NJIT is New Jersey's Science & Technology University. With roots going back to 1881, when it was founded as Newark Technical School, New Jersey Institute of Technology observed its 125th anniversary in 2006.


Located in University Heights, Newark, NJ, home to more than 30,000 college students, NJIT's campus is just 10 miles from New York City.

Playing a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future, NJIT, as a major public technological university, is an important pipeline for the flow of technology into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university helps to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$83 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities on the 45-acre campus, including biomedical engineering labs and a campus center.

Instructional Programs

NJIT offers an ever-expanding array of educational programs, with eight new academic programs approved beginning in 2009-10, which comes after the addition of 14 new programs in 2008. As of 2009, NJIT





lists 55 bachelor's degree majors, 53 master's degree programs and 19 doctoral programs — through six schools:

Newark College of Engineering
College of Architecture and Design
College of Science and Liberal Arts
School of Management
Albert Dorman Honors College
College of Computing Sciences

NJIT has 416 full-time faculty; more than 98 percent of whom hold the highest degree in their field. The student-faculty ratio is 13:1, with more than 5,300 undergraduate students and more than 2,800 graduate students. Our students hail from 33 states and more than

100 countries to rank eighth in the nation for diversity.

Albert Dorman Honors College enrolls more than 500 students who take advantage of honors courses, research opportunities, advising and mentoring. Honors College students have SAT scores ranking in the top 10 percent nationally. With more than 44,000 alumni, NJIT is rated by U.S. News and World Report as a toptier research university offering bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees.

Research

NJIT drew more than \$75 million in research funding in 2005 and faculty members welcome student collaboration on research projects.

Economic Development

NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies. NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element, together with instruction, research and community service. More than 60 technology start-up companies, many of which hire NJIT students, are on campus.

The Career Edge

All 10 of the majors with the highest starting salaries for 2005-06 grads are in engineering, computing and business, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers.

Computer and data processing services lead the list of the 10 fastest-growing occupations in projections compiled by the U.S. Department of Labor. Computer-related employment is expected to grow 117 percent by 2008, according to the Career Guide to Industries.

As technology changes all fields, those with science and technology backgrounds are positioned to lead. Among the CEOs of the S&P 500 companies, engineering is the single largest undergraduate degree and more than half of CEOs have undergraduate degrees in engineering, business management, science, math and computing.



The Global Edge

The diversity in NJIT's student body and faculty prepares graduates to understand and succeed in the global marketplace. NJIT was named among the world's top 500 universities in a study by the Institute of Higher Education, Shanghai Jiao Tong University.

The Technology Edge

NJIT has been designated as one of the nation's most technologically sophisticated universities by Forbes.com and a Princeton Review survey and the university has received major funding from the National Science Foundation and the National Security Agency in recent years.

The Academic Edge

NJIT has long been a national leader in applying new technologies and approaches to the education experience. NJIT was a pioneer in requiring computer science for students in all majors and the School of Architecture has led innovations in teaching CAD and digital design. The School's innovative "paperless" first-year program was recently cited by Campus Technology Magazine.

Students have a wide range of educational choices in building an interest-tailored program. Among their options are cross-enrolling at neighboring Rutgers to enrich their program with subjects such as music and languages.

NJIT students learn emerging technologies from researchers behind the technologies,



developing valuable marketplace skills. Real-world experience through experiential learning makes graduates more marketable, with many co-op opportunities leading to permanent jobs.

The Regional Edge

New Jersey, with America's highest concentration of pharmaceutical, hi-tech, biotech, and medical device companies, is the place to study technology. It has the nation's highest per capita number of engineers and scientists as residents, while also leading in per capita rate of patents issued. Further, the Newark-New York region is a living laboratory for architecture and building sciences, environmental engineering and transportation.

The Research Edge

NJIT has been designated by the State of New Jersey as the Homeland Security Technology Systems Center and NJIT operates the worldrenowned Big Bear Solar Observatory.

A History of NIIT

From the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age, New Jersey Institute of Technology has a rich history with its beginnings developing from the industrial age.

In 1881, an act of the New Jersey State Legislature, recognizing an urgent need, sought a home for what would be the state's technical school. The efforts of Newark's public and private sectors resulted with the opening of Newark Technical School, addressing the state's need.

Over time, the university expanded its curriculum and mission. In 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By the middle of the 20th century, Newark Technical School was transformed into the robust Newark College of Engineering.

The post-war period was one of enormous activity with regular expansion of the campus, as well as the introduction of doctoral level programs. In 1975, with the addition of the New Jersey School of Architecture, the institution had evolved into a technological university, emphasizing a broad range of degrees and dedication to significant research and public service. Newark College of Engineering, stronger than ever, remained intact, but a new university name — New Jersey Institute of Technology — reflected the institution's expanded mission.

A broadened mission called for the creation of a residential campus and the opening of NJIT's first dormitory in 1980 began a period of steady growth that continues. Two new schools were established during the 1980s—the College of Science and Liberal Arts (1982) and the School of Industrial Management (1988). The Albert Dorman Honors College was established in 1994, and the newest school, the College of Computing Sciences, was created in 2001. Beginning in 2009 the College of Architecture and Design was created to house the New Jersey School of Architecture and the new school of Art and Design.





Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch

Having joined NJIT as its seventh president in July 2002, Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch is leading the university in a period of multi-layered growth.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$83 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities, while also drawing similar dollars in annual research funding.

Under President Altenkirch, NJIT has expanded its course offerings, with 16 new degree programs added in the 2008-09 academic year alone, and 13 more in various stages of development for implementation in the following two years.

Coinciding with the expansion is NJIT's transition from a smaller commuter campus to a larger institution with a larger resident student population. The incoming class of 2013 was the

largest in the history of the school, and more than half the freshman class resides on campus.

Tied to that transition is Altenkirch's strong belief that the home institution in New Jersey's largest city needs to be residential and provide the experiences associated with a residential campus. At the same time, Altenkirch is committed to NJIT's involvement with the community in its home city of Newark.

Intercollegiate athletics fits those goals naturally and upgrading NJIT athletics has been a priority of Altenkirch's presidency going back to November 2002 meetings that led to NJIT's reclassification to NCAA Division I.

Adding a personal dimension to his support, Altenkirch, a multi-sport athlete in high school, freshman baseball player at Purdue University, and a former college soccer official, and his wife, Beth, are regular attendees at NJIT competitions, home and away.

Immediately before his selection as president of NJIT, Altenkirch was vice president for research at

Mississippi State University (MSU), a position he held from 1998 to 2002.

Prior to his appointment as vice president at MSU, Altenkirch served as dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture at Washington State University (1995-98).

From 1988 to 1995, he was dean of the College of Engineering at MSU. He also served as professor and chair of mechanical engineering at the University of Kentucky (1975-88).

Altenkirch holds a PhD from Purdue University, an MS from the University of California, Berkeley, and a BS from Purdue, all in mechanical engineering.

He is the author of over 50 publications and nearly 100 presentations in combustion and heat transfer and served as principal investigator for 10 Space Shuttle experiments investigating the spread of fire in reduced gravity.

He is a fellow of the American Society of Engineers and in 2008 received the Ellis Island Medal of Honor.



Dr. Joel Bloom Vice President for Academic and Student Services

Dr. Joel Bloom, who joined NJIT in July 1990, is responsible for eight divisions of the university, including physical education and athletics.

In 1998, Bloom was appointed the first dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College in addition to his vice president responsibilities. The honors college enrolls over 500 students, including residents of 15 states and several foreign countries. The combined average SAT score is over 1300 and freshmen

typically have ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class. Honors College students maintain a grade point average higher than 3.5.

Prior to his arrival at NJIT, Dr. Bloom served seven years as assistant commissioner of the New Jersey Department of Education for the Division of General Academic Education. He was responsible for managing many of the education department's initiatives, over 300 grants and contracts, and a \$24 million budget.

Formerly a teacher and school administrator in New York City Public Schools, Dr. Bloom was also a director of research and instructor at Teacher's College, Columbia University. He is chair of the Greater Newark Consortium for Pre-College Education and vice chair of the State Board for Communities and Schools. He serves further as a member of numerous boards at the state, regional and national levels and has received national and state education awards, as well as federal, foundation and corporate grant awards. He has published journal articles and presented papers on school improvement, curriculum development, college transition and student assessment.

Dr. Bloom holds a master's degree and a doctorate from Teacher's College, Columbia University. He also earned master's and bachelor's degrees from Hunter College of the City University of New York.



Lenny Kaplan
Director of Athletics

Since taking over as head of NJIT's division of physical education and athletics in August 2000, Lenny Kaplan has been instrumental in guiding NJIT's reclassification to NCAA Division I.

Kaplan helped stabilize and expand a program that was entering its fourth year in Division II when he arrived in Newark. In late 2002, after discussions

with university President Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch and Vice President Dr. Joel Bloom, Kaplan took on the task of steering NJIT's programs into Division I, a process that reached fruition with the NCAA's granting active Division I status, with full championship eligibility effective September 1, 2009

Throughout Kaplan's tenure, NJIT has enhanced the athletics program, particularly in areas that benefit the student-athletes directly.

The sports offerings have expanded to its current 18 varsity programs. And since 2004, NJIT has renovated its two main on-campus venues—Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium at

Lubetkin Field and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center. Further, construction has begun on the Naimoli Family Recreation Center, a 25,600-square foot facility on the site of the old tennis courts that will enhance the recreational and intercollegiate opportunities on campus.

The school also signed a 10-year partnership to play all home baseball in the professional Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and later agreed to host basketball in the new Prudential Center, downtown Newark home of the NHL's New Jersey Devils.

Under Kaplan's leadership, many teams achieved regional and national Division II ranking. Success for several women's teams was unprecedented, with



basketball, tennis and soccer all reaching postseason play for the first time in his administration.

Additionally, men's volleyball captured a 2007 divisional championship in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association and the next year reached the EIVA playoff semifinals hosted by eventual 2008 national champion Penn State.

Kaplan guided the Highlanders toward further stability with membership in the newly-expanded all-sports Great West Conference, which offers a conference home for 11 of NJIT's varsity sports.

NJIT's outstanding home facilities will allow it to host conference championships in the Great West Conference and allowed it to host ECAC postseason championships in 2005-06.

Before coming to NJIT, Lenny Kaplan served 11 years at Manhattan College, where he began as Manhattan's director of operations and was assistant athletics director from 1991-2000.

Kaplan, a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration, resides in Merrick, NY, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.

Sports Medicine

NJIT sports medicine is moving forward with expanded facilities and a staff of three full-time trainers led by head trainer Matt Koscs, MS/ATC, with assistant trainers Paul Grayner, MEd/ATC, and Sandra Brendle, MSEd/ATC. They work with team physicians Louis Rizio, MD, and Stephen Matta, DO.

Matt Koscs, who earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Delaware, has served NJIT as head trainer since July 2009, a year after he joined the staff as an assistant trainer. As an undergrad at Delaware, he was recipient of the Paris Delligatti Memorial Award for Excellence in Athletic Training.

Prior to NJIT, he served three years as head trainer at Hodgson Vocational Technical High School in Newark, DE. He also worked with soccer clubs in Delaware and was employed at Christiana Care Physical Therapy Plus, in Newark, DE.

Paul Grayner, who holds a bachelor's degree from Saint Leo College in Florida and a master's from American University in Washington, DC, has a diverse background in athletic training, having served at the college and professional levels, as well as in a fitness center setting. He joined the NJIT staff late in 2008.

From the mid-1970s to the mid-1980s, he was a trainer in the minor league systems of the New York Yankees and New York Mets and in 1984 he was assistant trainer with the Mets. He later worked with the Long Island Knights professional basketball team.

At the collegiate level, he was head trainer at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ from 1989 to 1998 and earlier worked as an assistant trainer at Hofstra, Adelphi and FDU.

Sandra Brendle, who joined the NJIT staff as an assistant trainer in the summer of 2009, earned her bachelor's degree, majoring in athletic training, from Greensboro (NC) College in 2007. She earned her master's in athletic training at Old Dominion University in May 2009. At ODU, she

worked with seven teams and was on the medical staff for the 2008 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Tournament first and second rounds. At Greensboro, she was 2006 Athletic Training Student of the Year and worked on the 2004 NCAA Division III Men's and Women's Soccer Championship tournament medical staff.

Dr. Rizio is a board certified orthopedic surgeon and is fellowship trained in the field of sports medicine. He is a graduate of Rutgers and after earning his medical degree from the UMDNJ/New Jersey Medical School, Dr. Rizio completed his orthopedic residency at Tufts University in Boston.

He then completed a sports medicine fellowship at the University of Miami and was assistant team physician of the Hurricanes, as well as the Miami Dolphins, the Miami Hurricanes.

Dr. Rizio practices at the New Jersey Sports Medicine Institute in Livingston, NJ. Prior to starting his own practice, Dr Rizio was the Chief of Sports Medicine at the NJ Medical School from 2000-2005. He is affiliated with four New Jersey hospitals: St. Barnabas Medical Center (Livingston); Short Hills Medical Center (Short Hills); Mountainside Hospital (Montclair); and, Overlook Hospital (Summit).

Dr. Matta, who is board certified in family medicine, currently specializes in primary care sports medicine at Mountainside Hospital in Montclair, NJ, a post he assumed after three years in the family practice residency program at Valley Baptist Medical Center in Harlingen, TX. He is a 2007 graduate of a five-year DO/MBA dual degree program with Philadelphia College of

Osteopathic Medicine for his medical degree and Saint Joseph's University for an MBA in healthcare administration. He is a 2002 magna cum laude graduate of Duquesne University in Pittsburgh, with a BS in honors chemistry. He and his family reside in Belleville, NJ.

Strength and Conditioning

Strength and conditioning is a key part of a successful Division I program, with an eye toward maximizing individual and team performance in competition. The strength and conditioning coach also works closely with the Athletic Training Staff in the areas of injury prevention and injury rehabilitation.

The 2008-09 year brought another dimension to NJIT athletics with the hiring of *Dan Huff*, CSCS, as the program's first full-time strength and conditioning coach. In addition to the hiring of a full-time coach to coordinate the strength and conditioning, NJIT renovated the weight rooms and purchased new equipment, with the area dedicated to use by the Highlander teams.

Huff previously served five years as strength and conditioning coordinator at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ, from 2003 to 2008, working with an 18-sport NCAA Division I program.

Huff was Sports Performance Director for Velocity Sports Performance in Wall, NJ, immediately before accepting his position at NJIT. He is a graduate of William Paterson University of New Jersey. He holds numerous certifications.



Academic Enrichment

NJIT's Center for Academic and Personal Enrichment (CAPE) added a new component in 2007 with the addition of an Associate Director position that was created for the specific purpose of serving the needs of NJIT's student-athletes.

The position focuses on five key areas: academic support, career development, personal development, leadership and community service including the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and CHAMPS Life Skills for NJIT's nearly 300 student-athletes.

Sandra Taylor filled the post in January 2010, having previously spent her professional career at Manhattan College, which is also her alma mater.

Working at Manhattan, a founding member of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference, Taylor was most recently Associate Director of Athletics and Senior Woman Administrator, filling those posts from 1996 to 2010.

For much of that time (1995-2003), she was Chief Athletic Department Compliance Officer. She began her service at Manhattan as Athletic Department Ticket Manager, serving in that capacity from 1993 to 2003.

She served on numerous NCAA, conference and internal college committees, including service on the NCAA Division I Management Council from 2004 to 2007 and as chair of the NCAA Women's Lacrosse Committee from 2002 to 2006.

She earned both her bachelor's degree in secondary education and her master's degree in special education from Manhattan College and is a doctoral candidate in educational leadership at St. Mary's University in Winona, MN.

Sandra and her husband, Ken, who is Associate Commissioner for Men's Basketball and Baseball at the MAAC, reside in Monroe Township, NJ, with their daughters, Katherine, who was born in May 2004, and Samantha, who was born in July 2009. In 2008-09, *Tim Wuorinen* moved over to CAPE as eligibility certification officer/academic advisor, having spent the previous five-plus years working in the NJIT Department of Athletics as assistant athletic director and coordinator for compliance and student-athlete services.

Tim Wuorinen was a compliance fellow with the MAAC and he has worked in the athletic offices of four colleges, including Western New England College, his undergraduate alma mater. In addition to his bachelor's degree from Western New England, he earned a master's degree from NJIT.

Tim and his wife, Tara, who is the Academic/ Athletic Coordinator at Saint Peter's College, reside in Aberdeen, NJ. Their son, Tyler, was born in May of 2010.

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment, headed by *Dr. Marybeth Boger*, is a resource available to all students within NJIT's Student Services Division. The CAPE provides academic support services and activities to enhance students' academic and professional development and it works with academic and administrative departments to help students develop the necessary analytical and problemsolving skills to become independent learners.

CAPE provides tutoring, student success workshops and testing accommodations.

Jim Engles Head Coach

Commitment, hard work, attention to detail. They are all familiar concepts in the world of sports.

When his players look at Jim Engles in his third season at the helm of New Jersey Institute of Technology men's basketball, they see those concepts put into action as the coach strives to build the Highlanders program into a solid Division I outfit.

NJIT introduced Jim Engles as its new head men's basketball coach in a press conference on April 10, 2008. And he has attacked the challenge tirelessly ever since, remaking the Highlander program in every way imaginable ever since.

Taking on his first head coaching position at age 39, Engles agreed to a five-year contract to lead the Highlanders after having been an assistant coach at the Division I level for 18 years, the last five as the lead assistant at Columbia.

Taking over at NJIT for the 2008-09 season, he inherited a program that had gone 0-29 in its second season of Division I competition the year before. On top of that, the top two scorers (the only double-figure scorers on the 0-29 team) and the top

rebounder were gone from the winless team the year before.

In that first year, the improvement was modest with one win, which broke the program's long losing streak. But he and his staff put in place a regimen that would set the tone for future improvement.

That new regimen paid dividends in the second year (2009-10), as the Highlanders made the big jump from one win the previous season to 10, plus single-digit road losses to Rutgers of the Big East and Lehigh, which would make the 2010 NCAA Tournament as champion of the Patriot League.

And the nine-game improvement was achieved with limited senior presence, as Gary Garris, the top rebounder and second-leading scorer from Engles' first season, missed his entire senior year due to injury, and Dan Stonkus, a three-year starter at center, missed the first 11 games due to preseason knee surgery and finished with 10 starts as a senior.

A 1990 graduate of Dickinson College, where he was a three-year letterwinner, Engles jumped into coaching at the Division I level in 1991 as a graduate assistant at Wagner College on his native Staten Island, NY. From that point on, he earned the respect of his peers throughout the region.

He became a full-time assistant at Wagner under head coach Tim Capstraw and remained with the Seahawks through the 1996-97 season, when he moved on to Rider University in Lawrenceville, NJ.

Engles stayed at Rider from 1997 to 2003, serving as the top assistant under head coach Don Harnum, who is now Director of Athletics at the school. Engles moved on to Columbia, where he joined the new staff under head coach Joe Jones in 2003-04.

In two of his stops—Wagner and Columbia, he was involved in noteworthy program turnarounds. And at Rider, he was with teams that averaged better than 15 wins per season in his six-year stint.





At Wagner, he was part of the best winning percentage turnaround in all of Division I basketball, as the Seahawks went from four wins in 1990-91 to 16 wins in 1991-92, his first season as a full-time coach. A year later, Wagner played for the Northeast Conference championship on national television and won a school-record 18 games.

At Columbia, he was part of a new staff that achieved instant results upon its arrival in 2003-04. The previous season, Columbia was 2-25 overall and winless in 14 Ivy League games. In Engles' first season, the Lions produced a 10-17 overall record, including a 6-8 mark in the Ivy League.

In 2006-07, Columbia posted a 16-12 record, the program's best in 15 years. In 2007-08, the Lions were 14-15 overall, plus 7-7 in the Ivy for a second straight year, matching the program's best league record since it was 10-4 in 1992-93.

His six-year run at Rider included the 2001-02 Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference regular season title with a 13-5 conference record and Rider's first-ever berth in the postseason National Invitation Tournament (1998 after an 18-win regular season).

The Highlanders received notice in their first three seasons of Division I competition. In the first season of Division I competition (2006-07), NJIT won its opening game, upsetting Manhattan, which had advanced a round in the previous year's NIT. The Highlanders then won their next game against Rider before the stunning start was halted in the third game. Back down to earth, the 2006-07 Highlanders finished 5-24 overall. Coincidentally, NJIT's dream start ended in a 73-60 loss to Engles' Columbia team. The Highlanders' second season of Division I competition was without bright spots and NJIT finished winless in 2007-08.

Despite having a short recruiting year and carrying over the burden of a losing streak that far preceded their arrival, Engles and his staff worked tirelessly.

The hard work showed in small ways from the start of the season with more competitive performances on the court and finally paid tangible dividends on January 21, 2009, with a 61-51 home win over Bryant that generated a torrent of positive local, regional and national coverage.

Engles, who starred at St. Peter's High School on Staten Island has strong basketball bloodlines. His grandfather, Ken Engles, was a player and coach at Georgetown. And Jim's uncle, John, was a star at Penn under Hall of Fame coach Chuck Daly.

Jim and his wife, Meegan, reside in Convent Station, NJ, with their two daughters, Kelcie (9) and Ryenn (7).

Mike Spisto
Assistant Coach

Mike Spisto brought nine years college coaching experience with him when he joined the NJIT staff in the summer of 2008, with four years as a junior college head coach, three years as an assistant at the NCAA Division I level and two years as an assistant in Division III.

He had two stints as head coach at the State University of New York at Delhi sandwiched around three years as a Division I assistant with Rider and Albany (NY). He began his coaching career with two years an assistant at Division III SUNY Oneonta, his alma mater.

At Delhi, which is also an alma mater, he was head coach from 1999 to 2001, left to become a Division I assistant and then returned for another two-year stint as head coach from 2004 to 2006.

His head coaching record in four years at SUNY Delhi was 86-31 and both stints included championships and coaching awards.

In his second season (2000-01), SUNY Delhi's Broncos finished 32-2, including a 28-game winning streak, a conference title and then region and district championships. The Broncos finished fourth at the 2001 nationals and Spisto was conference, region and district coach of the year, as well as Basketball Coaches Association of New York Coach of the Year.

When he returned for his second term at SUNY Delhi, Spisto again was chosen Mountain Valley Conference Coach of the Year in 2004-05. The following season the Broncos were number one in the country their division for six straight weeks and Spisto repeated as conference and region coach of the year.

He coached numerous all-stars, including a first-team junior college all-American, while sending four players ahead to NCAA Division I and nine more to Division II and NAIA scholarships.

In July 2006, Mike Spisto assumed duties as Director of Athletics at SUNY Delhi, a position he held for two years before coming to NJIT.

His first Division I coaching assignment came at Rider University in 2001-02, where he worked alongside Jim Engles as an assistant when Rider captured its first-ever Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference regular season championship.

Heading to the University at Albany (NY), he helped recruit the team that would win back-to-back America East Conference championships. Among the players he helped recruit was Jamar Wilson, who was America East Rookie of the Year and later was two-time conference Player of the Year.

Spisto's coaching career began at Oneonta State following his 1997 graduation. In addition to his bachelor's degree from Oneonta, he earned an associate's degree from SUNY Delhi, as well as an MSS from United States Sports Academy.

He played at both Delhi and Oneonta. He was all-region twice at Delhi, where he is the career assists leader. At Oneonta he was captain as a senior after winning an ECAC title his junior year.

"Mike has been a winner as a head coach and he was part of building things as an assistant at the Division I level," said Jim Engles. "He was with me (as an assistant) at Rider when we won the MAAC regular season title and then he went to Albany and helped recruit and coach the nucleus of the team that went from five wins when he got there to winning back-to-back America East titles and making the NCAAs."

Mike and his wife, Katie-Lynn, reside in Staten Island, NY, with their young sons, Michael (5) and Christopher (2).



Ira Bowman
Assistant Coach

Ira Bowman, who was born in Newark, NJ, returned to his hometown in 2008 for his first college coaching position with NJIT after a playing career that saw him spend parts of three seasons in the National Basketball Association with the Philadelphia 76ers and the Atlanta Hawks.

An eight-year professional career came after a standout college playing career split between Providence and Penn. His pro career took him to three continents in addition to the Continental Basketball Association and his stints in the NBA.

After a torn anterior cruciate ligament halted his playing days, Bowman worked four years as Executive Director of Assist by Knight Foundation from 2004 to 2008 immediately before accepting his coaching position at NJIT.

One of New Jersey's top high school players in the late 1980s and early 1990s, Bowman starred at Seton Hall Prep (West Orange, NJ), where he graduated as the second all-time leading scorer at a school with a storied basketball tradition.

He led Seton Hall Prep to a 31-1 record in his senior year and the school was New Jersey Parochial A and Essex County champion in 1991.

Bowman first attended Providence College and played two years in the Big East Conference under coach Rick Barnes, before transferring to the University of Pennsylvania. Playing at Penn for coach Fran Dunphy, he was an all-Philadelphia Big Five and all-Ivy player for the Quakers, who were unbeaten in the Ivy League in both of his seasons. He was honored as Ivy League Player of the Year in 1996.

Undrafted after college, the 6-foot-5 Bowman played in Australia, where he was all-league for the Gold Coast Rollers. He moved to the CBA, which was the top developmental league for the NBA at the time and he was a starter for the champion Connecticut Pride in 1999 and a CBA all-star in 2000, the same year of his first tour as a member of the Philadelphia 76ers.

He was back in the NBA with the Hawks for part of the 2000-01 season and he had another final stint with the Sixers in 2001-02.

Out of the NBA, Bowman went to Europe and played in Naples, Italy, for a year before returning to Grand Rapids of the CBA, where he sustained his career-ending ACL injury in 2004.

"Ira has known great success as a player, but he's also known what it was like to keep working to achieve his goals," said Jim Engles. "He was a top recruit coming out of Seton Hall Prep and he had a great career at Penn.

"He was a year-round player as a pro, where he played overseas and in the CBA. He kept at it to win championships and then realize his goal of playing in the NBA. He has played for people like Larry Brown, Rick Barnes, Pat Knight, Fran Dunphy and during his high school career, he was coached by legendary Seton Hall Prep mentor Bob Farrell. The fact that he is from Newark and he succeeded as a player at an academic institution like Penn makes him a great fit for what we're trying to do at NJIT."

He resides in Vaux Hall, NJ, with his wife, Reyna, and their son, Jeremiah (4).



Kevin Tirone
Assistant Coach

Kevin Tirone is in his first full-time college coaching position, having joined coach Jim Engles' new NJIT staff in the summer of 2008.

Tirone, who was raised in Staten Island, NY, and resides in Bloomfield, NJ, got involved with coaching when he was an undergraduate at Saint

Joseph's University in Philadelphia.

At Saint Joe's, Tirone worked for head coach Phil Martelli, the 2003-04 national Coach of the Year, after an Elite Eight postseason appearance that included three future NBA players, Jameer Nelson, Delonte West and Dwayne Jones. Tirone was a student assistant for the Hawks during the 2004-05 season as they advanced to the National Invitation Tournament championship at Madison Square Garden.

In addition to Coach Martelli, Tirone worked for assistant coaches Monte Ross (now head coach at Delaware), Mike Rice (later top assistant at Pitt and head coach at Robert Morris, and now head coach at Rutgers) and Mark Bass.

After graduating from Saint Joe's, Tirone worked for The Hoop Group, the largest basketball instruction organization in the world. Among Tirone's myriad of duties was directing the time-honored Pocono Invitational Basketball Camp, a prestigious overnight camp that began operation in 1963. He also directed individual camps of Bob Hurley (St. Anthony High School) and Kevin Boyle (St. Patrick's High School) and he worked closely with Hoop Group President Rob Kennedy.

From the Hoop Group, Tirone headed west to Robert Morris University in the Pittsburgh, PA, area and worked as Director of Basketball Operations in 2007-08 on the staff headed by Mike Rice.

The Colonials finished 26-8 (most wins in school history) and they upset Atlantic Coast Conference power Boston College and Fordham in non-conference play, while posting a 16-2 Northeast Conference record. As regular season champion of the NEC, Robert Morris went to the NIT, where it faced Syracuse. Mike Rice was National Association of Basketball Coaches District III Coach of the Year and Robert Morris player Tony Lee was NEC Player of the Year.

"Kevin is young, but he's already been part of teams that had built up to achieve great success at Saint Joe's and at Robert Morris. He started his coaching career at Robert Morris and they had their best season when he was out there," Jim Engles said. "And his work at the Hoop Group has made him part of a vast network of coaches--some of the top coaches in the country."

He resides in Jersey City, NJ.

Albino, a 2009 graduate of Drew University in Madison, NJ, where he was a four-year guard for the Rangers, joined the NJIT men's basketball staff as Director of Basketball Operations in 2009-10.

He worked his way up Drew's depth chart throughout his playing career, advancing from a full-time reserve

role as a freshman to becoming a starter in half his games as a junior and finally to start 23 of his team's 25 games as a senior.

He was named to both the Landmark Conference all-academic team and the Landmark Conference Academic Honor Roll as a senior

Beginning on September 1, 2009, the entire NJIT athletics program officially gained across-the-board active membership in NCAA Division I, completing a process that began officially in 2003.

NJIT, its teams, and student-athletes enjoy the full benefits of Division I membership, including eligibility for Division I postseason championship competition and the inclusion of the Highlanders among the national Division I leaders in statistics maintained by the NCAA.

Within months of NJIT's active Division I membership, the school won its first national Division I statistical championships, as women's volleyball player Sabrina Baby led the nation in digs per set, while she and her teammates captured the team digs crown for digs, as well.

The NCAA's decision making NJIT a full member of Division I completed a specific timetable that required NJIT and its Department of Athletics to meet a series of annual benchmarks before proceeding to the next step.

NJIT, which previously competed in NCAA Division II, first moved to reclassify its men's soccer program in 2003. The move grew out of November 2002 meetings among President Robert A. Altenkirch, Vice President Joel Bloom, and Director of Athletics Lenny Kaplan. From there, came a proposal from Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I. Little more than two years later, the NCAA approved NJIT's proposal to begin advancing its entire program to Division I.

Men's soccer achieved active Division I status in 2005 and NJIT women's soccer became postseason-eligible in 2007. The remainder of NJIT's athletics program also began reclassifying in 2005, with active status taking longer for an entire program than under the single-sport-pergender track used for the two soccer teams.

In 2005-06 the lion's share of the competition all but men's soccer came at the Division II level. In 2006-07, 2007-08, and 2008-09, NJIT's teams competed at the Division I level and complied full with NCAA Division I rules, but were not eligible for championships at the top level.

Every facet of the program has been enhanced in the reclassification, with a special emphasis placed on student-athlete welfare. Facility upgrades have gone along with sports medicine staff expansion, a strength and conditioning program, and academic enrichment. NJIT has also built a model NCAA Division I rules compliance regimen within its athletics program and across the entire university.

A key late benchmark in reclassification came in the spring of 2009, with NJIT's successful completion of the NCAA Division I certification self-study. An in-depth project that takes approximately one year to complete and involves an on-campus visit from a Peer Review team, Division I certification, renewable every 10 years, is required of all active Division I institutions.

"We completed a major milestone in demonstrating that we have the infrastructure in place and the commitment to compete at the highest levels, not only academically but now athletically as well," said Dr. Altenkirch, who made upgrading athletics a priority from the beginning of his tenure as the seventh President of NJIT in May 2002.

Professor Robert English, the NCAA Faculty Athletics Representative and Interim Dean of the School of Management, added, "I am very impressed with NJIT's student-athletes who have worked hard to meet the challenge of the heightened level of Division I competition and at the same time continued to excel academically, with many athletes earning academic honors and awards and several earning perfect 4.0 GPAs during the semester of competition."

Further, the NJIT Board of Trustees embraced the transition to Division I as part of the university's strategic plan to enhance the quality of campus life in NJIT's transition to a residential university.

Going back to early announcements of NJIT's NCAA reclassification plans, Altenkirch stated: "As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university with our academic peers."



Already, NJIT's teams have competed throughout the

United States, taking on opponents from schools that are instantly recognizable for their stature in academics and athletics.

NJIT teams and student-athletes have faced opponents from seven of the eight Ivy League schools (all except for Brown) and all eight Patriot League schools, including Army and Navy, Bucknell, Lafayette, and Lehigh.

In addition, Highlander teams have taken on teams from such famed conferences as the Atlantic Coast Conference, Big East Conference, Big Ten Conference, and Pac 10 Conference, with competition against Missouri of the Big 12 Conference slated for December 2010 in women's basketball.

Two high-profile opponents--Maryland in men's soccer in 2005 and Penn State in men's volleyball in 2008—won national championships following the same regular seasons in which they faced NJIT.

The Highlanders have also competed against members of all of the conferences based in the Northeastern and Mid-Atlantic regions of the United States, including America East, Atlantic 10, Colonial, Metro Atlantic, Mid-Eastern, and Northeast.

The eighth New Jersey-based institution in Division I, NJIT has competed against all seven of its home state peers, including Big East programs Rutgers and Seton Hall.

NJIT's longest-established Division I program, men's soccer, gained its first win against a Big East foe in 2008, defeating Rutgers a year after topping San Diego State for the Highlanders' first win over a Top 25-ranked team.

With its place in Division I officially certified by the NCAA, NJIT is looking ahead to continued growth. That outlook is consistent with President Altenkirch's frequently expressed view that, "the transition to Division I is just that, a transition, a process rather than an event."

For his part, Director of Athletics Lenny Kaplan said: "We are looking forward to being a solid and successful member of Division I and we are excited by the opportunity to write a new chapter in the history of NJIT athletics."





In October 2007, the Prudential Center ushered in a new era in sports and entertainment in Newark and the entire northern New Jersey area.

Newark is in the midst of a major revitalization, converting the city core into a vibrant and energized entertainment district.

The Prudential Center, the New Jersey Performing Arts Center, The Newark Symphony, Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and in 2010, Red Bull Arena in nearby Harrison represent just part of the nearly \$2 billion in construction underway.

Prudential Center is the cornerstone in the revitalization and renaissance of downtown Newark. In addition to the arena, Newark will soon add scores of condominiums, restaurants, themed bars and mixed retail establishments. Prudential Center, one of the finest arenas in the country, is New Jersey's home for hockey, college basketball, indoor soccer, concerts, family shows and special events.

A public/private partnership between the City of Newark and Devils Arena Entertainment made the \$375 million Prudential Center a reality that is changing the face of downtown Newark and making it a destination place for sports and live entertainment in the region.

Bounded by Edison Place to the north, Lafayette Street to the south, Mulberry Street to the east and Broad Street and City Hall to the west, "The Rock" is located about a mile from NJIT's University Heights campus. Known best as the home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils, the Prudential Center has a seating capacity of 17, 625 for hockey and up to 18,500 for basketball.

Featuring a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as two club lounges, a goal bar, terrace area and a 350-seat gourmet restaurant, along with 76 Luxury Suites and two Event Suites, the Prudential Center is big league in every way.

The relationship between NJIT and the Prudential Center is a natural. 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of Newark's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. NJIT, meanwhile, is an integral part of the city's educational, civic and economic life.

The arrival of the spectacular Prudential Center nearly coincides with NJIT's arrival as an NCAA Division I institution—the first in Newark and the newest in New Jersey in more than 20 years. The Rock opened one year after NJIT began Division I competition as part of its NCAA reclassification which is now complete.

In the arena's inaugural year, NJIT played host to six basketball games on four dates, including four men's basketball games and two women's games. Included was the first women's or girls' sports competition in the building's history, when the Highlanders entertained Cornell on January 15, 2008.



The Highlanders hosted five more men's and women's college basketball games in the state-of-the-art building and are set to host four games in 2009-10. Further, NJIT's club ice hockey team plays all of its home games in the full-size Devils practice rink facility (AmeriHealth Pavilion), which adjoins the main arena and has an 800-seat capacity.

The Prudential Center, located in downtown Newark, about a mile from NJIT's University Heights campus, is easily accessible by mass transit or by automobile.

"The Rock" is located a short walk from regional mass transportation hub Newark Penn Station, which is served by Amtrak and New Jersey Transit trains, not to mention the Newark City Light Rail, which has a stop (Warren Street Station) at the NJIT campus just a few feet from the entrance of Fleisher Athletic Center and J. Malcolm Simon Stadium at Lubetkin Field

Highways passing near the arena include: I-78, I-280, the NJ Turnpike, Garden State Parkway, Routes 1 & 9, 21, and 22.

There are over 3,500 parking spaces within two blocks of the arena and way-finding signage, guest services personnel and security will assist in getting you to your destination (Please note: all of the parking lots are owned independently, with the exception of the VIP Parking Deck (Lot 10) located on Lafayette Street at the corner of Broad and Lafayette).

ATHLETICS FACILITIES

The NJIT basketball teams will have home games this season in the downtown Newark Prudential Center and on-campus in the recently-renovated gymnasium of the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center.

"The Rock", located about a mile from NJIT's University Heights campus, opened in October 2007 as the new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils. NJIT basketball has played there in each of the building's first two seasons and the Highlanders will return for two doubleheaders in February 2010.

The Fleisher Athletic Center gym, also home to NJIT's volleyball teams, underwent renovation in the summer of 2006. Included in the makeover was installation of a new floor and baskets and a repositioning of the main playing court.

The gym also got new lighting, a new sound system and new scoreboards, along with entirely new seating for more than 1,000 spectators after the first phase of renovation. Future plans include the addition of more seating, which will nearly double the seating capacity while maintaining the up close-feel that puts spectators next to the action and contributes to the homecourt advantage.

The back bay 'C gym' can be sectioned off from the main competition floor, making the facility useful for intramurals, physical education classes and campus recreation time, while being able to host multiple simultaneous events.

The NJIT basketball teams also have full access to the other facilities in the Fleisher Center. These include the fitness area (containing computer-



controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units and an indoor track), a free-weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), a martial arts center and an aerobics dance studio.

A six-lane swimming pool in Fleisher Athletic Center is home to the NJIT men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads play on the four outdoor lighted tennis courts behind Fleisher Athletic Center. The NJIT Campus Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.

Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium, with its entrance a few feet from the entrance of the Fleisher Athletic Center, is a first-class venue for college soccer.

Outfitted with SprinTurf artificial grass in the

summer of 2004, the complex also includes lighting for night contests, bleacher seating for more than 1,000 spectators, a press box and scoreboard. The installation of the new surface, a walking track and new landscaping was done at a cost of \$1.2 million.

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, opened in 1999 at a cost of \$30 million and with a seating capacity of 6,200, became the home of NJIT baseball in 2004. In a joint December 2005 press conference, New York Yankees manager Joe Torre was a featured speaker as NJIT and the Newark Bears announced a 10-year partnership that designated the downtown stadium the home of all Highlanders home games for the decade to come.

NJIT, which offers a growing list of club sports, also has a robust intramural program, which makes use of the numerous athletic facilities.



Newark: The Renaissance City

NJIT is located in the heart of New Jersey's largest city, Newark, with a population of over 300,000, making it the 65th-largest city in the United States. A major urban center, Newark is a city on the move.

Attractions in Newark include:

- The Prudential Center, a major indoor entertainment and sports venue housing New Jersey Devils hockey, New Jersey Nets basketball, major concerts and other premier events
- New Jersey Performing Arts Center
- The Newark Museum
- The Newark Public Library
- Symphony Hall
- Branch Brook Park
- Art galleries, restaurants, shopping
- The Ironbound neighborhood, renowned for its dining and vibrant nightlife
- An urban architectural laboratory
- Professional minor league baseball (Newark Bears)





Newark: New Jersey's College Town

Some 30,000 undergraduate, graduate, and professional students attend classes in the University Heights section, which is home to NJIT, Rutgers-Newark, the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey (UMDNJ), and Essex County College.

Adjacent to NJIT to the east, is the Newark campus of Rutgers University and the two schools enjoy an exceptionally close and productive relationship. NJIT and Rutgers students have library privileges at both campuses. NJIT students may also enrich their educational experience by enrolling in Rutgers-Newark courses and in full degree programs in disciplines not offered by NJIT, such as art, music, geology, and psychology.

Each year, the two universities co-sponsor a common season of theatrical productions, as well as 'World Week', a joint program of honors colloquia, and a variety of other cultural and social activities.

NJIT also enjoys a cooperative relationship with its neighbor to the west in the University Heights area, UMDNJ, with several joint degree programs.

New Jersey/New York Metropolitan Region

NJIT and Newark are a part of a region that is a magnet not only to the rest of the United States, but also to the world.

In Newark and neighboring northern New Jersey alone, attractions such as the Prudential Center, New Jersey Performing Arts Center, Meadowlands Sports Complex, Red Bull Arena, Liberty Science Center, and numerous others are minutes away by car and in most cases accessible by public transportation. Literally dozens of shopping malls are within a 20-minute drive of Newark, as well.

Midtown Manhattan, with all that it and the rest of New York City offer, is less than 15 miles from the NJIT campus.

NJIT students have regular access to discount tickets for Broadway shows, museums, concerts, and sporting events.

The school also sponsors weekend trips throughout the northeastern United States, with activities such as skiing, boating, swimming, hiking, and more.

The spectacular Jersey shore is less than an hour away by car and winter sports are within a couple of hours drive to the west and north.







NJIT, with its campus in Newark, NJ, sits in a region that abounds with major professional sports unlike any other in the United States and perhaps in the world. There are nine teams in the major professional leagues (MLB, NFL, NBA, and NHL) located in New York City, northern New Jersey and Long Island.

Only one of nine major teams is more than 25 miles from Newark, but most, including the New Meadowlands Stadium (Giants and Jets NFL football), Madison Square Garden (NBA Knicks, NHL Rangers), are much closer.

The three closest professional sports venues (listed below) are within three miles of NJIT's campus and can be accessed in a matter of minutes at low cost by public transportation, beginning with Newark Light Rail, from campus.

Prudential Center

The home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils and the New Jersey Nets of the National Basketball Association is in downtown Newark at the corner of Mulberry and Edison streets, about one mile from the NJIT's University Heights campus.



Red Bull Arena

Opened in October 2007, 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of the city's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. In addition to NHL hockey and NBA basketball, it has hosted numerous entertainment and sporting events, including NJIT basketball.

NJIT played basketball in the Rock in the inaugural year and in each year since. Indeed, NJIT hosted the first women's basketball game ever played in the Prudential Center on January 15, 2008 (NJIT vs. Cornell).

The arena, with full-capacity seating for 18,500 spectators, features a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as the latest in ice-surface technology and a gourmet restaurant overlooking the ice for Devils games. The building contains 850,000 square feet of space, 9,000 tons of steel, eight million pounds of structural steel and 25,000 cubic yards of concrete.



Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium

Red Bull Arena

Located in Harrison, NJ, just across the Passaic River from Newark and less than three miles from the NJIT campus, the new home of the New York Red Bulls (opened in March 2010) sets the standard for soccer venues across North America.

The state-of-the-art soccer-specific facility is a major component of a multi-billion dollar development.

Red Bull Arena has a number of key design elements which give its seating bowl a close-to-the-action feeling and the unique stadium roof design extends from its leading edge over the entire seating bowl and then curve down to the concourse.

The overall seating capacity for soccer is 25,000, including 30 luxury suites (20 lower level and 10 upper level) and 1,116 club seats. Other amenities include three stadium clubs and two retail outlets.

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the professional baseball Newark Bears and since 2004 the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999. With a seating capacity of 6,200, "The Den" affords fans an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major league-caliber press box.

In December 2005, NJIT and the Bears held a joint press conference to herald a new partnership that includes a 10-year deal that extends Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium as the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball.



Route 21 South: Follow Rt. 21 South (McCarter Highway) to Raymond Blvd. Turn Right on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren Street traffic light and Fleisher Athletic Center & Lubetkin Field at J. GREAT WEST CONFERENCE



NJIT's first multi-sport conference affiliation at the Division I level, came when the Highlanders aligned with the Great West Conference, which began play as an expanded multi-sport conference in 2009-10.

Member schools are spread over seven states and four time zones, giving each school added exposure in new destinations. The conference, which began as a football-only league, took a giant leap in the collegiate athletic world with expansion to include a full range of sports and new members.

Joining the league in July 2008 were: Houston Baptist, NJIT, North Dakota, South Dakota, Texas-Pan American and Utah Valley. Chicago State accepted the league's invitation to join in October 2008. These seven schools joined football-only members Cal Poly, UC Davis and Southern Utah.

As the conference began planning for multi-team sport competition, several teams were added in women's soccer and baseball to help provide a more diverse and competitive field. Delaware State, Howard and South Carolina State joined as associate members in women's soccer and they formed the East Division, along with NJIT. Northern Colorado and New York Institute of Technology joined as associate members in baseball, while Seattle was added as an associate member in cross country and track and field.

NJIT, Texas-Pan American and Utah Valley had been playing each other in multiple sports, including home-and-home games in men's and women's basketball, since NJIT began Division I competition for the first time in 2006-07.

NJIT and Utah Valley completed their NCAA reclassification and became championship-eligible members of NCAA Division I in September. Houston Baptist announced an agreement with the NCAA that can make HBU an active member of Division I in 2011-12 and North Dakota and South Dakota will be active members of Division I in 2012-13. Texas-Pan American and Chicago State have

been active Division I programs for many years.

The expanded conference is not an automatic NCAA Division I championship postseason qualifier, but it offers the benefit of conference championship competition, stable scheduling opportunities and individual recognition for student-athletes through weekly and season all-conference recognition.

The champion of the Great West Conference men's basketball postseason tournament (hosted in 2011 by Utah Valley) receives an automatic bid into the CollegeInsider.com Tournament (CIT) a 16-team national postseason tournament won by Old Dominion in 2009 and Missouri State in 2010 in a game that was televised nationally on Fox College Sports.

Governance of the GWC remains primarily with the member institutions. Each member institution is represented on the President's Council by its CEO. General operations and management of the Conference is conducted by the Joint Council, comprised of Directors of Athletics and Senior Woman Administrators.

NJIT's sports that compete in championships sponsored by the Great West Conference are: baseball, basketball (men's and women's); cross country (men's and women's); track and field (men's and women's; indoor and outdoor); women's tennis; and, women's volleyball.

Two NJIT sports that do not come under the Great West umbrella continue in their existing conferences—men's soccer in the Atlantic Soccer Conference and men's volleyball in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association, which has an automatic NCAA postseason berth, claimed in 2008 by eventual national champion Penn State.
