JANUSZ MLYNEK Co-Head Coach

Janusz Mlynek begins his first season as co-head coach of NJIT's co-ed fencing team.

Mlynek is a senior coach at the Polish-American Fencing School in Elizabeth, New Jersey. His students claimed five medals at the 2001 North American Cup. He has previous collegiate experience as an assistant at Jean de Brebeuf College in Montreal.

As a participant, Mlynek was a two-time silver-medalist at Poland's national championships. More recently, he won three consecutive gold medals in 1995-97 at the Garden State Games.

Mlynek has a master of arts degree from Krakow Academy of Physical Education in Krakow, Poland. He resides in Elizabeth.

WITOLD RAK Co-Head Coach

Exercise physiologist Witold Rak takes another turn at collegiate coaching by coming to NJIT.

Rak has contributed greatly to exposing fencing to inner-city youth in New York City through the Sports & Arts Foundation. He is the founder/director of the Woodside Fencing Center in Queens, and the co-founder/director of the East Harlem International Fencing Club. In both positions, he prepares grassroots fencing programs for children and adults.

Rak fenced at Eastern Military Academy in Huntington, New York, before starting for the varsity at St. John's University in 1970. He earned a bachelor's degree from New York Institute of Technology, a master of science in exercise physiology from Queens (N.Y.) College, and a Physicum from Hannover Medical College in Hannover, Germany.

Rak spent eight years competing internationally in northern Germany. He has taught fencing at the TKH Club in Hannover and at Queens College. Rak was on the FIE staff at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games and a production assistant at the 1996 Atlanta Games.

Rak has previous collegiate coaching experience at SUNY-Purchase, and has also coached in the Empire State Games. He aims to continue original fencing research studies at NJIT.

ATHLETICS FACILITIES

The NJIT co-ed fencing team practices in the Fleisher Multi-Purpose Room. The room is equipped with the latest in electrical strips and speed targets.

Additionally, the team has access to all of the facilities in the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center. These include the Fleisher fitness center and weight room, four racquetball courts, a martial arts center, an aerobics/dance studio, and four lighted outdoor hardcourt tennis courts.

The Highlanders' men's and women's basketball and volleyball teams play at Entwisle Gymnasium, the main gym in the athletic center. Entwisle, which can entertain crowds of up to 1,500, is also open to the campus community during selected hours for recreation.

Lubetkin Field, a lighted, natural grass facility adjacent to the athletic center, is home to the Highlanders' baseball and men's and women's soccer teams. It contains a midfield scoreboard and pressbox facilities, and its bleacher seating can hold approximately 1,000 spectators.

The six-lane pool on the first floor of the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center also hosts the NJIT men's and women's swimming teams. It is staffed by certified lifeguards for recreational swimming. The Hazell Student Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.

The above facilities are also used for physical education classes, club sports and intramurals. Club offerings include bowling, cricket, golf, judo, lacrosse and wrestling.

UNIVERSITY INFORMATION



New Jersey Institute of Technology is a public research university enrolling over 8,800 bachelor's, master's and doctoral students in 80 degree programs through its six colleges: Newark College of Engineering, New Jersey School of Architecture, College of Science and Liberal Arts, School of Management, Albert Dorman Honors College, and College of Computing Sciences. Research initiatives include manufacturing, microelectronics, multimedia, transportation, computer science, solar astrophysics, environmental engineering and science, and architecture and building science.

NJIT history spans from the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age. Newark was a factory town when the tuition-free evening school was founded in 1881 to support local industries. The first 90 students studied algebra, geometry, trigonometry, chemistry, physics and drawing. From

those early days, science and technology have been the engines fueling the university's development.

Today, continuing a fourfold mission of instruction, research, economic development and and public service, NJIT is among the leading comprehensive technological universities in the nation. Yahoo! Internet Life magazine has perennially named NJIT a "most-wired" university in its annual rankings. The school received Carnegie Foundation designation
