ABOUT NJIT

NJIT is New Jersey's Science & Technology University. With roots going back to 1881, when it was founded as Newark Technical School, New Jersey Institute of Technology observed its 125th anniversary in 2006.

Located in University Heights, Newark, NJ, home to more than 30,000 college students, NJIT's campus is just 10 miles from New York City.

Playing a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future, NJIT, as a major public technological university, is an important pipeline for the flow of technology into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university helps to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$83 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities on the 45-acre campus, including biomedical engineering labs and a campus center.

Instructional Programs

NJIT offers an ever-expanding array of educational programs, with eight new academic programs approved beginning in 2009-10, which comes after the addition of 14 new programs in 2008. As of 2009, NJIT lists 55 bachelor's degree majors, 53 master's degree programs and 19 doctoral programs — through six schools:

College of Architecture and Design
College of Science and Liberal Arts
School of Management
Albert Dorman Honors College
College of Computing Sciences

NJIT has 416 full-time faculty; more than 98 percent of whom hold the highest degree in their field. The student-faculty ratio is 13:1, with more than 5,300 undergraduate students and more than 2,800 graduate students. Our students hail from 33 states and more than 100 countries to rank eighth in the nation for diversity.

Albert Dorman Honors College enrolls more than 500 students who take advantage of honors courses, research opportunities, advising and mentoring.

Honors College students have SAT scores ranking in the top 10 percent nationally.

With more than 44,000 alumni, NJIT is rated by US News and World Report as a top-tier national research university offering bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees.

Research

NJIT drew more than \$75 million in research funding in 2005 and faculty members welcome student collaboration on research projects.

Economic Development

NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies. NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element, together with instruction, research and community service. More than 60 technology start-up companies, many of which hire NJIT students, are on campus.





The Career Edge

All 10 of the majors with the highest starting salaries for 2005-06 grads are in engineering, computing and business, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers.

Computer and data processing services lead the list of the 10 fastest-growing occupations in projections compiled by the US Department of Labor. Computer-related employment is expected to grow 117 percent by 2008, according to the Career Guide to Industries.

As technology changes all fields, those with science and technology backgrounds are positioned to lead. Among the CEOs of the S&P 500 companies, engineering is the single largest undergraduate degree and more than half of CEOs have undergraduate degrees in engineering, business management, science, math and computing.

The Global Edge

The diversity in NJIT's student body and faculty prepares graduates to understand and succeed in the global marketplace. NJIT was named among the world's top 500 universities in a study by the Institute of Higher Education, Shanghai Jiao Tong University.

The Technology Edge

NJIT has been designated one of the nation's most technologically sophisticated universities by Forbes.com and a Princeton Review survey and the university has received major funding from the National Science Foundation and the National Security Agency in recent years.

The Academic Edge

NJIT has long been a national leader in applying new technologies and approaches to the educational experience. NJIT was a pioneer in requiring computer science for students in all majors and the School of Architecture has led innovations in teaching CAD and digital design. The school's innovative "paperless" first-year program was recently cited by Campus Technology Magazine.

Students have a wide range of educational choices in building an interest-tailored program. Among their options are cross-enrolling at neighboring Rutgers to enrich their program with subjects such as music and languages.

NJIT students learn emerging technologies from the researchers behind the technologies, developing valuable marketplace skills. Real-world experience through experiential learning makes graduates more marketable, with many co-op opportunities leading to permanent jobs.



The Regional Edge

New Jersey, with America's highest concentration of pharmaceutical, hi-tech, biotech, and medical device companies is the place to study technology. It has the nation's highest per capita number of engineers and scientists as residents, while also leading in per capita rate of patents issued. Further, the Newark-New York region is a living laboratory for architecture and building sciences, environmental engineering and transportation.

The Research Edge

NJIT has been designated by the State of New Jersey as the Homeland Security Technology Systems Center and NJIT operates the world-renowned Big Bear Solar Observatory.

A History of NJIT

From the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age, New Jersey Institute of Technology has a rich history with its beginnings developing from the industrial age.

In 1881, an act of the New Jersey State Legislature, recognizing an urgent need, sought a home for what would be the state's technical school. The efforts of Newark's public and private sectors resulted with the opening of Newark Technical School, addressing the state's need.

Over time, the university expanded its curriculum and mission. In 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By the middle of the 20th century, Newark Technical School was transformed into the robust Newark College of Engineering.

The post-war period was one of enormous activity with regular expansion of the campus, as well as the introduction of doctoral level programs. In 1975, with the addition of the New Jersey School of Architecture, the institution had evolved into a technological university, emphasizing a broad range of degrees and dedication to significant research and public service. Newark College of Engineering, stronger than ever, remained intact, but a new university name — New Jersey Institute of Technology — reflected the institution's expanded mission.

A broadened mission called for the creation of a residential campus and the opening of NJIT's first dormitory in 1980 began a period of steady growth that continues. Two new schools were established during the 1980s—the College of Science and Liberal Arts (1982) and the School of Industrial Management (1988). The Albert Dorman Honors College was established in 1994, and the newest school, the College of Computing Sciences, was created in 2001. Beginning in 2009 the College of Architecture and Design was created to house the New Jersey School of Architecture and the new school of Art and Design.



ADMINISTRATION



Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch *President*

Having joined NJIT as its seventh president in July 2002, Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch is leading the university in a period of multi-layered growth.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$80 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities, while also drawing similar dollars in annual research funding.

Under President Altenkirch, NJIT has expanded its course offerings, with 16 new degree programs added in the 2008-09 academic year alone, and 13 in various stages of development for implementation in the next two years..

Coinciding with the expansion is NJIT's transition from a smaller commuter campus to a larger institution with a larger resident student population. The incoming class of 2012 is the largest in the history of the school, and more than half the freshman class resides on campus.

Tied to that transition is Altenkirch's strong belief that the home institution in New Jersey's largest city needs to be residential and provide the experiences associated with a residential campus. At the same time, Altenkirch is committed to NJIT's involvement with the community in its home city of Newark.

Intercollegiate athletics fits those goals naturally and upgrading NJIT athletics has been a priority of Altenkirch's presidency going back to November 2002 meetings that led to NJIT's reclassification to NCAA Division I.

Adding a personal dimension to his support, Altenkirch, a multi-sport athlete in high school, freshman baseball player at Purdue University, and a former college soccer official, and his wife, Beth, are regular attendees at NJIT competitions, home and away.

Immediately before his selection as president of NJIT, Altenkirch was vice president for research at Mississippi State University (MSU), a position he held from 1998 to 2002.

Prior to his appointment as vice president at MSU, Altenkirch served as dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture at Washington State University (1995-98).

From 1988 to 1995, he was dean of the College of Engineering at MSU. He also served as professor and chair of mechanical engineering at the University of Kentucky (1975-88).

Altenkirch holds a PhD from Purdue University, an MS from the University of California, Berkeley, and a BS from Purdue, all in mechanical engineering.

He is the author of over 50 publications and nearly 100 presentations in combustion and heat transfer and served as principal investigator for 10 Space Shuttle experiments investigating the spread of fire in reduced gravity.

He is a fellow of the American Society of Engineers and in 2008 received the Ellis Island Medal of Honor.



Dr. Joel Bloom *Vice President for Academic and Student Services*

Dr. Joel Bloom, who joined NJIT in July 1990, is responsible for eight divisions of the university, including physical education and athletics.

In 1998, Bloom was appointed the first dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College in addition to his vice president responsibilities. The honors college enrolls over 500 students, including residents of 15 states and several foreign countries. The combined average SAT score is over 1300 and freshmen typically have ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class. Honors College students maintain a grade point average higher than 3.5.

Prior to his arrival at NJIT, Dr. Bloom served seven years as assistant commissioner of the New Jersey Department of Education for the Division of General Academic Education. He was responsible for managing many of the education department's initiatives, over 300 grants and contracts, and a \$24 million budget.

Formerly a teacher and school administrator in New York City Public Schools, Dr. Bloom was also a director of research and instructor at Teacher's College, Columbia University.

He is chair of the Greater Newark Consortium for Pre-College Education and vice chair of the State Board for Communities and Schools. He serves further as a member of numerous boards at the state, regional and national levels and has received national and state education awards, as well as federal, foundation and corporate grant awards. He has published journal articles and presented papers on school improvement, curriculum development, college transition and student assessment.

Dr. Bloom holds a master's degree and a doctorate from Teacher's College, Columbia University. He also earned master's and bachelor's degrees from Hunter College of the City University of New York.



Lenny Kaplan *Director of Athletics*

Since taking over as head of NJIT's division of physical education and athletics in August 2000, Lenny Kaplan has been instrumental in guiding NJIT's reclassification to NCAA Division I.

Kaplan helped stabilize and expand a program that was entering its fourth year in Division II when he arrived in Newark. In late 2002, after discussions with university President Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch and Vice President Dr. Joel Bloom, Kaplan took on the task of steering NJIT's programs into Division I, a process that reached fruition with the NCAA's granting active Division I status, with full championship eligibility effective September 1, 2009.

Throughout Kaplan's tenure, NJIT has enhanced the athletics program, particularly in areas that benefit the student-athletes directly.

The sports offerings have expanded to 19 varsity programs and since 2004, NJIT has renovated its two main on-campus venues—Mal Simon Stadium at Lubetkin Field and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center. The school also signed a 10-year partnership to play all home baseball in the professional Bears and Eagles



Riverfront Stadium and later agreed to host basketball in the new Prudential Center, downtown Newark home of the NHL's New Jersey Devils.

Under Kaplan's leadership, many teams achieved regional and national Division II ranking. Success for several women's teams was unprecedented, with basketball, tennis and soccer all reaching postseason play for the first time in his administration,

Additionally, men's volleyball captured a 2007 divisional championship in the Eastern Intercollegiate

Volleyball Association and the next year reached the EIVA playoff semifinals hosted by eventual 2008 national champion Penn State.

Kaplan guided the Highlanders toward further stability with membership in the newly-expanded all-sports Great West Conference, which will offer a conference home for 11 of NJIT's 19 varsity sports.

NJIT's outstanding home facilities will allow it to host conference championships in the Great West Conference and allowed it to host ECAC postseason

championships in 2005-06.

Before coming to NJIT, Lenny Kaplan served 11 years at Manhattan College, where he began as Manhattan's director of operations and was assistant athletics director from 1991-2000.

Kaplan, a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration, resides in Merrick, NY, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.

STUDENT-ATHLETE SUPPORT

Sports Medicine

NJIT sports medicine is moving forward with expanded facilities and a staff of three full-time trainers led by head trainer Matt Koscs, MS/ATC, with assistant trainers Paul Grayner, MEd/ATC, and Sandra Brendle, MSED/ATC. They work with team physicians Louis Rizio, MD, and Rutvik (Rudy) Patel, DO.



Matt Koscs

Matt Koscs, who earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Delaware, came to NJIT as an assistant trainer in July 2008 and moved up to the head trainer position a year later. As an undergrad, he was recipient of the Paris Delligatti Memorial Award for Excellence in Athletic Training.

Prior to NJIT, he served three years as head trainer at Hodgson Vocational Technical High School in Newark, DE. He also worked with soccer clubs in Delaware and was employed at Christiana Care Physical Therapy Plus, in Newark, DE.

Paul Grayner, who holds a bachelor's degree from Saint Leo College in Florida and a master's from American University in Washington, DC, has a diverse background in athletic training, having served at the college and professional levels, as well as in a fitness center setting. He joined the NJIT staff late in 2008.

From the mid-1970s to the mid-1980s, he was a trainer in the minor league systems of the New York Yankees and New York Mets and in 1984 he was assistant trainer with the Mets. He later worked with the Long Island Knights professional basketball team.



Paul Grayner

At the collegiate level, he was head trainer at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ from 1989 to 1998 and earlier worked as an assistant trainer at Hofstra, Adelphi and FDU.

Sandra Brendle, who joined the NJIT staff as an assistant trainer in the summer of 2009, earned her bachelor's degree, majoring in athletic training from Greensboro (NC) College in 2007. She earned her master's in athletic training at Old Dominion University in May 2009. At ODU, she worked with seven teams and was on the medical staff for the 2008 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Tournament first and second rounds. At Greensboro, she was 2006 Athletic Training Student of the Year and worked on the 2004 NCAA Division III Men's and Women's Soccer Championship tournament medical staff.

Dr. Rizio is a board certified orthopedic surgeon and is fellowship trained in the field of sports medicine. He is a graduate of Rutgers and after earning his med-

ical degree from the UMDNJ/New Jersey Medical School, Dr. Rizio completed his orthopedic residency at Tufts University in Boston.

He then completed a sports medicine fellowship at the University of Miami and was assistant team physician of the Hurricanes, as well as the Miami Dolphins, the Miami Hurricanes.

Dr. Rizio practices at the New Jersey Sports Medicine Institute. Prior to starting his own practice, Dr Rizio was the Chief of Sports Medicine at the NJ Medical School from 2000-2005.

Dr. Patel practices in association with Dr. Rizio. A cum laude graduate of NYIT, Dr. Patel earned his DO from the New York College of Osteopathic Medicine. He was chief resident in Family Medicine at the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School in New Brunswick, NJ, from 2003 to 2006.

Strength and Conditioning



Dan Huff

A formal strength and conditioning program is a key part of a Division I program, with an eye toward maximizing individual and team performance in competition. The strength and conditioning coach also works closely with the Athletic Training Staff in the areas of injury prevention and injury rehabilitation.

The 2008-09 season brought another dimension to NJIT athletics with the hiring of Dan Huff, CSCS, as the Highlanders' first full-time strength and conditioning coach. In addition to the hiring of a full-time



coach to coordinate the strength and conditioning, NJIT renovated the weight rooms and purchased new equipment, with the area dedicated to use by the Highlander teams.

Huff previously served five years as strength and conditioning coordinator at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ, from 2003 to 2008, working with an 18-sport NCAA Division I program.

Huff was Sports Performance Director for Velocity Sports Performance in Wall, NJ, immediately before accepting his position at NJIT. He is a graduate of William Paterson University of New Jersey. He holds numerous certifications.

Academic Enrichment

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment (CAPE) added a new component with the 2007 hiring of Erika Rigby McCourt as Associate Director of CAPE in a position that was created for the specific purpose of serving the needs of NJIT's student-athletes.

Rigby McCourt left her post to focus more on raising her infant daughter and NJIT is in the process of filling the position, which focuses on five key areas: academic support, career development, personal devel-

opment, leadership and community service including the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and CHAMPS Life Skills for NJIT's nearly 300 student-athletes.

In 2008-09, Tim Wuorinen moved over to CAPE as eligibility certification officer/academic advisor, after having spent the previous five-plus years working in the NJIT Department of Athletics as assistant athletic director and coordinator for compliance and student-athlete services.

Erika Rigby McCourt, the first person to serve NJIT as Associate Director for CAPE with the specific component of student-athlete support, previously worked for over a decade in three NCAA Division I programs, most recently at Seton Hall University, where she was Associate Director of Academic

Support Services. Her career began in 1997 at Northern Arizona, where she directed the Academic Enrichment Program and continued as Academic/Athletic Coordinator at Saint Peter's College.

Tim Wuorinen was a compliance fellow with the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference and he has worked in the athletic offices of four colleges, including Western New England College, his undergraduate alma mater. In addition to his bachelor's degree from Western New England, he earned a master's degree from NJIT.

Tim and his wife, Tara, who is the Academic/Athletic Coordinator at Saint Peter's College, reside in Aberdeen, NJ.

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment, headed by Dr. Marybeth Boger, is a resource available to all students within NJIT's Student Services Division. The CAPE provides academic support services and activities to enhance students' academic and professional development and it works with academic and administrative departments to help students develop the necessary analytical and problem-solving skills to become independent learners.

CAPE provides tutoring, student success workshops and testing accommodations.

Margaret McKeon

Head Coach

Third season at NJIT, eighth season overall

Margaret McKeon joined NJIT women's basketball as head coach in July 2007, bringing with her a deep passion for teaching basketball and a proven record of having transformed a struggling program into an NCAA Division I Tournament qualifier.

Her abilities were evident almost immediately in her first preseason practices at NJIT and it carried over into the season with a high-energy playing style and an attitude that made the Highlanders a threat for all 40 minutes, no matter what the score.

At first, however, wins were hard to come by, as McKeon's first NJIT team opened at 2-10. But the new approach began to bear fruit in early January and the Highlanders went 8-9 the rest of the way, including a 2-1 record in the 2008 national Independent Division I Tournament.

Their final record of 10-19, more than doubled the win total from NJIT's first season of Division I competition (4-24 overall, 3-23 against Division I opponents in 2006-07).

The six-win improvement from one year to the next was the second-best in the 22-season history of the program.

"What I love to do is teach," said McKeon before her first season leading NJIT's fortunes. "I have a passion for the game and my goal is to help young women not only play the game, but grow as people. There are a lot of life lessons for them and for me."

McKeon's track record includes five NCAA Division I postseason tournament appearances in her years as an assistant coach and head coach.

"I am very happy to be back in the tri-state area," said McKeon, a native of Queens, NY, where she was a star player in high school and college. "And I am very excited for this opportunity to build a Division I program from the ground up."

"The vision of Dr. (Robert) Altenkirch (NJIT President) and Dr. (Joel) Bloom (Vice President of



Academic and Student Services) to move the entire athletic program forward is the reason I became interested in this job. NJIT already has a reputation for academic excellence and I look forward to working with (Director of Athletics) Lenny Kaplan and his staff to develop a competitive Division I program that will attract the types of student-athletes who are eager to excel in the classroom, as well as on the court."

Expanding on the idea of academic achievement at a school such as NJIT translating on the basketball floor, McKeon said: "(The players) strive to be excellent in the classroom and when they come onto the court, that's what they expect of themselves. If you can give them a purpose—why we are doing it and this is the end result—they believe they will strive to succeed in basketball, too. They live by that."

In five years as head coach at Boston University (1999-2004), McKeon transformed the Terriers from a team with five wins the season before her arrival to one that earned a spot in the NCAA Division I Tournament by her fourth season and was only a game short of repeating as America East Conference champion the following year.

Before her years as head coach at BU, McKeon was assistant and then associate head coach at George Washington from 1995 to 1999, during which time GW posted a combined record of 93-31. In her four seasons on the staff, the Colonials went to the NCAAs three times, were ranked 10th in the nation and advanced to the Division I tournament's Elite Eight in 1996-97.

At Boston University, McKeon took over a program that was established, but had failed to achieve double-figure wins totals in each of its previous three seasons, including a 5-22 record the year before she was named head coach. In her first year (1999-00) the Terriers were 8-21, but they moved upward quickly, reaching the 17-win mark in her third season. That 17-11 record in 2001-02 was BU's first winning record in seven years. In the 2002-03 NCAA season, the Terriers won the America East Conference championship and advanced to face UConn in the NCAAs.

The 2003-04 season was her biggest triumph at BU when the Terriers chalked up a 19-11 overall record and a second straight spot in the America East post-season championship game.

Overall, her Boston University teams won 70 games in five seasons, including a combined 52-37 record the last three seasons.

The Terriers' steady overall improvement was apparent in conference play, as well. McKeon's teams went from 3-15 in conference her first year to 10-6 by her third year. Her America East Conference regular season record over her last three seasons at BU was 32-18, with postseason championship game appearances the last two seasons.



In her four seasons as an assistant coach at George Washington, the Colonials won three Atlantic 10 Conference championships, advancing to the NCAA Tournament all three times. GW ranked 10th nationally and reached the tournament's Elite Eight in 1996-97 and the Colonials advanced to the second round two other times, including 1995-96, when they finished 18th in the final national poll.

Earlier, at the University of Houston, she was part of a staff that recruited what one service rated as the 10th best in the nation in 1994. In her first year as a college coach, McKeon was on the staff for the 1991-

92 Arizona State squad that reached the NAAs. The Sun Devils' combined record in her two seasons there was 37-19, playing in the Pacific 10, one of the nation's elite women's basketball conferences.

McKeon is a 1991 graduate of St. John's University in Queens, NY, earning a BA in athletic administration.

A collegiate star at both St. John's and at Oklahoma, she was all-Big East for St. John's, setting a conference single-game assists record that still stands, with 18 against Georgetown on January 16, 1991. She also starred at Oklahoma, earning all-conference honorable mention.

Before college, she starred at Christ the King Regional High School in Queens, a school renowned for its powerhouse girls' basketball program that has produced such talent as WNBA players Sue Bird and Chamique Holdsclaw. Between high school and college, she coached the New York Liberty Belles AAU Basketball Club, the most successful girls AAU program in the Northeast.

A member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association since 1991, McKeon was a speaker at two WBCA national conventions.

She resides in Newark.

Gabrielle Butler

Assistant Coach

Gabrielle Butler joined the NJIT women's basketball staff in July 2008 as an assistant, resuming an extremely successful college coaching career.

Butler and NJIT head coach Margaret McKeon first met when they were assistants in a George Washington University program that was a championship contender at the national level (Butler coached at GW from 1991 to 1999, and McKeon was an assistant there from 1995 to 1999).

When McKeon became head coach at Boston University, Butler joined her there, serving as first assistant from 1999 to 2002.

At George Washington, Butler coached teams that qualified for the NCAA Division I Tournament in six of her eight seasons on the staff.

During her tenure, the Colonials garnered six NCAA tournament bids. George Washington won at least one game in each of its trips to the Big Dance and reached the 1997 Elite Eight and the 1995 Sweet Sixteen. Butler's drive to win was instrumental in GW capturing four straight Atlantic 10 Conference championships from 1994 to 1998.

In her three seasons at BU, Butler helped lay the groundwork for a program revival that resulted in the Terriers' first winning season in seven years (17-11 in 2001-02), followed by the program's first NCAA post-season appearance.

In addition to her successful coaching career, Butler, who hails from the nation's capital, has enjoyed a successful tenure in the field of law. After graduating from Franklin and Marshall College (Lancaster, PA) in 1985, she worked as a legal assistant in Washington, DC, until 1991, when she joined the staff at George Washington. She left BU in 2002 to resume her legal career, but kept her ties to the world of college basketball.

When McKeon took the helm of the women's program at NJIT in 2007, Butler followed the Highlanders' progress and realized she was ready and eager to return to coaching.

"I am very excited about reuniting with Coach McKeon and about being at NJIT," said Butler upon

joining the Highlanders. "Margaret is a skilled, passionate teacher of the game and is committed to bringing academically and athletically-talented student-athletes to the university."

Said McKeon of Butler: "Gabrielle and I share a long history building a tradition of success. In addition to her coaching skills, she is an exceptional recruiter who has the ability to identify quality prospects and follow through to sell the school and the program.

"Gabrielle and I also share the philosophy that we are teachers first," continued McKeon. "We strongly believe the college experience should be about academics, as well as athletics and we encourage our student-athletes to strive for excellence on the court and in the classroom."

Coach Butler resides in Kearny, NJ.



Frozena Jerro

Assistant Coach

Frozena Jerro, who joined head coach Margaret McKeon's staff in July of 2009, has been in the NCAA Division I basketball tournament as a player and as a head coach.

The northern California product played in the "Big Dance" for Arizona State and led Cal State Northridge in the Division I tournament as head coach.

She was also an assistant coach with three different NCAA Division I programs-Houston (1993-95), Cal State Northridge (1997-98), and UNLV (2002-08). Her most recent job was a one-year stint assisting at West Los Angeles College in 2008-09.

Coach Jerro led the program at Cal State Northridge from 1998 to 2002 and is the most successful head coach in that program's 35-year history. Her 1998-99 Matadors posted a 21-8 overall record and made the NCAA Division I Tournament as champion of the Big Sky Conference. Honored as Big Sky Coach of the Year in 1998-99, she took the Matadors back to the conference championship game in 2000, finishing with an 18-10 record.

Her overall record as head coach at Cal State Northridge was 48-41 and her overall winning percentage of .539 and conference winning percentage of

.615 (29-18) are both tops among the 10 head coaches in Matador history.

As a college player, Jerro starred at both St. Mary's College in her native northern California and at Arizona State, where she graduated in 1993. At Saint Mary's, she led the West Coast Conference in steals as a freshman and helped the Gaels to WCC titles in each of her two years. Moving on to Arizona State, she was a Pac-10 Conference All-Star after helping the Sun Devils into the 1992 NCAA Tournament. She also played in the 1990 United States Olympic Sports Festival.

Arizona State, coincidentally, was where the basketball careers of Frozena Jerro and Margaret McKeon first overlapped, as Jerro's final two years as a college player were McKeon's first two years as a college coach. Subsequently, Jerro began her own coaching career at Houston in 1993, where McKeon was also an assistant coach from 1993 to 1995.

Coach Jerro moved on from Houston to Cal State Northridge, where she spent one season as an assistant before ascending to head coach in 1998. Next up was a six-year stint at UNLV that saw the Lady Rebels reach postseason play four times, with berths in the 2003, 2004, 2005, and 2006 Women's National Invitation Tournaments. UNLV's combined record in her tenure was 99-84, including a 26-win season in 2003-04.

"Coach Jerro has been very successful, both as a player and a coach," said McKeon in announcing the staff addition. "She is a great teacher of the game with a strong work ethic and an upbeat, positive personality that motivates the players. She truly has what it takes to be successful at this level and will be a valuable addition to our coaching staff.

Said Jerro: "I'm extremely excited and grateful to be part of the Highlander family. I've learned so much from Coach McKeon throughout my career as a player and a coach. Having the chance to reunite with Coach McKeon, and to work with Coach (Gabrielle) Butler toward building something special here at NJIT is a blessing and an awesome opportunity.

"I hope that with the enthusiasm I have for teaching and mentoring young people through the game of basketball, I will be able to make a positive impact on this program."

Jerro's primary on-court focus will be working with the NJIT guards, although she will also assist with the post players. She will also serve as recruiting coordinator, a role she also filled at UNLV.

Coach Jerro resides in Bayonne, NJ.

2009-10 OUTLOOK

This season looms as an important one in the evolution of the NJIT women's basketball program.

For the first time, the Highlanders are active members of NCAA Division I, eligible for national team and individual championships as of September 1, 2009. The new status for NJIT comes after a reclassification period that saw the Highlanders face Division I competition for the previous three seasons.

In addition, 2009-10 will mark NJIT's first season as a member of a Division I conference, the newly-expanded Great West Conference, which will provide 12 regular season games plus a postseason conference championship game, in addition to weekly and postseason individual player honors.

Specific to the 2009-10 Highlanders, the 13-player preseason roster includes six incoming freshmen, meaning nearly half the squad will be new to college basketball. The rest of the squad is comprised a sophomore, two juniors, and four seniors.

The youth is heavily weighted in the backcourt, with a pair of four-year regulars, Jill Dickinson and Jackie McCaffrey having graduated from last year's squad. Dickinson scored 915 career points in 111 career games and McCaffrey, a point guard who led last year's team with 50 steals, started 112 of 115 career games.

"We're young, young on the perimeter," said coach Margaret McKeon during preseason. "The only one with experience is Jess (junior Jessica Gerald) and she's coming off a major injury."

Gerald, an impact player since the day she arrived on campus in 2007, was averaging a team-best 16.7 points per game through the first 19 games of her sophomore season when it abruptly ended following a severe ankle injury sustained in an early February practice.

The 2007-08 Division I Independent Newcomer of the Year, the Gerald's explosive scoring ability was evidenced by her school-record 37 points in a win over Cal State-Bakersfield in January of her freshman season and in numerous other high-scoring efforts in her 48-game career. Despite missing the last 10 games a season ago, she has 686 career points (14.3 ppg)

"She's trying to get back her timing," said Coach McKeon of the player who had an explosive first step before the injury. "We like the progress she's made so far, but it's probably going to take some time to get back to the strength of her game."

The "veteran" point guard is sophomore Melanie Griffin, who played in all 29 games as a top sub in her freshman season, but most of her work came playing as an off guard. She played about 10 minutes a game as a freshman.

The rest of the experience at guard comes from junior Ivana Seric, who is listed as a forward, but will see action at all five positions, and from senior Katie Piekelski, who is listed as a guard on the roster, but whose primary role is as a combo forward. Seric, the team's tallest regular at 6-foot-1, is an excellent passer and dribbler.

Among the freshmen, Kim Dweck is a point guard likely to share playing time with the sophomore Melanie Griffin, and Rayven Johnson and Emily Schartner should see significant action right away.

Dweck, a pure point guard, is a strong passer and floor general.

Johnson, is a powerful 5-foot-8 wing player who can has a good mid-range jump shot and who also uses her strength around the basket, where she is an exceptional offensive rebounder. Schartner, a 5-foot-10 two guard, will add to the Highlanders' outside shooting arsenal.

NJIT also has two guards from Serbia, both of whom played prep ball at The Patterson School in North Carolina. Unfortunately, point guard Ivana Lacmanovic suffered a torn anterior cruciate ligament in preseason and will not be available in 2009-10. Her compatriot, Jelena Zoric, is a 5-foot-10 shooting guard whose strength is her long-range shooting ability.

The Highlanders have experience and talent on the front line, led by Seric and the senior twin Oyelola sisters, Taiwo and Femi, both of whom have been integral players in NJIT's move to Division I. Each sister stands 5-foot-11 and they are strong players capable of producing double-figure scoring and rebounding totals on a regular basis.

Of the two, Taiwo was quicker to become an impact player at the college level. After playing as a sub in 25 games her freshman year and averaging 3.6 points and 3.1 rebounds, she broke out in a big way as a sophomore, more than doubling her scoring to 8.2 ppg and pushing her rebounding average to 5.6 per game (tops on the team).

She followed that improvement with another step forward in her junior year, upping her scoring average to 9.2 ppg and repeating as the team rebounding leader (5.7 rpg).

Femi's development was a bit slower, as her biggest jump came from her sophomore to her junior year. She averaged 4 ppg and 3 rpg as a freshman and moved up to 5.1 points and 4 rebounds as a sophomore. Last year, as a junior, she made the big scoring jump, averaging close to 10 points per game (9.8 to be exact) and went up to 5.6 rebounds per contest to finish second to her sister on the team (in total, Taiwo had 164 rebounds to 162 for Femi).



2009-10 OUTLOOK

Seric is a remarkably versatile player who literally will see playing time at all five positions on the floor this season. A midseason addition to the NJIT roster in 2007-08, she proved to be a catalyst that year, as the Highlanders generated an 8-7 record in the 15 games she played.

Last year she was the only player to start all 29 games and she averaged 6.2 points and 4.6 rebounds (third on the team), while leading NJIT with 70 assists and tying for the team lead in blocked shots.

Piekielski, who returned from offseason knee surgery between her sophomore and junior seasons, played in 27 games last season as a junior, starting 10. A hard worker, she will play at both forward spots in her senior year.

The newcomer on the front line is freshman Maria Sanchez, a 6-foot-1 native of Spain. Expected to come off the bench at the start of her college career, Sanchez is expected to make open shots, rebound and defend.

Senior center Kathryn Wighton, the tallest player on the roster, was out indefinitely as the season started while she rehabbed from a back injury.

As McKeon and her staff attempt to blend in all the newcomers, a key element in the team's success will be in the leadership that comes from the veteran players.

"Veteran leadership is crucial," said the coach. "It's about leading by example and being committed on a daily basis and transferring that approach to the younger players."

How regularly that commitment comes and how quickly it is passed on to the newcomers will go a long way in shaping NJIT's season.

"We could have a good season," said Coach McKeon. "We have some talent. But we're taking it day-by-day."

NJIT women's basketball, under McKeon's direction, has not shied from top level competition and this season continues that emerging tradition.

Her first win as coach of the Highlanders came on November 28, 2007 against UMBC, a team that had played in the NCAA Division I Tournament the spring before.

Last year's schedule included NJIT's first-ever women's basketball matchups against teams from two of the nation's power conferences, the Atlantic Coast

Conference and the Big East. The ACC foe was Boston College and the Big East opponent was West Virginia.

This season, NJIT will again challenge the ACC (December 29 at Virginia Tech) and the Big East (December 3 at Marquette), but the Highlanders will open the season against their first-ever foe from the Big Ten Conference (November 15 at Penn State).

There will also be two February dates in the Prudential Center, the downtown Newark home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils. NJIT will host Houston Baptist in "The Rock" on February 18 and a week later the Highlanders will host South Dakota there on February 25.

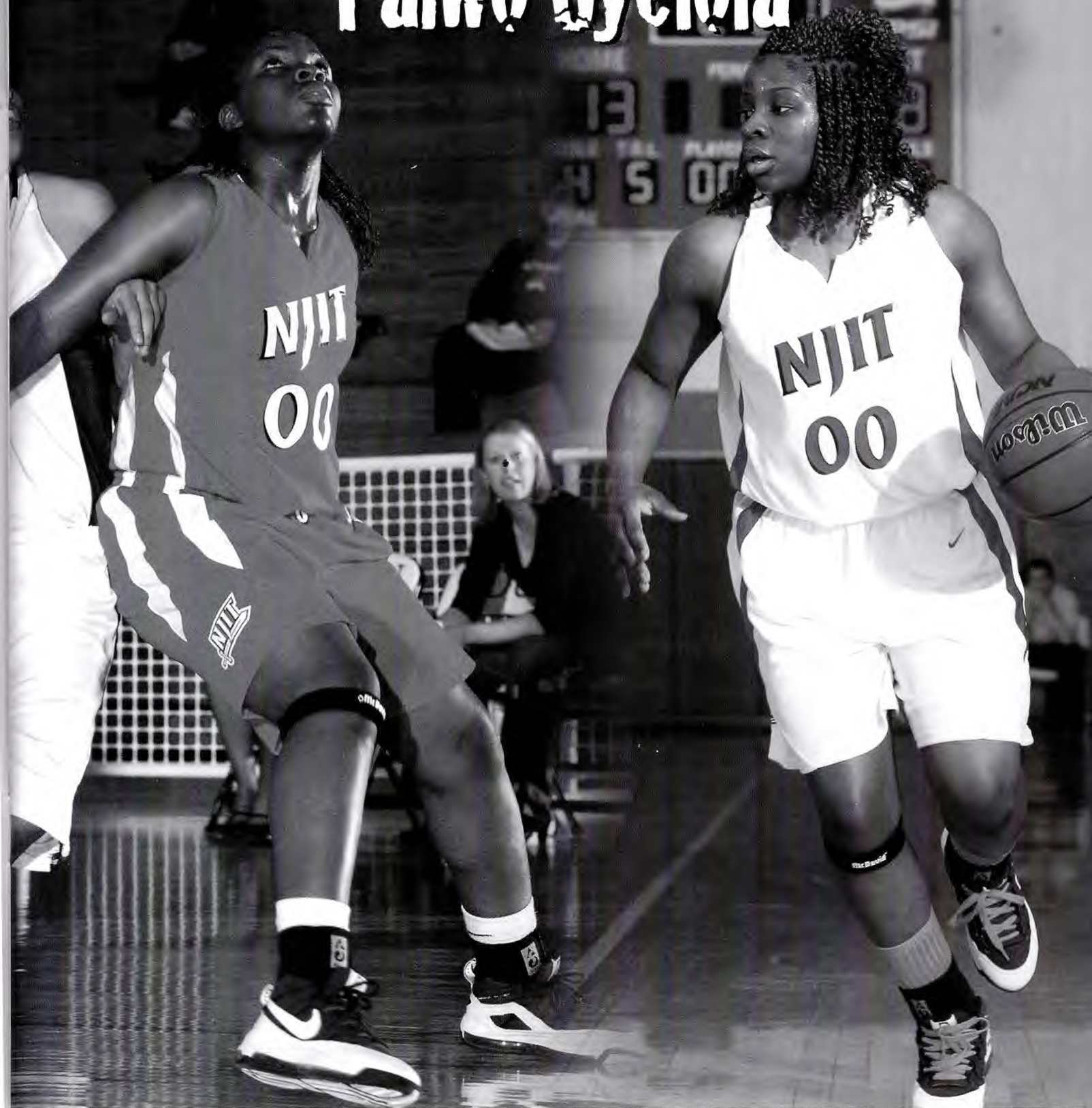
The Great West Conference will bring games against former Division I Independent power Utah Valley, as well as other established NJIT Division I foes Chicago State and Texas-Pan American, plus new opponents Houston Baptist, North Dakota, and South Dakota. Both Dakotas were national powers at the Division II level and each won 18 games in its first Division I reclassification season a year ago.

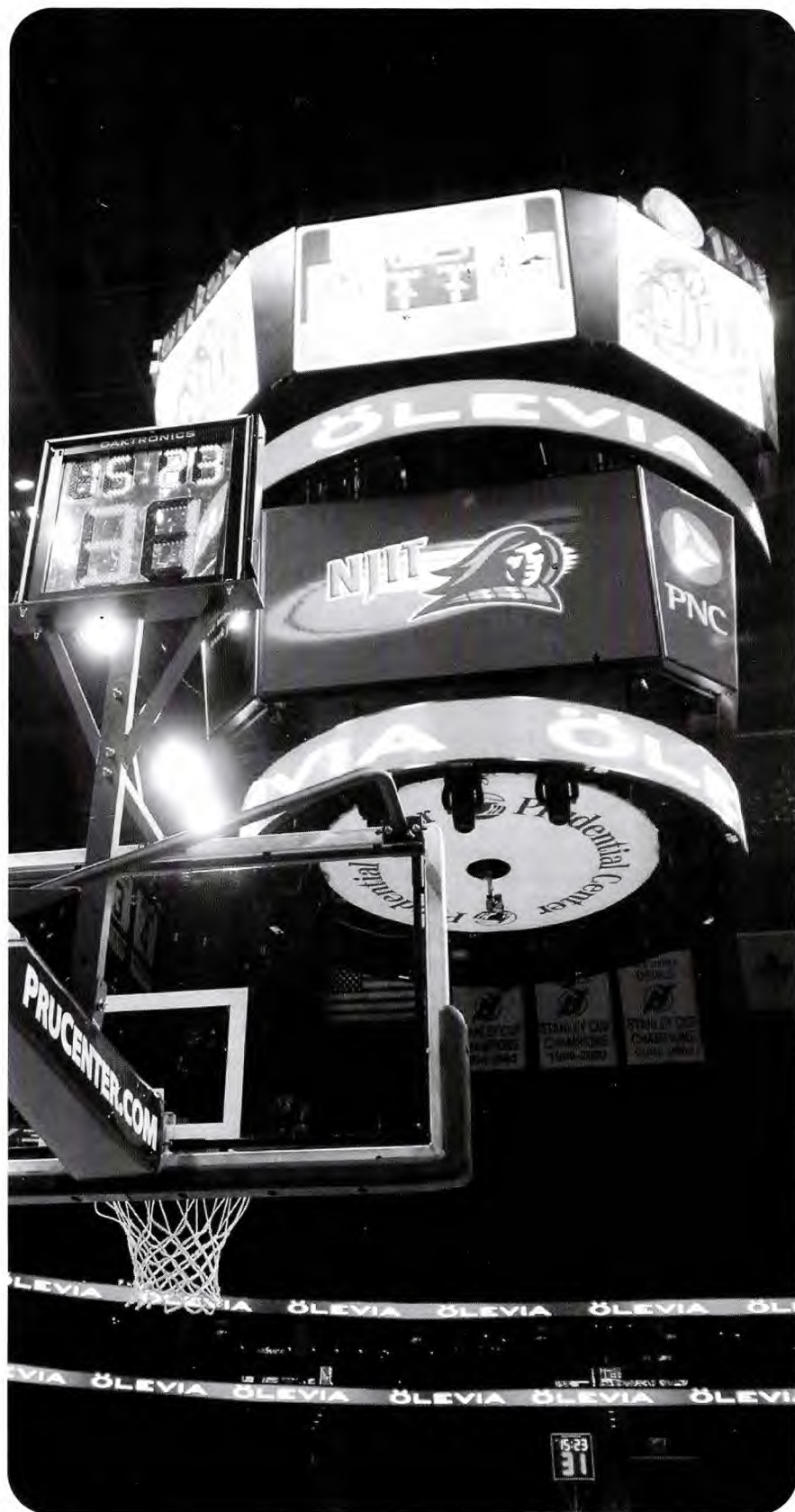
This year, the games will be described by Matt Provence and Jon Schaeffer, who will work either in tandem or solo on selected games throughout the schedule. Play-by-play coverage begins 10 minutes before the scheduled tipoff time.

Matt Provence, who is in his first full season calling games for the Highlanders, enters his third season with the IronPigs after spending the previous two seasons as Assistant General Manager for the Daytona Cubs of the Florida State League. Prior to his time with the Cubs, Provence handled media relations duties as the Director of Broadcasting for the Lynchburg Hillcats from 1998-2004. The graduate of James Madison University officially began his professional baseball career with the Norwich Navigators in 1997 after interning with the New York Yankees broadcast team in 1995.

Schaeffer, back for a second season with NJIT, is set to make the 2010 season his eighth in professional baseball (and third with the IronPigs) after beginning his broadcasting career as a radio announcer with Lynchburg in 2003. A native of Lower Merion, PA, Schaeffer also handles play-by-play duties for Lincoln University football. Schaeffer is a 2002 graduate of Penn State University with a degree in Broadcast Journalism. While at PSU, he was nominated for a Hearst award, recognizing excellence in student broadcasting.



PRUDENTIAL CENTER



In October 2007, the Prudential Center ushered in a new era in sports and entertainment in Newark and the entire northern New Jersey area.

Newark is in the midst of a major revitalization, converting the city core into a vibrant and energized entertainment district. The Prudential Center, the New Jersey Performing Arts Center, The Newark Symphony, Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and in 2010, Red Bull Arena in nearby Harrison represent just part of the nearly \$2 billion in construction underway.

Prudential Center is the cornerstone in the revitalization and renaissance of downtown Newark. In addition to the arena, Newark will soon add scores of condominiums, restaurants, themed bars and mixed retail establishments. Prudential Center, one of the finest arenas in the country, is New Jersey's home for hockey, college basketball, indoor soccer, concerts, family shows and special events.

A public/private partnership between the City of Newark and Devils Arena Entertainment made the \$375 million Prudential Center a reality that is changing the face of downtown Newark and making it a destination place for sports and live entertainment in the region.

Bounded by Edison Place to the north, Lafayette Street to the south, Mulberry Street to the east and Broad Street and City Hall to the west, "The Rock" is located about a mile from NJIT's University Heights campus.

Known best as the home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils, the Prudential Center has a seating capacity of 17,625 for hockey and up to 18,500 for basketball.

Featuring a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as two club lounges, a goal bar, terrace area and a 350-seat gourmet restaurant, along with 76 Luxury Suites and two Event Suites, the Prudential Center is big league in every way.

The relationship between NJIT and the Prudential Center is a natural. "The Rock" is the centerpiece of Newark's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. NJIT, meanwhile, is an integral part of the city's educational, civic and economic life.

The arrival of the spectacular Prudential Center nearly coincides with NJIT's arrival as an NCAA Division I institution—the first in Newark and the newest in New Jersey in more than 20 years. The Rock opened one year after NJIT began Division I competition as part of its NCAA reclassification which is now complete.

In the arena's inaugural year, NJIT played host to six basketball games on four dates, including four men's basketball games and two women's games. Included was the first women's or girls' sports competition in the building's history, when the Highlanders entertained Cornell on January 15, 2008.

The Highlanders hosted five more men's and women's college basketball games in the state-of-the-art building and are set to host four games in 2009-10. Further, NJIT's club ice hockey team plays all of its home games in the full-size Devils practice rink facility (AmeriHealth Pavilion), which adjoins the main arena and has an 800-seat capacity.



The Prudential Center, located in downtown Newark, about a mile from NJIT's University Heights campus, is easily accessible by mass transit or by automobile.

"The Rock" is located a short walk from regional mass transportation hub Newark Penn Station, which is served by Amtrak and New Jersey Transit trains, not to mention the Newark City Light Rail, which has a stop (Warren Street Station) at the NJIT campus just a few feet from the entrance of Fleisher Athletic Center and J. Malcolm Simon Stadium at Lubetkin Field.

Highways passing near the arena include: I-78, I-280, the NJ Turnpike, Garden State Parkway, Routes 1 & 9, 21, and 22.

There are over 3,500 parking spaces within two blocks of the arena and way-finding signage, guest services personnel and security will assist in getting you to your destination (Please note: all of the parking lots are owned independently, with the exception of the VIP Parking Deck (Lot 10) located on Lafayette Street at the corner of Broad and Lafayette).

ATHLETICS FACILITIES

The NJIT basketball teams will have home games this season in the downtown Newark Prudential Center and on-campus in the recently-renovated gymnasium of the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center.

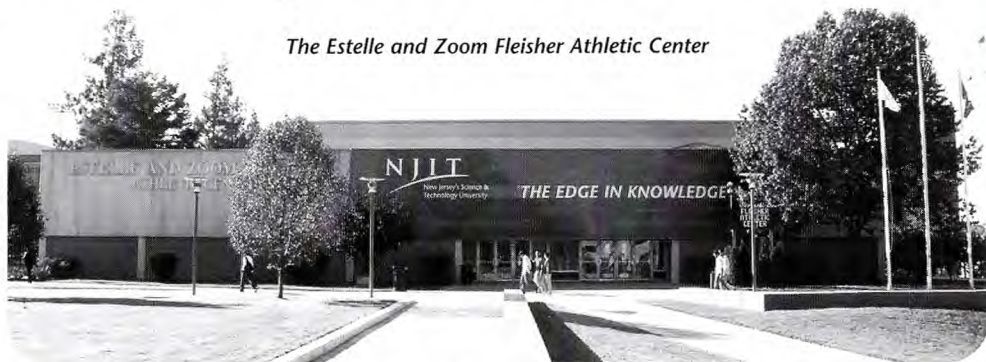
"The Rock", located about a mile from NJIT's University Heights campus, opened in October 2007 as the new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils. NJIT basketball has played there in each of the building's first two seasons and the Highlanders will return for two doubleheaders in February 2010.

The Fleisher Athletic Center gym, also home to NJIT's volleyball teams, underwent renovation in the summer of 2006. Included in the makeover was installation of a new floor and baskets and a repositioning of the main playing court.

The gym also got new lighting, a new sound system and new scoreboards, along with entirely new seating for more than 1,000 spectators after the first phase of renovation. Future plans include the addition of more seating, which will nearly double the seating capacity while maintaining the up close-feel that puts spectators next to the action and contributes to the home-court advantage.

The back bay 'C gym' can be sectioned off from the main competition floor, making the facility useful for intramurals, physical education classes and campus recreation time, while being able to host multiple simultaneous events.

The Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center



The NJIT basketball teams also have full access to the other facilities in the Fleisher Center. These include the fitness area (containing computer-controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units and an indoor track), a free-weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), a martial arts center and an aerobics dance studio.

A six-lane swimming pool in Fleisher Athletic Center is home to the NJIT men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads play on the four outdoor lighted tennis courts behind Fleisher Athletic Center. The NJIT Campus Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.

Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium, with its entrance a few feet from the entrance of the Fleisher Athletic Center, is a first-class venue for college soccer. Outfitted with SprinTurf artificial grass in the

summer of 2004, the complex also includes lighting for night contests, bleacher seating for more than 1,000 spectators, a press box and scoreboard. The installation of the new surface, a walking track and new landscaping was done at a cost of \$1.2 million.

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, opened in 1999 at a cost of \$30 million and with a seating capacity of 6,200, became the home of NJIT baseball in 2004. In a joint December 2005 press conference, New York Yankees manager Joe Torre was a featured speaker as NJIT and the Newark Bears announced a 10-year partnership that designated the downtown stadium the home of all Highlanders home games for the decade to come.

NJIT, which offers a growing list of club sports, also has a robust intramural program, which makes use of the numerous athletic facilities.

- New Jersey Devils Hockey and other events at the Prudential Center

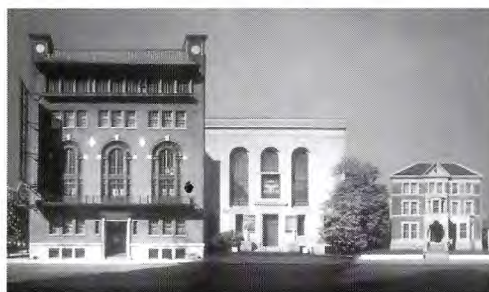

Newark: New Jersey's College Town

Adjacent to NJIT is the Newark campus of Rutgers University.

NJIT and Rutgers enjoy an exceptionally close and productive consortial relationship within the thriving University Heights section of Newark. NJIT and Rutgers students have library privileges at both campuses. NJIT students may also enrich their educational experience by enrolling in Rutgers-Newark courses and in full degree programs in disciplines not offered at NJIT, such as art, music, geology and psychology.

Each year the two universities co-sponsor a common season of theatrical productions, as well as 'World Week,' a joint program of honors colloquia, and a variety of other cultural and social activities.

SPORTS AND ENTERTAINMENT IN & AROUND NEWARK

Prudential Center

The new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils is in downtown Newark at the corner of Mulberry and Edison streets, about one mile from the NJIT's University Heights campus.

Opened in October 2007, 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of the city's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. In addition to the world's best hockey, it is home to numerous entertainment and sporting events, including NJIT basketball. Indeed, NJIT hosted the first women's basketball game in the Prudential Center on January 15, 2008 (NJIT vs. Cornell).

NJIT played in the Rock in the inaugural year and plans are ongoing for the Highlanders to play games each year in North America's newest major arena.

The arena, with full-capacity seating for 18,500 spectators, features a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as the latest in ice-surface technology and a gourmet restaurant overlooking the ice for Devils games. The building contains 850,000 square feet of space, 9,000 tons of steel, eight million pounds of structural steel and 25,000 cubic yards of concrete.

Red Bull Arena

The new home of the New York Red Bulls (opening in March 2010) will set the standard for soccer venues across North America.

The state-of-the-art soccer-specific facility, under construction in Harrison, NJ, about two miles from



the NJIT campus, is a major component of a multi-billion dollar development.

Red Bull Arena will have a number of key design elements which will give Red Bull Arena's seating bowl a close-to-the-action feeling and the unique stadium roof design will extend from its leading edge over the entire seating bowl and then curve down to the concourse.

The overall seating capacity for soccer will be 25,189, including 30 luxury suites (20 lower level and 10 upper level) and 1,116 club seats. Other amenities include three stadium clubs and two retail outlets.



Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium



Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the professional baseball Newark Bears and since 2004 the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999. With a seating capacity of 6,200, "The Den" affords fans an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major league-caliber press box.

In December 2005, NJIT and the Bears held a joint press conference to herald a new partnership that includes a 10-year deal that extends Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium as the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball.

NCAA DIVISION 1

New Jersey Institute of Technology athletics is on the move to the top level of college athletics—NCAA Division I.

The reclassification is nearly complete; as NJIT closes in on active championship-eligible Division I status, which is slated to arrive for all programs in 2009-10.

Formerly a member of Division II, NJIT got the go-ahead to begin the reclassification process, which began with an exploratory year in 2005-06. All of the programs that previously competed in Division II then moved up to face Division I competition effective in 2006-07.

Two sports—men's soccer and women's soccer—paved the way on a faster NCAA track that allows lower division schools to elevate one sport in each gender to Division I in a process that takes two years to complete.

NJIT men's soccer became a full member of NCAA Division I at the start of the 2005 season, when the Highlanders arrived at championship eligibility. The men's journey to the top level began in 2003. NJIT women's soccer began a similar two-year process in 2005, with full Division I status and championship eligibility arriving with the 2007 season.

The larger process of advancing the entire program to Division I takes longer and includes application, a detailed strategic plan and in-depth annual review of the institution's progress in moving toward its goal of complying with NCAA Division I rules and building a strong, broad-based athletics program.

NJIT's move to Division I progressed quickly after the November 2002 discussions among President Robert A. Altenkirch, Vice President Joel Bloom and Athletics Director Lenny Kaplan.

From there came a proposal from Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I. Little more than two years later, the NCAA approved NJIT's proposal to advance its entire program to Division I.

Along the way, scholarship and operating budgets have been enhanced, with expanded coaching staffs, increased scholarship dollars and upgraded facilities for competition and practice.

Upgrading athletics has been a priority for Dr. Altenkirch since he was selected as the seventh President of NJIT in May 2002.

"As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university athletically with our academic peers," said Altenkirch. "It will also enable us to recruit the best and brightest student-athletes, improve athletics facilities available to the entire NJIT community, gain regional and national visibility, and build strong linkages with students that will carry over to their days as alumni."

Moving to Division I has allowed NJIT student-athletes to test themselves in competition against their peers from all over the country, including competition against teams from the nation's best conferences.

Along the way, two NJIT opponents (Maryland men's soccer in 2005 and Penn State men's volleyball in 2008) have faced the Highlanders in the regular season and then gone on to win their respective national championship.

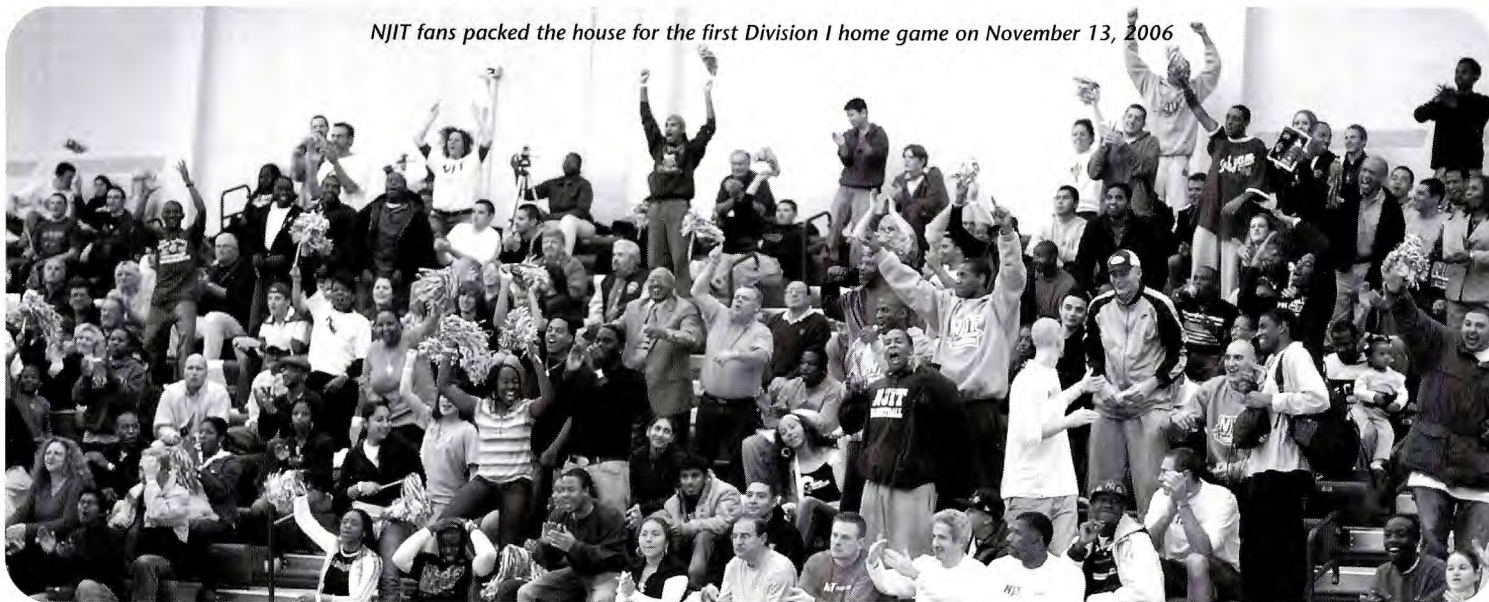

Great West

NJIT's basketball teams begin 2009-10 competition as part of the expanded multi-sport Great West Conference.

Member schools are spread over seven states and four time zones, giving each school added exposure in new destinations. The conference, which began as a football-only league, took a giant leap in the collegiate athletic world with expansion to include several additional sports and new members.

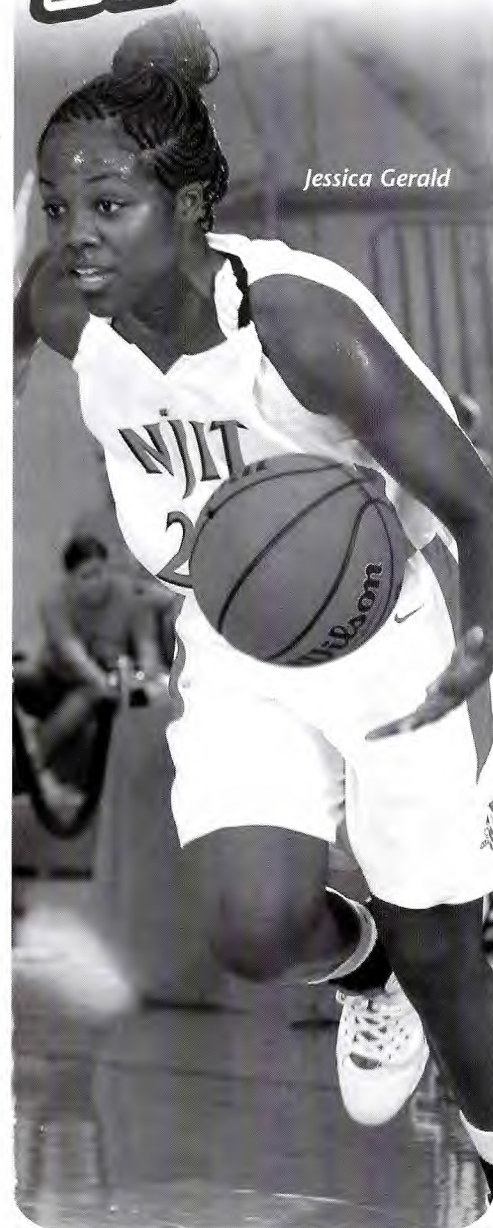
Joining the league on July 10, 2008 were: Houston Baptist, NJIT, North Dakota, South Dakota, Texas-Pan American and Utah Valley. Chicago State accepted the league's invitation to join in October 2008. These seven schools joined football-only members Cal Poly, UC Davis and Southern Utah.

As the conference began planning for multi-team sport competition in 2009-10, several teams were added in the sports of women's soccer and baseball to help provide a more diverse and competitive field. Delaware State, Howard and South Carolina State joined as associate members in women's soccer. Northern Colorado and New York Institute of Technology joined as associate members in baseball. Seattle was added as an associate member in cross country and track and field in 2009.

NJIT, Texas-Pan American and Utah Valley have been playing each other in multiple sports, including home-and-home games in men's and women's basketball, since NJIT began Division I competition for the first time in 2006-07.

NJIT and Utah Valley completed their NCAA reclassification and became active championship-eligible members of NCAA Division I on September 1, 2009. Houston Baptist announced an agreement with the NCAA that can make HBU an active member of Division I in 2011-12 and North Dakota and South Dakota will be active members of Division I in 2012-13. Texas-Pan American and Chicago State have been active Division I programs for many years.

The expanded conference is not an automatic NCAA Division I championship postseason qualifier, but will offer the benefit of conference championship competition, stable scheduling opportunities and individual recognition for student-athletes through weekly and season all-conference recognition.

Utah Valley will host the inaugural 2010 Great West Conference women's basketball postseason tournament from March 10 and 13 in the McKay Events Center on Utah Valley's campus in Orem, Utah. The men's championship tournament will take place simultaneously at Utah Valley, as well.

The governance of the Great West Conference remains primarily with the member institutions. Each member institution is represented on the President's Council by its respective CEO. The general operations and management of the Conference will be conducted by the Directors of Athletics and Senior Woman Administrators (Joint Council). Scheduling of contests, assignment of officials and certain media relations functions remain with member institutions.

NJIT's sports that do not come under the Great West umbrella will continue in their existing conferences—men's soccer in the Atlantic Soccer Conference and men's volleyball in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association, which has an automatic NCAA postseason berth, which was claimed in 2008 by eventual national champion Penn State.

In addition, NJIT will continue competition against top non-conference regional and national opponents. Two NJIT opponents—Maryland in men's soccer and Penn State in men's volleyball, have won national championships following seasons in which they faced the Highlanders. Meanwhile, NJIT teams will compete regularly with opponents from the Atlantic Coast, Atlantic 10, America East, Big East, Ivy League, Patriot League, MAAC and Northeast Conference.
