Transit train can be taken to Newark Penn Station.

#### FROM NJIT TO BEARS & EAGLES (one mile)

From Fleisher Athletic Center (80 Lock Street), travel northeast on Lock (toward New Street) and turn right onto Central Avenue. Follow one-half mile to Washington Street and turn left. After 0.2 miles Washington becomes Bridge Street. The stadium will be on the left. Turn left onto Route 21, then the first left onto Division Street (one-way). Park on Division.







### Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference



When NJIT reclassified its athletic programs to NCAA Division II from Division III in 1997, the Highlanders joined the New York Collegiate Athletic Conference (NYCAC). After three years of NYCAC play, the Highlanders began a new era in the fall of 2000 when they became members of the Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference (CACC).

For its first two seasons in the league, NJIT was the only CACC school with full NCAA membership. The others were in a period of transition while switching affiliation from the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA).

However, five other CACC members completed their provisional requirements in 2002, four more did so in 2003, and Wilmington (Del.) College joined the NCAA fold in 2004. This season, Philadelphia University is in the conference. As a conference, the CACC was voted into active status by the NCAA membership committee in July 2004. Shortly thereafter, it was granted an automatic qualifier into the NCAA Championships in four sports, including men's and women's basketball

NJIT has made its mark in CACC baseball, improving its conference finish in each of head coach Brian Callahan's first five seasons, capped in 2005 with the Highlanders first-place finish and CACC regular season title.

The 2006 season will be the last one in the CACC for NJIT, as the Highlanders begin the process of reclassifying to NCAA Division I from Division II. This season, NJIT will play a full CACC regular season conference slate and individual student-athletes will be eligible for conference honors, as well. As a result of the reclassification, NJIT will not be part of postseason competition. Next season, NJIT will play a Division I schedule.


