About NJIT

NJIT is New Jersey's Science & Technology University. With roots going back to 1881, when it was founded as Newark Technical School, New Jersey Institute of Technology observed its 125th anniversary in 2006.

Located in University Heights, Newark, New Jersey, home to more than 30,000 college students, NJIT's campus is just 10 miles from New York City.

Playing a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future, NJIT, as a major public technological university, is an important pipeline for the flow of technology into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university helps to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$83 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities on the 45-acre campus, including biomedical engineering labs and a campus center.

Instructional Programs

NJIT offers 96 degree programs — 36 undergraduate, 41 master's and 19 doctoral programs — through six schools:

NJIT has 416 full-time faculty; more than 98 percent of whom hold the highest degree in their field. More than 5,300 undergraduate students and more than 2,800 graduate students. Our students hail from 33 states and more than 100 countries to rank eighth in the nation for diversity.

Albert Dorman Honors College enrolls more than 500 students who take advantage of honors courses, research opportunities, advising and mentoring. Honors College students have SAT scores ranking in the top 10 percent nationally.

With more than 44,000 alumni, NJIT is rated by US News and World Report as a top-tier national research university offering bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees.

Research

NJIT drew more than \$75 million in research funding in 2005 and faculty members welcome student collaboration on research projects.

Economic Development

NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies. NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element, together with instruction, research and community service. More than 60 technology start-up companies, many of which hire NJIT students, are on campus.



The Career Edge

All 10 of the majors with the highest starting salaries for 2005-06 grads are in engineering, computing and business, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers.

Computer and data processing services lead the list of the 10 fastest-growing occupations in projections compiled by the US Department of Labor. Computer-related employment is expected to grow 117 percent by 2008, according to the Career Guide to Industries.

As technology changes all fields, those with science and technology backgrounds are positioned to lead. Among the CEOs of the S&P 500 companies, engineering is the single largest undergraduate degree and more than half of CEOs have undergraduate degrees in engineering, business management, science, math and computing.

The Global Edge

The diversity in NJIT's student body and faculty prepares graduates to understand and succeed in the global marketplace. NJIT was named among the world's top 500 universities in a study by the Institute of Higher Education, Shanghai Jiao Tong University.

The Technology Edge

NJIT has been designated one of the nation's most technologically sophisticated universities by Forbes.com and a Princeton Review survey and the university has received major funding from the National Science Foundation and the National Security Agency in recent years.

The Academic Edge

NJIT has long been a national leader in applying new technologies and approaches to the educational experience. NJIT was a pioneer in requiring computer science for students in all majors and the School of Architecture has led innovations in teaching CAD and digital design. The school's innovative "paperless" first-year program was recently cited by Campus Technology Magazine.

Students have a wide range of educational choices in building an interest-tailored program. Among their options are cross-enrolling at neighboring Rutgers to enrich their program with subjects such as music and languages.



NJIT students learn emerging technologies from the researchers behind the technologies, developing valuable marketplace skills. Real-world experience through experiential learning makes graduates more marketable, with many co-op opportunities leading to permanent jobs.

The Regional Edge

New Jersey, with America's highest concentration of pharmaceutical, hi-tech, biotech, and medical device companies is the place to study technology. It has the nation's highest per capita number of engineers and scientists as residents, while also leading in per capita rate of patents issued. Further, the Newark-New York region is a living laboratory for architecture and building sciences, environmental engineering and transportation.

The Research Edge

NJIT has been designated by the State of New Jersey as the Homeland Security Technology Systems Center and NJIT operates the world-renowned Big Bear Solar Observatory.

A History of NJIT

From the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age, New Jersey Institute of Technology has a rich history with its beginnings developing from the industrial age.

In 1881, an act of the New Jersey State Legislature, recognizing an urgent need, sought a home for what would be the state's technical school. The efforts of Newark's public and private sectors resulted with the opening of Newark Technical School, addressing the state's need.

Over time, the university expanded its curriculum and mission. In 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By the middle of the 20th century, Newark Technical School was transformed into the robust Newark College of Engineering.

The post-war period was one of enormous activity with regular expansion of the campus, as well as the introduction of doctoral level programs. In 1975, with the addition of the New Jersey School of Architecture, the institution had evolved into a technological university, emphasizing a broad range of degrees and dedication to significant research and public service. Newark College of Engineering, stronger than ever, remained intact, but a new university name — New Jersey Institute of Technology — reflected the institution's expanded mission.

A broadened mission called for the creation of a residential campus and the opening of NJIT's first dormitory in 1980 began a period of steady growth that continues. Two new schools were established during the 1980s—the College of Science and Liberal Arts (1982) and the School of Industrial Management (1988). The Albert Dorman Honors College was established in 1994, and the newest school, the College of Computing Sciences, was created in 2001.



Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch

President

Having joined NJIT as its seventh president in July 2002, Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch is leading the university in a period of multi-layered growth.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$80 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities, while also drawing similar dollars in annual research funding.

Under President Altenkirch, NJIT has expanded its course offerings, with 16 new degree programs added in the 2008-09 academic year alone, and 13 in various stages of development for implementation in the next two years.

Coinciding with the expansion is NJIT's transition from a smaller commuter campus to a larger institution with a larger resident student population. The incoming class of 2012 is the largest in the history of the school, and more than half the freshman class resides on campus.

Tied to that transition is Altenkirch's strong belief that the home institution in New Jersey's largest city needs to be residential and provide the experiences associated with a residential campus. At the same time, Altenkirch is committed to NJIT's involvement with the community in its home city of Newark.

Intercollegiate athletics fits those goals naturally and upgrading NJIT athletics has been a priority of Altenkirch's presidency going back to November 2002 meetings that led to NJIT's reclassification to NCAA Division I.

Adding a personal dimension to his support, Altenkirch, a multi-sport athlete in high school, freshman baseball player at Purdue University, and a former college soccer official, and his wife, Beth, are regular attendees at NJIT competitions, home and away.

Immediately before his selection as president of NJIT, Altenkirch was vice president for research at Mississippi State University (MSU),

a position he held from 1998 to 2002.

Prior to his appointment as vice president at MSU, Altenkirch served as dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture at Washington State University (1995-98).

From 1988 to 1995, he was dean of the College of Engineering at MSU. He also served as professor and chair of mechanical engineering at the University of Kentucky (1975-88).

Altenkirch holds a PhD from Purdue University, an MS from the University of California, Berkeley, and a BS from Purdue, all in mechanical engineering.

He is the author of over 50 publications and nearly 100 presentations in combustion and heat transfer and served as principal investigator for 10 Space Shuttle experiments investigating the spread of fire in reduced gravity.

He is a fellow of the American Society of Engineers and in 2008 received the Ellis Island Medal of Honor.



Dr. Joel Bloom

Vice President of Academic and Student Services

Dr. Joel Bloom, who joined NJIT in July 1990, is responsible for eight divisions of the university, including physical education and athletics.

In 1998, Bloom was appointed the first dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College in addition to his vice president responsibilities. The honors college enrolls over 500 students, including residents of 15 states and several foreign countries. The combined average SAT score is over 1300 and freshmen typically have ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class. Honors College students maintain a grade point average higher than 3.5.

Prior to his arrival at NJIT, Dr. Bloom served seven years as assistant commissioner of the

New Jersey Department of Education for the Division of General Academic Education. He was responsible for managing many of the education department's initiatives, over 300 grants and contracts, and a \$24 million budget.

Formerly a teacher and school administrator in New York City Public Schools, Dr. Bloom was also a director of research and instructor at Teacher's College, Columbia University.

He is chair of the Greater Newark Consortium for Pre-College Education and vice chair of the State Board for Communities and Schools. He serves further as a member of numerous boards at the state, regional and national levels and has received national and state education awards, as well as federal, foundation and corporate grant awards. He has published journal articles and presented papers on school improvement, curriculum development, college transition and student assessment.

Dr. Bloom holds a master's degree and a doctorate from Teacher's College, Columbia University. He also earned master's and bachelor's degrees from Hunter College of the City University of New York.



Lenny Kaplan

Director of Athletics

Since taking over as head of NJIT's division of physical education and athletics in August 2000, Lenny Kaplan has been instrumental in guiding NJIT's momentous reclassification to NCAA Division I from Division II,

Upon his arrival at NJIT, Kaplan helped stabilize and expand a program that was entering its fourth year in Division II when he arrived in Newark. In late 2002, after discussions with university President Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch and Vice President Dr. Joel Bloom, Kaplan took on the task of steering NJIT's programs into Division I, a process that is set to reach fruition with full championship eligibility in 2009-10.

Throughout Kaplan's tenure, NJIT has enhanced the athletics program, particularly in areas that benefit the student-athletes directly.

The sports offerings have expanded to 19 varsity programs and since 2004, NJIT has renovated its two main on-campus venues—Lubetkin Field and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center. The school also signed a 10-year partnership to play all home baseball in the professional Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and later agreed to host basketball in the new Prudential Center, downtown Newark home of the NHL's New Jersey Devils.

In 2005-06, NJIT's outstanding home facilities allowed it to host two ECAC Division II post-season championships—women's soccer in the fall and baseball in the spring.

Under Kaplan's leadership, many teams achieved regional and national Division II ranking. Success for several women's teams was unprecedented, with basketball, tennis and soccer all reaching postseason play for the first time in his administration,

Additionally, men's volleyball captured a 2007 divisional championship in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association and the next year reached the EIVA playoff semifinals hosted by eventual 2008 national champion Penn State.

As active NCAA Division I status and postseason eligibility in all sports for the 2009-10 academic year nears, Kaplan guided the Highlanders toward further stability with membership in the newly-expanded all-sports Great West Conference, which will offer a conference home for 11 of NJIT's 19 varsity sports.

Before coming to NJIT, Lenny Kaplan served 11 years at Manhattan College, where he began as Manhattan's director of operations and then advanced to assistant athletics director from 1991-2000.

Kaplan, a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration, resides in Merrick, NY, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua. Sports Medicine

NJIT's sports medicine is moving forward with expanded facilities and a staff of three full-time trainers led by head trainer Roger Olean, MEd/ATC. Matt Koscs, MS/ATC is the assistant trainer and one of the full-time positions is vacant as of November 2008. They work with team physicians Louis Rizio, MD, and Rutvik (Rudy) Patel, DO.



Roger Olean

Olean, an intercollegiate athletic trainer since 1992, returned to NJIT in the summer of 2008 after having filled the same position from 2000 to 2005.

Olean, who earned his bachelor's degree from Slippery Rock (PA) University in 1991 and his

master's degree from Springfield (MA) College in 1998, has served on the training staffs at four colleges and three high schools.

He began his career at Hood College in 1992 and also worked on the Springfield College staff while pursuing his master's. After his first tour with the Highlanders, he spent two years at SUNY Cobleskill. Olean also worked at three high schools.

Matt Koscs, who earned both his bachelor's (2005) and master's (2008) degrees from the University of Delaware, came to NJIT in July 2008. As an undergrad, he was recipient of the Paris Delligatti Memorial Award for Excellence in Athletic Training.

Prior to NJIT, he served three years as head trainer at Hodgson Vocational Technical High

School in Newark, DE. He was head trainer for the Delaware Dynasty semi-pro soccer team, as well as with the Kirkwood Soccer Club and was employed at Christiana Care Physical Therapy Plus, in Newark, DE, where he was an athletic trainer and Director of Athletic Training Services in a clinical setting.

Dr. Rizio is a board certified orthopedic surgeon and is fellowship trained in the field of sports medicine. He is a graduate of Rutgers and after earning his medical degree from the UMDNJ/New Jersey Medical School, Dr. Rizio completed his orthopedic residency at Tufts University in Boston.

He then completed a sports medicine fellowship at the University of Miami. During his fellowship, he was assistant team physician of the Miami Dolphins, the Miami Hurricanes and the Florida Marlins.

Dr. Rizio, who specializes in sports-related injuries, practices at the New Jersey Sports Medicine Institute. Prior to starting his own practice, Dr. Rizio was the Chief of Sports Medicine at the NJ Medical School from 2000-2005.

Dr. Patel practices in association with Dr. Rizio. A cum laude graduate of NYIT, Dr. Patel earned his DO from the New York College of Osteopathic Medicine. He was chief resident in Family Medicine at the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School in New Brunswick, NJ, from 2003 to 2006.

Strength and Conditioning

The 2008-09 season brought another dimension to NJIT athletics with the hiring of Dan Huff, CSCS, as the first full-time strength and conditioning coach.

In addition to the hiring of a full-time coach to coordinate the strength and conditioning for NJIT's 19 intercollegiate varsity teams, the university renovated the weight rooms and purchased new art equipment, with the area dedicated to use by the Highlander teams.

A formal and ongoing strength and conditioning program is part of most Division I programs, with an eye toward maximizing individual and team performance in competition.

The strength and conditioning coach also works closely with the Athletic Training Staff in the areas of injury prevention and injury rehabilitation.

Dan Huff brings solid experience to the newly-created post, which represents another step in NJIT's commitment to the growth of its young Division I program.

Huff previously served five years as strength and conditioning coordinator at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ. He worked with the Knights' 18-sport NCAA Division I athletic program from 2003 to 2008.

Huff was Sports Performance Director for Velocity Sports Performance in Wall, NJ, immediately before accepting his position at NJIT. He is also owner and head strength coach of Huff Training, LLC.

Prior to earning his degree in Physical Education with a concentration in exercise physiology from William Paterson University, Huff received a certificate of exercise science from Bergen Community College.

He worked on the Fitness Center staff at the YMCA of Greater Bergen County and was an exercise physiologist and Health and Fitness Center director for the YM-YWHA of North Jersey.

Huff holds numerous certifications, including NSCA Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist and YMCA Strength Training Instructor.

Academic Enrichment

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment (CAPE) added a new component with the hiring in 2007 of Erika Rigby McCourt, whose position as Associate Director of CAPE was created for the specific purpose of serving the needs of NJIT's student-athletes.

She focuses on five key areas: academic support, career development, personal development, leadership and community service including the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and CHAMPS Life Skills for NJIT's nearly 300 student-athletes.

In 2008-09, NJIT will add an eligibility certification officer/academic advisor, who will work with Rigby McCourt under her supervision.



Erika Rigby McCourt

Erika Rigby McCourt came to NJIT from Seton Hall University, where she was Associate Director of Academic Support Services for the Pirates athletic program from 2004 until she left for NJIT. At Seton Hall, she worked directly with men's basketball, women's soccer, women's volleyball and swimming, assisting in class scheduling, tests and tutoring sessions.

The Jersey City, NJ, native is working with her fourth Division I program in a career that began in 1997 at Northern Arizona, where she was director of the Academic Enrichment Program. She returned home, serving as Academic/Athletic Coordinator at Saint Peter's College, where she was responsible for the academic progress of over 300 student-athletes in 20 sports, from 1999 to 2004.

Rigby McCourt graduated from Providence College, where she was an intercollegiate runner who earned Big East Conference all-academic honors. She earned master's degrees from Northern Arizona and from Saint Peter's and she is pursuing her doctorate in higher education at Seton Hall.

A member of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletes, she is on the NCAA Initial Eligibility Waiver Committee. She also previously worked in the office of former United States Senator Bill Bradley of New Jersey.

Erika married Robert McCourt, the head men's soccer coach at Monmouth University, in May 2008 and they reside in Oakhurst, NJ.

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment, headed by Dr. Marybeth Boger, is a resource available to all students within NJIT's Student Services Division. The CAPE provides academic support services and activities to enhance students' academic and professional development and it works with academic and administrative departments to help students develop the necessary analytical and problem-solving skills to become independent learners.

CAPE provides tutoring, student success workshops and testing accommodations.

New Jersey Institute of Technology athletics is on the move to the top level of college athletics—NCAA Division I.

The reclassification is nearly complete, as NJIT closes in on active championship-eligible Division I status, which is slated to arrive for all programs in 2009-10.

Formerly a member of Division II, NJIT got the go-ahead to begin the reclassification process, which began with an exploratory year in 2005-06. All of the programs that previously competed in Division II then moved up to face Division I competition effective in 2006-07.

Two sports—men's soccer and women's soccer—paved the way on a faster NCAA track that allows lower division schools to elevate one sport in each gender to Division I in a process that takes two years to complete.

NJIT men's soccer became a full member of NCAA Division I at the start of the 2005 season, when the Highlanders arrived at championship eligibility. The men's journey to the top level began in 2003. NJIT women's soccer began a similar two-year process in 2005, with full Division I status and championship eligibility arriving with the 2007 season.

The larger process of advancing the entire program to Division I takes longer and includes application, a detailed strategic plan and in-depth annual review of the institution's progress in moving toward its goal of complying with NCAA Division I rules and building a strong, broad-based athletics program.

NJIT's move to Division I progressed quickly after the November 2002 discussions among President Robert A. Altenkirch, Vice President

Joel Bloom and Athletics Director Lenny Kaplan.

From there came a proposal from Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I. Little more than two years later, the NCAA approved NJIT's proposal to advance its entire program to Division I.

Along the way, scholarship and operating budgets have been enhanced, with expanded coaching staffs, increased scholarship dollars and upgraded facilities for competition and practice.

Upgrading athletics has been a priority for Dr. Altenkirch since he was selected as the seventh President of NJIT in May 2002.

"As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university athletically with our academic peers," said Altenkirch. "It will also enable us to recruit the best and brightest student-athletes, improve athletics facilities available to the entire NJIT community, gain regional and national visibility, and build strong linkages with students that will carry over to their days as alumni."

Moving to Division I has allowed NJIT student-athletes to test themselves in competition against their peers from all over the country, including competition against teams from the nation's best conferences.

Along the way, two NJIT opponents (Maryland men's soccer in 2005 and Penn State men's volleyball in 2008) have faced the Highlanders in the regular season and then gone on to win their respective national championship.

Margaret McKeon

*Head Coach,
Second season at NJIT,

Margaret McKeon joined NJIT women's basketball as head coach in July 2007, bringing with her a deep passion for teaching basketball and a proven record of having transformed a struggling program into an NCAA Division I Tournament qualifier.

Her abilities were evident almost immediately in her first preseason practices at NJIT and it carried over into the season with a high-energy playing style and an attitude that made the Highlanders a threat for all 40 minutes, no matter what the score.

At first, however, wins were hard to come by, as McKeon's first NJIT team opened at 2-10. But the new approach began to bear fruit in early January and the Highlanders went 8-9 the rest of the way, including a 2-1 record in the national Independent Division I Tournament.

Their final record of 10-19, more than doubled the win total from NJIT's first season of Division I competition (4-24 overall, 3-23 against Division I opponents in 2006-07).

The six-win improvement from one year to the next was the second-best in the 21-season history of the program, topped only by a jump of 11 wins (4 to 15) between 2000-01 and 2001-02 at the Division II level.

"What I love to do is teach," said McKeon before her first season leading NJIT's fortunes. "I have a passion for the game and my goal is to help young women not only play the game, but grow as people. There are a lot of life lessons for them and for me."

McKeon's track record includes five NCAA Division I postseason tournament appearances in her years as an assistant coach and head coach.

"I am very happy to be back in the tri-state area," said McKeon, a native of Queens, NY, where she was a star player in high school and college. "And I am very excited for this opportunity to build a Division I program from the ground up."

"The vision of Dr. (Robert) Altenkirch (NJIT President) and Dr. (Joel) Bloom (Vice President of Academic and Student Services) to move the entire athletic program forward is the reason I became interested in this job. NJIT already has a reputation for academic excellence and I look forward to working with (Director of Athletics) Lenny Kaplan and his staff to develop a competitive Division I program that will attract the types of student-athletes who are eager to excel in the classroom, as well as on the court."

Expanding on the idea of academic achievement at a school such as NJIT translating on the basketball floor, McKeon said: "(The players) strive to be excellent in the classroom and when they come onto the court, that's what they expect of themselves. If you can give them a purpose—why we are doing it and this is the end result—they believe they will strive to succeed in basketball, too. They live by that."

In five years as head coach at Boston University (1999-2004), McKeon transformed the Terriers from a team with five wins the season before her arrival to one that earned a spot in the NCAA Division I Tournament by her fourth season and was only a game short of repeating as America East Conference champion the following year.

Before her years as head coach at BU, McKeon was assistant and then associate head coach at George Washington from 1995 to 1999, during which time GW posted a combined record of 93-31. In her four seasons on the staff, the Colonials went to the NAAs three times, were ranked 10th in the nation and advanced to the Division I tournament's Elite Eight in 1996-97.

At Boston University, McKeon took over a program that was established, but had failed to achieve double-figure wins totals in each of its previous three seasons, including a 5-22 record the year before she was named head coach. In her first year (1999-00) the Terriers were 8-21, but they moved upward quickly, reaching the 17-win mark in her third season. That 17-11 record in 2001-02 was BU's first winning record in seven years. In the 2002-03 NCAA season, the Terriers won the America East Conference championship and advanced to face UConn in the NAAs.



The 2003-04 season was her biggest triumph at BU when the Terriers chalked up a 19-11 overall record and a second straight spot in the America East postseason championship game.

Overall, her Boston University teams won 70 games in five seasons, including a combined 52-37 record the last three seasons.

The Terriers' steady overall improvement was apparent in conference play, as well. McKeon's teams went from 3-15 in conference her first year to 10-6 by her third year. Her America East Conference regular season record over her last three seasons at BU was 32-18, with postseason championship game appearances the last two seasons.

In her four seasons as an assistant coach at George Washington, the Colonials won three Atlantic 10 Conference championships, advancing to the NCAA Tournament all three times. GW ranked 10th nationally and reached the tournament's Elite Eight in 1996-97 and the Colonials advanced to the second round two other times, including 1995-96, when they finished 18th in the final national poll.

Earlier, at the University of Houston, she was part of a staff that recruited what one service rated as the 10th best in the nation in 1994. In her first year as a college coach, McKeon

was on the staff for the 1991-92 Arizona State squad that reached the NAAs. The Sun Devils' combined record in her two seasons there was 37-19, playing in the Pacific 10, one of the nation's elite women's basketball conferences.

McKeon is a 1991 graduate of St. John's University in Queens, NY, earning a BA in athletic administration.

A collegiate star at both St. John's and at Oklahoma, she was all-Big East for St. John's, setting a conference single-game assists record that still stands, with 18 against Georgetown on January 16, 1991. She also starred at Oklahoma, earning all-conference honorable mention.

Before college, she starred at Christ the King Regional High School in Queens, a school renowned for its powerhouse girls' basketball program that has produced such talent as WNBA players Sue Bird and Chamique Holdscaw. Between high school and college, she coached the New York Liberty Belles AAU Basketball Club, the most successful girls AAU program in the Northeast.

A member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association since 1991, McKeon was a speaker at two WBCA national conventions.

She resides in Woodside, NY.



Gabrielle Butler

Assistant Coach

Gabrielle Butler joined the NJIT women's basketball staff in July 2008 as an assistant, resuming an extremely successful college coaching career.

Butler and McKeon first met when they were assistants in a George Washington University program that was a championship contender at the national level (Butler coached at GW from 1991 to 1999, and McKeon was an assistant there from 1995 to 1999).

When McKeon became head coach at Boston University, Butler joined her there, serving as first assistant from 1999 to 2002.

At George Washington, Butler coached teams that qualified for the NCAA Division I Tournament in six of her eight seasons on the staff.

During her tenure, the Colonials garnered six NCAA tournament bids. George Washington won at least one game in each of its trips to the Big Dance and reached the 1997 Elite Eight and the 1995 Sweet Sixteen. Butler's drive to win was instrumental in GW capturing four straight Atlantic 10 Conference championships from 1994 to 1998.

In her three seasons at BU, Butler helped lay the groundwork for a program revival that resulted in the Terriers' first winning season in seven years (17-11 in 2001-02), followed by the program's first NCAA postseason appearance.

In addition to her successful coaching career, Butler, who hails from the nation's capital, has enjoyed a successful tenure in the field of law. After graduating from Franklin and Marshall College (Lancaster, PA) in 1985, she worked as a legal assistant in Washington, DC, until 1991, when she joined the staff at George Washington. She left BU in 2002 to resume her legal career, but kept her ties to the world of college basketball.

When McKeon took the helm of the women's program at NJIT in 2007, Butler followed the

Highlanders' progress and realized she was ready and eager to return to coaching.

Said McKeon of Butler: "Gabrielle and I share a long history building a tradition of success. In addition to her coaching skills, she is an exceptional recruiter who has the ability to identify quality prospects and follow through to sell the school and the program.

"Gabrielle and I also share the philosophy that we are teachers first," continued McKeon. "We strongly believe the college experience should be about academics, as well as athletics and we encourage our student-athletes to strive for excellence on the court and in the classroom."



Mary Kacic

Assistant Coach

Mary Kacic joined the NJIT coaching staff in July 2007 after a year as interim assistant women's basketball coach at Fordham in 2006-07.

She previously coached two years at Division II Dowling (2003 to 2005), as well as serving as a head coach in the renowned Liberty Belles girls AAU program in 2003.

She has also worked as a coach and counselor in camps conducted by Manhattan College, UConn, Siena College, Christ the King HS and Eastern Invitational.

She is certified as a strength and conditioning coach (CSCS) by the National Strength and Conditioning Association and is a certified basketball referee.

As a player, Kacic starred at Christ the King High, which ranked first in the nation by USA Today following her senior year (1998) and captured the New York State Federation crown all each season from 1995 to 1998. She

was all-tri-state (NY, NJ, CT), all-city and all-Queens as a senior.

Kacic went on to play Division I college ball at Manhattan, where she was a four-year member of the varsity and a two-year captain. She received the prestigious 2002 Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference/New York State Lottery Scholar-Athlete of the Year, an honor given to the top scholar-athlete among the MAAC's 10 women's basketball teams.

She completed her playing eligibility at Dowling in 2003, helping the team to the NCAA Division II tournament. Kacic earned all-conference and all-tournament honors, as well as all-region recognition from the Met (NY) Basketball Writers Association.

Kacic earned degrees from the two colleges she represented on the basketball court. She was a magna cum laude graduate of Manhattan, receiving her BS in exercise science in February 2003. In May 2004, she received her MBA in general management from Dowling.

She resides in Howard Beach, NY.



Siobhan Kilkenny

Assistant Coach

An international player for her native Ireland and a former collegiate star stateside, Siobhan Kilkenny joined the New Jersey Institute of Technology women's basketball coaching staff for the 2005-06 season.

Kilkenny, a 2003 graduate of Manhattan College (bachelor of science degree in physical education), is a former member of the Irish Senior National women's basketball team and was part of her nation's national team program from 1994 to 2004.

She represented Ireland in the 2001 and 2004 Women's European Basketball Championships and was the 2003 Irish International Player of the Year.

While at Manhattan, Kilkenny was named Most Valuable Player of the 2003 Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Tournament after

leading her team to the championship and an automatic berth in the NCAA Division I Tournament.

Also that year, she was an All-MAAC 2nd team honoree for the regular season and was also named to the All-Met (NY) 2nd team. A strong all-around player at shooting guard and small forward, Kilkenny averaged 12 points, 6 rebounds and 2.7 steals per game as a senior, placing her among the conference leaders in all three categories, including third place in steals.

She finished her career ranked fourth on Manhattan's all-time career steals list (202) and was named to the Big Apple Classic first team in 2001 and 2002.

Prior to accepting her position on the NJIT coaching staff, Kilkenny was playing professional women's basketball for the Pabellon Ourense (Spain) club team.




She has teaching experience in schools in Westchester County, NY, as well as having done student teaching in Westchester and in the Riverdale section of the Bronx, NY.

2007-08 Outlook

NJIT women's basketball is optimistic beginning the program's third season of NCAA Division I competition.

A year ago, the Highlanders faced uncertainty with a new coach installing a new style of play and a roster that had six players who hadn't been with the team the previous year.

Now, NJIT returns all but one core player from a still young squad that won four of its last seven games and eight of its last 17 to finish with 10 wins overall.

With those 10 wins, NJIT more than doubled its output from the previous season (4-24 overall; 3-23 vs. Division I opponents) in 2006-07, the first year of Division I competition for the Highlanders, who were reclassifying after nine seasons in Division II.

Margaret McKeon, the new head coach, took over at NJIT in July 2007, having previously guided Boston University to unprecedented success in a five-year run as head coach of the Terriers.

Taking over a BU program that won five games the season before she became head coach, McKeon led the Terriers to their first-ever NCAA postseason tournament bid in her fourth season (2002-03) and then came within a game of returning to the Big Dance in 2004. Before that, she was a top assistant coach at high-level programs, including George Washington, which made the NCAA's three times, advancing to the 1997 Elite Eight. Before GW, she coached at Arizona State and then Houston.

Stepping in at NJIT year ago, McKeon introduced a new system to a group of players that included one senior, two juniors and 11 freshmen or sophomores.

McKeon's 2007-08 Highlanders were competitive, but it didn't translate into more wins at first. In fact, NJIT was 2-10 through its first 12 games of 2007-08, compared to 3-9 the season before.

However, things changed shortly after the first of the year and the Highlanders put together four sets of back-to-back wins, going

8-9 over the last 17 games, 4-3 over the last seven and 2-1 in the Division I Independent Tournament.

Perhaps most illustrative of NJIT's improvement under McKeon were the results against two fellow Division I Independents (to be Great West Conference opponents of NJIT starting in 2009-10).

In the first year of Division I competition, NJIT was 0-2 against both Utah Valley and Texas-Pan American. Utah Valley, in particular, had trounced the Highlanders by 31-point margins in both 2006-07 meetings. Texas-Pan American had won by more modest margins of 11 and 13 points against the Highlanders.

In 2007-08, however, the Highlanders turned the tables completely on Texas-Pan Am, beating the Broncos all three times the teams met in McKeon's first year at the helm.

Against Utah Valley, a team that had beaten the Highlanders by 62 combined points in the previous season, NJIT closed the gap in the first meeting of 2008, falling by nine points in Utah, 78-69.

The Highlanders did more than close the gap the next two times they faced Utah Valley, upending the Wolverines in Newark, 82-72, and then proving it wasn't been a fluke, 77-72, in the season finale in the Division I Independent Tournament.

One of the more impressive traits of the "new" Highlanders was that their games were never over, with NJIT maintaining its intensity to fight back from large deficits.

That "comebackability" rests in strong conditioning, plus a system that balances playing time so that players can go full throttle and then give way to a fresh teammate. Last year, no Highlander played more than 27 minutes a game, but 11 played at least 12 minutes a game.

While last year's 10 wins was a huge improvement, it is not even close to being the ceiling for NJIT and last year's strong finish has things pointed in a positive direction.

"We have a veteran group that understands what I expect and what to expect from themselves," said the coach. "We're not defining people's roles anymore. We're a unit, building on last year's chemistry and good, consistent rotation."

The only departed player from last year's core

is Erika Velez, who closed out her college career by appearing in all 29 games (16 starts), averaging 6.2 points and 4 rebounds per game. Velez also had 69 assists, second on the team.

Otherwise, all the key players are back, led by senior captain and point guard Jackie McCaffrey, the only player to start every game a year ago and the team leader in minutes played and assists (76).

"Jackie is our floor general," said McKeon. "She is a natural athlete who sets the pace with a commanding physical presence."

The team's other senior, Jill Dickinson, is poised for a strong finish, too. She is a solid scoring threat, having led the team in scoring as a sophomore (9.4 ppg), while adding 7.3 ppg last year. She enters her senior year with 107 career three-point baskets, including a team-best 45 last season.

"Jill is an experienced senior this year," said McKeon. "She is comfortable in her role as a three-point threat and is someone who has the green light."

Another impact guard is sophomore Jessica Gerald, the National Division I Independent Newcomer of the Year last season. Combining quickness and a nice shooting touch, Gerald averaged a team-leading 12.7 points per game, which included a school-record 37 points in an early January win against Cal State Bakersfield.

Gerald was second on the team with 38 three-point baskets made and she also got to the foul line for a team-leading 140 free throw attempts, connecting at a 76 percent clip.

"Jessica is a fierce competitor," said Coach McKeon. "She has the instinctive ability to pick up on the big picture. Her high level of intensity – physically, mentally and technically – sets an example for the entire team."

Sophomore Adriana Johnson and freshman Melanie Griffin figure to see plenty of action, as well. Johnson, a sparkplug, played in 28 games, starting one, as a rookie and Griffin is one of the team's more talented players after playing in a strong high school program at Willingboro High in South Jersey.

NJIT also has three players who operate outside of traditional guard-forward roles. Sophomore Ivana Seric, in particular, is a true hybrid who is at once the best low-post scorer for NJIT and a strong perimeter defender.

At 6-foot-2, she could play point guard in certain situations.

Joining last year's team in midseason, Seric, a native of Croatia, faced the double challenge of adjusting to a new culture and language, as well as joining a team that had been working together for nearly three months before her arrival in the United States.

Although she did not post huge numbers, she made a difference for NJIT, which went 8-7 in the 15 games she played.

Katie Piekieski, listed as a guard at 5-foot-10, is coming back from knee surgery and will challenge for some of the minutes vacated by the graduated Velez.

NJIT's third-leading scorer as a freshman (7.9 ppg), Piekieski played in 25 games (11 starts) last year before her season was cut short by the knee injury. She averaged 5.6 points per game as a sophomore.

Junior twins Taiwo and Femi Oyelola expanded their games with the switch to McKeon's new offense. As freshmen, neither of them even attempted a three-point shot. As sophomores in the new system, they combined to attempt 119 threes and connected on 33 of them.

Taiwo, who operates well in transition, was second on the team in scoring (8.2 ppg) a year ago and led the Highlanders in rebounding (5.6 rpg).

Having played almost exclusively in the post as a freshman, she added perimeter shooting to her game as a sophomore and this year has the confidence to put the ball on the floor and drive to the basket.

Femi is more of a traditional post player, especially when it comes to defense and rebounding. But she, too, showed the ability to take and make outside shots and should continue as a valuable contributor off the bench. She played about 14 minutes a game in 26 appearances last year.

NJIT's two traditional post players are junior Kathryn Wighton and sophomore Maya Al-Shingieti. Al-Shingieti led the 2007-08 Highlanders in blocked shots and appeared in 25 games, starting seven. Wighton is the team's tallest player at 6-foot-4.

"We're looking at Maya, Kathryn and Femi to perform defensively on the block and in the rebounding area. All three are key compo-

nents to our success," McKeon revealed.

"Maya has the ability to rebound and defend. We expect Kathryn to step up and utilize the physical presence she brings with her height and wing span. Femi's strong presence and unique ability to score in and out makes her a nightmare to defense and causes problems for the opposition."

Also on the 2008-09 Highlanders is walk-on guard Ash'Lee Smith, who played on three New Jersey state high school champions at Bloomfield Tech.

Included in this year's schedule are NJIT's first-ever women's basketball matchups against teams from two of the nation's power conferences, the Atlantic Coast Conference and the Big East. The ACC foe is Boston College (January 21 at BC) and the Big East opponent is West Virginia (November 28 in a tournament at the University of Maine).

There will also be two dates in the Prudential Center, the downtown Newark home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils. On December 18, the Highlanders will host Lehigh in a stand-alone women's game with a 7 pm start and then on February 12, NJIT will take on Utah Valley at 6 pm as part of a doubleheader with the NJIT and Utah Valley men in The Rock.

Looking back a year and looking ahead, McKeon remarked: "I'm really excited about the upcoming season. My staff and I enjoy working with this group. We have great chemistry on and off the floor. I am looking forward to a successful season."





Prudential Center



In October 2007, the Prudential Center ushered in a new era in sports and entertainment in Newark and the entire Northern New Jersey area.

Newark is in the midst of a major revitalization, converting the city core into a vibrant and energized entertainment district. The Prudential Center, the New Jersey Performing Arts Center, The Newark Symphony, Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and in 2009, Red Bull Park in nearby Harrison represent just part of the nearly \$2 billion in construction underway.

Prudential Center is the cornerstone in the revitalization and renaissance of downtown Newark. In addition to the arena, Newark will soon add scores of condominiums, restaurants, themed bars and mixed retail establishments. Prudential Center, one of the finest arenas in the country, is New Jersey's home for hockey, college basketball, indoor soccer, concerts, family shows and special events.

A public/private partnership between the City of Newark and Devils Arena Entertainment made the \$375 million Prudential Center a reality that is changing the face of downtown Newark and making it a destination place for sports and live entertainment in the region.

Bounded by Edison Place to the north, Lafayette Street to the south, Mulberry Street to the east and Broad Street and City Hall to the west, "The Rock" is located about a mile from NJIT's University Heights campus.

Known best as the home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils, the Prudential Center has a seating capacity of 17,625 for hockey and up to 18,500 for basketball.

Featuring a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as two club lounges, a goal bar, terrace area and a 350-seat gourmet restaurant, along with 76 Luxury Suites and two Event Suites, the Prudential Center is big league in every way.

The relationship between NJIT and the Prudential Center is a natural. 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of Newark's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. NJIT, meanwhile, is an integral part of the city's educational, civic and economic life.

The arrival of the spectacular Prudential Center nearly coincides with NJIT's arrival as an NCAA Division I institution—the first in Newark and the newest in New Jersey in more than 20 years. The Rock opened one year after NJIT began Division I competition as part of its NCAA reclassification which becomes complete in 2009-10.

In the arena's inaugural year, NJIT played host to six basketball games on four dates, including four men's basketball games and two women's games. Included was the first women's or girls' sports competition in the building's history, when the Highlanders entertained Cornell on January 15, 2008.

The Highlanders are set to host five more men's and women's college basketball games in the state-of-the-art building again in 2008-09. And NJIT's club ice hockey team now plays all of its home games in the full-size Devils practice rink facility, which adjoins the main arena and has an 800-seat capacity.



The Prudential Center, located in downtown Newark, about a mile from NJIT's campus in the University Heights section, is easily accessible by mass transit or by automobile.

"The Rock" is located a short walk from regional mass transportation hub Newark Penn Station, which is served by Amtrak and New Jersey Transit trains, not to mention the Newark City Light Rail, which has a stop (Warren Street Station) at the NJIT campus just a few feet from the entrance of Fleisher Athletic Center and Lubetkin Field.

Highways passing near the arena include: -78, I-280, the NJ Turnpike, Garden State Parkway, Routes 1 & 9, 21, and 22.

There are over 3,500 parking spaces within two blocks of the arena and way-finding signage, guest services personnel and security will assist in getting you to your destination (Please note: all of the parking lots are owned independently, with the exception of the VIP Parking Deck (Lot 10) located on Lafayette Street at the corner of Broad and Lafayette).



The NJIT basketball teams will have home games this season in the downtown Newark Prudential Center and on-campus in the recently-renovated gymnasium of the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center.

"The Rock", located about a mile from NJIT's University Heights campus, opened in October 2007 as the new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils. Highlander basketball played six games on four dates in the 18,500-seat state-of-the-art arena with dates in December 2007 and January 2008. This season, NJIT is set host five games on four dates in December 2008 and January and February 2009.

The Fleisher Athletic Center gym, also home to NJIT's volleyball teams, underwent renovation in the summer of 2006. Included in the makeover was installation of a new floor and baskets and a repositioning of the main playing court. The gym also got new lighting, a new sound system and new scoreboards, along with entirely new seating for more than 1,000 spectators after the first phase of renovation. Future plans include the addition of more seating, which will nearly double the seating capacity, while maintaining the up close-feel that puts spectators close to the action and contributes to the homecourt advantage.

The back bay 'C gym' can be sectioned off from the main competition floor, making the facility useful for intramurals, physical educa-

tion classes and campus recreation time, while being able to host multiple simultaneous events.

The NJIT basketball teams also have full access to the other facilities in the Fleisher Center. These include the fitness area (containing computer-controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units and an indoor track), a free-weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), a martial arts center and an aerobics dance studio.

A six-lane swimming pool in Fleisher Athletic Center is home to the NJIT men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads play on the four outdoor lighted tennis courts behind Fleisher Athletic Center. The NJIT Campus Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.

Lubetkin Field, with its entrance a few feet from the entrance of the Fleisher Athletic

Center, is a first-class venue for college soccer. Outfitted with SprinTurf artificial grass in the summer of 2004, Lubetkin Field also includes lighting for night contests, bleacher seating for more than 1,000 spectators, a press box and scoreboard. The installation of the new surface, a walking track and new landscaping was done at a cost of \$1.2 million.

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, opened in 1999 at a cost of \$30 million and with a seating capacity of 6,200, became the home of NJIT baseball in 2004. In a joint December 2005 press conference, New York Yankees manager Joe Torre was a featured speaker as NJIT and the Newark Bears announced a 10-year partnership that designated the downtown stadium the home of all Highlanders home games for the decade to come.

NJIT, which offers a growing list of club sports, also has a robust intramural program, which makes use of the numerous athletic facilities.





Newark: The Renaissance City

NJIT is located in the heart of New Jersey's largest city. A major urban center, Newark is a city on the move. Some 30,000 undergraduate, graduate and professional students attend classes in University Heights at the city's four public institutions of higher learning: NJIT, Rutgers-Newark, the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, and Essex County College.

- Symphony Hall

- Art galleries, restaurants, and shopping
- An urban architectural laboratory
- Professional minor league baseball (Newark Bears)
- New Jersey Devils Hockey and other events at the Prudential Center



Newark: New Jersey's College Town

Adjacent to NJIT is the Newark campus of Rutgers University.

NJIT and Rutgers enjoy an exceptionally close and productive consortial relationship within the thriving University Heights section of Newark. NJIT and Rutgers students have library privileges at both campuses. NJIT students may also enrich their educational experience by enrolling in Rutgers-Newark courses and in full degree programs in disciplines not offered at NJIT, such as art, music, geology and psychology.

Each year the two universities co-sponsor a common season of theatrical productions, as well as 'World Week,' a joint program of hon-

ors colloquia, and a variety of other cultural and social activities.

New Jersey/New York Metropolitan Region

The NJIT campus is in one of the nation's most exciting cultural and business regions. Advantages include:

- Minutes from New Jersey Performing Arts Center, Liberty Science Center, Meadowlands Sports Complex, Manhattan and all of its attractions, Newport Center Mall, and Secaucus Outlet Center.
- Discount tickets for Broadway shows, museums, concerts, and sporting events.
- Weekend trips throughout the Northeastern United States: skiing, boating, swimming, hiking, and more.

Prudential Center

The new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils is in downtown Newark at the corner of Mulberry and Edison streets, about one mile from the NJIT's University Heights campus.

Opened in October 2007, 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of the city's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. In addition to the world's best hockey, it will be home to numerous entertainment and sporting events, including NJIT basketball. In 2007-08, NJIT hosted six basketball games there on four dates and there are plans to play more games in 2008-09 in North America's newest major arena.

The arena, with seating for 18,500 spectators, features a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as the latest in ice-surface technology and a gourmet restaurant overlooking the ice for Devils games. The building contains 850,000 square feet of space, 9,000 tons of steel, eight million pounds of structural steel and 25,000 cubic yards of concrete.

Red Bull Park

The Red Bulls of Major League Soccer and AEG New York broke ground in September 2006 for Red Bull Park, a 25,000-seat soccer stadium and a major component of the Harrison MetroCentre development, located across the Passaic River, about two miles from NJIT's campus.



The \$100 million 'soccer specific' stadium will feature a 360-degree European-style roof/canopy covering the majority of the seating. When completed in the summer of 2008, Red Bull Park will be the home of the MLS Red Bulls, international soccer and other events. AEG developed and operates 'soccer specific' stadiums in California and in Illinois.

The multi-billion dollar Harrison MetroCentre will feature three million square feet of office space; 3,500 residential units; 300,000 square feet of retail space and over 10,000 decked parking spaces when completed.

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium



Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the professional baseball Newark Bears and since 2004 the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999. With a seating capacity of 6,200, "The Den" affords fans an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major league-caliber press box.

In December 2005, NJIT and the Bears held a joint press conference to herald a new partnership that includes a 10-year deal that extends Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium as the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball.



Great West

NJIT's basketball teams will compete as a Division I Independents in 2008-09, but starting in 2009-10, the Highlanders will be part of the expanded multi-sport Great West Conference.

On July 10, 2008, NJIT was one of six institutions to announce it had joined the expansion of the Great West Conference to form a Division I all-sports league that will conduct championship competition in several sports in 2008-09 and then begin full conference scheduling and championships in 2009-10.

The announcement was made simultaneously by the six institutions and by the conference office, which is led by Commissioner Ed Grom.

In October 2008, Chicago State announced that it would join the original six institutions, bringing the expanded all-sports Great West to seven members.

The Great West, which has existed for four years as a football-only league in the NCAA's Division I Football Championship Subdivision (formerly known as I-AA), is expanding into an all-sports league with the addition of NJIT, Texas-Pan American, Utah Valley, Houston Baptist, University of North Dakota, University of South Dakota, and Chicago State.

The all-sports version of the Great West Conference will eventually offer championships in 14 sports, 11 of which are sponsored by NJIT, including: men's and women's basketball; baseball; women's volleyball; women's tennis; men's and women's cross country; men's and women's indoor track and field; and, men's and women's outdoor track and field.

Cross country and indoor and outdoor track and field championships are planned for 2008-09, with the full complement scheduled to kick in the following year in 2009-10.



NJIT, Texas-Pan American and Utah Valley have been playing each other in multiple sports, including home-and-home games in men's and women's basketball, since NJIT began competing against Division I competition for the first time in 2006-07.

NJIT and Utah Valley are scheduled to complete their NCAA reclassification and become active championship-eligible members of NCAA Division I in 2009-10, the first year of conference play. North Dakota and South Dakota will be active members of Division I in 2012-13 and Houston Baptist will arrive in 2014-15. Texas-Pan American and Chicago State have been active Division I programs for many years.

The expanded conference is not eligible for automatic Division I championship postseason qualification, but will offer the benefit of conference championship competition, stable scheduling opportunities in all conference sports and individual recognition for student-athletes through weekly and season all-conference recognition. The individual awards programs for student-athletes have begun in 2008-09.

NJIT's sports that do not come under the Great West umbrella will continue in their existing conferences—men's soccer in the Atlantic Soccer Conference, women's soccer in the United Soccer Conference and men's volleyball in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association, which has an automatic NCAA postseason berth, which was claimed this year by eventual 2008 national champion, Penn State.

In addition, NJIT will continue to schedule competition against top non-conference regional and national opponents. Two NJIT opponents—Maryland in men's soccer and Penn State in men's volleyball have won national championships following seasons in which they faced the Highlanders. Meanwhile, NJIT teams will compete regularly with opponents from the Big East, Atlantic 10, America East, Ivy League, Patriot League, MAAC and Northeast Conference.
