About NJIT

NJIT is New Jersey's Science & Technology University. With roots going back to 1881, when it was founded as Newark Technical School, New Jersey Institute of Technology observed its 125th anniversary in 2006.

Located in University Heights, Newark, New Jersey, home to more than 30,000 college students, NJIT's campus is just 10 miles from New York City.

Playing a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future, NJIT, as a major public technological university, is an important pipeline for the flow of technology into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university helps to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$83 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities on the 45-acre campus, including biomedical engineering labs and a campus center.

Instructional Programs

NJIT offers 96 degree programs — 36 undergraduate, 41 master's and 19 doctoral programs — through six schools:

NJIT has 416 full-time faculty; more than 98 percent of whom hold the highest degree in their field. Over 5,300 undergraduate students and more than 2,800 graduate students. Our students hail from 33 states and more than 100 countries to rank eighth in the nation for diversity.

Albert Dorman Honors College enrolls more than 500 students who take advantage of honors courses, research opportunities, advising and mentoring. Honors College students have SAT scores ranking in the top 10 percent nationally.

With more than 44,000 alumni, NJIT is rated by US News and World Report as a top-tier national research university offering bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees.

Research

NJIT drew more than \$75 million in research funding in 2005 and faculty members welcome student collaboration on research projects.

Economic Development

NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies. NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element, together with instruction, research and community service. More than 60 technology start-up companies, many of which hire NJIT students, are on campus.



The Career Edge

All 10 of the majors with the highest starting salaries for 2005-06 grads are in engineering, computing and business, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers.

Computer and data processing services lead the list of the 10 fastest-growing occupations in projections compiled by the US Department of Labor. Computer-related employment is expected to grow 117 percent by 2008, according to the Career Guide to Industries.

As technology changes all fields, those with science and technology backgrounds are positioned to lead. Among the CEOs of the S&P 500 companies, engineering is the single largest undergraduate degree and more than half of CEOs have undergraduate degrees in engineering, business management, science, math and computing.

The Global Edge

The diversity in NJIT's student body and faculty prepares graduates to understand and succeed in the global marketplace. NJIT was named among the world's top 500 universities in a study by the Institute of Higher Education, Shanghai Jiao Tong University.

The Technology Edge

NJIT has been designated one of the nation's most technologically sophisticated universities by Forbes.com and a Princeton Review survey and the university has received major funding from the National Science Foundation and the National Security Agency in recent years.

The Academic Edge

NJIT has long been a national leader in applying new technologies and approaches to the educational experience. NJIT was a pioneer in requiring computer science for students in all majors and the School of Architecture has led innovations in teaching CAD and digital design. The school's innovative "paperless" first-year program was recently cited by Campus Technology Magazine.

Students have a wide range of educational choices in building an interest-tailored program. Among their options are cross-enrolling at neighboring Rutgers to enrich their program with subjects such as music and languages.



NJIT students learn emerging technologies from the researchers behind the technologies, developing valuable marketplace skills. Real-world experience through experiential learning makes graduates more marketable, with many co-op opportunities leading to permanent jobs.

The Regional Edge

New Jersey, with America's highest concentration of pharmaceutical, hi-tech, biotech, and medical device companies is the place to study technology. It has the nation's highest per capita number of engineers and scientists as residents, while also leading in per capita rate of patents issued. Further, the Newark-New York region is a living laboratory for architecture and building sciences, environmental engineering and transportation.

The Research Edge

NJIT has been designated by the State of New Jersey as the Homeland Security Technology Systems Center and NJIT operates the world-renowned Big Bear Solar Observatory.

A History of NJIT

From the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age, New Jersey Institute of Technology has a rich history with its beginnings developing from the industrial age.

In 1881, an act of the New Jersey State Legislature, recognizing an urgent need, sought a home for what would be the state's technical school. The efforts of Newark's public and private sectors resulted with the opening of Newark Technical School, addressing the state's need.

Over time, the university expanded its curriculum and mission. In 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By the middle of the 20th century, Newark Technical School was transformed into the robust Newark College of Engineering.

The post-war period was one of enormous activity with regular expansion of the campus, as well as the introduction of doctoral level programs. In 1975, with the addition of the New Jersey School of Architecture, the institution had evolved into a technological university, emphasizing a broad range of degrees and dedication to significant research and public service. Newark College of Engineering, stronger than ever, remained intact, but a new university name — New Jersey Institute of Technology — reflected the institution's expanded mission.

A broadened mission called for the creation of a residential campus and the opening of NJIT's first dormitory in 1980 began a period of steady growth that continues. Two new schools were established during the 1980s—the College of Science and Liberal Arts (1982) and the School of Industrial Management (1988). The Albert Dorman Honors College was established in 1994, and the newest school, the College of Computing Sciences, was created in 2001.



Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch

President

Having joined NJIT as its seventh president in July 2002, Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch is leading the university in a period of multi-layered growth.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$80 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities, while also drawing similar dollars in annual research funding.

Under President Altenkirch, NJIT has expanded its course offerings, with 16 new degree programs added in the 2008-09 academic year alone, and 13 in various stages of development for implementation in the next two years.

Coinciding with the expansion is NJIT's transition from a smaller commuter campus to a larger institution with a larger resident student population. The incoming class of 2012 is the largest in the history of the school, and more than half the freshman class resides on campus.

Tied to that transition is Altenkirch's strong belief that the home institution in New Jersey's largest city needs to be residential and provide the experiences associated with a residential campus. At the same time, Altenkirch is committed to NJIT's involvement with the community in its home city of Newark.

Intercollegiate athletics fits those goals naturally and upgrading NJIT athletics has been a priority of Altenkirch's presidency going back to November 2002 meetings that led to NJIT's reclassification to NCAA Division I.

Adding a personal dimension to his support, Altenkirch, a multi-sport athlete in high school, freshman baseball player at Purdue University, and a former college soccer official, and his wife, Beth, are regular attendees at NJIT competitions, home and away.

Immediately before his selection as president of NJIT, Altenkirch was vice president for research at Mississippi State University (MSU),

a position he held from 1998 to 2002.

Prior to his appointment as vice president at MSU, Altenkirch served as dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture at Washington State University (1995-98).

From 1988 to 1995, he was dean of the College of Engineering at MSU. He also served as professor and chair of mechanical engineering at the University of Kentucky (1975-88).

Altenkirch holds a PhD from Purdue University, an MS from the University of California, Berkeley, and a BS from Purdue, all in mechanical engineering.

He is the author of over 50 publications and nearly 100 presentations in combustion and heat transfer and served as principal investigator for 10 Space Shuttle experiments investigating the spread of fire in reduced gravity.

He is a fellow of the American Society of Engineers and in 2008 received the Ellis Island Medal of Honor.



Dr. Joel Bloom

Vice President of Academic and Student Services

Dr. Joel Bloom, who joined NJIT in July 1990, is responsible for eight divisions of the university, including physical education and athletics.

In 1998, Bloom was appointed the first dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College in addition to his vice president responsibilities. The honors college enrolls over 500 students, including residents of 15 states and several foreign countries. The combined average SAT score is over 1300 and freshmen typically have ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class. Honors College students maintain a grade point average higher than 3.5.

Prior to his arrival at NJIT, Dr. Bloom served seven years as assistant commissioner of the

New Jersey Department of Education for the Division of General Academic Education. He was responsible for managing many of the education department's initiatives, over 300 grants and contracts, and a \$24 million budget.

Formerly a teacher and school administrator in New York City Public Schools, Dr. Bloom was also a director of research and instructor at Teacher's College, Columbia University.

He is chair of the Greater Newark Consortium for Pre-College Education and vice chair of the State Board for Communities and Schools. He serves further as a member of numerous boards at the state, regional and national levels and has received national and state education awards, as well as federal, foundation and corporate grant awards. He has published journal articles and presented papers on school improvement, curriculum development, college transition and student assessment.

Dr. Bloom holds a master's degree and a doctorate from Teacher's College, Columbia University. He also earned master's and bachelor's degrees from Hunter College of the City University of New York.



Lenny Kaplan

Director of Athletics

Since taking over as head of NJIT's division of physical education and athletics in August 2000, Lenny Kaplan has been instrumental in guiding NJIT's momentous reclassification to NCAA Division I from Division II,

Upon his arrival at NJIT, Kaplan helped stabilize and expand a program that was entering its fourth year in Division II when he arrived in Newark. In late 2002, after discussions with university President Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch and Vice President Dr. Joel Bloom, Kaplan took on the task of steering NJIT's programs into Division I, a process that is set to reach fruition with full championship eligibility in 2009-10.

Throughout Kaplan's tenure, NJIT has enhanced the athletics program, particularly in areas that benefit the student-athletes directly.

The sports offerings have expanded to 19 varsity programs and since 2004, NJIT has renovated its two main on-campus venues—Lubetkin Field and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center. The school also signed a 10-year partnership to play all home baseball in the professional Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and later agreed to host basketball in the new Prudential Center, downtown Newark home of the NHL's New Jersey Devils.

In 2005-06, NJIT's outstanding home facilities allowed it to host two ECAC Division II post-season championships—women's soccer in the fall and baseball in the spring.

Under Kaplan's leadership, many teams achieved regional and national Division II ranking. Success for several women's teams was unprecedented, with basketball, tennis and soccer all reaching postseason play for the first time in his administration,

Additionally, men's volleyball captured a 2007 divisional championship in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association and the next year reached the EIVA playoff semifinals hosted by eventual 2008 national champion Penn State.

As active NCAA Division I status and postseason eligibility in all sports for the 2009-10 academic year nears, Kaplan guided the Highlanders toward further stability with membership in the newly-expanded all-sports Great West Conference, which will offer a conference home for 11 of NJIT's 19 varsity sports.

Before coming to NJIT, Lenny Kaplan served 11 years at Manhattan College, where he began as Manhattan's director of operations and then advanced to assistant athletics director from 1991-2000.

Kaplan, a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration, resides in Merrick, NY, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua. Sports Medicine

NJIT's sports medicine is moving forward with expanded facilities and a staff of three full-time trainers led by head trainer Roger Olean, MEd/ATC. Matt Koscs, MS/ATC is the assistant trainer and one of the full-time positions is vacant as of November 2008. They work with team physicians Louis Rizio, MD, and Rutvik (Rudy) Patel, DO.

Olean, an intercollegiate athletic trainer since 1992, returned to NJIT in the summer of 2008 after having filled the same position from 2000 to 2005.

Olean, who earned his bachelor's degree from Slippery Rock (PA) University in 1991 and his

master's degree from Springfield (MA) College in 1998, has served on the training staffs at four colleges and three high schools.

He began his career at Hood College in 1992 and also worked on the Springfield College staff while pursuing his master's. After his first tour with the Highlanders, he spent two years at SUNY Cobleskill. Olean also worked at three high schools.

Matt Koscs, who earned both his bachelor's (2005) and master's (2008) degrees from the University of Delaware, came to NJIT in July 2008. As an undergrad, he was recipient of the Paris Delligatti Memorial Award for Excellence in Athletic Training.

Prior to NJIT, he served three years as head trainer at Hodgson Vocational Technical High

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School in Newark, DE. He was head trainer for the Delaware Dynasty semi-pro soccer team, as well as with the Kirkwood Soccer Club and was employed at Christiana Care Physical Therapy Plus, in Newark, DE, where he was an athletic trainer and Director of Athletic Training Services in a clinical setting.

Dr. Rizio is a board certified orthopedic surgeon and is fellowship trained in the field of sports medicine. He is a graduate of Rutgers and after earning his medical degree from the UMDNJ/New Jersey Medical School, Dr. Rizio completed his orthopedic residency at Tufts University in Boston.

He then completed a sports medicine fellowship at the University of Miami. During his fellowship, he was assistant team physician of the Miami Dolphins, the Miami Hurricanes and the Florida Marlins.

Dr. Rizio, who specializes in sports-related injuries, practices at the New Jersey Sports Medicine Institute. Prior to starting his own practice, Dr Rizio was the Chief of Sports Medicine at the NJ Medical School from 2000-2005.

Dr. Patel practices in association with Dr. Rizio. A cum laude graduate of NYIT, Dr. Patel earned his DO from the New York College of Osteopathic Medicine. He was chief resident in Family Medicine at the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School in New Brunswick, NJ, from 2003 to 2006.

Strength and Conditioning

The 2008-09 season brought another dimension to NJIT athletics with the hiring of Dan Huff, CSCS, as the first full-time strength and conditioning coach.

In addition to the hiring of a full-time coach to coordinate the strength and conditioning for NJIT's 19 intercollegiate varsity teams, the university renovated the weight rooms and purchased new art equipment, with the area dedicated to use by the Highlander teams.

A formal and ongoing strength and conditioning program is part of most Division I programs, with an eye toward maximizing individual and team performance in competition.

The strength and conditioning coach also works closely with the Athletic Training Staff in the areas of injury prevention and injury rehabilitation.

Dan Huff brings solid experience to the newly-created post, which represents another step in NJIT's commitment to the growth of its young Division I program.

Huff previously served five years as strength and conditioning coordinator at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ. He worked with the Knights' 18-sport NCAA Division I athletic program from 2003 to 2008.

Huff was Sports Performance Director for Velocity Sports Performance in Wall, NJ, immediately before accepting his position at NJIT. He is also owner and head strength coach of Huff Training, LLC.

Prior to earning his degree in Physical Education with a concentration in exercise physiology from William Paterson University, Huff received a certificate of exercise science from Bergen Community College.

He worked on the Fitness Center staff at the YMCA of Greater Bergen County and was an exercise physiologist and Health and Fitness Center director for the YM-YWHA of North Jersey.

Huff holds numerous certifications, including NSCA Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist and YMCA Strength Training Instructor.

Academic Enrichment

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment (CAPE) added a new component with the hiring in 2007 of Erika Rigby McCourt, whose position as Associate Director of CAPE was created for the specific purpose of serving the needs of NJIT's student-athletes.

She focuses on five key areas: academic support, career development, personal development, leadership and community service including the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and CHAMPS Life Skills for NJIT's nearly 300 student-athletes.

In 2008-09, NJIT will add an eligibility certification officer/academic advisor, who will work with Rigby McCourt under her supervision.



Erika Rigby McCourt

Erika Rigby McCourt came to NJIT from Seton Hall University, where she was Associate Director of Academic Support Services for the Pirates athletic program from 2004 until she left for NJIT. At Seton Hall, she worked directly with men's basketball, women's soccer, women's volleyball and swimming, assisting in class scheduling, tests and tutoring sessions.

The Jersey City, NJ, native is working with her fourth Division I program in a career that began in 1997 at Northern Arizona, where she was director of the Academic Enrichment Program. She returned home, serving as Academic/Athletic Coordinator at Saint Peter's College, where she was responsible for the academic progress of over 300 student-athletes in 20 sports, from 1999 to 2004.

Rigby McCourt graduated from Providence College, where she was an intercollegiate runner who earned Big East Conference all-academic honors. She earned master's degrees from Northern Arizona and from Saint Peter's and she is pursuing her doctorate in higher education at Seton Hall.

A member of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletes, she is on the NCAA Initial Eligibility Waiver Committee. She also previously worked in the office of former United States Senator Bill Bradley of New Jersey.

Erika married Robert McCourt, the head men's soccer coach at Monmouth University, in May 2008 and they reside in Oakhurst, NJ.

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment, headed by Dr. Marybeth Boger, is a resource available to all students within NJIT's Student Services Division. The CAPE provides academic support services and activities to enhance students' academic and professional development and it works with academic and administrative departments to help students develop the necessary analytical and problem-solving skills to become independent learners.

CAPE provides tutoring, student success workshops and testing accommodations.

New Jersey Institute of Technology athletics is on the move to the top level of college athletics—NCAA Division I.

The reclassification is nearly complete, as NJIT closes in on active championship-eligible Division I status, which is slated to arrive for all programs in 2009-10.

Formerly a member of Division II, NJIT got the go-ahead to begin the reclassification process, which began with an exploratory year in 2005-06. All of the programs that previously competed in Division II then moved up to face Division I competition effective in 2006-07.

Two sports—men's soccer and women's soccer—paved the way on a faster NCAA track that allows lower division schools to elevate one sport in each gender to Division I in a process that takes two years to complete.

NJIT men's soccer became a full member of NCAA Division I at the start of the 2005 season, when the Highlanders arrived at championship eligibility. The men's journey to the top level began in 2003. NJIT women's soccer began a similar two-year process in 2005, with full Division I status and championship eligibility arriving with the 2007 season.

The larger process of advancing the entire program to Division I takes longer and includes application, a detailed strategic plan and in-depth annual review of the institution's progress in moving toward its goal of complying with NCAA Division I rules and building a strong, broad-based athletics program.

NJIT's move to Division I progressed quickly after the November 2002 discussions among President Robert A. Altenkirch, Vice President

Joel Bloom and Athletics Director Lenny Kaplan.

From there came a proposal from Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I. Little more than two years later, the NCAA approved NJIT's proposal to advance its entire program to Division I.

Along the way, scholarship and operating budgets have been enhanced, with expanded coaching staffs, increased scholarship dollars and upgraded facilities for competition and practice.

Upgrading athletics has been a priority for Dr. Altenkirch since he was selected as the seventh President of NJIT in May 2002.

"As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university athletically with our academic peers," said Altenkirch. "It will also enable us to recruit the best and brightest student-athletes, improve athletics facilities available to the entire NJIT community, gain regional and national visibility, and build strong linkages with students that will carry over to their days as alumni."

Moving to Division I has allowed NJIT student-athletes to test themselves in competition against their peers from all over the country, including competition against teams from the nation's best conferences.

Along the way, two NJIT opponents (Maryland men's soccer in 2005 and Penn State men's volleyball in 2008) have faced the Highlanders in the regular season and then gone on to win their respective national championship.



Jim Engles

Head Coach, Dickinson '90

New Jersey Institute of Technology introduced Jim Engles as its new head men's basketball coach in a press conference on April 10, 2008.

Taking on his first head coaching position at age 39, Engles agreed to a five-year contract to lead the Highlanders after having been an assistant coach at the Division I level for 18 years, the last five as the lead assistant at Columbia.

A 1990 graduate of Dickinson College, where he was a three-year letterwinner, Engles jumped into coaching at the Division I level in 1991 as a graduate assistant at Wagner College on his native Staten Island, NY.

He became full-time at Wagner under head coach Tim Capstraw and remained with the Seahawks through the 1996-97 season, when he moved on to Rider University in Lawrenceville, NJ.

Engles stayed at Rider from 1997 to 2003, serving as the top assistant under head coach Don Harnum, who is now Director of Athletics at the school. Engles moved on to Columbia, where he joined the new staff under head coach Joe Jones in 2003-04.

In two of his stops—Wagner and Columbia, he was involved in noteworthy program turnarounds. And at Rider, he was with teams that averaged better than 15 wins per season in his six-year stint.

At Wagner, he was part of the best winning percentage turnaround in all of Division I basketball, as the Seahawks went from four wins in 1990-91 to 16 wins in 1991-92, his first season as a full-time coach. A year later, Wagner played for the Northeast Conference championship on national television and won a school-record 18 games.

At Columbia, he was part of a new staff that achieved instant results upon its arrival in 2003-04. The previous season, Columbia was 2-25 overall and winless in 14 Ivy League

games. In Engles' first season, the Lions produced a 10-17 overall record, including a 6-8 mark in the Ivy League.

In 2006-07, Columbia posted a 16-12 record, the program's best in 15 years. In 2007-08, the Lions were 14-15 overall, plus 7-7 in the Ivy for a second straight year, matching the program's best league record since it was 10-4 in 1992-93.

His six-year run at Rider included the 2001-02 Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference regular season title with a 13-5 conference record and Rider's first-ever berth in the postseason National Invitation Tournament (1998 after an 18-win regular season).

His experience will serve him well as he takes over an NJIT program that enters its third season of Division I competition.

The Highlanders have received notice in both seasons. In the first season of Division I competition (2006-07), NJIT won its opening game, upsetting Manhattan, which had advanced a round in the previous year's NIT. The Highlanders then won their next game against Rider before the stunning start was halted in the third game. Back down to earth, the 2006-07 Highlanders finished 5-24 overall. Coincidentally, NJIT's dream start ended in a 73-60 loss to Engles' Columbia team. The Highlanders' second season of Division I competition was without bright spots and NJIT finished winless in 2007-08.

Against that background, Engles was hired as head coach in April 2008 and he and his staff have been at work ever since, tirelessly working to remake the program in every way imaginable.

Engles, who starred at St. Peter's High School on Staten Island has strong basketball bloodlines. His grandfather, Ken Engles, was a player and coach at Georgetown. And Jim's uncle, John, was a star at Penn under Hall of Fame coach Chuck Daly.

Jim and his wife, Meegan, reside in Convent Station, NJ, with their two daughters, Kelcie and Ryenn.





Mike Spisto

Assistant Coach

Mike Spisto brought nine years college coaching experience with him when he joined the NJIT staff in the summer of 2008, with four years as a junior college head coach, three years as an assistant at the NCAA Division I level and two years as an assistant in Division III.

He had two stints as head coach at the State University of New York at Delhi sandwiched around three years as a Division I assistant with Rider and Albany (NY). He began his coaching career with two years as an assistant at Division III SUNY Oneonta, his alma mater.

At Delhi, which is also an alma mater, he was head coach from 1999 to 2001, left to become a Division I assistant and then returned for another two-year stint as head coach from 2004 to 2006.

His head coaching record in four years at SUNY Delhi was 86-31 and both stints included championships and coaching awards.

In his second season (2000-01), SUNY Delhi's Broncos finished 32-2, including a 28-game winning streak, a conference title and then region and district championships. The Broncos finished fourth at the 2001 nationals and Spisto was conference, region and district coach of the year, as well as Basketball Coaches Association of New York Coach of the Year.

When he returned for his second term at SUNY Delhi, Spisto again was chosen Mountain Valley Conference Coach of the Year in 2004-05. The following season the Broncos were number one in the country their division for six straight weeks and Spisto repeated as conference and region coach of the year.

He coached numerous all-stars, including a first-team junior college all-American, while sending four players ahead to NCAA Division I and nine more to Division II and

NAIA scholarships.

In July 2006, Mike Spisto assumed duties as Director of Athletics at SUNY Delhi, a position he held for two years before coming to NJIT.

His first Division I coaching assignment came at Rider University in 2001-02, where he worked alongside Jim Engles as an assistant when Rider captured its first-ever Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference regular season championship.

Heading to the University at Albany (NY), he helped recruit the team that would win back-to-back America East Conference championships. Among the players he helped recruit was Jamar Wilson, who was America East Rookie of the Year and later was two-time conference Player of the Year.

Spisto's coaching career began at Oneonta State following his 1997 graduation. In addition to his bachelor's degree from Oneonta, he earned an associate's degree from SUNY Delhi, as well as an MSS from United States Sports Academy.

He played at both Delhi and Oneonta. He was all-region twice at Delhi, where he is the career assists leader. At Oneonta he was captain as a senior after winning an ECAC title his junior year.

"Mike has been a winner as a head coach and he was part of building things as an assistant at the Division I level," said Jim Engles. "He was with me (as an assistant) at Rider when we won the MAAC regular season title and then he went to Albany and helped recruit and coach the nucleus of the team that went from five wins when he got there to winning back-to-back America East titles and making the NCAAs."



Ira Bowman

Assistant Coach

Ira Bowman, who was born in Newark, NJ, returns to his hometown for his first college coaching position with NJIT after a playing career that saw him spend parts of three

seasons in the National Basketball Association with the Philadelphia 76ers and the Atlanta Hawks.

An eight-year professional career came after a standout college playing career split between Providence and Penn. His pro career took him to three continents in addition to the Continental Basketball Association and his stints in the NBA.

After a torn anterior cruciate ligament halted his playing days, Bowman worked four years as Executive Director of Assist by Knight Foundation from 2004 to 2008 immediately before accepting his coaching position at NJIT.

One of New Jersey's top high school players in the late 1980s and early 1990s, Bowman starred at Seton Hall Prep (West Orange, NJ), where he graduated as the second all-time leading scorer at a school with a storied basketball tradition.

He led Seton Hall Prep to a 31-1 record in his senior year and the school was New Jersey Parochial A and Essex County champion in 1991.

Bowman first attended Providence College and played two years in the Big East Conference, before transferring to the University of Pennsylvania. Playing at Penn, he was an all-Philadelphia Big Five and all-Ivy player for the Quakers, who were unbeaten in the Ivy League in both of his seasons. He was honored as Ivy League Player of the Year in 1996.

Undrafted after college, the 6-foot-5 Bowman played in Australia, where he was all-league for the Gold Coast Rollers. He moved to the CBA, which was the top developmental league for the NBA at the time and he was a starter for the champion Connecticut Pride in 1999 and a CBA all-star in 2000, the same year of his first tour as a member of the Philadelphia 76ers.

He was back in the NBA with the Hawks for part of the 2000-01 season and he had another final stint with the Sixers in 2001-02.

Out of the NBA, Bowman went to Europe and played in Naples, Italy, for a year before returning to Grand Rapids of the CBA, where he sustained his career-ending ACL injury in 2004.

"Ira has known great success as a player, but he's also known what it was like to keep working to achieve his goals," said Jim Engles. "He was a top recruit coming out of Seton Hall Prep and he had a great career at Penn.

"He was a year-round player as a pro, where he played overseas and in the CBA. He kept at it to win championships and then realize his goal of playing in the NBA. He has played for people like Larry Brown, Rick Barnes, Pat Knight, Fran Dunphy and during his high school career, he was coached by legendary Seton Hall Prep mentor Bob Farrell. The fact that he is from Newark and he succeeded as a player at an academic institution like Penn makes him a great fit for what we're trying to do at NJIT."



Kevin Tirone

Assistant Coach

Kevin Tirone is taking on his first full-time college coaching position, having joined coach Jim Engles' new NJIT staff in the summer of 2008.

Tirone, who was raised in Staten Island, NY, got involved with coaching when he was an undergraduate at Saint Joseph's University in Philadelphia.

At Saint Joe's, Tirone worked for head coach Phil Martelli, the 2003-04 national Coach of the Year after an Elite Eight postseason appearance that included three future NBA players, Jameer Nelson, Delonte West and Dwayne Jones. Tirone was a student assistant for the Hawks during the 2004-05 season as they advanced to the National Invitation Tournament championship at Madison Square Garden.

In addition to Coach Martelli, Tirone worked for assistant coaches Monte Ross (now head coach at Delaware), Mike Rice (later top assistant at Pitt and now head coach at Robert Morris) and Mark Bass.

After graduating from Saint Joe's, Tirone worked for The Hoop Group, the largest basketball instruction organization in the world. Among Tirone's myriad of duties was directing the time-honored Pocono Invitational Basketball Camp, a prestigious overnight camp that began operation in


1963. He also directed individual camps of Bob Hurley (St. Anthony High School) and Kevin Boyle (St. Patrick's High School) and he worked closely with Hoop Group President Rob Kennedy.

From the Hoop Group, Tirone headed west to Robert Morris University in the Pittsburgh, PA, area and worked as Director of Basketball Operations in 2007-08 on the staff headed by Mike Rice.

The Colonials finished 26-8 (most wins in school history) and they upset Atlantic Coast Conference power Boston College and Fordham in non-conference play, while posting a 16-2 Northeast Conference

record. As regular season champion of the NEC, Robert Morris went to the NIT, where it faced Syracuse. Mike Rice was National Association of Basketball Coaches District III Coach of the Year and Robert Morris player Tony Lee was NEC Coach of the Year.


"Kevin is young, but he's already been part of teams that had built up to achieve great success at Saint Joe's and at Robert Morris. He started his coaching career at Robert Morris and they had their best season when he was out there," Jim Engles said. "And his work at the Hoop Group has made him part of a vast network of coaches—some of the top coaches in the country."

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2008-09 Outlook


Change abounds heading into the new season of NJIT men's basketball, beginning at the top with an all new coaching staff and continuing with a roster that includes five newcomers among its 10 active players.

Attached to the change is the uncertainty of so many new players adjusting at once to a new level of play and a new set of teammates, with everyone trying to learn a new system.

The new head coach, Jim Engles, takes over the Highlanders after spending the previous 18 years as an assistant with three different nearby Division I programs. Most recently the lead assistant at Columbia for five years, Engles previously coached at Wagner and Rider.

Engles was involved in significant turnarounds at both Wagner and Columbia and he helped maintain an already high level of success at Rider in his tenure there.

His Wagner tenure featured the biggest winning percentage turnaround in all of Division

I from 1990-91 to 1991-92, when the Seahawks jumped from four wins to 16 wins. Later, he was part of a new staff that led the Columbia Lions to the second-best one-season turnaround in Ivy League history in 2003-04.

And at Rider, he was part of the school's first-ever NIT berth (1998) and its first Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference regular season title (2001-02).

"Based on my experience at Wagner and Columbia, you can see the basic framework of undeveloped talent and good kids with a desire to improve," said Engles. "We have some good upper class leadership and we have some new guys who help with that by showing up every day ready to work and are already to do what it takes.

"We also have some talented guys who need to go through their own experiences and see the success they can have on and off the court. Sometimes that process can occur quickly. Other times it needs some time to mature."

NJIT had success for more than two decades

at lower levels of the NCAA, reaching Division III postseason 15 times in 16 seasons between 1981 and 1997 and then reaching postseason three times in their nine years in Division II. But the highest level, after some stunning initial success, continues to be a major challenge.

The Division I era dawned in November 2006 and the Highlanders shocked the area basketball scene with upset wins in the first two games, defeating Manhattan in the season opener away and Rider in the home opener.

Things came back to earth with a loss in the third game and the season soon settled into a more predictable 5-24 final record. A year later there were no heady moments to temper the losses and NJIT finished 2007-08 without winning.

Against that background, Engles was hired in April 2008 with strong institutional backing and a mandate to put the Highlanders on sound footing as a Division I program.

He and his staff have been at work ever since, tirelessly aiming to remake the program in every way imaginable.

From the day he moved into his office, Engles was proactive in pressing internal improvement, adjusting how the returning players approached their roles as Division I student-athletes.

Despite an abbreviated recruiting season, Engles and his staff went outside for four new players who join a group of five players from last year's team, a transfer who practiced but did not play in 2007-08 and another newcomer who was recruited by the previous coaching staff. And the staff has extended that concept of internal improvement to the newcomers since they arrived in late August.

"We will compete every game," said Engles. "The guys have been coachable and they are working very hard at being selfless teammates. If we continue that and if we compete every night and expect success, we will achieve success."

Lacking a proven go-to player on offense, Engles says: "We expect different players to lead our scoring at different times."

On defense, he will preach "solid man-to-man defense with an emphasis on rebounding the ball and protecting the basket, protect the paint."

Among the returnees, junior center Dan

Dan Stonkus



Stonkus is the most experienced, with 55 starts in two seasons. Remarkably, he is the only remaining player who was around for the first Division I season just two years ago.

At 6-9, 245, he is a physical presence on defense with 90 blocked shots in two seasons. However, that defensive presence will have to expand to other areas, including scoring and rebounding.

His 2007-08 averages were 4.3 points and 4.4 rebounds per game, but he has had double-figure rebound games and with a career shooting percentage over 50 percent, he can contribute more points, too.

Sophomores Jheryl Wilson and Justin Garris, who each averaged 7.1 points per game as freshmen, combined for 38 starts a year ago as freshmen. Garris started more games (23 to 15), but Wilson averaged more minutes per game (27 for Wilson to 21 for Garris).

Wilson, who played both guard spots, played off the ball more frequently as the season progressed, but finished as the team assists leader. A product of high school superpower St. Benedict's Prep, located a few blocks from NJIT in Newark, he flashed the ability to reach mid-teens scoring and produced seven double-figure scoring games, with a high of 16 against Army.

Garris, who played on the wing at shooting guard and small forward, made a splash in his second college game with a team-high 10 points in 23 minutes against Washington, as he matched up well athletically against players from the elite Pac 10 school. He posted seven more double-figure scoring games, reaching a high of 13 three different times, including twice in the last five games.

The other two returnees, sophomore guard Brendon Lyn and sophomore forward Paulius Skema were regular role players as freshmen. Each appeared in 26 of the team's 29 games, with Lyn starting three and averaging about 13 minutes a contest and Skema getting one start and playing 11 minutes a game. Skema, 6-foot-8, averaged 3 ppg and 2.3 rpg, while Lyn, a quick, selfless point guard, chipped in 2.4 points per game and a rebound a game.

Gary Garris, the older brother of Justin, is a key player on and off the court. An impressive looking 6-foot-5, he was named team captain before this season and should start at forward.

Well thought of on the recruiting scene coming out of his post grad year at the Hun School in Princeton, NJ, Gary spent two years as a backup at American University

before transferring to NJIT in the summer of 2007. Able only to practice last year at NJIT due to NCAA transfer rules, he was among the top couple of players on the team and certainly would have started if it had been possible.

The freshman twins Sammy and Teddy Schickel will have an immediate impact on the backcourt. Teddy, who is 6-foot-1, has all the leadership skills coaches look for at the position, is excellent at involving his teammates, while also possessing the scoring skills to keep opponents honest. Sammy, who is 6-foot-3 and strong, combines an excellent shooting touch with the size and strength to be a true scorer.

They were signed by Engles and his staff after spending a post grad year at the Heat Academy in Virginia, where they played on a team that won 35 games against the top prep school competition in the Southeast.

With only one returning frontline starter (Stonkus), Ryan Regis, a gifted 6-6, 260 power forward will join the fray immediately. Still developing, he is powerful enough to compete inside and athletic and skillful enough to succeed away from the basket. His biggest challenge will be adjusting to the rigors of Division I basketball on the fly.

Mike Maczko, who committed to NJIT before the coaching change, is a 6-foot-6 freshman wing player noted for his perimeter shooting. Newcomer Patrick Horstmann, a 6-7 forward from Germany, will redshirt this season.

The season will begin, as have the previous two, against Manhattan (home on November 15). Then comes a four-game excursion into the Hoop Group Philly Classic, which opens for NJIT with games at Penn State and Towson, followed by a pair of games in Philadelphia at the Palestra.

In addition to the game at Penn State of the Big 10, the Highlanders will visit two Big East opponents—Rutgers and St. John's. NJIT will also continue series against teams from the America East, Metro Atlantic, Mid-Eastern Athletic, Northeast conferences and the Patriot League, in addition to fellow Division I Independents.

Another feature of the 2008-09 season is a return to the Prudential Center, where the Highlanders, who there last season, again will host games in the magnificent downtown Newark arena's second season. Located about a mile from the NJIT campus, "The Rock" is the home base of the New Jersey Devils of the National Hockey League.

Prudential Center

In October 2007, the Prudential Center ushered in a new era in sports and entertainment in Newark and the entire Northern New Jersey area.

Newark is in the midst of a major revitalization, converting the city core into a vibrant and energized entertainment district. The Prudential Center, the New Jersey Performing Arts Center, The Newark Symphony, Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and in 2009, Red Bull Park in nearby Harrison represent just part of the nearly \$2 billion in construction underway.

Prudential Center is the cornerstone in the revitalization and renaissance of downtown Newark. In addition to the arena, Newark will soon add scores of condominiums, restaurants, themed bars and mixed retail establishments. Prudential Center, one of the finest arenas in the country, is New Jersey's home for hockey, college basketball, indoor soccer, concerts, family shows and special events.

A public/private partnership between the City of Newark and Devils Arena Entertainment made the \$375 million Prudential Center a reality that is changing the face of downtown Newark and making it a destination place for sports and live entertainment in the region.

Bounded by Edison Place to the north, Lafayette Street to the south, Mulberry Street to the east and Broad Street and City Hall to the west, "The Rock" is located about a mile from NJIT's University Heights campus.

Known best as the home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils, the Prudential Center has a seating capacity of 17,625 for hockey and up to 18,500 for basketball.

Featuring a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as two club lounges, a goal bar, terrace area and a 350-seat gourmet restaurant, along with 76 Luxury Suites and two Event Suites, the Prudential Center is big league in every way.

The relationship between NJIT and the Prudential Center is a natural. 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of Newark's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. NJIT, meanwhile, is an integral part of the city's educational, civic and economic life.

The arrival of the spectacular Prudential Center nearly coincides with NJIT's arrival as an NCAA Division I institution—the first in Newark and the newest in New Jersey in more than 20 years. The Rock opened one year after NJIT began Division I competition as part of its NCAA reclassification which becomes complete in 2009-10.

In the arena's inaugural year, NJIT played host to six basketball games on four dates, including four men's basketball games and two women's games. Included was the first women's or girls' sports competition in the building's history, when the Highlanders entertained Cornell on January 15, 2008.

The Highlanders are set to host five more men's and women's college basketball games in the state-of-the-art building again in 2008-09. And NJIT's club ice hockey team now plays all of its home games in the full-size Devils practice rink facility, which adjoins the main arena and has an 800-seat capacity.





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The Prudential Center, located in downtown Newark, about a mile from NJIT's campus in the University Heights section, is easily accessible by mass transit or by automobile.

"The Rock" is located a short walk from regional mass transportation hub Newark Penn Station, which is served by Amtrak and New Jersey Transit trains, not to mention the Newark City Light Rail, which has a stop (Warren Street Station) at the NJIT campus just a few feet from the entrance of Fleisher Athletic Center and Lubetkin Field.

Highways passing near the arena include: -78, I-280, the NJ Turnpike, Garden State Parkway, Routes 1 & 9, 21, and 22.

There are over 3,500 parking spaces within two blocks of the arena and way-finding signage, guest services personnel and security will assist in getting you to your destination (Please note: all of the parking lots are owned independently, with the exception of the VIP Parking Deck (Lot 10) located on Lafayette Street at the corner of Broad and Lafayette).

Northbound:

Exit 14 toward I-78 westbound. Take center ramp after the toll booth toward US 1-9/Rt. 21. Keep right to stay on the ramp toward US 1-9. Continue on US 1-9 approx. 3 miles and exit on the right onto Rt. 21 (McCarter Highway). Bear left onto Broad Street northbound. Continue on Broad Street to Lafayette Street and make a right. Prudential Center will be on your left.

Southbound or northbound:

Follow signs for Routes 1 and 9 North via the ramp to State Hwy 21. Slight left at Rt 21 (signs for Newark/US 22/State Hwy 21). Turn left at Edison Place. Turn left at Mulberry Street (door-to-door distance is approx. 4.4 miles).

From George Washington Bridge or Lincoln Tunnel, follow signs to New Jersey Turnpike and then follow directions above for New Jersey Turnpike southbound.


From Holland Tunnel, follow signs to I-78 westbound and take center ramp after the toll booth toward US 1-9/Rt. 21. Keep right to stay on the ramp toward US 1-9. Continue on US 1-9 approx. 3 miles and exit on the right onto Rt. 21 (McCarter Highway). Bear left onto Broad Street northbound. Continue on Broad Street to Lafayette Street and make a right. Prudential Center will be on your left.

The NJIT basketball teams will have home games this season in the downtown Newark Prudential Center and on-campus in the recently-renovated gymnasium of the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center.

“The Rock”, located about a mile from NJIT’s University Heights campus, opened in October 2007 as the new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils. Highlander basketball played six games on four dates in the 18,500-seat state-of-the-art arena with dates in December 2007 and January 2008. This season, NJIT is set host five games on four dates in December 2008 and January and February 2009.

The Fleisher Athletic Center gym, also home to NJIT’s volleyball teams, underwent renovation in the summer of 2006. Included in the makeover was installation of a new floor and baskets and a repositioning of the main playing court. The gym also got new lighting, a new sound system and new scoreboards, along with entirely new seating for more than 1,000 spectators after the first phase of renovation. Future plans include the addition of more seating, which will nearly double the seating capacity, while maintaining the up close-feel that puts spectators close to the action and contributes to the homecourt advantage.

The back bay ‘C gym’ can be sectioned off from the main competition floor, making the facility useful for intramurals, physical educa-

tion classes and campus recreation time, while being able to host multiple simultaneous events.

The NJIT basketball teams also have full access to the other facilities in the Fleisher Center. These include the fitness area (containing computer-controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units and an indoor track), a free-weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), a martial arts center and an aerobics dance studio.

A six-lane swimming pool in Fleisher Athletic Center is home to the NJIT men’s and women’s swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads play on the four outdoor lighted tennis courts behind Fleisher Athletic Center. The NJIT Campus Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.

Lubetkin Field, with its entrance a few feet from the entrance of the Fleisher Athletic

Center, is a first-class venue for college soccer. Outfitted with SprinTurf artificial grass in the summer of 2004, Lubetkin Field also includes lighting for night contests, bleacher seating for more than 1,000 spectators, a press box and scoreboard. The installation of the new surface, a walking track and new landscaping was done at a cost of \$1.2 million.

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, opened in 1999 at a cost of \$30 million and with a seating capacity of 6,200, became the home of NJIT baseball in 2004. In a joint December 2005 press conference, New York Yankees manager Joe Torre was a featured speaker as NJIT and the Newark Bears announced a 10-year partnership that designated the downtown stadium the home of all Highlanders home games for the decade to come.

NJIT, which offers a growing list of club sports, also has a robust intramural program, which makes use of the numerous athletic facilities.

Newark: The Renaissance City

NJIT is located in the heart of New Jersey's largest city. A major urban center, Newark is a city on the move. Some 30,000 undergraduate, graduate and professional students attend classes in University Heights at the city's four public institutions of higher learning: NJIT, Rutgers-Newark, the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, and Essex County College.

Prudential Center

The new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils is in downtown Newark at the corner of Mulberry and Edison streets, about one mile from the NJIT's University Heights campus.

Opened in October 2007, 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of the city's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. In addition to the world's best hockey, it will be home to numerous entertainment and sporting events, including NJIT basketball. In 2007-08, NJIT hosted six basketball games there on four dates and there are plans to play more games in 2008-09 in North America's newest major arena.

The arena, with seating for 18,500 spectators, features a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as the latest in ice-surface technology and a gourmet restaurant overlooking the ice for Devils games. The building contains 850,000 square feet of space, 9,000 tons of steel, eight million pounds of structural steel and 25,000 cubic yards of concrete.

Red Bull Park

The Red Bulls of Major League Soccer and AEG New York broke ground in September 2006 for Red Bull Park, a 25,000-seat soccer stadium and a major component of the Harrison MetroCentre development, located across the Passaic River, about two miles from NJIT's campus.



The \$100 million 'soccer specific' stadium will feature a 360-degree European-style roof/canopy covering the majority of the seating. When completed in the summer of 2008, Red Bull Park will be the home of the MLS Red Bulls, international soccer and other events. AEG developed and operates 'soccer specific' stadiums in California and in Illinois.

The multi-billion dollar Harrison MetroCentre will feature three million square feet of office space; 3,500 residential units; 300,000 square feet of retail space and over 10,000 decked parking spaces when completed.

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium



Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the professional baseball Newark Bears and since 2004 the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999. With a seating capacity of 6,200, "The Den" affords fans an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major league-caliber press box.

In December 2005, NJIT and the Bears held a joint press conference to herald a new partnership that includes a 10-year deal that extends Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium as the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball.



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

Great West

NJIT's basketball teams will compete as a Division I Independents in 2008-09, but starting in 2009-10, the Highlanders will be part of the expanded multi-sport Great West Conference.

On July 10, 2008, NJIT was one of six institutions to announce it had joined the expansion of the Great West Conference to form a Division I all-sports league that will conduct championship competition in several sports in 2008-09 and then begin full conference scheduling and championships in 2009-10.

The announcement was made simultaneously by the six institutions and by the conference office, which is led by Commissioner Ed Grom.

In October 2008, Chicago State announced that it would join the original six institutions, bringing the expanded all-sports Great West to seven members.

The Great West, which has existed for four years as a football-only league in the NCAA's Division I Football Championship Subdivision (formerly known as I-AA), is expanding into an all-sports league with the addition of NJIT, Texas-Pan American, Utah Valley, Houston Baptist, University of North Dakota, University of South Dakota, and Chicago State.

The all-sports version of the Great West Conference will eventually offer championships in 14 sports, 11 of which are sponsored by NJIT, including: men's and women's basketball; baseball; women's volleyball; women's tennis; men's and women's cross country; men's and women's indoor track and field; and, men's and women's outdoor track and field.

Cross country and indoor and outdoor track and field championships are planned for 2008-09, with the full complement scheduled to kick in the following year in 2009-10.



NJIT, Texas-Pan American and Utah Valley have been playing each other in multiple sports, including home-and-home games in men's and women's basketball, since NJIT began competing against Division I competition for the first time in 2006-07.

NJIT and Utah Valley are scheduled to complete their NCAA reclassification and become active championship-eligible members of NCAA Division I in 2009-10, the first year of conference play. North Dakota and South Dakota will be active members of Division I in 2012-13 and Houston Baptist will arrive in 2014-15. Texas-Pan American and Chicago State have been active Division I programs for many years.

The expanded conference is not eligible for automatic Division I championship postseason qualification, but will offer the benefit of conference championship competition, stable scheduling opportunities in all conference sports and individual recognition for student-athletes through weekly and season all-conference recognition. The individual awards programs for student-athletes have begun in 2008-09.

NJIT's sports that do not come under the Great West umbrella will continue in their existing conferences—men's soccer in the Atlantic Soccer Conference, women's soccer in the United Soccer Conference and men's volleyball in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association, which has an automatic NCAA postseason berth, which was claimed this year by eventual 2008 national champion, Penn State.

In addition, NJIT will continue to schedule competition against top non-conference regional and national opponents. Two NJIT opponents—Maryland in men's soccer and Penn State in men's volleyball have won national championships following seasons in which they faced the Highlanders. Meanwhile, NJIT teams will compete regularly with opponents from the Big East, Atlantic 10, America East, Ivy League, Patriot League, MAAC and Northeast Conference.


