NJIT is New Jersey's Science & Technology University. With roots going back to 1881, when it was founded as Newark Technical School, New Jersey Institute of Technology observed its 125th anniversary in 2006.

Located in University Heights, Newark, New Jersey, home to more than 30,000 college students, NJIT's campus is just 10 miles from New York City.

Playing a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future, NJIT, as a major public technological university, is an important pipeline for the flow of technology into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university helps to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$83 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities on the 45-acre campus, including biomedical engineering labs and a campus center.

Instructional Programs

NJIT offers 96 degree programs — 36 undergraduate, 41 master's and 19 doctoral programs — through six schools:

NJIT has 416 full-time faculty; more than 98 percent of whom hold the highest degree in their fie0 than 5,300 undergraduate students and more than 2,800 graduate students. Our students hail from 33 states and more than 100 countries to rank eighth in the nation for diversity.

Albert Dorman Honors College enrolls more than 500 students who take advantage of honors courses, research opportunities, advising and mentoring. Honors College students have SAT scores ranking in the top 10 percent nationally. With more than 44,000 alumni, NJIT is rated by US News and World Report as a top-tier national research university offering bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees.

Research

NJIT drew more than \$75 million in research funding in 2005 and faculty members welcome student collaboration on research projects.

Economic Development

NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies. NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element, together with instruction, research and community service. More than 60 technology start-up companies, many of which hire NJIT students, are on campus.



The Career Edge

All 10 of the majors with the highest starting salaries for 2005-06 grads are in engineering, computing and business, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers.

Computer and data processing services lead the list of the 10 fastest-growing occupations in projections compiled by the US Department of Labor. Computer-related employment is expected to grow 117 percent by 2008, according to the Career Guide to Industries.

As technology changes all fields, those with science and technology backgrounds are positioned to lead. Among the CEOs of the S&P 500 companies, engineering is the single largest undergraduate degree and more than half of CEOs have undergraduate degrees in engineering, business management, science, math and computing.

The Global Edge

The diversity in NJIT's student body and faculty prepares graduates to understand and succeed in the global marketplace. NJIT was named among the world's top 500 universities in a study by the Institute of Higher Education, Shanghai Jiao Tong University.

The Technology Edge

NJIT has been designated one of the nation's most technologically sophisticated universities by Forbes.com and a Princeton Review survey and the university has received major funding from the National Science Foundation and the National Security Agency in recent years.

The Academic Edge

NJIT has long been a national leader in applying new technologies and approaches to the educational experience. NJIT was a pioneer in requiring computer science for students in all majors and the School of Architecture has led innovations in teaching CAD and digital design. The school's innovative "paperless" first-year program was recently cited by Campus Technology Magazine.

Students have a wide range of educational choices in building an interest-tailored program. Among their options are cross-enrolling at neighboring Rutgers to enrich their program with subjects such as music and languages.



NJIT students learn emerging technologies from the researchers behind the technologies, developing valuable marketplace skills. Realworld experience through experiential learning makes graduates more marketable, with many co-op opportunities leading to permanent jobs.

The Regional Edge

New Jersey, with America's highest concentration of pharmaceutical, hi-tech, biotech, and medical device companies is the place to study technology. It has the nation's highest per capita number of engineers and scientists as residents, while also leading in per capita rate of patents issued. Further, the Newark-New York region is a living laboratory for architecture and building sciences, environmental engineering and transportation.

The Research Edge

NJIT has been designated by the State of New Jersey as the Homeland Security Technology Systems Center and NJIT operates the worldrenowned Big Bear Solar Observatory.

A History of NJIT

From the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age, New Jersey Institute of Technology has a rich history with its beginnings developing from the industrial age.

In 1881, an act of the New Jersey State Legislature, recognizing an urgent need, sought a home for what would be the state's technical school. The efforts of Newark's public and private sectors resulted with the opening of Newark Technical School, addressing the state's need.

Over time, the university expanded its curriculum and mission. In 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By the middle of the 20th century, Newark Technical School was transformed into the robust Newark College of Engineering.

The post-war period was one of enormous activity with regular expansion of the campus, as well as the introduction of doctoral level programs. In 1975, with the addition of the New Jersey School of Architecture, the institution had evolved into a technological university, emphasizing a broad range of degrees and dedication to significant research and public College service. Newark of Engineering, stronger than ever, remained intact, but a new university name - New Jersey Institute of Technology - reflected the institution's expanded mission.

A broadened mission called for the creation of a residential campus and the opening of NJIT's first dormitory in 1980 began a period of steady growth that continues. Two new schools were established during the 1980s the College of Science and Liberal Arts (1982) and the School of Industrial Management (1988). The Albert Dorman Honors College was established in 1994, and the newest school, the College of Computing Sciences, was created in 2001.



Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch President

Having joined NJIT as its seventh president in July 2002, Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch is leading the university in a period of multi-layered growth.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$80 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities, while also drawing similar dollars in annual research funding.

Under President Altenkirch, NJIT has expanded its course offerings, with 16 new degree programs added in the 2008-09 academic year alone, and 13 in various stages of development for implementation in the next two years.

Coinciding with the expansion is NJIT's transition from a smaller commuter campus to a larger institution with a larger resident student population. The incoming class of 2012 is the largest in the history of the school, and more than half the freshman class resides on campus.

Tied to that transition is Altenkirch's strong belief that the home institution in New Jersey's largest city needs to be residential and provide the experiences associated with a residential campus. At the same time, Altenkirch is committed to NJIT's involvement with the community in its home city of Newark.

Intercollegiate athletics fits those goals naturally and upgrading NJIT athletics has been a priority of Altenkirch's presidency going back to November 2002 meetings that led to NJIT's reclassification to NCAA Division I.

Adding a personal dimension to his support, Altenkirch, a multi-sport athlete in high school, freshman baseball player at Purdue University, and a former college soccer official, and his wife, Beth, are regular attendees at NJIT competitions, home and away.

Immediately before his selection as president of NJIT, Altenkirch was vice president for research at Mississippi State University (MSU), a position he held from 1998 to 2002.

Prior to his appointment as vice president at MSU, Altenkirch served as dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture at Washington State University (1995-98).

From 1988 to 1995, he was dean of the College of Engineering at MSU. He also served as professor and chair of mechanical engineering at the University of Kentucky (1975-88).

Altenkirch holds a PhD from Purdue University, an MS from the University of California, Berkeley, and a BS from Purdue, all in mechanical engineering.

He is the author of over 50 publications and nearly 100 presentations in combustion and heat transfer and served as principal investigator for 10 Space Shuttle experiments investigating the spread of fire in reduced gravity.

He is a fellow of the American Society of Engineers and in 2008 received the Ellis Island Medal of Honor.



Dr. Joel Bloom Vice President of Academic and Student Services

Dr. Joel Bloom, who joined NJIT in July 1990, is responsible for eight divisions of the university, including physical education and athletics.

In 1998, Bloom was appointed the first dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College in addition to his vice president responsibilities. The honors college enrolls over 500 students, including residents of 15 states and several foreign countries. The combined average SAT score is over 1300 and freshmen typically have ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class. Honors College students maintain a grade point average higher than 3.5.

Prior to his arrival at NJIT, Dr. Bloom served seven years as assistant commissioner of the

New Jersey Department of Education for the Division of General Academic Education. He was responsible for managing many of the education department's initiatives, over 300 grants and contracts, and a \$24 million budget.

Formerly a teacher and school administrator in New York City Public Schools, Dr. Bloom was also a director of research and instructor at Teacher's College, Columbia University.

He is chair of the Greater Newark Consortium for Pre-College Education and vice chair of the State Board for Communities and Schools. He serves further as a member of numerous boards at the state, regional and national levels and has received national and state education awards, as well as federal, foundation and corporate grant awards. He has published journal articles and presented papers on school improvement, curriculum development, college transition and student assessment.

Dr. Bloom holds a master's degree and a doctorate from Teacher's College, Columbia University. He also earned master's and bachelor's degrees from Hunter College of the City University of New York.



Lenny Kaplan Director of Athletics

Since taking over as head of NJIT's division of physical education and athletics in August 2000, Lenny Kaplan has been instrumental in shaping a new direction for the program.

His first task was to help stabilize and expand a program that was entering its fourth year in Division II when he arrived in Newark. In late 2002, after discussions with university President Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch and Vice President Dr. Joel Bloom, Kaplan took on the task of steering NJIT's programs into Division I, a process that is set to reach fruition with full championship eligibility in 2009-10.

The sports offerings have expanded to 19 varsity programs and since 2004, NJIT has renovated its two main on-campus venues-Lubetkin Field and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center. The school also signed a 10-year partnership to play all home baseball in the professional Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and later agreed to host basketball in the new Prudential Center, downtown Newark home of the NHL's New Jersey Devils.

In 2005-06, NJIT's outstanding home facilities allowed it to host ECAC Division II postseason championships in women's soccer and baseball.

Under Kaplan's leadership, many teams achieved regional and national Division II ranking. Women's teams in basketball, tennis and soccer all reached postseason play for the first time in his administration,

Additionally, men's volleyball captured a divisional championship in the Eastern

Intercollegiate Volleyball Association and the next year reached the EIVA playoff semifinals hosted by eventual 2008 national champion Penn State.

Kaplan guided the program toward further stability with membership in the newlyexpanded all-sports Great West Conference, which will offer a conference home for 11 of NJIT's 19 varsity sports.

Before coming to NJIT, Lenny Kaplan served 11 years at Manhattan College, where he began as Manhattan's director of operations and was assistant athletics director from 1991-2000.

Kaplan, a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration, resides in Merrick, NY, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.

STUDENT-ATHLETE SUPPORT

Sports Medicine

NJIT sports medicine is moving forward with expanded facilities and a staff of three fulltime trainers led by head trainer Roger Olean, MEd/ATC, with assistant trainers Paul Grayner, MEd/ATC, and Matt Koscs, MS/ATC. They work with team physicians Louis Rizio, MD, and Rutvik (Rudy) Patel, DO.



Roger Olean

Olean, an intercollegiate athletic trainer since 1992, returned to NJIT in the summer of 2008 after having filled the same position from 2000 to 2005. He earned his bachelor's degree from Slippery Rock (PA) University and his master's degree from Springfield (MA) College and has served on the training staffs at four colleges (NJIT, Hood, Springfield, and SUNY Cobleskill) and three high schools.

Matt Koscs, who earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Delaware, came to NJIT in July 2008. As an undergrad, he was recipient of the Paris

Delligatti Memorial Award for Excellence in Athletic Training.

Prior to NJIT, he served three years as head trainer at Hodgson Vocational Technical High School in Newark, DE. He also worked with soccer clubs in Delaware and was employed at Christiana Care Physical Therapy Plus, in Newark, DE.

Paul Grayner, who holds a bachelor's degree from Saint Leo College in Florida and a master's from American University in Washington, DC, has a diverse background in athletic training, having served at the college and professional levels, as well as in a fitness center setting. He joined the NJIT staff late in 2008.

From the mid-1970s to the mid-1980s, he was a trainer in the minor league systems of the New York Yankees and New York Mets and in 1984 he was assistant trainer with the Mets. He later worked with the Long Island Knights professional basketball team.

At the collegiate level, he was head trainer at

Paul Grayner

Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ from 1989 to 1998 and earlier worked as an assistant trainer at Hofstra, Adelphi and FDU.

Dr. Rizio is a board certified orthopedic surgeon and is fellowship trained in the field of sports medicine. He is a graduate of Rutgers and after earning his medical degree from the UMDNJ/New Jersey Medical School, Dr. Rizio completed his orthopedic residency at Tufts University in Boston.

He then completed a sports medicine fellowship at the University of Miami and was assistant team physician of the Hurricanes, as well as the Miami Dolphins, the Miami Hurricanes.

Dr. Rizio practices at the New Jersey Sports Medicine Institute. Prior to starting his own practice, Dr Rizio was the Chief of Sports Medicine at the NJ Medical School from 2000-2005.

Dr. Patel practices in association with Dr. Rizio. A cum laude graduate of NYIT, Dr. Patel earned his DO from the New York College of Osteopathic Medicine. He was chief resident in Family Medicine at the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School in New Brunswick, NJ, from 2003 to 2006.

Strength and Conditioning

A formal strength and conditioning program is a key part of a Division I program, with an eye toward maximizing individual and team performance in competition. The strength and conditioning coach also works closely with the

Athletic Training Staff in the areas of injury prevention and injury rehabilitation.

The 2008-09 season brought another dimension to NJIT athletics with the hiring of Dan Huff, CSCS, as the Highlanders' first full-time strength and conditioning coach. In addition to the hiring of a full-time coach to coordinate the strength and conditioning, NJIT renovated the weight rooms and purchased new equipment, with the area dedicated to use by the Highlander teams.

Huff previously served five years as strength and conditioning coordinator at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ, from 2003 to 2008, working with an 18-sport NCAA Division I program.

Huff was Sports Performance Director for Velocity Sports Performance in Wall, NJ, immediately before accepting his position at NJIT. He is a graduate of William Paterson University of New Jersey. He holds numerous certifications.

Academic Enrichment

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment (CAPE) added a new component with the 2007 hiring of Erika Rigby McCourt as Associate Director of CAPE in a position that was created for the specific purpose of serving the needs of NJIT's student-athletes.

She focuses on five key areas: academic support, career development, personal development, leadership and community service including the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and CHAMPS Life Skills for NJIT's nearly 300 student-athletes.

In 2008-09, Tim Wuorinen moved over to CAPE as eligibility certification officer/academic advisor, after having spent the previous five-plus years working in the NJIT Department of Athletics as assistant athletic director and coordinator for compliance and student-athlete services.

Erika Rigby McCourt came to NJIT from Seton Hall University, where she was Associate Director of Academic Support Services for athletics from 2004 until she left for NJIT. At Seton Hall, she worked directly with four teams, including men's basketball.

She is with her fourth Division I program in a career that began in 1997 at Northern Arizona, where she directed the Academic Enrichment Program. She later returned home to New Jersey, serving as Academic/Athletic Coordinator at Saint Peter's College from 1999 to 2004.



Erika Rigby McCourt

Rigby McCourt graduated from Providence College, where she was a Big East Conference all-academic runner. She earned master's degrees from Northern Arizona and from Saint Peter's and is pursuing her doctorate at Seton Hall.

A member of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletes, she is on the NCAA Initial Eligibility Waiver Committee.

Erika married Robert McCourt, the head men's soccer coach at Monmouth University, in May 2008 and they reside in Oakhurst, NJ.

Tim Wuorinen was a compliance fellow with the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference and worked in the athletic offices of four colleges, including Western New England College, his undergraduate alma mater. In addition to his bachelor's degree from Western New England, he earned a master's degree from NJIT.

Tim and his wife, Tara, who is the academic/athletic coordinator at Saint Peter's College, reside in Aberdeen, NJ.

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment, headed by Dr. Marybeth Boger, is a resource available to all students within NJIT's Student Services Division. The CAPE provides academic support services and activities to enhance students' academic and professional development and it works with academic and administrative departments to help students develop the necessary analytical and problemsolving skills to become independent learners.

CAPE provides tutoring, student success workshops and testing accommodations.

New Jersey Institute of Technology athletics is on the move to the top level of college athletics—NCAA Division I.

The reclassification is nearly complete, as NJIT closes in on active championship-eligible Division I status, which is slated to arrive for all programs in 2009-10.

Formerly a member of Division II, NJIT got the go-ahead to begin the reclassification process, which began with an exploratory year in 2005-06. All of the programs that previously competed in Division II then moved up to face Division I competition effective in 2006-07.

Two sports—men's soccer and women's soccer—paved the way on a faster NCAA track that allows lower division schools to elevate one sport in each gender to Division I in a process that takes two years to complete.

NJIT men's soccer became a full member of NCAA Division I at the start of the 2005 season, when the Highlanders arrived at championship eligibility. The men's journey to the top level began in 2003. NJIT women's soccer began a similar two-year process in 2005, with full Division I status and championship eligibility arriving with the 2007 season.

The larger process of advancing the entire program to Division I takes longer and includes application, a detailed strategic plan and in-depth annual review of the institution's progress in moving toward its goal of complying with NCAA Division I rules and building a strong, broad-based athletics program.

NJIT's move to Division I progressed quickly after the November 2002 discussions among President Robert A. Altenkirch, Vice President Joel Bloom and Athletics Director Lenny Kaplan.


From there came a proposal from Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I. Little more than two years later, the NCAA approved NJIT's proposal to advance its entire program to Division I.

Along the way, scholarship and operating budgets have been enhanced, with expanded coaching staffs, increased scholarship dollars and upgraded facilities for competition and practice. Upgrading athletics has been a priority for Dr. Altenkirch since he was selected as the seventh President of NJIT in May 2002.

"As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university athletically with our academic peers," said Altenkirch. "It will also enable us to recruit the best and brightest student-athletes, improve athletics facilities available to the entire NJIT community, gain regional and national visibility, and build strong linkages with students that will carry over to their days as alumni."

Moving to Division I has allowed NJIT studentathletes to test themselves in competition against their peers from all over the country, including competition against teams from the nation's best conferences.

Along the way, two NJIT opponents (Maryland men's soccer in 2005 and Penn State men's volleyball in 2008) have faced the Highlanders in the regular season and then gone on to win their respective national championship.

New Jersey Turnpike: Driving North

from South Jersey: NJ Turnpike to Exit 13A Newark Airport. After toll booth stay to left follow signs to Rt. 1 & 9 North. You will merge onto Rt. 1 & 9 North. Airport will be on right. Follow signs for downtown Newark and Rt. 21 North-(left lane exit ramp). Downtown Newark will be in front of you. Follow Rt. 21 North (McCarter Highway). Turn left on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren St. traffic light (Raymond Blvd. becomes Lock St.) Fleisher Athletic Center & Lubetkin Field will be on your right.

New Jersey Turnpike: Driving South

from North Jersey: Take exit 15W to Route 280 West. Then follow Route 280 West directions.

Brian Callahan Head Coach

Brian Callahan enters his ninth season, the third in NJIT's Division I era, having guided the program to record success, including the 2006 Eastern College Athletic Conference postseason championship that capped the school's Division II era.

In 2007, facing the program's first Division I schedule, Callahan directed the Highlanders to 15 wins, including an 8-10 mark in the last 18 games.

On May 22, 2006, Callahan's Highlanders won the ECAC postseason championship, finishing with a school-record 27 wins, including a three-game sweep of the ECAC Tournament. It was NJIT's third straight season with at least 20 wins and an ECAC postseason berth.

One of the nation's youngest head coaches when he took the helm in 2000-01, Callahan improved NJIT's conference finish in each of his first five seasons, culminating in the 2005 Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference regular season title.

In his first season (2001), the Highlanders placed seventh in the CACC, before advancing to sixth, fifth, second and then first in 2005. Callahan was voted by his peers as CACC Coach of the Year in 2004 and 2005.

In 2003, the team qualified for its first CACC playoff berth, a feat it repeated in 2004 and 2005 (NJIT was not eligible for the 2006 CACC playoffs). The 2005 Highlanders also won the CACC Team Sportsmanship Award.

Callahan coached 20 all-conference and two all-region players and one conference Player of the Year at NJIT from 2001 to 2006. And his 2007 team had the program's first New Jersey all-state Division I first-team and national Division I Independent 1st-team all-star, Kwesi Mitchell, who then became a professional baseball signee.

A graduate of Bayonne (NJ) High School in his hometown, Callahan earned bachelor's (1996, magna cum laude) and master's degrees (1998) from Saint Peter's College in Jersey City, NJ.

A four-year baseball letterwinner at Saint Peter's, Callahan earned Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference all-academic honors as a senior. From 1996 to 1998, he served Saint Peter's as graduate assistant in sports information and assistant baseball coach. He is also a member of the school's intramural Hall of Fame and was an assistant coach at Jersey City's Ferris High School in 1998-99.

Ed Ward Assistant Coach

The veteran coach joined the NJIT staff in 2001, having spent 12 seasons as an assistant at the NCAA Division I level and then starting a Division II program as head coach.

Ward's NJIT duties include instructing the hitters, who have twice set new records for team batting average, the latest in 2006, when the Highlanders batted .317 and belted out a record 32 homers. He also oversees the program's recruiting and outfield instruction.

Before NJIT, Ward was the startup head coach at Division II Felician, winning 34 in two seasons, including three vs. nationally-ranked DII foes and one Division I squad while reaching the conference playoffs each year. Prior to Felician, he logged 12 years as an assistant at Division I Fairleigh Dickinson, where 18 of his recruits went on to sign professional contracts.

Ward recently completed his 11th season as a men's basketball assistant at Montclair State, including a 14-game stint as interim head coach, when he led the Red Hawks into the 2005 conference playoffs while head coach Ted Fiore was on medical leave. In 2002-03 Montclair won the conference championship and advanced to the NCAA Division III Sweet Sixteen.

He has also coached high school baseball and basketball, is a certified baseball umpire and holds a 25-year Service Award with the American Baseball Coaches Association and the New Jersey State Baseball Umpires Association.

A sought-after coach and lecturer at baseball and basketball camps throughout the region, Coach Ward directs baseball camps around the calendar. He is director of the Golden Falcon Baseball Camp for boys and girls (K-8th grade); director of Improve Your Skills Baseball Camp for high school boys (grades 9-12) and during the winter, Ward runs the Improve Your Skills Pitchers/Catchers Camp and winter hitting camp.

He coaches the 14U Jersey City Diamond Dawgs and the 15 year-old RBI Team in Jersey City, which will host the Northeast Regionals in a tournament run by Major League Baseball. The Elizabeth, NJ, resident received a Bachelor of Arts degree in physical education from Kean College in 1981.



Chris Reardon Pitching Coach

Fresh from leading nearby Caldwell College to its second consecutive NCAA Division II Regional postseason berth as head coach, Reardon was named NJIT's pitching coach in the fall of 2008.

He led Caldwell to three NCAA Division II Northeast Regional postseason appearances in eight years, including 2007 and 2008. His overall record in eight seasons at Caldwell was 176-150.

NJIT head coach Brian Callahan and Reardon have known each other since they both became head coaches at rival conference schools in 2000-01. At the time, NJIT competed in the Division II Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference, as did Reardon's Caldwell teams. NJIT moved up to face Division I competition starting in 2007, but Callahan and Reardon have remained friends.

Reardon led Caldwell to the Division II Regionals following the 2004, 2007 and 2008 seasons and his teams captured three conference regular season crowns and two conference tournament titles, including a championship double in 2008.

He was named CACC Coach of the Year in 2003 and 2007, an award that Callahan received in 2004 and 2005 when the Highlanders belonged to the conference.

Reardon's teams at Caldwell produced 37 allconference honorees and ranked first in the conference in both team batting average and team earned run average each of the last two years. The 2008 Cougars ranked fifth nationally in Division II with a 3.11 team ERA. His 2003 team was also ranked in ERA.

Before Caldwell, Reardon was an assistant coach in 1999-2000 at St. John's, one of the top Division I programs in the Northeast. He began his coaching career at Nassau Community College in Garden City, NY.

Reardon, who played two years at New Mexico Junior College and two years at

Queens (NY) College, is a 1998 graduate of Queens. The proud father of daughter, Madison, Reardon resides in Cedar Grove, NJ.



John Farmer Graduate Assistant Coach

John Farmer, a graduate of neighboring Rutgers University, Newark, where he was a four-year starter in baseball, became a graduate assistant coach at NJIT, starting in the fall of 2008.

He earned his bachelor's degree at Rutgers-Newark with a major in criminal justice. On the ball field, he started three years at second base and one year at shortstop, batting close to .300 for his career and earning secondteam all-conference honors in the New Jersey Athletic Conference in 2005.

He is a graduate of Toms River East High School, where he was four-year starter on teams that won six championships, including the 2001 New Jersey Group IV title.

Farmer has worked for three years on the grounds crew and operations for the professional Newark Bears and since 2005 on the Rutgers-Newark athletics building operations and game day staff.



Tyler Hamilton Student Assistant Coach

Tyler Hamilton is serving as a student assistant coach after having been an infielder with the Highlanders for the previous four seasons, including the 2005 Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference championship, the 2006 ECAC Division II champions and the first two NJIT Division I teams. An architecture major, Hamilton was an all-academic honoree in the CACC.

2009 Outlook

Taking a look at the recent history of NJIT baseball can help put the team's 2009 into perspective.

In 2001, when the program was competing at the Division II level and Brian Callahan became the head coach, progress meant setting a new school record for wins at the Division II level. The following four years saw NJIT improve its standing within the Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference each season, capped by a first-place finish in 2005. And NJIT's final season in Division II ended with a postseason championship sweep of the ECAC Championship, as the 2006 Highlanders won a school-record 27 times.

Stepping up to Division I competition in 2007, NJIT knew it would have to adjust its standard of success. Even so, the Highlanders posted a respectable 15 wins overall, including a 9-10 record nine in the last 19 contests.

While the Highlanders expected challenges in competing at the Division I level, the 2008 season was more difficult than expected.

Last season, a realist had to expect slippage at the plate with the graduation of several stalwarts from the Division II championships and the smooth transition to the first season of Division I. At the same time, the top four ERA leaders from the first Division I season were returning, so the pitching was expected to be strong.

Unfortunately for the Highlanders, not only the hitting dropped off, but so did a lot of other things, including the pitching and the result was the first misstep for a program that had been rising steadily for six straight years.

Against that background, 2009 shapes up as a full-fledged rebuilding year, with the freshman class more than doubling the seniors (9-to-4) on the roster. And with just 20 players on the roster, nearly everyone can expect to see extensive playing time and many will be asked to fill more than one role.

For example, senior PJ Saporito, a talented hitter, has just 62 career at-bats, but he is likely to play every day at either first base or designated hitter when he is not filling his traditional college role as a starting left-handed pitcher.

"Our goal for this year is to go out every day and compete as hard as we can and have a chance to be in every game," said Callahan. "We hope the young players will learn every day what it takes to succeed at the Division I level and we hope the upper classmen can carry us when the freshmen go through growing pains."

The team's work in the offseason encourages the coach. "All the guys have put in the time and effort in the classroom and in the weight room to be successful," he said. "I'm proud of what they've done to prepare themselves. With the low (roster) numbers, they haven't taken anything for granted and they've pushed each other because they know everyone has to contribute for us to have any success."

Of the position players, only senior 2B Craig Binkiewicz has been a full-time starter. An infielder in high school, he has been an outfielder his first three years in college, but is returning to his old position.

A nationally-ranked hitter (.427 average) at the Division II level as a freshman, he helped lead NJIT to the 2006 ECAC championship as the team's leadoff man. Binkiewicz has remained a catalyst despite his average dropping into the .200s the last two years. He will look to close his NJIT career with something closer to his freshman success.

The only other returnees to play 20 games or more in 2008 were: utility man Matt Tomczyk (23 games, 18 starts); outfielder James D'Aloia (28 games; 22 starts); and, infielder John Berner (20 games, 13 starts). Two other veterans—senior tri-captain Thomas Farina and junior Kyle McCarthy—add a veteran presence to the roster.

All of the returnees have shown good things at times in the past, but it will be essential for them to hit better than they did in 2008, when Binkiewicz, at .238, had the best batting average in the group.

Another veteran who will bolster the lineup is Saporito, who has batted 62 times in three seasons, but whose primary role in college has been as a left-handed starting pitcher. A talented hitter who homered in his first college at-bat, Saporito will play first base or perform as the designated hitter on days when he doesn't pitch. And he will be part of the batting order on days when he pitches.

Nearly half of the players on the roster (nine of 20) are freshmen, so it should be no surprise that they will be asked to take on important roles.





Dan Moreno is a big, strong player who can man the corner infield positions and will be a key hitter in the middle of the order. Vincent Del Vecchio will move in at shortstop, where he is expected to be a defensive upgrade at a crucial position.

Another critical defensive position will be manned by a pair of freshmen, as Bryan Bleakley and John Bouck move in as the team's catchers. Bleakley, in particular, is expected to add to the team's hitting, as well.

Most of the outfield spots are up for grabs, although D'Aloia, a strong defender who should be able to improve his hitting with more regular game action, has a leg up to play center field.

Tomczyk, who played mostly at catcher to help address a team need in 2008, is a top candidate in the outfield, as are Farina, the veteran captain, and speedy freshman Jeffrey Pizzi. Converted pitcher Gio Bermudez, freshman Anthony Caiola, and freshman Jeff Salerno are in the picture, as well.

The numbers on the pitching staff are thinner than anyone would like. However, senior lefthanders PJ Saporito and Matt Melody will be the anchors.

Saporito, who emerged as an ace in 2007, had a difficult 2008 that mirrored NJIT's struggles as a team. He has had a strong offseason that included another stellar summer in the New York Collegiate Baseball League, one of the top leagues of its kind, and has looked good in preseason drills.

He is good enough to give his team a shot at winning any time he takes the mound.

Melody, who competed in the NYCBL the last two years, as well, is the team's hardest thrower. He was a starting pitcher for two years, but in 2008 moved to the bullpen, where he was slated to be the closer. He appeared in a team-high 27 games, but now he moves back to the starting rotation.

Emerging as the third starter is sophomore right-hander Steven Ace. At 6-3, 210, he has the big frame needed to be a starting pitcher and he has improved in the offseason. As a freshman, he appeared in 12 games, all in relief and threw just over 12 innings. He will likely be asked to pitch four or five times that total as a sophomore starter in 2009. The fourth starter remains unclear. Junior RHP Chris Parenti is a possibility to fill the role. He had a promising freshman season in 2006 (5-0 record), but missed all of 2007 with an injury and did not get back to form in 2008. He is likely to start and relieve in 2009.

Freshmen right-handers Reid Okita and Ian Oates figure to work out of the bullpen, with Okita serving as a long man and Oates possibly filling the closer's role.

Dan Moreno, who is likely to start at a corner infield spot, also looms as a prominent pitcher with a chance to start or relieve. Yet another freshman position player, Jeff Salerno, and Tomczyk, the sophomore utilityman, will also see action on the mound for NJIT.

The mixing and matching will be done against a challenging schedule. Indeed, NJIT's first nine scheduled games are against teams from the high-powered Big East Conference. The opening series is slated against Pitt, to be played in North Carolina. Next is a four-game set at West Virginia, followed by a game at Rutgers and then a game at Seton Hall in the opening round of the three-day Strike Out Cancer Tournament, hosted by Seton Hall.

NJIT will follow that tournament with its annual Spring Break trip to Florida before returning to New Jersey for the home opener against Lehigh on March 25.

Lehigh is the first of three Patriot League opponents for NJIT, which will also take on Lafayette and Army. The Highlanders will face opponents from the America East, Atlantic 10, Colonial Athletic Association, Metro Atlantic, and Northeast Conferences, as well.

America East opponents will include Binghamton, Hartford, UMBC (in Florida) and Vermont; Saint Joseph's from the Atlantic 10 will play home-and-home against NJIT. The MAAC opponents are Iona (Strike Out Cancer Tournament), Manhattan, Marist, Rider, Saint Peter's, and Siena, while NEC regular season champ Monmouth is on the Highlanders schedule, as is LIU (in Florida). Northeastern of the CAA will be NJIT's third foe in the Strike Out Cancer Tournament.

Army, Binghamton, Manhattan, and Monmouth all came in first place in their conference regular seasons and Rider won the MAAC Tournament championship to advance to the NCAAs.







The History of the Robbie Levine Foundation

The Robbie Levine Foundation was founded to honor the memory of Robbie Levine, a happy, healthy nine-year-old boy whose life revolved around his family, his friends and baseball. Robbie died suddenly on September 27, 2005 when his heart stopped while he was running the bases during a Little League team practice.

A healthy fourth grader, Robbie had experienced a dizzy spell during practice several months earlier, but testing by a pediatric cardiologist did not detect any health problems. When Robbie collapsed on the ball field, no defibrillator was available on the scene and, although his father, Dr. Craig Levine, performed cardiopulmonary resuscitation, Robbie could not be revived. In the wake of this unimaginable tragedy in their lives, Robbie's parents, Jill and Dr. Craig Levine, created the Robbie Levine Foundation to ensure that no other parent, on the ball field or anywhere else, should have to undergo the horror that they have faced.

It is their devotion to fostering heart health and supporting individuals with heart disease through education, support and technology that is the driving force behind the establishment and continuing operations of the Robbie Levine foundation.

The organization's goal is to help ensure that children and adults with heart disease get the care, treatment and support they need to live full, long and healthy lives. 



Home of the NJIT Highlanders

New York Yankees manager Joe Torre visited New Jersey Institute of Technology on December 8, 2005 to herald a new partnership between NJIT's baseball team, the Highlanders, and the Newark Bears.

Torre, a friend of the Bears and of college baseball, was on hand as the Highlanders signed a 10-year contract to play their home games at Bears & Eagles Riverfront Stadium in Newark.

"I think this partnership is nothing but aces," Torre said during a press conference at NJIT. "It's a partnership between two class organizations that will make for nothing but a lot of fun for everyone."

For the previous two years, the Highlanders played their home games at the stadium. But the team's longer-term commitment to play at the stadium comes as NJIT elevates its winning baseball program from NCAA Division II to Division I play.

"NJIT is bringing Division I baseball to this great stadium," said NJIT President Robert A. Altenkirch, "which will generate the highest level of excitement. It's a great partnership that allows NJIT to play intercollegiate baseball in a great facility, maybe the best for college baseball in the country."



Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the Newark Bears, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999.

Since then Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium has hosted many exciting events including the 2001 Atlantic League All Star Game and the clinching contest of the Bears 2002 Atlantic League championship. In addition The Den is the home to the annual Pride Bowl sprint football game which benefits Newark's Project Pride each fall.

With a seating capacity of 6,200 Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadiums affords everyone in attendance an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major leaguecaliber press box featuring two radio booths and two television booths.

The name, Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, honors Newark's rich baseball history. The original Bears were a farm team for the New York Yankees up until 1949 and the Eagles were a very successful Negro League team that played in Newark until 1950.

The speakers noted that the greatest beneficiary of the partnership between NJIT and the Bears is the city of Newark. The Highlanders playing at the stadium will add vitality to the city, as NJIT students and fans stream to see their team.

"NJIT's continuing and growing partnership with the Newark Bears is an integral part of our effort to be fully engaged with our host community in Newark and Essex County," Altenkirch said. "Our students enjoy coming here to watch their team, as well as the Bears, play in this great stadium - a keystone of Newark's renaissance. It's satisfying to work with the Bears, a great partner, and to be a part of their effort to grow minor league baseball in Newark."


Each year the two universities co-sponsor a common season of theatrical productions, as well as 'World Week,' a joint program of hon-

Prudential Center

The new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils is in downtown Newark at the corner of Mulberry and Edison streets, about one mile from the NJIT's University Heights campus.

Opened in October 2007, 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of the city's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. In addition to the world's best hockey, it will be home to numerous entertainment and sporting events, including NJIT basketball. In 2007-08, NJIT hosted six basketball games there on four dates and there are plans to play more games in 2008-09 in North America's newest major arena.

The arena, with seating for 18,500 spectators, features a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as the latest in ice-surface technology and a gourmet restaurant overlooking the ice for Devils games. The building contains 850,000 square feet of space, 9,000 tons of steel, eight million pounds of structural steel and 25,000 cubic yards of concrete.

Red Bull Arena

The Red Bulls of Major League Soccer broke ground in September 2006 for Red Bull Arena, a 25,000-seat soccer stadium and a major component of the Harrison MetroCentre development, located across the Passaic River, about two miles from NJIT's campus.



The \$100 million 'soccer specific' stadium will feature a 360-degree European-style roof/ canopy covering the majority of the seating. When completed, Red Bull Arena will be the home of the MLS Red Bulls, international soccer and other events.

The multi-billion dollar Harrison MetroCentre will feature three million square feet of office space; 3,500 residential units; 300,000 square feet of retail space and over 10,000 decked parking spaces when completed.

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium



Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the professional baseball Newark Bears and since 2004 the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999. With a seating capacity of 6,200, "The Den" affords fans an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major leaguecaliber press box.

In December 2005, NJIT and the Bears held a joint press conference to herald a new partnership that includes a 10-year deal that extends Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium as the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball.





Official Hat of NJIT Baseball







NJIT baseball will compete as a Division I Independent in 2009, but starting in 2010, the Highlanders will be part of the expanded multi-sport Great West Conference.

On July 10, 2008, NJIT was one of six institutions to announce it had joined the expansion of the Great West Conference to form a Division I all-sports league that will begin full conference scheduling and championships in 2009-10.

The announcement was made simultaneously by the six institutions and by the conference office, which is led by Commissioner Ed Grom. Joining NJIT in making the announcement were: Houston Baptist, North Dakota, South Dakota, Texas-Pan American and Utah Valley.

In October 2008, Chicago State announced that it would join the original six institutions, bringing the expanded all-sports Great West to seven members. Then, in January 2009, Commissioner Grom announced the addition of associate members NYIT and Northern Colorado to join the six base-ball-playing Great West schools for the 2010 season (South Dakota does not sponsor baseball).

The plan is for the eight teams to engage each other in four-game, three-day weekend series to build a 28-game Great West Conference schedule.

The Great West, which had existed for four years as a football-only league in the NCAA's Division I Football Championship Subdivision (formerly known as I-AA), is expanding into an all-sports league with the addition of NJIT, Texas-Pan American, Utah Valley, Houston Baptist, University of North Dakota, University of South Dakota, and Chicago State.

The all-sports version of the Great West Conference will eventually offer championships in 15 sports, 12 of which are sponsored by NJIT, including: baseball, men's and women's basketball; women's soccer; women's volleyball; women's tennis; men's and women's cross country; men's and women's indoor track and field; and, men's and women's outdoor track and field.

NJIT, Texas-Pan American and Utah Valley have been playing each other in multiple sports, including home-and-home games in men's and women's basketball, since NJIT began facing Division I competition for the first time in 2006-07. Houston Baptist became an NJIT foe in 2008-09.


NJIT and Utah Valley are scheduled to complete their NCAA reclassification and become active championship-eligible members of NCAA Division I in 2009-10, the first year of conference play. Houston Baptist announced an agreement with the NCAA that can make HBU an active member of Division I in 2011-12 and North Dakota and South Dakota will be active members of Division I in 2012-13. Texas-Pan American and Chicago State have been active Division I programs for many years.

The expanded conference is not eligible for automatic Division I championship postseason qualification, but will offer the benefit of conference championships, stable scheduling opportunities in all conference sports and individual recognition for student-athletes through weekly and season all-conference recognition. The individual awards programs for student-athletes have begun in 2008-09.

NJIT's sports that do not come under the Great West umbrella will continue in their existing conferences—men's soccer in the Atlantic Soccer Conference and men's volleyball in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association, which has an automatic NCAA postseason berth, which was claimed in 2008 by eventual 2008 national champion Penn State.

In addition, NJIT will continue to schedule against top non-conference regional and national opponents. Two NJIT opponents—Maryland in men's soccer and Penn State in men's volleyball have won national championships following seasons in which they faced the Highlanders. Meanwhile, NJIT teams will compete regularly with opponents from the Big East, Atlantic 10, America East, Ivy League, Patriot League, MAAC and Northeast Conference.
