Developed by CN Foundry for NJIT, the logo depicts the traditional Highlander, whose ferocity and bravery against all odds are the stuff of legend.



# ABOUT NJIT

NJIT is New Jersey's Science & Technology University. With roots going back to 1881, when it was founded as Newark Technical School, New Jersey Institute of Technology observed its 125th anniversary in 2006.

Located in University Heights, Newark, NJ, home to more than 30,000 college students, NJIT's campus is just 10 miles from New York City.

Playing a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future, NJIT, as a major public technological university, is an important pipeline for the flow of technology into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university helps to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$83 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities on the 45-acre campus, including biomedical engineering labs and a campus center.

## Instructional Programs

NJIT offers an ever-expanding array of educational programs, with eight new academic programs approved beginning in 2009-10, which comes after the addition of 14 new programs in 2008. As of 2009, NJIT lists 55 bachelor's degree majors, 53 master's degree programs and 19 doctoral programs — through six schools:

- Newark College of Engineering**
- College of Architecture and Design**
- College of Science and Liberal Arts**
- School of Management**
- Albert Dorman Honors College**
- College of Computing Sciences**

NJIT has 416 full-time faculty; more than 98 percent of whom hold the highest degree in their field. The student-faculty ratio is 13:1, with more than 5,300 undergraduate students and more than 2,800 graduate students. Our students hail from 33 states and more than 100 countries to rank eighth in the nation for diversity.

Albert Dorman Honors College enrolls more than 500 students who take advantage of honors courses, research opportunities, advising and mentoring.

Honors College students have SAT scores ranking in the top 10 percent nationally.

With more than 44,000 alumni, NJIT is rated by US News and World Report as a top-tier national research university offering bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees.

## Research

NJIT drew more than \$75 million in research funding in 2005 and faculty members welcome student collaboration on research projects.

## Economic Development

NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies. NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element, together with instruction, research and community service. More than 60 technology start-up companies, many of which hire NJIT students, are on campus.





## The Career Edge

All 10 of the majors with the highest starting salaries for 2005-06 grads are in engineering, computing and business, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers.

Computer and data processing services lead the list of the 10 fastest-growing occupations in projections compiled by the US Department of Labor. Computer-related employment is expected to grow 117 percent by 2008, according to the Career Guide to Industries.

As technology changes all fields, those with science and technology backgrounds are positioned to lead. Among the CEOs of the S&P 500 companies, engineering is the single largest undergraduate degree and more than half of CEOs have undergraduate degrees in engineering, business management, science, math and computing.

## The Global Edge

The diversity in NJIT's student body and faculty prepares graduates to understand and succeed in the global marketplace. NJIT was named among the world's top 500 universities in a study by the Institute of Higher Education, Shanghai Jiao Tong University.

## The Technology Edge

NJIT has been designated one of the nation's most technologically sophisticated universities by Forbes.com and a Princeton Review survey and the university has received major funding from the National Science Foundation and the National Security Agency in recent years.

## The Academic Edge

NJIT has long been a national leader in applying new technologies and approaches to the educational experience. NJIT was a pioneer in requiring computer science for students in all majors and the School of Architecture has led innovations in teaching CAD and digital design. The school's innovative "paperless" first-year program was recently cited by Campus Technology Magazine.

Students have a wide range of educational choices in building an interest-tailored program. Among their options are cross-enrolling at neighboring Rutgers to enrich their program with subjects such as music and languages.

NJIT students learn emerging technologies from the researchers behind the technologies, developing valuable marketplace skills. Real-world experience through experiential learning makes graduates more marketable, with many co-op opportunities leading to permanent jobs.

## The Regional Edge

New Jersey, with America's highest concentration of pharmaceutical, hi-tech, biotech, and medical device companies is the place to study technology. It has the nation's highest per capita number of engineers and scientists as residents, while also leading in per capita rate of patents issued. Further, the Newark-New York region is a living laboratory for architecture and building sciences, environmental engineering and transportation.

## The Research Edge

NJIT has been designated by the State of New Jersey as the Homeland Security Technology Systems Center and NJIT operates the world-renowned Big Bear Solar Observatory.

## A History of NJIT

From the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age, New Jersey Institute of Technology has a rich history with its beginnings developing from the industrial age.

In 1881, an act of the New Jersey State Legislature, recognizing an urgent need, sought a home for what would be the state's technical school. The efforts of Newark's public and private sectors resulted with the opening of Newark Technical School, addressing the state's need.

Over time, the university expanded its curriculum and mission. In 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By the middle of the 20th century, Newark Technical School was transformed into the robust Newark College of Engineering.

The post-war period was one of enormous activity with regular expansion of the campus, as well as the introduction of doctoral level programs. In 1975, with the addition of the New Jersey School of Architecture, the institution had evolved into a technological university, emphasizing a broad range of degrees and dedication to significant research and public service. Newark College of Engineering, stronger than ever, remained intact, but a new university name — New Jersey Institute of Technology — reflected the institution's expanded mission.

A broadened mission called for the creation of a residential campus and the opening of NJIT's first dormitory in 1980 began a period of steady growth that continues. Two new schools were established during the 1980s—the College of Science and Liberal Arts (1982) and the School of Industrial Management (1988). The Albert Dorman Honors College was established in 1994, and the newest school, the College of Computing Sciences, was created in 2001. Beginning in 2009 the College of Architecture and Design was created to house the New Jersey School of Architecture and the new school of Art and Design.





# ADMINISTRATION



## Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch

*President*

Having joined NJIT as its seventh president in July 2002, Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch is leading the university in a period of multi-layered growth.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$80 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities, while also drawing similar dollars in annual research funding.

Under President Altenkirch, NJIT has expanded its course offerings, with 16 new degree programs added in the 2008-09 academic year alone, and 13 in various stages of development for implementation in the next two years..

Coinciding with the expansion is NJIT's transition from a smaller commuter campus to a larger institution with a larger resident student population. The incoming class of 2012 is the largest in the history of the school, and more than half the freshman class resides on campus.

Tied to that transition is Altenkirch's strong belief that the home institution in New Jersey's largest city needs to be residential and provide the experiences associated with a residential campus. At the same time, Altenkirch is committed to NJIT's involvement with the community in its home city of Newark.

Intercollegiate athletics fits those goals naturally and upgrading NJIT athletics has been a priority of Altenkirch's presidency going back to November 2002 meetings that led to NJIT's reclassification to NCAA Division I.

Adding a personal dimension to his support, Altenkirch, a multi-sport athlete in high school, freshman baseball player at Purdue University, and a former college soccer official, and his wife, Beth, are regular attendees at NJIT competitions, home and away.

Immediately before his selection as president of NJIT, Altenkirch was vice president for research at Mississippi State University (MSU), a position he held from 1998 to 2002.

Prior to his appointment as vice president at MSU, Altenkirch served as dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture at Washington State University (1995-98).

From 1988 to 1995, he was dean of the College of Engineering at MSU. He also served as professor and chair of mechanical engineering at the University of Kentucky (1975-88).

Altenkirch holds a PhD from Purdue University, an MS from the University of California, Berkeley, and a BS from Purdue, all in mechanical engineering.

He is the author of over 50 publications and nearly 100 presentations in combustion and heat transfer and served as principal investigator for 10 Space Shuttle experiments investigating the spread of fire in reduced gravity.

He is a fellow of the American Society of Engineers and in 2008 received the Ellis Island Medal of Honor.



## Dr. Joel Bloom

*Vice President for Academic and Student Services*

Dr. Joel Bloom, who joined NJIT in July 1990, is responsible for eight divisions of the university, including physical education and athletics.

In 1998, Bloom was appointed the first dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College in addition to his vice president responsibilities. The honors college enrolls over 500 students, including residents of 15 states and several foreign countries. The combined average SAT score is over 1300 and freshmen typically have ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class. Honors College students maintain a grade point average higher than 3.5.

Prior to his arrival at NJIT, Dr. Bloom served seven years as assistant commissioner of the New Jersey Department of Education for the Division of General Academic Education. He was responsible for managing many of the education department's initiatives, over 300 grants and contracts, and a \$24 million budget.

Formerly a teacher and school administrator in New York City Public Schools, Dr. Bloom was also a director of research and instructor at Teacher's College, Columbia University.

He is chair of the Greater Newark Consortium for Pre-College Education and vice chair of the State Board for Communities and Schools. He serves further as a member of numerous boards at the state, regional and national levels and has received national and state education awards, as well as federal, foundation and corporate grant awards. He has published journal articles and presented papers on school improvement, curriculum development, college transition and student assessment.

Dr. Bloom holds a master's degree and a doctorate from Teacher's College, Columbia University. He also earned master's and bachelor's degrees from Hunter College of the City University of New York.



## Lenny Kaplan

*Director of Athletics*

Since taking over as head of NJIT's division of physical education and athletics in August 2000, Lenny Kaplan has been instrumental in guiding NJIT's reclassification to NCAA Division I.

Kaplan helped stabilize and expand a program that was entering its fourth year in Division II when he arrived in Newark. In late 2002, after discussions with university President Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch and Vice President Dr. Joel Bloom, Kaplan took on the task of steering NJIT's programs into Division I, a process that reached fruition with the NCAA's granting active Division I status, with full championship eligibility effective September 1, 2009.

Throughout Kaplan's tenure, NJIT has enhanced the athletics program, particularly in areas that benefit the student-athletes directly.

The sports offerings have expanded to 19 varsity programs and since 2004, NJIT has renovated its two main on-campus venues—Mal Simon Stadium at Lubetkin Field and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center. The school also signed a 10-year partnership to play all home baseball in the professional Bears and Eagles



Riverfront Stadium and later agreed to host basketball in the new Prudential Center, downtown Newark home of the NHL's New Jersey Devils.

Under Kaplan's leadership, many teams achieved regional and national Division II ranking. Success for several women's teams was unprecedented, with basketball, tennis and soccer all reaching postseason play for the first time in his administration,

Additionally, men's volleyball captured a 2007 divisional championship in the Eastern Intercollegiate

Volleyball Association and the next year reached the EIVA playoff semifinals hosted by eventual 2008 national champion Penn State.

Kaplan guided the Highlanders toward further stability with membership in the newly-expanded all-sports Great West Conference, which will offer a conference home for 11 of NJIT's 19 varsity sports.

NJIT's outstanding home facilities will allow it to host conference championships in the Great West Conference and allowed it to host ECAC postseason

championships in 2005-06.

Before coming to NJIT, Lenny Kaplan served 11 years at Manhattan College, where he began as Manhattan's director of operations and was assistant athletics director from 1991-2000.

Kaplan, a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration, resides in Merrick, NY, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.

# STUDENT-ATHLETE SUPPORT

## Sports Medicine

NJIT sports medicine is moving forward with expanded facilities and a staff of three full-time trainers led by head trainer Matt Koscs, MS/ATC, with assistant trainers Paul Grayner, MEd/ATC, and Sandra Brendle, MSED/ATC. They work with team physicians Louis Rizio, MD, and Rutvik (Rudy) Patel, DO.

Matt Koscs, who earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Delaware, came to NJIT as an assistant trainer in July 2008 and moved up to the head trainer position a year later. As an undergrad, he was recipient of the Paris Delligatti Memorial Award for Excellence in Athletic Training.

Prior to NJIT, he served three years as head trainer at Hodgson Vocational Technical High School in Newark, DE. He also worked with soccer clubs in Delaware and was employed at Christiana Care Physical Therapy Plus, in Newark, DE.

Paul Grayner, who holds a bachelor's degree from Saint Leo College in Florida and a master's from American University in Washington, DC, has a diverse background in athletic training, having served at the college and professional levels, as well as in a fitness center setting. He joined the NJIT staff late in 2008.

From the mid-1970s to the mid-1980s, he was a trainer in the minor league systems of the New York Yankees and New York Mets and in 1984 he was assistant trainer with the Mets. He later worked with the Long Island Knights professional basketball team.



**Paul Grayner**

At the collegiate level, he was head trainer at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ from 1989 to 1998 and earlier worked as an assistant trainer at Hofstra, Adelphi and FDU.

Sandra Brendle, who joined the NJIT staff as an assistant trainer in the summer of 2009, earned her bachelor's degree, majoring in athletic training from Greensboro (NC) College in 2007. She earned her master's in athletic training at Old Dominion University in May 2009. At ODU, she worked with seven teams and was on the medical staff for the 2008 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Tournament first and second rounds. At Greensboro, she was 2006 Athletic Training Student of the Year and worked on the 2004 NCAA Division III Men's and Women's Soccer Championship tournament medical staff.

Dr. Rizio is a board certified orthopedic surgeon and is fellowship trained in the field of sports medicine. He is a graduate of Rutgers and after earning his med-

ical degree from the UMDNJ/New Jersey Medical School, Dr. Rizio completed his orthopedic residency at Tufts University in Boston.

He then completed a sports medicine fellowship at the University of Miami and was assistant team physician of the Hurricanes, as well as the Miami Dolphins, the Miami Hurricanes.

Dr. Rizio practices at the New Jersey Sports Medicine Institute. Prior to starting his own practice, Dr Rizio was the Chief of Sports Medicine at the NJ Medical School from 2000-2005.

Dr. Patel practices in association with Dr. Rizio. A cum laude graduate of NYIT, Dr. Patel earned his DO from the New York College of Osteopathic Medicine. He was chief resident in Family Medicine at the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School in New Brunswick, NJ, from 2003 to 2006.

## Strength and Conditioning



**Dan Huff**

A formal strength and conditioning program is a key part of a Division I program, with an eye toward maximizing individual and team performance in competition. The strength and conditioning coach also works closely with the Athletic Training Staff in the areas of injury prevention and injury rehabilitation.

The 2008-09 season brought another dimension to NJIT athletics with the hiring of Dan Huff, CSCS, as the Highlanders' first full-time strength and conditioning coach. In addition to the hiring of a full-time



coach to coordinate the strength and conditioning, NJIT renovated the weight rooms and purchased new equipment, with the area dedicated to use by the Highlander teams.

Huff previously served five years as strength and conditioning coordinator at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ, from 2003 to 2008, working with an 18-sport NCAA Division I program.

Huff was Sports Performance Director for Velocity Sports Performance in Wall, NJ, immediately before accepting his position at NJIT. He is a graduate of William Paterson University of New Jersey. He holds numerous certifications.

## Academic Enrichment

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment (CAPE) added a new component with the 2007 hiring of Erika Rigby McCourt as Associate Director of CAPE in a position that was created for the specific purpose of serving the needs of NJIT's student-athletes.

Rigby McCourt left her post to focus more on raising her infant daughter and NJIT is in the process of filling the position, which focuses on five key areas: academic support, career development, personal devel-

opment, leadership and community service including the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and CHAMPS Life Skills for NJIT's nearly 300 student-athletes.

In 2008-09, Tim Wuorinen moved over to CAPE as eligibility certification officer/academic advisor, after having spent the previous five-plus years working in the NJIT Department of Athletics as assistant athletic director and coordinator for compliance and student-athlete services.

Erika Rigby McCourt, the first person to serve NJIT as Associate Director for CAPE with the specific component of student-athlete support, previously worked for over a decade in three NCAA Division I programs, most recently at Seton Hall University, where she was Associate Director of Academic

Support Services. Her career began in 1997 at Northern Arizona, where she directed the Academic Enrichment Program and continued as Academic/Athletic Coordinator at Saint Peter's College.

Tim Wuorinen was a compliance fellow with the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference and he has worked in the athletic offices of four colleges, including Western New England College, his undergraduate alma mater. In addition to his bachelor's degree from Western New England, he earned a master's degree from NJIT.

Tim and his wife, Tara, who is the Academic/Athletic Coordinator at Saint Peter's College, reside in Aberdeen, NJ.

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment, headed by Dr. Marybeth Boger, is a resource available to all students within NJIT's Student Services Division. The CAPE provides academic support services and activities to enhance students' academic and professional development and it works with academic and administrative departments to help students develop the necessary analytical and problem-solving skills to become independent learners.

CAPE provides tutoring, student success workshops and testing accommodations.



# COACHING STAFF





## Jim Engles

*Head Coach*

Dickinson, 1990

Commitment, hard work, attention to detail. They are all familiar concepts in the world of sports.

When his players look at Jim Engles, about to enter his second season at the helm of New Jersey Institute of Technology men's basketball, they see those concepts put into action as the coach strives to build the Highlanders program into a solid Division I outfit.

NJIT introduced Jim Engles as its new head men's basketball coach in a press conference on April 10, 2008. And he has attacked the challenge tirelessly ever since, remaking the Highlander program in every way imaginable ever since.

Taking on his first head coaching position at age 39, Engles agreed to a five-year contract to lead the Highlanders after having been an assistant coach at the Division I level for 18 years, the last five as the lead assistant at Columbia.

A 1990 graduate of Dickinson College, where he was a three-year letterwinner, Engles jumped into coaching at the Division I level in 1991 as a graduate assistant at Wagner College on his native Staten Island, NY. From that point on, he earned the respect of his peers throughout the region.

He became a full-time assistant at Wagner under head coach Tim Capstraw and remained with the Seahawks through the 1996-97 season, when he moved on to Rider University in Lawrenceville, NJ.

Engles stayed at Rider from 1997 to 2003, serving as the top assistant under head coach Don Harnum, who is now Director of Athletics at the school. Engles moved on to Columbia, where he joined the new staff under head coach Joe Jones in 2003-04.

In two of his stops—Wagner and Columbia, he was involved in noteworthy program turnarounds. And at Rider, he was with teams that averaged better than 15 wins per season in his six-year stint.

At Wagner, he was part of the best winning percentage turnaround in all of Division I basketball, as the

Seahawks went from four wins in 1990-91 to 16 wins in 1991-92, his first season as a full-time coach. A year later, Wagner played for the Northeast Conference championship on national television and won a school-record 18 games.

At Columbia, he was part of a new staff that achieved instant results upon its arrival in 2003-04. The previous season, Columbia was 2-25 overall and winless in 14 Ivy League games. In Engles' first season, the Lions produced a 10-17 overall record, including a 6-8 mark in the Ivy League.

In 2006-07, Columbia posted a 16-12 record, the program's best in 15 years. In 2007-08, the Lions were 14-15 overall, plus 7-7 in the Ivy for a second straight year, matching the program's best league record since it was 10-4 in 1992-93.

His six-year run at Rider included the 2001-02 Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference regular season title with a 13-5 conference record and Rider's first-ever berth in the postseason National Invitation Tournament (1998 after an 18-win regular season).

His experience will serve him well at NJIT, which becomes an active, championship-eligible member of Division I in his second season (2009-10) and competed at the Division I level for three seasons before that.

The Highlanders received notice in their first three seasons of Division I competition. In the first season of Division I competition (2006-07), NJIT won its opening game, upsetting Manhattan, which had advanced a round in the previous year's NIT. The Highlanders then won their next game against Rider before the stunning start was halted in the third game. Back down to earth, the 2006-07 Highlanders finished 5-24 overall. Coincidentally, NJIT's dream start ended in a 73-60 loss to Engles' Columbia team. The Highlanders' second season of Division I competition was without bright spots and NJIT finished winless in 2007-08.

Despite having a short recruiting year and carrying over the burden of a losing streak that far preceded their arrival, Engles and his staff worked tirelessly.

The hard work showed in small ways from the start of the season with more competitive performances on the court and finally paid tangible dividends on January 21, 2009, with a 61-51 home win over Bryant that generated a torrent of positive local, regional and national coverage.

Engles, who starred at St. Peter's High School on Staten Island has strong basketball bloodlines. His grandfather, Ken Engles, was a player and coach at Georgetown. And Jim's uncle, John, was a star at Penn under Hall of Fame coach Chuck Daly.

Jim and his wife, Meegan, reside in Convent Station, NJ, with their two daughters, Kelcie (8) and Ryenn (6).



## Mike Spisto *Assistant Coach*

Mike Spisto brought nine years college coaching experience with him when he joined the NJIT staff in the summer of 2008, with four years as a junior college head coach, three years as an assistant at the NCAA Division I level and two years as an assistant in Division III.

He had two stints as head coach at the State University of New York at Delhi sandwiched around three years as a Division I assistant with Rider and Albany (NY). He began his coaching career with two years an assistant at Division III SUNY Oneonta, his alma mater.

At Delhi, which is also an alma mater, he was head coach from 1999 to 2001, left to become a Division I assistant and then returned for another two-year stint as head coach from 2004 to 2006.

His head coaching record in four years at SUNY Delhi was 86-31 and both stints included championships and coaching awards.

In his second season (2000-01), SUNY Delhi's Broncos finished 32-2, including a 28-game winning streak, a conference title and then region and district championships. The Broncos finished fourth at the 2001 nationals and Spisto was conference, region and district coach of the year, as well as Basketball Coaches Association of New York Coach of the Year.

When he returned for his second term at SUNY Delhi, Spisto again was chosen Mountain Valley Conference Coach of the Year in 2004-05. The following season the Broncos were number one in the country their division for six straight weeks and Spisto repeated as conference and region coach of the year.

He coached numerous all-stars, including a first-team junior college all-American, while sending four players ahead to NCAA Division I and nine more to Division II and NAIA scholarships.

In July 2006, Mike Spisto assumed duties as Director of Athletics at SUNY Delhi, a position he held for two years before coming to NJIT.

His first Division I coaching assignment came at Rider University in 2001-02, where he worked alongside Jim Engles as an assistant when Rider captured its first-ever Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference regular season championship.

Heading to the University at Albany (NY), he helped recruit the team that would win back-to-back America East Conference championships. Among the players he helped recruit was Jamar Wilson, who was America East Rookie of the Year and later was two-time conference Player of the Year.

Spisto's coaching career began at Oneonta State following his 1997 graduation. In addition to his bachelor's degree from Oneonta, he earned an associate's degree from SUNY Delhi, as well as an MSS from United States Sports Academy.

He played at both Delhi and Oneonta. He was all-region twice at Delhi, where he is the career assists leader. At Oneonta he was captain as a senior after winning an ECAC title his junior year.

"Mike has been a winner as a head coach and he was part of building things as an assistant at the Division I level," said Jim Engles. "He was with me (as an assistant) at Rider when we won the MAAC regular season title and then he went to Albany and helped recruit and coach the nucleus of the team that went from five wins when he got there to winning back-to-back America East titles and making the NAAs."

Mike and his wife, Katie-Lynn, reside in Staten Island, NY, with their young sons, Michael (4) and Christopher (1).



## Ira Bowman *Assistant Coach*

Ira Bowman, who was born in Newark, NJ, returned to his hometown in 2008 for his first college coaching position with NJIT after a playing career that saw him spend parts of three seasons in the National Basketball Association with the Philadelphia 76ers and the Atlanta Hawks.

An eight-year professional career came after a stand-out college playing career split between Providence and Penn. His pro career took him to three continents in addition to the Continental Basketball Association and his stints in the NBA.

After a torn anterior cruciate ligament halted his playing days, Bowman worked four years as Executive Director of Assist by Knight Foundation from 2004 to 2008 immediately before accepting his coaching position at NJIT.

One of New Jersey's top high school players in the late 1980s and early 1990s, Bowman starred at Seton Hall Prep (West Orange, NJ), where he graduated as the second all-time leading scorer at a school with a storied basketball tradition.

He led Seton Hall Prep to a 31-1 record in his senior year and the school was New Jersey Parochial A and Essex County champion in 1991.

Bowman first attended Providence College and played two years in the Big East Conference under coach Rick Barnes, before transferring to the University of Pennsylvania. Playing at Penn for coach Fran Dunphy, he was an all-Philadelphia Big Five and all-Ivy player for the Quakers, who were unbeaten in the Ivy League in both of his seasons. He was honored as Ivy League Player of the Year in 1996.

Undrafted after college, the 6-foot-5 Bowman played in Australia, where he was all-league for the Gold Coast Rollers. He moved to the CBA, which was the top developmental league for the NBA at the time and he was a starter for the champion Connecticut Pride in 1999 and a CBA all-star in 2000, the same year of his first tour as a member of the Philadelphia 76ers.

He was back in the NBA with the Hawks for part of the 2000-01 season and he had another final stint with the Sixers in 2001-02.

Out of the NBA, Bowman went to Europe and played in Naples, Italy, for a year before returning to Grand Rapids of the CBA, where he sustained his career-ending ACL injury in 2004.

"Ira has known great success as a player, but he's also known what it was like to keep working to achieve his goals," said Jim Engles. "He was a top recruit coming out of Seton Hall Prep and he had a great career at Penn."

"He was a year-round player as a pro, where he played overseas and in the CBA. He kept at it to win championships and then realize his goal of playing in the NBA. He has played for people like Larry Brown, Rick Barnes, Pat Knight, Fran Dunphy and during his high school career, he was coached by legendary Seton Hall Prep mentor Bob Farrell. The fact that he is from Newark and he succeeded as a player at an academic institution like Penn makes him a great fit for what we're trying to do at NJIT."

He resides in Vaux Hall, NJ, with his wife, Reyna, and their son, Jeremiah (3).



## Kevin Tirone

*Assistant Coach*

Kevin Tirone is in his first full-time college coaching position, having joined coach Jim Engles' new NJIT staff in the summer of 2008.

Tirone, who was raised in Staten Island, NY, and resides in Bloomfield, NJ, got involved with coaching when he was an undergraduate at Saint Joseph's University in Philadelphia.

At Saint Joe's, Tirone worked for head coach Phil Martelli, the 2003-04 national Coach of the Year, after an Elite Eight postseason appearance that included three future NBA players, Jameer Nelson, Delonte West and Dwayne Jones. Tirone was a student assistant for the Hawks during the 2004-05 season as they advanced to the National Invitation Tournament championship at Madison Square Garden.

In addition to Coach Martelli, Tirone worked for assistant coaches Monte Ross (now head coach at Delaware), Mike Rice (later top assistant at Pitt and now head coach at Robert Morris) and Mark Bass.

After graduating from Saint Joe's, Tirone worked for The Hoop Group, the largest basketball instruction organization in the world. Among Tirone's myriad of duties was directing the time-honored Pocono Invitational Basketball Camp, a prestigious overnight camp that began operation in 1963. He also directed individual camps of Bob Hurley (St. Anthony High

School) and Kevin Boyle (St. Patrick's High School) and he worked closely with Hoop Group President Rob Kennedy.

From the Hoop Group, Tirone headed west to Robert Morris University in the Pittsburgh, PA, area and worked as Director of Basketball Operations in 2007-08 on the staff headed by Mike Rice.

The Colonials finished 26-8 (most wins in school history) and they upset Atlantic Coast Conference power Boston College and Fordham in non-conference play, while posting a 16-2 Northeast Conference record. As regular season champion of the NEC, Robert Morris went to the NIT, where it faced Syracuse. Mike Rice was National Association of Basketball Coaches District III Coach of the Year and Robert Morris player Tony Lee was NEC Player of the Year.

"Kevin is young, but he's already been part of teams that had built up to achieve great success at Saint Joe's and at Robert Morris. He started his coaching career at Robert Morris and they had their best season when he was out there," Jim Engles said. "And his work at the Hoop Group has made him part of a vast network of coaches—some of the top coaches in the country."



## Nelson Albino

*Director of Basketball Operations*

Albino, a 2009 graduate of Drew University in Madison, NJ, where he was a four-year guard for the Rangers, joined the NJIT men's basketball staff as Director of Basketball Operations.

He worked his way up Drew's depth chart throughout his playing career, advancing from a full-time reserve role as a freshman to becoming a starter in half his games as a junior and finally to start 23 of his team's 25 games as a senior.

He was named to both the Landmark Conference all-academic team and the Landmark Conference Academic Honor Roll as a senior.

A resident of Parlin, NJ, Albino is a graduate of St. Peter's Prep in Jersey City.

"I am excited to welcome Nelson to our program," said Engles. "He has a terrific passion for the game and we are fortunate to bring him to our staff. He brings knowledge, leadership, and tremendous character to his position. He will be a wonderful asset to our student-athletes."




## Sunay Pandya



# 2009-10 OUTLOOK

NJIT men's basketball, under second-year head coach Jim Engles, will take its next set toward being a consistently competitive Division I program.

The Highlanders are championship-eligible members of Division I for the first time this season, which also marks the first year for the new Great West Conference, an affiliation that will provide NJIT with 12 conference regular season games and a postseason tournament.

NJIT has an active roster that is younger even than was expected as recently as September. It was no secret the Highlanders would have six true freshmen plus a sophomore who missed his entire freshman season due to injury. Unforeseen, however, the team's only two seniors, the projected starting center, Dan Stonkus, and power forward, Gary Garris, are out with knee injuries.

Garris, who led the 2008-09 team in rebounding, is out indefinitely following offseason surgery on both knees. Stonkus, with 84 career starts, tore a meniscus working in his family's yard and is likely out for the season. As a result, the active roster features seven true freshmen (including a walk-on), four sophomores (one of whom missed his entire freshman season) and a junior.

The good news is that the talent level is significantly higher than at any previous time in NJIT's Division I

era. "We have a positive outlook," said Engles. "We have a nice group of freshmen and some veterans who look young, but who got a lot of experience last year because of our situation. The big thing for all of them is to learn all the things that go into creating a winning program."

Appointed head coach of the Highlanders in April 2008 after 18 years as a respected assistant at three Division I programs in the region, Engles came to NJIT after serving as the lead assistant at Columbia for five years and previously coached at Wagner and Rider. He was involved in significant turnarounds at both Wagner and Columbia and he helped maintain an already high level at Rider.

His Wagner tenure featured the biggest winning percentage turnaround in all of Division I from 1990-91 to 1991-92, when the Seahawks jumped from four wins to 16 wins. Later, he was part of a new staff that led Columbia to the second-best one-season turnaround in Ivy League history in 2003-04. And at Rider, he was part of the school's first-ever NIT berth (1998) and its first MAAC regular season title (2001-02).

NJIT which had success for more than two decades at lower levels of the NCAA, reaching Division III postseason 15 times in 16 seasons (1981 to 1997) and then reaching postseason three times in nine years in


Division II, has mostly scuffled in its three years at the highest level.

From the day he moved into his office in April 2008, Engles was proactive in pressing internal improvement, adjusting how the players approached their roles as Division I student-athletes. And now, 12 of the program's 15 players have come in since Engles was hired and the makeover is ongoing.

The only active holdover is Jheryl Wilson, who flourished down the stretch of his sophomore season. A product national schoolboy power St. Benedict's Prep, Wilson had a decent freshman season that saw him average 7.1 points per game with a high of 16 points in 2007-08, plus a team-leading 68 assists.

After a slow start last year, Wilson picked it up and led NJIT in scoring (12.6 ppg) and assists (67), while finishing second in steals (41) and tied for third in rebounding (4.2 rpg). He had 18 double-figure scoring games, reaching a high of 26 points twice, including in a 61-51 win over Bryant on January 21 that brought national attention to the Highlanders for breaking their long losing streak.

This year, he was voted to the 2009-10 preseason Great West first team by the conference coaches and looms as a solid contributor for the final two seasons of his college career.

# 2009-10 OUTLOOK

The top returning sophomore, second-team preseason all-GWC Isaiah Wilkerson, is a true cornerstone player.

A star at Curtis HS on Staten Island, NY, he enrolled at NJIT for the spring 2009 semester and made his college debut on December 20 without benefit of a practice. He scored three points that day, but three nights later, he scored 12 points at Rutgers, beginning a string of 15 consecutive double-figure scoring games. He finished as NJIT's second-leading scorer (12.5 ppg) and was the team's primary ballhandler. At least as important, Isaiah made a seamless transition off the court that added leadership and unity to a team that needed both qualities and he is team captain as a sophomore.

Now, he will match up with bigger men, due in part to the absence of the injured Stonkus and Garris on the interior. "Isaiah is going from being our point guard to being our power forward," said Engles. "He's a tough kid and he plays hard all the time. He'll create some matchup problems for other teams."

The other three sophomores are post player Ryan Regis and twin guards Sammy and Teddy Schickel. Regis played in 28 of NJIT's 31 games his freshman year and started the last two after Stonkus was sidelined due to a concussion.

Sammy Schickel never practiced or played in 2008-09 due to a stress fracture in one of his legs. He is both good sized and a talented perimeter shooter who will be a three-point threat. His twin, Teddy, played in 30 games (four starts) as a freshman. A tough competitor and dedicated worker, he will contribute off the bench at point guard this season.

The rest of the active roster is freshmen, including two will start in the backcourt, Drejon Scott and Chris Flores. Scott, out of one of Virginia's strongest programs (Petersburg High, alma mater of Famer Moses Malone), is totally at ease with the ball and has the quickness to drive past opponents, combined with an outside shooting touch that saw him make 86 three-point baskets as a high school senior year.

Flores, a combo guard, led O'Bryant School of Math and Science to the 2008 Boston City League South title. He then spent a prep year at Marianapolis Prep in Connecticut, where he rated among the top 20 players in the state and scored 35 points in the New England Class B prep final. Flores is an excellent passer with explosive athleticism and shooting range that saw him make 52 three-pointers in his prep year.

Another strong addition is PJ Miller, a long, 6-foot-3 combo guard from the Washington, DC, area, where he starred at Potomac School in McLean, VA, scoring in double figures every game as a senior, including a high of 42 vs. Flint Hill (VA). As a junior, he was MVP of the Virginia Independent schools Division II title game.

Up front, Nick Lopez offers an attractive combination of toughness, energy and skill. A New Jersey product,

he was one of the top 40 players in his statewide class before going to prep school in Pennsylvania for his last two years.

Two other freshmen in the mix are Sean McCarthy, a true center, and forward Matt Darnell.


McCarthy, at 6-10, 265, has a background that saw his last two pre-college teams reach their respective season-ending championship. He will have the chance to compete in games as he learns college level play.

Darnell isn't as big (6-6, 220) but was an accomplished high school player, averaging 19 points as a senior and being named twice by the Washington Post as AAA Commonwealth District Player of the Year playing at Virginia's North Stafford High.

In addition to the inaugural Great West Conference season, NJIT will play its first two games ever against teams from the powerful Atlantic Coast Conference (December 21 at Virginia and January 5 at Boston College). The Highlanders will face another power conference, visiting Big East opponents Seton Hall (November 30, a one-mile "road trip" to Newark's Prudential Center; and December 19 at Rutgers).

NJIT will also continue series against teams from the America East, Metro Atlantic, Northeast Conferences and the Ivy League and Patriot Leagues, in addition to Division I Independent Longwood.






# MATT DARNELL


# DREJON SCOTT

Quick and confident point guard who is comfortable with the ball in big situations ... possesses the ability to get into the defense off the dribble, or to make shots from long range ... likely starter at point guard.

**Prior to NJIT:** Named by the Richmond Times-Dispatch to its All-Metro second team, playing at tradition-rich Petersburg (VA) High School, which is best known in basketball circles as the alma mater of Hall of Famer Moses Malone ... Scott's senior team, which won Virginia's Central District and Central Region championships, was mentioned in local news reports along with Malone-led Petersburg teams that finished 25-0 and won state titles in the 1970s. The 2008-09 Petersburg Crimson Wave had a 30-0 start and the top regular season ranking in Virginia before losing in the state AAA semifinals to another 30-win team. The loss in his final game was bittersweet for Scott, who was his team's game-leading scorer with 20 points and also crossed the coveted 1,000-point career barrier for coach Bill Lawson III ... Scott made 86 of 190 three-point tries in his senior season, including 5-for-7 in the season-ending game ... He was a 76 percent free throw shooter as a senior and netted 425 of his points as a senior, with a high of 36 on January 16 against Prince George (VA). Most noteworthy in that game, he was successful on a Petersburg school-record 10 of 11 attempts from three-point distance ... He made at least one three-pointer in 28 of his team's 31 games. He had four games scoring in the 20s and was a double-figure scorer in 21 of 31 games ... Petersburg also reached the state semifinals in 2008, when it finished 27-4 with Scott at the point in his junior year ... AAU team was Petersburg Elite/Team Loaded, coached by Ty White.

Matt Provence, who is in his first full season calling games for the Highlanders, enters his third season with the IronPigs after spending the previous two seasons as Assistant General Manager for the Daytona Cubs of the Florida State League. While with Daytona, the New Jersey native was part of a staff that Baseball America recognized with the 2006 Bob Freitas Award, which annually honors the most outstanding organization in four different levels of Minor League Baseball. Prior to his time with the Cubs, Provence handled media relations duties as the Director of Broadcasting for the Lynchburg Hillcats from 1998-2004. The graduate of James Madison University officially began his professional baseball career with the Norwich Navigators in 1997 after interning with the New York Yankees broadcast team in 1995.

Schaeffer, back for a second season with NJIT, is set to make the 2010 season his eighth in professional baseball (and third with the IronPigs) after beginning his broadcasting career as a radio announcer with Lynchburg in 2003. A native of Lower Merion, PA, Schaeffer also handles play-by-play duties for Lincoln University football. Schaeffer is a 2002 graduate of Penn State University with a degree in Broadcast Journalism. While at PSU, he was nominated for a Hearst award, recognizing excellence in student broadcasting.



# PRUDENTIAL CENTER



In October 2007, the Prudential Center ushered in a new era in sports and entertainment in Newark and the entire northern New Jersey area.

Newark is in the midst of a major revitalization, converting the city core into a vibrant and energized entertainment district. The Prudential Center, the New Jersey Performing Arts Center, The Newark Symphony, Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and in 2010, Red Bull Arena in nearby Harrison represent just part of the nearly \$2 billion in construction underway.

Prudential Center is the cornerstone in the revitalization and renaissance of downtown Newark. In addition to the arena, Newark will soon add scores of condominiums, restaurants, themed bars and mixed retail establishments. Prudential Center, one of the finest arenas in the country, is New Jersey's home for hockey, college basketball, indoor soccer, concerts, family shows and special events.

A public/private partnership between the City of Newark and Devils Arena Entertainment made the \$375 million Prudential Center a reality that is changing the face of downtown Newark and making it a destination place for sports and live entertainment in the region.

Bounded by Edison Place to the north, Lafayette Street to the south, Mulberry Street to the east and Broad Street and City Hall to the west, "The Rock" is located about a mile from NJIT's University Heights campus.

Known best as the home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils, the Prudential Center has a seating capacity of 17,625 for hockey and up to 18,500 for basketball.

Featuring a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as two club lounges, a goal bar, terrace area and a 350-seat gourmet restaurant, along with 76 Luxury Suites and two Event Suites, the Prudential Center is big league in every way.

The relationship between NJIT and the Prudential Center is a natural. 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of Newark's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. NJIT, meanwhile, is an integral part of the city's educational, civic and economic life.

The arrival of the spectacular Prudential Center nearly coincides with NJIT's arrival as an NCAA Division I institution—the first in Newark and the newest in New Jersey in more than 20 years. The Rock opened one year after NJIT began Division I competition as part of its NCAA reclassification which is now complete.

In the arena's inaugural year, NJIT played host to six basketball games on four dates, including four men's basketball games and two women's games. Included was the first women's or girls' sports competition in the building's history, when the Highlanders entertained Cornell on January 15, 2008.

The Highlanders hosted five more men's and women's college basketball games in the state-of-the-art building and are set to host four games in 2009-10. Further, NJIT's club ice hockey team plays all of its home games in the full-size Devils practice rink facility (AmeriHealth Pavilion), which adjoins the main arena and has an 800-seat capacity.



The Prudential Center, located in downtown Newark, about a mile from NJIT's University Heights campus, is easily accessible by mass transit or by automobile.

"The Rock" is located a short walk from regional mass transportation hub Newark Penn Station, which is served by Amtrak and New Jersey Transit trains, not to mention the Newark City Light Rail, which has a stop (Warren Street Station) at the NJIT campus just a few feet from the entrance of Fleisher Athletic Center and J. Malcolm Simon Stadium at Lubetkin Field.

Highways passing near the arena include: I-78, I-280, the NJ Turnpike, Garden State Parkway, Routes 1 & 9, 21, and 22.

There are over 3,500 parking spaces within two blocks of the arena and way-finding signage, guest services personnel and security will assist in getting you to your destination (Please note: all of the parking lots are owned independently, with the exception of the VIP Parking Deck (Lot 10) located on Lafayette Street at the corner of Broad and Lafayette).

Continue on US 1-9 approx. 3 miles and exit on the right onto Rt. 21 (McCarter Highway). Bear left onto Broad Street northbound. Continue on Broad Street to Lafayette Street and make a right. Prudential Center will be on your left.

### Garden State Parkway

#### Southbound or northbound—

—Exit 145. Follow signs to I-280 eastbound. Exit 15 (Route 21-Downtown/Arts). At bottom of ramp

(traffic light). Turn right onto Route 21 South. Continue on Rt. 21 to Raymond Boulevard. Turn right onto Raymond Blvd. and then left onto Mulberry Street. The Prudential Center will be visible ahead on your right.

### From Newark Liberty International Airport

Follow signs for Routes 1 and 9 North via the ramp to State Hwy 21. Slight left at Rt 21 (signs for Newark/US 22/State Hwy 21). Turn left at Edison Place. Turn left at Mulberry Street (door-to-door distance is approx. 4.4 miles).

### From New York City

—From George Washington Bridge or Lincoln Tunnel, follow signs to New Jersey Turnpike and then follow directions above for New Jersey Turnpike southbound.

—From Holland Tunnel, follow signs to I-78 westbound and take center ramp after the toll booth toward US 1-9/Rt. 21. Keep right to stay on the ramp toward US 1-9. Continue on US 1-9 approx. 3 miles and exit on the right onto Rt. 21 (McCarter Highway). Bear left onto Broad Street northbound. Continue on Broad Street to Lafayette Street and make a right. Prudential Center will be on your left.



# ATHLETICS FACILITIES

The NJIT basketball teams will have home games this season in the downtown Newark Prudential Center and on-campus in the recently-renovated gymnasium of the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center.


“The Rock”, located about a mile from NJIT’s University Heights campus, opened in October 2007 as the new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils. NJITr basketball has played there in each of the building’s first two seasons and the Highlanders will return for two doubleheaders in February 2010.

The Fleisher Athletic Center gym, also home to NJIT’s volleyball teams, underwent renovation in the summer of 2006. Included in the makeover was installation of a new floor and baskets and a repositioning of the main playing court.

The gym also got new lighting, a new sound system and new scoreboards, along with entirely new seating for more than 1,000 spectators after the first phase of renovation. Future plans include the addition of more seating, which will nearly double the seating capacity while maintaining the up close-feel that puts spectators next to the action and contributes to the home-court advantage.

The back bay ‘C gym’ can be sectioned off from the main competition floor, making the facility useful for intramurals, physical education classes and campus recreation time, while being able to host multiple simultaneous events.

The NJIT basketball teams also have full access to the other facilities in the Fleisher Center. These include the fitness area (containing computer-controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units and an indoor track), a free-weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), a martial arts center and an aerobics dance studio.

A six-lane swimming pool in Fleisher Athletic Center is home to the NJIT men’s and women’s swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads play on the four outdoor lighted tennis courts behind Fleisher Athletic Center. The NJIT Campus Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.

Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium, with its entrance a few feet from the entrance of the Fleisher Athletic Center, is a first-class venue for college soccer. Outfitted with SprinTurf artificial grass in the

summer of 2004, the complex also includes lighting for night contests, bleacher seating for more than 1,000 spectators, a press box and scoreboard. The installation of the new surface, a walking track and new landscaping was done at a cost of \$1.2 million.

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, opened in 1999 at a cost of \$30 million and with a seating capacity of 6,200, became the home of NJIT baseball in 2004. In a joint December 2005 press conference, New York Yankees manager Joe Torre was a featured speaker as NJIT and the Newark Bears announced a 10-year partnership that designated the downtown stadium the home of all Highlanders home games for the decade to come.

NJIT, which offers a growing list of club sports, also has a robust intramural program, which makes use of the numerous athletic facilities.

Turn left on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren St. traffic light (Raymond Blvd. becomes Lock St.) Fleisher Athletic Center & Lubetkin Field will be on your right.

**New Jersey Turnpike: Driving South from North Jersey:** Take exit 15W to Route 280 West. Then follow Route 280 West directions.

**Route 280 West:** After drawbridge, take Exit 15A (Rt. 21 South - McCarter Highway). Follow Rt. 21 South to Raymond Blvd. Turn right on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren St. traffic light (Raymond Blvd. becomes Lock St.) Fleisher Athletic Center & Lubetkin Field will be on your right.

**Route 280 East:** Take Exit 15 (Rt. 21 South - McCarter Highway). Follow Rt. 21 South to Raymond Blvd. Turn right on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren St. traffic light (Raymond Blvd. becomes Lock St.) Fleisher Athletic Center & Lubetkin Field will be on your right.

**Garden State Parkway (North & South bound):** Take exit 145 to Route 280 East, then follow Route 280 East directions.

**Route 1 & 9 North & South:** Take exit marked Newark, Rt. 21 North. Follow Rt. 21 North (McCarter Highway). Turn left on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren St. traffic light (Raymond Blvd. becomes Lock St.) Fleisher Athletic Center & Lubetkin Field will be on your right.

**Route 78 East:** Take Route 78 East to Rt. 21 North. Turn left on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren St. traffic light (Raymond Blvd. becomes Lock St.) Fleisher Athletic Center & Lubetkin Field will be on your right.

# SPORTS AND ENTERTAINMENT IN & AROUND NEWARK

## Prudential Center

The new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils is in downtown Newark at the corner of Mulberry and Edison streets, about one mile from the NJIT's University Heights campus.

Opened in October 2007, 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of the city's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. In addition to the world's best hockey, it is home to numerous entertainment and sporting events, including NJIT basketball. Indeed, NJIT hosted the first women's basketball game in the Prudential Center on January 15, 2008 (NJIT vs. Cornell).

NJIT played in the Rock in the inaugural year and plans are ongoing for the Highlanders to play games each year in North America's newest major arena.

The arena, with full-capacity seating for 18,500 spectators, features a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as the latest in ice-surface technology and a gourmet restaurant overlooking the ice for Devils games. The building contains 850,000 square feet of space, 9,000 tons of steel, eight million pounds of structural steel and 25,000 cubic yards of concrete.



the NJIT campus, is a major component of a multi-billion dollar development.

Red Bull Arena will have a number of key design elements which will give Red Bull Arena's seating bowl a close-to-the-action feeling and the unique stadium roof design will extend from its leading edge over the entire seating bowl and then curve down to the concourse.

The overall seating capacity for soccer will be 25,189, including 30 luxury suites (20 lower level and 10 upper level) and 1,116 club seats. Other amenities include three stadium clubs and two retail outlets.

## Red Bull Arena

The new home of the New York Red Bulls (opening in March 2010) will set the standard for soccer venues across North America.

The state-of-the-art soccer-specific facility, under construction in Harrison, NJ, about two miles from



## Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium



Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the professional baseball Newark Bears and since 2004 the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999. With a seating capacity of 6,200, "The Den" affords fans an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major league-caliber press box.

In December 2005, NJIT and the Bears held a joint press conference to herald a new partnership that includes a 10-year deal that extends Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium as the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball.



# NCAA DIVISION 1

New Jersey Institute of Technology athletics is on the move to the top level of college athletics—NCAA Division I.

The reclassification is nearly complete, as NJIT closes in on active championship-eligible Division I status, which is slated to arrive for all programs in 2009-10.

Formerly a member of Division II, NJIT got the go-ahead to begin the reclassification process, which began with an exploratory year in 2005-06. All of the programs that previously competed in Division II then moved up to face Division I competition effective in 2006-07.

Two sports—men's soccer and women's soccer—paved the way on a faster NCAA track that allows lower division schools to elevate one sport in each gender to Division I in a process that takes two years to complete.

NJIT men's soccer became a full member of NCAA Division I at the start of the 2005 season, when the Highlanders arrived at championship eligibility. The men's journey to the top level began in 2003. NJIT women's soccer began a similar two-year process in 2005, with full Division I status and championship eligibility arriving with the 2007 season.

The larger process of advancing the entire program to Division I takes longer and includes application, a detailed strategic plan and in-depth annual review of the institution's progress in moving toward its goal of complying with NCAA Division I rules and building a strong, broad-based athletics program.

NJIT's move to Division I progressed quickly after the November 2002 discussions among President Robert A. Altenkirch, Vice President Joel Bloom and Athletics Director Lenny Kaplan.

From there came a proposal from Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I. Little more than two years later, the NCAA approved NJIT's proposal to advance its entire program to Division I.

Along the way, scholarship and operating budgets have been enhanced, with expanded coaching staffs, increased scholarship dollars and upgraded facilities for competition and practice.

Upgrading athletics has been a priority for Dr. Altenkirch since he was selected as the seventh President of NJIT in May 2002.

"As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university athletically with our academic peers," said Altenkirch. "It will also enable us to recruit the best and brightest student-athletes, improve athletics facilities available to the entire NJIT community, gain regional and national visibility, and build strong linkages with students that will carry over to their days as alumni."

Moving to Division I has allowed NJIT student-athletes to test themselves in competition against their peers from all over the country, including competition against teams from the nation's best conferences.

Along the way, two NJIT opponents (Maryland men's soccer in 2005 and Penn State men's volleyball in 2008) have faced the Highlanders in the regular season and then gone on to win their respective national championship.

# Great West

NJIT's basketball teams begin 2009-10 competition as part of the expanded multi-sport Great West Conference.

Member schools are spread over seven states and four time zones, giving each school added exposure in new destinations. The conference, which began as a football-only league, took a giant leap in the collegiate athletic world with expansion to include several additional sports and new members.

Joining the league on July 10, 2008 were: Houston Baptist, NJIT, North Dakota, South Dakota, Texas-Pan American and Utah Valley. Chicago State accepted the league's invitation to join in October 2008. These seven schools joined football-only members Cal Poly, UC Davis and Southern Utah.

As the conference began planning for multi-team sport competition in 2009-10, several teams were added in the sports of women's soccer and baseball to help provide a more diverse and competitive field. Delaware State, Howard and South Carolina State joined as associate members in women's soccer. Northern Colorado and New York Institute of Technology joined as associate members in baseball. Seattle was added as an associate member in cross country and track and field in 2009.

NJIT, Texas-Pan American and Utah Valley have been playing each other in multiple sports, including home-and-home games in men's and women's basketball, since NJIT began Division I competition for the first time in 2006-07.

NJIT and Utah Valley completed their NCAA reclassification and became active championship-eligible members of NCAA Division I on September 1, 2009. Houston Baptist announced an agreement with the NCAA that can make HBU an active member of Division I in 2011-12 and North Dakota and South Dakota will be active members of Division I in 2012-13. Texas-Pan American and Chicago State have been active Division I programs for many years.

The expanded conference is not an automatic NCAA Division I championship postseason qualifier, but will offer the benefit of conference championship competition, stable scheduling opportunities and individual recognition for student-athletes through weekly and season all-conference recognition.

The champion of the Great West Conference men's basketball postseason tournament (hosted in 2010 by Utah Valley) will receive an automatic bid into the CollegeInsider.com Tournament (CIT) a 16-team national postseason tournament. The CIT, won by Old Dominion in 2009, will crown its 2010 champion on March 30 in a game that will be televised nationally on Fox College Sports.

The governance of the Great West Conference remains primarily with the member institutions. Each member institution is represented on the President's Council by its respective CEO. The general operations and management of the Conference will be conducted by the Directors of Athletics and Senior Woman Administrators (Joint Council). Scheduling of contests, assignment of officials and certain media relations functions remain with member institutions.

NJIT's sports that do not come under the Great West umbrella will continue in their existing conferences—men's soccer in the Atlantic Soccer Conference and men's volleyball in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association, which has an automatic NCAA postseason berth, which was claimed in 2008 by eventual national champion Penn State.

In addition, NJIT will continue competition against top non-conference regional and national opponents. Two NJIT opponents—Maryland in men's soccer and Penn State in men's volleyball, have won national championships following seasons in which they faced the Highlanders. Meanwhile, NJIT teams will compete regularly with opponents from the Atlantic Coast, Atlantic 10, America East, Big East, Ivy League, Patriot League, MAAC and Northeast Conference.
