



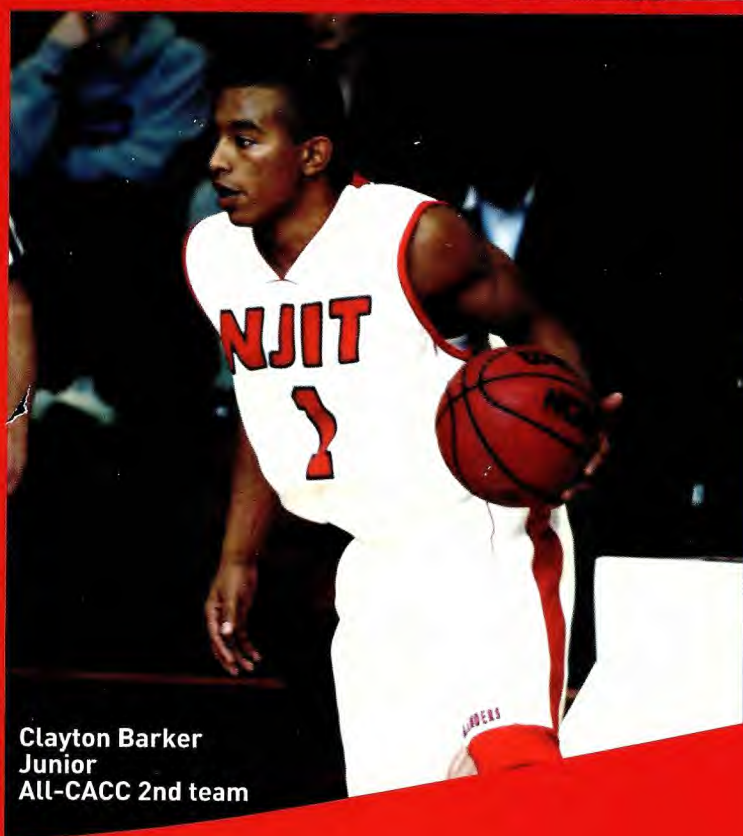

WHY THE HIGHLANDERS?

The area on which the NJIT campus sits, now known as University Heights, was formerly called the Newark Highlands. The mailing address of the University used to be on High Street, until the road was re-named Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard.

You don't have to listen long to New Jersey Institute of Technology coach Jim Casciano before you hear the words "young" and "improve" used in a recurring theme for his team in 2005-06.

Casciano, in his 20th year as a college head coach (his fifth at NJIT), has a well-earned reputation for rebuilding struggling programs at Castleton State and St. Michael's in Vermont and at King's, before coming to NJIT.

The current challenge is different, because the rebuilding comes after success at the same school. The task of rebuilding is not as large-scale as it was at his previous stops, either.

In 2002-03, Casciano led NJIT to its best Division II finish, with 18 wins, a Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference regular season title and an ECAC post-season berth.

Since then, the Highlanders have featured young rosters, with few veterans the last two seasons. On top of that, the team has seen more than its share of injuries. Even so, the Highlanders qualified for the post-season Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference tournament each season.

Last year, the Highlanders were five games off the pace in the balanced CACC. Sixteen of NJIT's 20 conference games were decided by 10 points, or less, so a few well-placed buckets could swing things in a positive direction.

Coming off an 11-17 overall record (10-10 in the CACC), NJIT has one senior, two juniors, five sophomores and three freshmen (a fourth is redshirting). The juniors are experienced all-conference players and four of the sophomores saw action in all 28 games a year ago. The freshmen will play right away and learn on the court.

"It seems like 'Groundhog Day', where we've been repeating the same thing the last few years," said Casciano. "We're young again—predominantly freshmen and sophomores—and we'll be counting on our young players to play for us right away."

"We'll stick to our beliefs, with a goal of improving daily. From there, we'll look for improvement in our record. That leads to the goal of having a winning season and putting yourself in position to win the [CACC] regular season."

The lineup features proven stars Marc Milbourne Swan in the low post and point guard Clayton Barker. Each man was 2nd team All-CACC last season and they were picked on this year's coaches' 10-man preseason All-CACC squad.

Milbourne Swan, a 6-foot-5 power forward, led NJIT in scoring (15.6 ppg) and rebounding (6.9 rpg), while ranking third nationally with a .657 field goal percentage. Extremely effective around the basket, he punished teams that fouled him by connecting on 126 free throws.

Barker, the backcourt leader, averaged 13.7 points, led NJIT in steals (51; 2.1 pg, ranked 53rd in the nation) and dished out close to 100 assists. He made 43 three-pointers, shot 82 percent at the foul line (ranked 80th nationally) and hit game-winning shots in the final 30 seconds of three games. "He gives us toughness, energy and leadership," said the coach. "He's quick and strong and he wants the ball in the clutch."

The only senior, 6-foot-7 banger Henry White, played in just two games last year, due to injury. With 57 games played the previous two seasons, White has reached double figures in scoring and rebounding in the past. His leadership will be vital.

Among the sophomores, guard Courcy Magnus bears watching after averaging 4.6 points in 28 games (10 starts) a year ago. "Courcy has demonstrated the ability to take a major step," said Casciano.

Kraig Peters, a 6-5 swingman, is back after starting 20 games and averaging 7.3 ppg. Peters has championship experience, having been an integral part of the New Jersey Group 4 state championship team at Lenape High School in 2003-04.

Brett Johnson and Kyle Edwards are two others who played in all 28 games and each made 13 starts last season as freshmen.

Johnson, a South Jersey native, who played in big games at perennial Philadelphia high school power Roman Catholic, averaged 6.3 points and 4.5 rebounds (second on the team) for the Highlanders.

Edwards, a versatile athlete, was second on the Highlanders in blocked shots, with 25. Brian Dench, the tallest

player on the active roster at 6-foot-8, appeared in 12 games as a freshman and averaged around 3 points and 3 rebounds per game.

Looking at his newcomers, Casciano says: "Every member of the freshman class will have an opportunity to contribute. All three could get quality minutes from the beginning."

Alex Stone, a true point guard, was a 1,000-point scorer in basketball and an all-county quarterback at Immaculata High in Somerville, NJ. He followed up with a strong postgraduate basketball year at Loomis Chaffee School in Connecticut, where he averaged 16 points, 8 rebounds and 6 assists.

"He's a tough kid and point guard is his natural position," said Casciano. "He's been around athletics all his life. His dad (Jim) was a star running back at Notre Dame and played pro football. Alex is comfortable in competition and he plays with a lot of confidence."

Michael Manning, a swing man, starred at Rutgers Prep, which he helped to the New Jersey Prep B crown as a senior. The 6-foot-3 Manning was all-state in both basketball and soccer.

Johnathan Dixon, an athletic 6-foot-4 forward, was a 1,000-point scorer at Lawrenceville (NJ) Prep, earning numerous all-star honors. He is capable of driving to the basket or pulling up to hit jump shots with three-point range.

A fourth freshman, 6-foot-9 Dan Stonkus will stay under wraps. Stonkus, the South Brunswick (NJ) High School career leader in blocked shots, is redshirting in 2005-06.

"He should be a cornerstone of our reclassification into Division I," said Casciano of Stonkus. "He's got legitimate size and great work habits, very coachable. He needs to work on some things, but we'll use this year to address those issues."

As the coach noted, NJIT is playing its final season in NCAA Division II, having undertaken the process of reclassifying to Division I. With that in mind, the Highlanders are playing their final season in the Division II Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference.

Next season, the Highlanders will play a Division I schedule of opponents, with full championship eligibility at the highest level arriving for the 2009-10 season.

New Jersey Institute of Technology athletics is on the move to the top level of college athletics--NCAA Division I.

The exciting news came this summer, when the NCAA gave NJIT the green light to reclassify its entire athletics program from Division II to Division I, a four-year process that will bring all Highlander sports to full Division I status and championship eligibility in 2009-10.

Two sports—men's soccer and women's soccer—are paving the way under NCAA rules that allow Division II or Division III schools to elevate one sport in each gender to Division I in a process that takes two years to complete.

NJIT men's soccer is already a full member of NCAA Division I, having arrived at championship eligibility in the 2005 season. The men's journey to the top level began in 2003, under the NCAA's two-year single-sport per gender reclassification process. Highlanders women's soccer is begin-

ning a similar two-year process in 2005, with full Division I status and championship eligibility arriving in the 2007 season.

The larger process of advancing the entire program to NCAA I takes four years to complete and includes application, a detailed strategic plan and in-depth annual review of the institution's progress in moving toward its goal of complying with NCAA Division I rules and building a strong, broad-based athletics program.

New Jersey Institute of Technology's move to Division I has moved quickly since the November 2002 discussions among President Robert A. Altenkirch, Vice President Joel Bloom and Athletics Director Lenny Kaplan.

From there, came a proposal from Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I. Little more than two years later, the NCAA has approved NJIT's proposal to advance its

entire 15-sport program to Division I.

Along the way, scholarship and operating budgets have been enhanced, with expanded coaching staffs, increased scholarship dollars and upgraded facilities for competition and practice.

Upgrading athletics has been a priority for Dr. Altenkirch since he was selected as the seventh President of NJIT in May 2002.

"As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university athletically with our academic peers," said Altenkirch. "It will also enable us to recruit the best and brightest student-athletes, improve athletics facilities available to the entire NJIT community, gain regional and national visibility, and build strong linkages with students that will carry over to their days as alumni."

Lubetkin Field was site of the first Division I competition at NJIT on September 1, 2004, when the men's soccer team hosted Monmouth University.



Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch

President

Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch, formerly vice president for research at Mississippi State University (MSU), joined NJIT as the university's seventh president in July 2002. During his tenure as MSU vice president for research, science and engineering, expenditures as reported to National Science Foundation (NSF) increased dramatically—75% from 1997 to 2001.



Prior to his appointment as vice president at MSU, Altenkirch served as professor of mechanical and materials engineering and dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture at Washington State University. From 1988 to 1995, he was professor of mechanical engineering and dean of the College of Engineering at MSU. He also served as professor and chair of mechanical engineering at the University of Kentucky.

In addition to the research program, his responsibilities encompassed congressional relations, intellectual property management and economic development. While dean of engineering at MSU, he led the effort to secure National Science Foundation funding for the establishment of the MSU NSF Engineering Research Center for Computational Field Simulation in

1990. Additionally, the Center was instrumental in helping the State of Mississippi attract a \$1 billion Nissan manufacturing plant.

Altenkirch holds a PhD from Purdue University, an MS from the University of California, Berkeley, and a BSME from Purdue, all in mechanical engineering. He is the author of over 50 publications and nearly 100 presentations in combustion and heat transfer and served as principal investigator for ten Space Shuttle experiments investigating the spread of fire in reduced gravity. He is a Fellow of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

Dr. Joel Bloom

Vice President of Academic and Student Services

Dr. Joel Bloom has worked at NJIT since July 1990. In his current position, he is responsible for nine divisions of the university, including Physical Education and Athletics.



Dr. Bloom is also Dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College, which enrolls more than 525 students who are typically in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class.

Prior to NJIT, Dr. Bloom spent seven years as assistant Commissioner in the New Jersey Department of Education. He is currently the Chair of

the NASULGC Council of Chief Student Affairs Officers and the Newark Consortium Board for Pre-College Education.

Dr. Bloom earned his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees from Hunter College, and holds a Master's and Doctorate from Columbia University Teachers College.

Lenny Kaplan

Director of Athletics

After serving 11 years in the athletics department at Division-I Manhattan College, Lenny Kaplan was appointed in August 2000 to head NJIT's division of physical education and athletics.



Kaplan is a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration. After three years as Manhattan's director of operations, he served as an assistant athletics director with the Jaspers from 1991-2000.

Kaplan is the Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference Executive Committee Supervisor for men's basketball, and serves on the NCAA Division II nominating committee, the D-II Women's Soccer Regional Advisory Committee, and the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association Executive Committee.

Kaplan resides in Merrick, New York, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.

Jim Casciano

Head Coach

Jim Casciano enters his 20th as a head coach at the collegiate level in 2005-06 and his first victory of the season will be a career milestone, as he reaches the 250-win mark, including 200 at the helm of four-year colleges.

In Casciano's head coaching career, he has achieved success in the collegiate game at an array of levels—at a two-year college and at four-year colleges in NAIA, NCAA Division III and NCAA Division II.

This season will be Casciano's fifth at New Jersey Institute of Technology and he has led the Highlanders to success,



just as he did at his other coaching stops.

In his second season at NJIT (2002-03), Casciano's Highlanders finished in first place in the Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference and were the runners-up in the ECAC Tournament. With an 18-11 record, NJIT set a school record for wins in the Division II era.

The prior season, Casciano was co-CACC Coach of the Year, after guiding the Highlanders to second place.

He came to NJIT after winning the ECAC Division III South Championship in 2000-01 with King's College. The Monarchs also earned their first Middle Atlantic Conference playoff berth since 1993-94.

The turnaround at King's was typical of a career that has seen him revitalize struggling programs. He spent five seasons at the Wilkes-Barre, PA, school, amassing 12 combined victories in the first three. The Monarchs, however, went 13-11 in 1999-2000 to enjoy their first winning campaign in six years, then improved to 19-9 in 2000-01, before Casciano moved on to NJIT.

In his first head coaching position at Castleton (VT) State in 1982-83, he

established a school record for victories, going 14-11, which earned a berth in the NAIA tournament.

Casciano then moved within Vermont to Division II St. Michael's. After two rebuilding years, his 1985-86 squad went 19-10 and Casciano was Mid-East Collegiate Conference Coach of the Year.

In 1986-87, the Purple Knights won the MCC championship, posted a 20-11 record (SMC's first 20-win season in 12 years) and earned the program's first NCAA tournament berth in 20 years. The following year, St. Michael's was ranked first in the nation in Division II by several preseason publications, including *Sports Illustrated*, in 1987-88 preseason.

After the initial rebuilding, Casciano compiled four consecutive winning seasons with St. Michael's, departing after the 1988-89 season and becoming a Division I assistant. Returning to the head coaching ranks in 1993, he took over at Valley Forge Military College in Wayne, PA. In three seasons with the two-year school, he compiled a 50-19 record and had five players earn Division I scholarships.

Casciano began his coaching career as a volunteer assistant to Rollie Massimino at Villanova. He has also assisted at Delaware, Washington & Lee, Old Dominion and Radford, plus three years as a women's basketball assistant at Temple.

Casciano played college basketball at Drexel University, where he earned a bachelor's degree in business administration in 1977. The Bridgeport, PA, native resides in Basking Ridge, NJ, with his wife, Daphne.

Jeff Sonnema

Assistant Coach

Jeff Sonnema, a 1999 graduate of New Jersey Institute of Technology, has made a seamless transition from two-sport stardom to coaching at his alma mater.

He was a standout player for the Highlanders in both basketball and baseball and he moved to the NJIT coaching staff in both sports. He was an assistant baseball coach for four seasons, before focusing exclusively on basketball. He joined the coaching staff

in 1999-2000 and became the men's basketball lead assistant in 2003-04.



Along the way, he was a player on NJIT's most successful basketball team ever (NCAA Division III national quarterfinalists in 1995-96) and an assistant coach on its most successful team at the Division II level (18 wins, conference championship, ECAC finalist in 2002-03).

In 2002-03, he assisted head coach Jim Casciano, as the Highlanders captured the Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference regular season title and went on to finish as runner-up in the Eastern College Athletic Conference postseason Tournament. That team also established a high for wins (18) in NJIT's NCAA Division II era (since 1997).

Sonnema holds the rare distinction of having been Most Valuable Player in both basketball (1996-97) and baseball (1999) and he was a four-year letterwinner in both sports. He was honored as NJIT's Outstanding Senior Male Athlete in 1998.

As a freshman, Sonnema was a member of the most successful basketball team in school history. The 1995-96 Highlanders advanced to the NCAA Division III national quarterfinals and had a won-lost record of 28-2, including 22 consecutive victories.

The next season, as a sophomore, he posted team-leading averages of 15.2 points and 6.0 rebounds per game and was selected as a New Jersey College Basketball Coaches Association All-Star.

Not only was he versatile as a two-sport standout, but he was also versatile within the sport of baseball. A successful pitcher and slugging first baseman, Sonnema's 3.55 earned-run average led the Highlanders' 1999 baseball team and he also batted .307. He holds the school single-game record, with nine runs batted in.

Sonnema earned a bachelor's degree

in management from NJIT. He and his wife, Katie, reside in Wyckoff, NJ.

Wendell Alexis

Assistant Coach

Having completed a long and stellar playing career, Wendell Alexis joined the coaching staff at New Jersey Institute of Technology in August 2005.



NJIT is the first college coaching stop for Alexis, but he has spent his entire adult life in the game, having starred at Syracuse University, where he graduated in 1986, and continuing through a professional career that lasted nearly 20 years until his retirement in 2004.

A graduate of Christ the King High School in Queens, Alexis was one of the top players in New York City before heading off to Syracuse, where he scored 1,212 career points, and grabbed over 400 rebounds. He was an All-Big East honoree for teams that consistently ranked among the best in the country.

Drafted by the Golden State Warriors in 1986, he spent his professional playing career overseas, starring in some of the top foreign leagues, including Spain, Italy, Israel, France, Germany and Greece. He was an all-star in the Euroleague (leading club teams from throughout the continent) from 1998-01.

In 1998, he had the honor of representing the United States as a member of the bronze medal-winning Team USA at the World Basketball Championships in Athens, Greece.

He began his pro career in Spain and moved on to Italy, where he played from 1988 to 1993, earning Italian league Most Valuable Player honors in 1993.

Joining the famed Maccabi Tel Aviv team, Alexis was MVP of the Israeli league, when his team captured

the league and cup championships in 1993-94.

He later played in France and then moved to Germany, where he played from 1996 to 2002. Along the way, Wendell was Most Valuable Player of the German league three times and in 1998 was third in the voting for Athlete of the Year in Berlin, a remarkable feat, considering the overwhelming popularity of soccer in that country.

After a year in Greece, Alexis returned to Germany, where he led his new team, Mitteldeutscher, to its best record and its first-ever European trophy. His team won the 2004 FIBA Cup. As a result, he capped his career by being honored as the MVP for the Western region of FIBA, basketball's world governing body.

Having gone out at the top of his game as a player, Wendell Alexis spent a year coaching as an assistant at St. Joseph High School in Metuchen, NJ, and also as head coach of the MSU Skyliners 16u AAU team, before joining the staff at NJIT. At St. Joseph, he worked extensively with Andrew Bynum, who went directly from high school to the 2005 NBA draft.

He and his wife, Nixia, reside with their three sons in Hillsborough, NJ.

David Grande

Assistant Coach

Joining the staff as a volunteer assistant coach for the 2005-06 season, David

Grande has made his living as a successful businessman, but the game of basketball has never been far from his life.



A 1975 graduate of West Chester University in Pennsylvania, he played basketball there after a year as a student and basketball player at Drexel. He later earned an MBA in marketing from Widener.

He is President of Vitusa Products, Inc. of Berkeley Heights, NJ, and before that was Executive Vice President of Vitusa Corporation of Englewood Cliffs, NJ, from 1981 to 1996. Before that, he held various corporate managerial positions.

At the same time, Grande has coached school and high school basketball since 1986, including from 1997 to 2005 at Oratory Prep in Summit, NJ.

He is also a co-founder and board member of Cherished Creations, a non-profit, New Jersey-based charity that helps create better lives for seriously ill children and the underprivileged.

Founded in 1997, it fulfills its mission primarily through a national wish/request program.

NJIT head coach Jim Casciano, a college teammate of Grande's at Drexel in the 1970's, has been a supporter of Cherished Creations since its inception and the 2004-05 Highlanders team adopted the wish of a 12-year old girl who was stricken with leukemia.

David and his wife, Angela, reside in Millington, NJ. They are the parents of three children: Daniela, Bianca and Anthony.

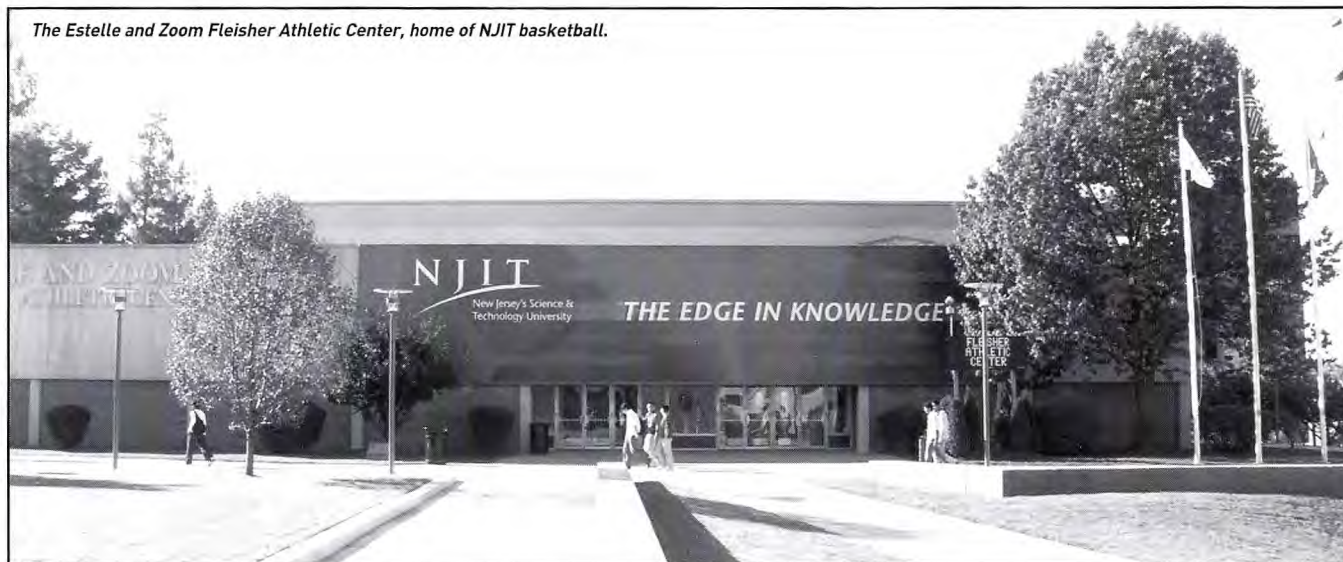
Chelise Gray

Jim Casciano's "Ten Step Approach"

to Academic Success

In his career as a head coach, Jim Casciano has a near 100-percent graduation rate of players who have remained in his program for four years. He credits this to his "Ten-Step Approach" to academic success, listed below:

1. Place sincere emphasis on academics.
2. Develop communications with the academic community.
3. The assignment of an assistant coach as academic coordinator, with other coaches serving as academic coaches.
4. Academic Coaches – Time Management Program. (Each coach is assigned players and is responsible for monitoring their academic progress. Use of time management sheets and meeting individually with players weekly or bi-weekly.)
5. Letters of introduction to professors.
6. Monthly Grade Sheets – Each player must personally have his instructors fill out grade sheets and return them to the academic coordinator.
7. Mandatory Study Hall – Held Monday through Thursday, two hours each day, eight hours per-week. Mandatory for all freshmen, transfer students, and any player with less than a 2.75 GPA.
8. Effective use of tutors, counselors, advisors, and resource materials.
9. Effective use of summer school sessions. (Helpful in students maintaining credits and staying on course to graduate.)
10. Emphasis on class attendance and minimizing conflicts with classes as a result of practice, games, and travel.

NJIT's Campus Center, opened in September 2004, is the final phase of a three-year, \$83.5-million campus makeover. It is designed to be the focal point of a vibrant campus life. The center features a soaring, two-story circular dining hall, sheathed in gleaming, double-pane, energy-conserving glass.

The construction program encompasses two tall multi-story buildings – the East Building, housing the Albert Dorman Honors College, the Department of Biomedical Engineering, and administrative offices, and the center itself, featuring dining facilities, student offices and lounges, game rooms, campus store and ballroom. The two buildings are connected by a sky bridge,

and a European-style piazza featuring a 55-foot clock tower.

In an effort to improve communication and socialization on the 45-acre urban campus, the architects scaled the complex to create the feel of an outdoor room and give more spatial definition to the campus. "To promote socializing, we wanted to encourage people to move through spaces, not around them," said Thomas Levering, associate partner at the architectural firm.

The new round campus dining hall adds height and verve plus doubles the dining space. Its smoky gray glass provides a strong presence on the campus green. A 28,000 square-foot, rooftop grass terrace crowns it. Paths around it reroute traffic to the

center. The clock tower stands adjacent to one entrance to the center. The donated tower features a carillon that will chime hourly.

The construction represents a major portion of more than a \$100 million facilities improvement plan. Completed are additional residence space and an additional building for the business incubator program. Upgrades in the works include two of NJIT's oldest buildings, Cullimore and Eberhardt halls, located adjacent to the complex.

"A good-looking center tells a visual story," said Levering. "A center with the right stuff says life outside the classroom is as important as life within it."

NJIT's history spans from the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age. Newark was a factory town when the tuition-free evening school was founded in 1881 to support local industries. From the early days, science and technology have been the engines fueling the university's development.

Over time, the university both anticipated and responded to change by expanding its curriculum and mission. Most notably, in 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By 1975, NJIT offered a broad range of undergraduate and graduate degrees. All programs included significant research and public service components with the goal of providing an academic environment that fostered intellectual depth and breadth, as well as social responsibility.

Today, continuing a fourfold mission of instruction, research, economic development and public service, NJIT is among the leading comprehensive technological universities in the nation. The university offers 92 degree programs in 33 undergraduate majors, 40 masters and 19 doctoral programs. It has state-of-the-art facilities on a 45-acre campus in Newark and a solar observatory in Big Bear, California.

NJIT'S SIX COLLEGES

While there has been tremendous growth and diversification at NJIT, its roots are in engineering education. For more than eight decades, Newark College of Engineering (NCE) has been preparing engineering students to use science, mathematics, technology and problem-solving skills to design, construct, test and maintain products, services, and information systems.

The New Jersey School of Architecture, established in 1973, is one of the largest architecture schools in the nation and is nationally recognized for the innovative integration of computer technology into the design curriculum.

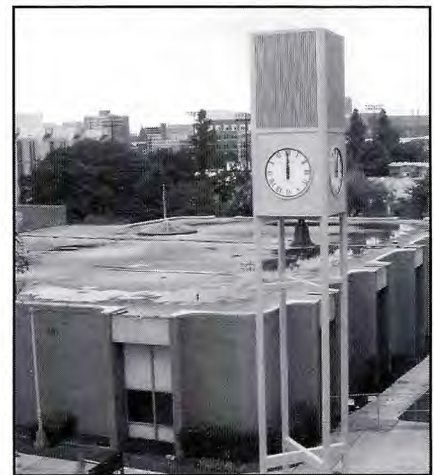
The College of Science and Liberal Arts (CSLA), established in 1982, is moving into the forefront of many national research activities from solar astronomy to computational and mathematical modeling. CSLA provides students with the skill sets for the professional marketplace including literacy in the computer, mathematical, physical and biological sciences, as well as the traditional liberal arts disciplines.

The School of Management, established in 1988, combines the best of the traditional business disciplines (e.g., finance, marketing, accounting, e-commerce) with the power of information and technology management to develop professionals who can manage and communicate effectively.

The Albert Dorman Honors College, established in 1993, offers one of the nation's leading technologically oriented honors programs for students who are prepared to undertake a rigorous and individualized course of study.

The College of Computing Sciences, established in 2001, encompasses a department of computer science, focused on both the theoretical areas of computing and the development of new computer technology, as well as a department of information systems, concentrated on applications involving people and organizations.

NJIT: NEW JERSEY'S TECHNOLOGICAL RESEARCH UNIVERSITY

NJIT plays a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future. As a major public technological university, NJIT is an important conduit through which technology flows into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university hopes to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In addition to its degree programs, the university offers a full spectrum of resources in technological specialties including:

- *enrichment programs for professionals through the Division of Continuing Professional Education.*
- *programs designed to attract elementary and high school students through careers in technology.*
- *extensive eLearning courses.*
- *selected courses available at locations throughout New Jersey.*

A strong applied research program is the very core of the technological research university, generating the

advances that fuel a knowledge-based economy. NJIT's research programs have grown exponentially over the past 25 years, from a total expenditure of \$500,000 in 1978 to more than \$75 million today. The university conducts cutting-edge applied research through multidisciplinary centers of excellence, specialized high-tech labs, and partnerships with industry to develop commercially promising new technologies.

NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark, New Jersey, and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of

helping small and medium-sized companies become more productive, profitable, and globally competitive.

NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element. The university's research centers work in collaboration with corporate partners to speed technology transfer, and numerous outreach programs help businesses become more productive. Extensive initiatives in transportation research based at the university focus on the infrastructure New Jersey needs for a thriving economy.

The NJIT men's and women's basketball teams play their home games in the main gymnasium of the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center.

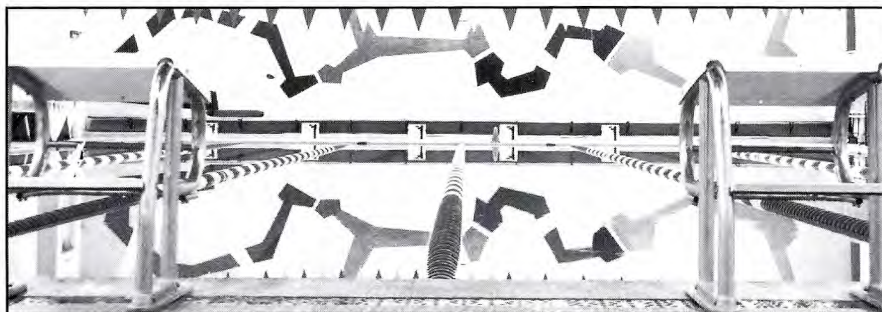
The facility, with seating for approximately 1,500 spectators, is also home to the Highlanders' men's and women's volleyball teams. The back bay, "C gym," area can be sectioned off from the main floor, making the entire gymnasium useful for intramural events, physical education classes, and campus recreation time, and able to host multiple events simultaneously.



The Fleisher Athletic Center is slated for a makeover in the summer of 2006, which will enhance the facility in its everyday use by the NJIT community, as well offering a more enjoyable experience for fans at intercollegiate contests.

Among the anticipated improvements are new spectator seating in the main gymnasium, as well improved lighting and sound. Locker and office space will be reconfigured to bring the facility in line with the needs of Division I competition, including a new court-side "press row" and a room that can serve as working space for media on game days and team meeting and study areas at other times.

The basketball teams also have access to all of the other facilities in the Fleisher Athletic Center. These include



the fitness area (containing computer-controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units, and an indoor track), two weight rooms (free-weight and hammer-strength), four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), and a martial arts/fencing center. A six-lane swimming pool is home to NJIT's men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads host meets and practices at four lighted outdoor hardcourt tennis courts behind the building. The newly-renovated campus center houses six regulation bowling lanes.

The NJIT soccer teams play and practice at Lubetkin Field, a lighted, campus facility, with a newly-installed SprinTurf surface, adjacent to the Fleisher Center. A \$1.2 million renovation project in the summer of 2004 added the artificial grass, a walking track and new landscaping.

Lubetkin contains a midfield scoreboard and pressbox facilities, with

seating to hold approximately 1,000 spectators. It is also used for club sports and intramural events, as well as by the NJIT baseball team for practice.

Bears & Eagles Riverfront Stadium in downtown Newark, the facility of the Newark Bears of the independent Atlantic League of Professional Baseball Clubs, became the full-time home of Highlander baseball in 2004 and offers one of the finest college baseball playing venues in the nation.

NJIT offers several club sports, including cricket, judo, men's lacrosse and track and field, plus a full intramural program.

Each NJIT student must pass two physical education classes as a graduation requirement. Offerings include aerobics, archery, bowling, dance, fencing, golf, karate, swimming, skiing, strength training and conditioning, volleyball and water safety.

Each year the two universities co-sponsor a common season of theatrical productions, as well as 'World Week,' a joint program of honors colloquia, and a variety of other cultural and social activities.

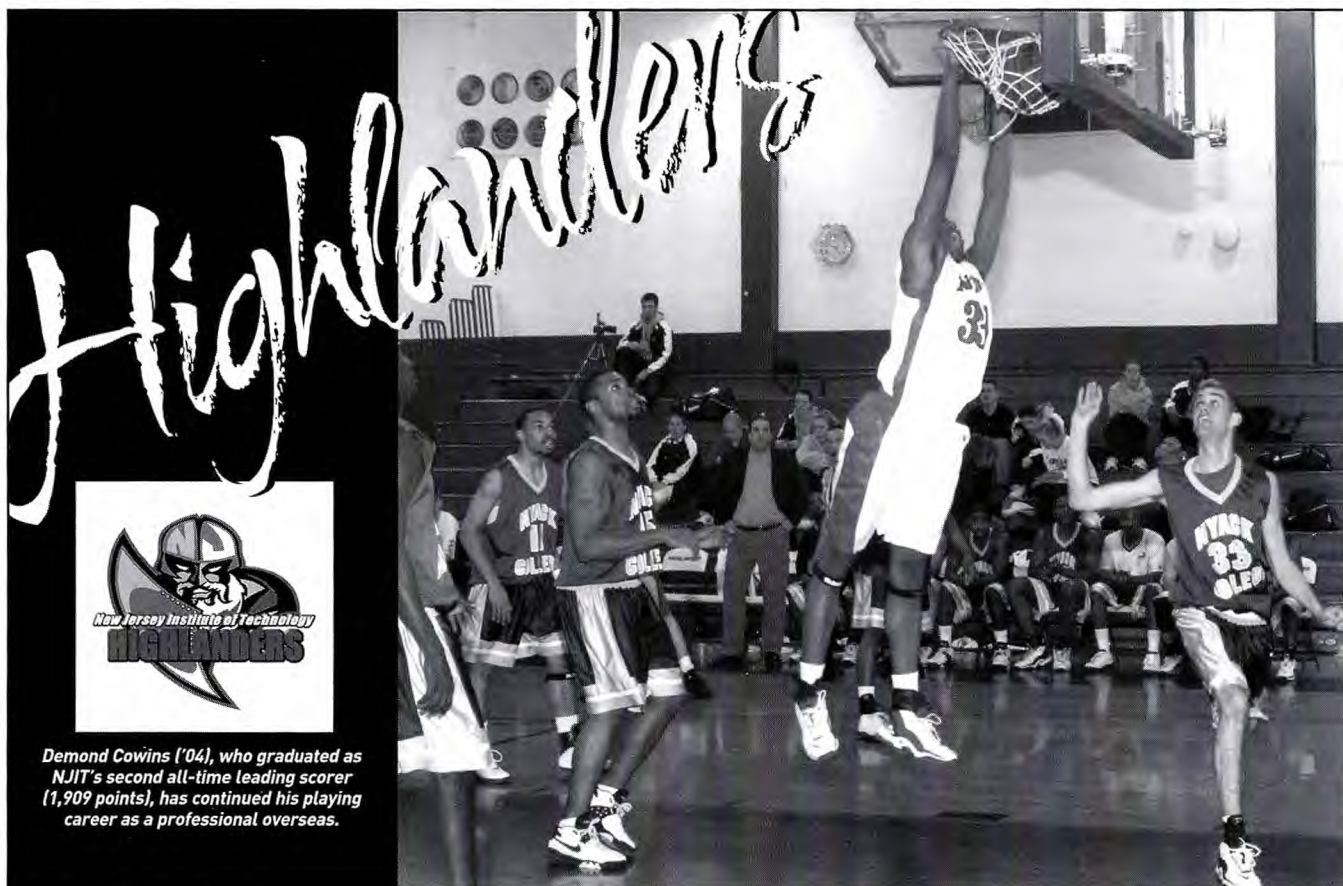

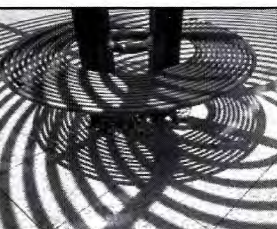

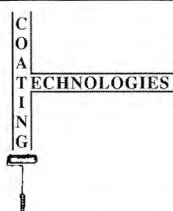

Go two blocks to Colden Street. Make a left on Colden Street. Follow signs to NJIT Parking Deck.

Route 78: Take Route 78 to the Garden State Parkway. Follow GSP directions.

When NJIT reclassified its athletic programs to NCAA Division II from Division III in 1997, the Highlanders joined the New York Collegiate Athletic Conference (NYCAC). After three years of NYCAC play, the Highlanders began a new era in the fall of 2000 when they became members of the Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference (CACC).

For its first two seasons in the league, NJIT was the only CACC school with full NCAA membership. The others were in a period of transition while switching affiliation from the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA).

However, five other CACC members completed their provisional requirements in 2002, four more did so in 2003, and this year, Wilmington (Del.) College joined the NCAA fold in 2004. This season, Philadelphia University is in the conference. As a conference, the CACC was voted into active status by the NCAA membership committee in July 2004. Shortly thereafter, it was granted an automatic qualifier into the NCAA Championships in four sports, including men's and women's basketball.

The 2005-06 season will be the last one in the CACC for NJIT, as the Highlanders begin the process of reclassifying to NCAA Division I from Division II. This season, NJIT will play a full CACC regular season conference slate and individual student-athletes will be eligible for conference honors, as well. As a result of the reclassification, NJIT will not be part of postseason competition. Next season, NJIT will play a Division I schedule.
