NJIT is New Jersey's Science & Technology University. With roots going back to 1881, when it was founded as Newark Technical School, New Jersey Institute of Technology observed its 125th anniversary in 2006.

Located in University Heights, Newark, New Jersey, home to more than 30,000 college students, NJIT's campus is just 10 miles from New York City.

Playing a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future, NJIT, as a major public technological university, is an important pipeline for the flow of technology into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university helps to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$83 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities on the 45-acre campus, including biomedical engineering labs and a campus center.

Instructional Programs

NJIT offers 96 degree programs — 36 undergraduate, 41 master's and 19 doctoral programs — through six schools:

NJIT has 416 full-time faculty; more than 98 percent of whom hold the highest degree in their fie0 than 5,300 undergraduate students and more than 2,800 graduate students. Our students hail from 33 states and more than 100 countries to rank eighth in the nation for diversity.

Albert Dorman Honors College enrolls more than 500 students who take advantage of honors courses, research opportunities, advising and mentoring. Honors College students have SAT scores ranking in the top 10 percent nationally. With more than 44,000 alumni, NJIT is rated by US News and World Report as a top-tier national research university offering bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees.

Research

NJIT drew more than \$75 million in research funding in 2005 and faculty members welcome student collaboration on research projects.

Economic Development

NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies. NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element, together with instruction, research and community service. More than 60 technology start-up companies, many of which hire NJIT students, are on campus.



The Career Edge

All 10 of the majors with the highest starting salaries for 2005-06 grads are in engineering, computing and business, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers.

Computer and data processing services lead the list of the 10 fastest-growing occupations in projections compiled by the US Department of Labor. Computer-related employment is expected to grow 117 percent by 2008, according to the Career Guide to Industries.

As technology changes all fields, those with science and technology backgrounds are positioned to lead. Among the CEOs of the S&P 500 companies, engineering is the single largest undergraduate degree and more than half of CEOs have undergraduate degrees in engineering, business management, science, math and computing.

The Global Edge

The diversity in NJIT's student body and faculty prepares graduates to understand and succeed in the global marketplace. NJIT was named among the world's top 500 universities in a study by the Institute of Higher Education, Shanghai Jiao Tong University.

The Technology Edge

NJIT has been designated one of the nation's most technologically sophisticated universities by Forbes.com and a Princeton Review survey and the university has received major funding from the National Science Foundation and the National Security Agency in recent years.

The Academic Edge

NJIT has long been a national leader in applying new technologies and approaches to the educational experience. NJIT was a pioneer in requiring computer science for students in all majors and the School of Architecture has led innovations in teaching CAD and digital design. The school's innovative "paperless" first-year program was recently cited by Campus Technology Magazine.

Students have a wide range of educational choices in building an interest-tailored program. Among their options are cross-enrolling at neighboring Rutgers to enrich their program with subjects such as music and languages.



NJIT students learn emerging technologies from the researchers behind the technologies, developing valuable marketplace skills. Realworld experience through experiential learning makes graduates more marketable, with many co-op opportunities leading to permanent jobs.

The Regional Edge

New Jersey, with America's highest concentration of pharmaceutical, hi-tech, biotech, and medical device companies is the place to study technology. It has the nation's highest per capita number of engineers and scientists as residents, while also leading in per capita rate of patents issued. Further, the Newark-New York region is a living laboratory for architecture and building sciences, environmental engineering and transportation.

The Research Edge

NJIT has been designated by the State of New Jersey as the Homeland Security Technology Systems Center and NJIT operates the world-renowned Big Bear Solar Observatory.

A History of NJIT

From the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age, New Jersey Institute of Technology has a rich history with its beginnings developing from the industrial age.

In 1881, an act of the New Jersey State Legislature, recognizing an urgent need, sought a home for what would be the state's technical school. The efforts of Newark's public and private sectors resulted with the opening of Newark Technical School, addressing the state's need.

Over time, the university expanded its curriculum and mission. In 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By the middle of the 20th century, Newark Technical School was transformed into the robust Newark College of Engineering.

The post-war period was one of enormous activity with regular expansion of the campus, as well as the introduction of doctoral level programs. In 1975, with the addition of the New Jersey School of Architecture, the institution had evolved into a technological university, emphasizing a broad range of degrees and dedication to significant research and public service. Newark College of Engineering, stronger than ever, remained intact, but a new university name - New Jersey Institute of Technology - reflected the institution's expanded mission.

A broadened mission called for the creation of a residential campus and the opening of NJIT's first dormitory in 1980 began a period of steady growth that continues. Two new schools were established during the 1980s the College of Science and Liberal Arts (1982) and the School of Industrial Management (1988). The Albert Dorman Honors College was established in 1994, and the newest school, the College of Computing Sciences, was created in 2001.



Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch President

Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch, formerly vice president for research at Mississippi State University (MSU), joined NJIT as the university's seventh president in July 2002. During his tenure as MSU vice president for research, science and engineering, expenditures as reported to National Science Foundation (NSF) increased dramatically—75% from 1997 to 2001.

Prior to his appointment as vice president at MSU, Altenkirch served as professor of mechanical and materials engineering and dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture at Washington State University. From 1988 to 1995, he was professor of mechanical engineering and dean of the College of Engineering at MSU. He also served as professor and chair of mechanical engineering at the University of Kentucky.

In addition to the research program, his responsibilities encompassed congressional relations, intellectual property management and economic development. While dean of engineering at MSU, he led the effort to secure National Science Foundation funding for the establishment of the MSU NSF Engineering Research Center for Computational Field Simulation in 1990. Additionally, the Center was instrumental in helping the State of Mississippi attract a \$1 billion Nissan manufacturing plant.

Altenkirch holds a PhD from Purdue University, an MS from the University of California, Berkeley, and a BSME from Purdue, all in mechanical engineering. He is the author of over 50 publications and nearly 100 presentations in combustion and heat transfer and served as principal investigator for ten Space Shuttle experiments investigating the spread of fire in reduced gravity. He is a Fellow of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.



Dr. Joel Bloom Vice President of Academic and Student Services

Dr. Joel Bloom has worked at NJIT since July 1990. In his current position, he is responsible for nine divisions of the university, including Physical Education and Athletics.

Dr. Bloom is also Dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College, which enrolls more than 525 students who are typically in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class.

Prior to NJIT, Dr. Bloom spent seven years as assistant Commissioner in the New Jersey Department of Education. He is currently the Chair of the NASULGC Council of Chief Student Affairs Officers and the Newark Consortium Board for Pre-College Education. Dr. Bloom earned his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees from Hunter College, and holds a Master's and Doctorate from Columbia University Teachers College.



Lenny Kaplan Director of Athletics

Since taking over as head of NJIT's division of physical education and athletics in August 2000, Lenny Kaplan was instrumental in establishing a sound NCAA Division II program, setting the stage for the reclassification into NCAA Division I.

Kaplan helped solidify and expand an NJIT program that was entering its fourth year in Division II when he arrived in Newark and in late 2002, after discussions with university President Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch and Vice President Dr. Joel Bloom, Kaplan began the task of steering NJIT's programs into Division I, a process that is set to reach fruition with full championship eligibility in 2009-10.

Along the way, NJIT has enhanced the athletics program, particularly in areas that will benefit the student-athletes directly.

The sports offerings have expanded to 19 varsity sports, and since 2004, NJIT has renovated its two main on-campus venues—Lubetkin Field and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center. The school also signed a 10year partnership to play its home baseball in the Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and agreed to host basketball in the new home of the NHL's New Jersey Devils.

In 2005-06, NJIT's outstanding home facilities allowed it to host two ECAC Division II postseason championships—women's soccer in the fall and baseball in the spring.

Under Kaplan's leadership, many teams achieved regional and national Division II ranking. Success for several women's teams was unprecedented, with basketball, tennis and soccer all reaching postseason play for the first time.

Additionally, men's volleyball captured a 2007 divisional championship in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association.

Before coming to NJIT, Lenny Kaplan served 11 years at Manhattan College, where he began as Manhattan's director of operations and then advanced to assistant athletics director.

Kaplan, a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration, resides in Merrick, NY, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.



Sports Medicine

NJITs sports medicine is moving forward with expanded facilities and a staff of three full-



time trainers led by head trainer Roger Olean, MEd/ATC, with assistant trainers Michael Douglas, MS/ATC, and Matt Koscs, MS/ATC. They work with team physicians Louis Rizio, MD, and Rutvik (Rudy) Patel, DO.

Roger Olean

Olean, an intercollegiate athletic trainer since 1992, returned in the summer of 2008 to NJIT, where he was head trainer from 2000-05.

Olean, who earned his bachelor's degree from Slippery Rock (PA) University in 1991 and his master's degree from Springfield (MA) College in 1998, has served on the training staffs at four colleges and three high schools.

He began his career at Hood College in 1992 and also worked on the Springfield College staff while pursuing his master's. After his first tour with the Highlanders, he spent two years at SUNY Cobleskill. Olean also worked at three high schools.

Douglas, a Newark native,

trainer/director of basketball operations for the NBA Development League Albuquerque Thunderbirds. Combining those stops with a multi-year stint as assistant trainer with the then-Memphis Grizzlies, Douglas is the only athletic trainer to serve teams in all three leagues that fall under the NBA umbrella.

At the collegiate level, he was head athletic trainer at Palm Beach Atlantic and at Spelman and was a graduate assistant trainer at Morehouse College in Atlanta.

Douglas has been a summer assistant trainer with the NFL Buffalo Bills and was head trainer of the Richmond (VA) Rhythm pro basketball team. He earned his bachelor's degree from Morehouse and his master's degree from Life University School of Graduate Studies in Georgia.

Matt Koscs, who earned both his bachelor's (2005) and master's (2008) degrees from the

came to NJIT in July 2008. As an undergrad, he was recipient of the Paris Delligatti Memorial Award for Excellence in Athletic Training.

University of Delaware,

Prior to NJIT, he served three years as head trainer

at Hodgson Vocational Technical High School in Newark, DE. He was head trainer for the Delaware Dynasty semi-pro soccer team, as well as with the Kirkwood Soccer Club and was employed at Christiana Care Physical Therapy Plus, in Newark, DE, where he was an athletic trainer and Director of Athletic Training Services in a clinical setting.

Dr. Rizio is a board certified orthopedic surgeon and is fellowship trained in the field of sports medicine. He is a graduate of Rutgers and after earning his medical degree from the UMDNJ/New Jersey Medical School, Dr. Rizio completed his orthopedic residency at Tufts University in Boston.

He then completed a sports medicine fellowship at the University of Miami. During his fellowship, he was assistant team physician of the Miami Dolphins, the Miami Hurricanes and the Florida Marlins.

Dr. Rizio, who specializes in sports-related injuries, practices at the New Jersey Sports Medicine Institute. Prior to starting his own practice, Dr Rizio was the Chief of Sports Medicine at the NJ Medical School from 2000-2005.

Dr. Patel practices in association with Dr. Rizio. A cum laude graduate of NYIT, Dr. Patel earned his DO from the New York College of Osteopathic Medicine. He was chief resident in Family Medicine at the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School in New Brunswick, NJ, from 2003 to 2006.

Academic Enrichment

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment (CAPE) added a new component with the hiring in 2007 of Erika Rigby McCourt, whose position as Associate Director of CAPE was created for the specific purpose of serving the needs of NJIT's student-athletes.

She focuses on five key areas: academic support, career development, personal development, leadership and community service including the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and CHAMPS Life Skills for NJIT's nearly 300 student-athletes.

In 2008, NJIT will add an eligibility certification officer/academic advisor, who will work with Rigby McCourt under her supervision.

Erika Rigby McCourt came to NJIT from Seton Hall University, where she was Associate Director of Academic Support



Services for the Pirates athletic program from 2004 until she left for NJIT. At Seton Hall, she worked directly with men's basketball, women's soccer, women's volleyball and swimming, assisting in class scheduling, tests and tutoring sessions.

The Jersey City, NJ, native is working with her fourth Division I program in a career that began in 1997 at Northern Arizona, where she was director of the Academic Enrichment Program. She returned home, serving as Academic/Athletic Coordinator at Saint Peter's College, where she was responsible for the academic progress of over 300 studentathletes in 20 sports, from 1999 to 2004.

Rigby McCourt graduated from Providence College, where she was an intercollegiate runner who earned Big East Conference all-academic honors. She earned master's degrees from Northern Arizona and from Saint Peter's and she is pursuing her doctorate in higher education at Seton Hall.

A member of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletes, she is on the NCAA Initial Eligibility Waiver Committee. She also previously worked in the office of former United States Senator Bill Bradley of New Jersey.

Erika married Robert McCourt, the head men's soccer coach at Monmouth University, in May 2008 and they reside in Oakhurst, NJ.

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment, headed by Dr. Marybeth Boger, is a resource available to all students within NJIT's Student Services Division. The CAPE provides academic support services and activities to enhance students' academic and professional development and it works with academic and administrative departments to help students develop the necessary analytical and problem-solving skills to become independent learners.

CAPE provides tutoring, student success workshops and testing accommodations. Blazing the trail for the rest of the New Jersey Institute of Technology athletic program, men's soccer marked its first season as a full member of NCAA Division I in 2005.

That means the Highlanders are eligible for postseason championship play at the highest level of the college game and they will chase a berth in the NCAA Men's College Cup field.



Having obtained full Division I status, men's soccer is at the vanguard of NJIT's overall athletic reclassification. The men's journey to the top level began in 2003, under the NCAA's two-year single-sport per gender reclassification process. Highlanders women's soccer began a similar two-year process in 2005, with full Division I status and championship eligibility arriving in 2007.

Also in 2005, the NCAA gave NJIT the green light to reclassify the remainder of its athletics program to Division I from Division II, a fouryear process that will bring all Highlander sports to Division I championship eligibility in 2009-10.

The move for men's soccer advanced quickly after November 2002 discussions among President Robert A. Altenkirch, Vice President Joel Bloom and Athletics Director Lenny Kaplan. From there, came a proposal from Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I. In rapid succession, the Atlantic Soccer Conference accepted NJIT as a member, Newark product Pedro Lopes, who had made his name as a star player and then assistant coach at Rutgers, was named head coach of the Highlanders and the NCAA received and accepted NJIT's formal application for reclassification.

Less than a year after those first discussions, NJIT, in September 2003, was in its first season of reclassification. The process continued into 2004, with all of the necessary compliance, including a schedule comprised exclusively of Division I opponents.

Off the field, enhanced scholarship and operating budgets enabled Lopes, who spent more than a decade in the national-level program at Rutgers, to strengthen the Highlanders. Before the 2004 season, assistant coach Javier Velasco gained full-time status and Lubetkin Field added a SprinTurf artificial surface to go with lighting and seating for more than 1,000 spectators, making for a first-class home facility.

NJIT's arrival in college soccer's big-time was underlined in 2005 when the Highlanders took on eventual Division I national champion Maryland. In addition to the champion Terrapins, NJIT has played numerous other top teams. In 2005, the Highlanders played a tie against Stony Brook, which later posted a win in the NCAAs.

"NJIT, by what it has done with our program, has shown every prospective student-athlete that it wants its student-athletes to experience college athletics and academics at the highest level," said Lopes.

Upgrading athletics has been a priority for Dr. Altenkirch since he was selected as the seventh President of NJIT in May 2002.

"As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university athletically with our academic peers," said Altenkirch. "It will also enable us to recruit the best and brightest student-athletes, improve athletics facilities available to the entire NJIT community, gain regional and national visibility, and build strong linkages with students that will carry over to their days as alumni."

The NJIT men's soccer program has made 17 postseason appearances, including 1960, when the school, then called Newark College of Engineering, was NAIA national champion. Seventeen Highlanders have been named All-Americans and in 57 seasons, the team has 382 victories.







Pedro Lopes Head Coach

Newark product Pedro Lopes became NJIT's ninth men's soccer head coach in July 2003, having previously spent seven seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Rutgers.

Assisting longtime head coach Bob Reasso, Lopes was involved in every aspect of leading Rutgers' national-level program. At NJIT, he has tapped that experience in building the Highlanders.

Under Lopes' leadership, the Highlander program evolved to compete at the top level of the college game. Indeed, the 2005 Highlanders took on eventual NCAA Division I national champion Maryland just two years after competing in Division II during Lopes' first season at the helm.

The Highlanders achieved the greatest victory in the four-year Division I era, stunning San Diego State, 2-0, on September 7, 2007 in San Diego. The Aztecs came in ranked in the top 25 of two national polls (22 by Top Drawer Soccer and 23 by Soccer America and receiving votes in three others. San Diego State had finished second in the Pac 10 the season before.

With Lopes at the helm, NJIT men's soccer has been the vanguard of a transition that will see the entire athletic program advance to full membership in NCAA Division I —a level reached by men's soccer in 2005.

Under his steady hand, the growth of the Highlanders was apparent in 2005, as the team earned much-improved results, setting a school record with five ties, including one against Stony Brook, which would go on to win a game in the NCAA Division I College Cup championship field. Between 2004, NJIT's first season against Division I competition, and 2005, the Highlanders made dramatic strides, cutting their goals allowed total by more than half and also improving their offensive goals total. In 2006, the Highlanders again improved their season wins total from the previous year. On top of that, NJIT was 2-3-1 in league play, remaining in contention for the postseason Atlantic Soccer Conference tournament heading into the final weekend. At season's end, the Highlanders had improved their defensive stats again.

Building on the national-level win over San Diego State, NJIT qualified for conference postseason play at the Division I level for the first time, playing in the Atlantic Soccer Conference tournament semifinal, where the Highlanders lost, 1-0, to eventual champion Florida Atlantic.

Lopes began coaching as a volunteer assistant at Rutgers in 1995, and then spent one season with Centenary (NJ) College before returning to the Scarlet Knights as a full-time assistant coach. He is also the Coaching Director for the Jersey Knights Soccer Club.

An integral part of championship teams his whole life as a player, Lopes was an All-American at Rutgers in both 1993 and 1994 and a two-time recipient of the Bob McNulty Award as team Most Valuable Player. He played in four NCAA Tournaments, including two Final Four appearances, with a national runner-up finish in 1990.

He was Atlantic 10 Conference Player of the Year in 1994, when Rutgers advanced to the Final Four for the third time in five seasons. In all four of his seasons, the Scarlet Knights won the A-10 championship and appeared in the NCAA Tournament. Rutgers was the national runner-up in 1990. He scored the game-winning goal in the 1993 Atlantic 10 Championship game and started all 86 games in his collegiate career. Not surprisingly, he was inducted into the Rutgers Olympic Hall of Fame class of 2004.

Lopes was a member of the United States U-23 National Team in 1993 and 1994 and he later played professionally with the NJ Imperials. Before college, Lopes was a High School All-American and New Jersey Player of the Year at perennial national power St. Benedict's Prep in Newark.

Pedro and his wife, Heather, were married in June 2006 and they reside in North Brunswick, NJ, with their daughter, Estela Sofia McCloskey Lopes, who was born on October 19, 2007.



Javier Velasco Assistant Coach

Full-time assistant Javier Velasco joined the NJIT staff prior to the 2003 season and he assists head coach Pedro Lopes with all aspects of the program.

Prior to coaching at NJIT, he was head coach of boys soccer at Manville (NJ) High School in 2001 and was an assistant coach at Kinnelon (NJ) High the previous year. He also has extensive club experience, coaching with the Players Development Academy and the Jersey Knights Soccer Club.

As a player, Velasco was a member of Centenary (NJ) College's 1995 National Small College Athletic Association national championship team and was Most Valuable Player of the title game. Earlier, he played at Mercer County College, which reached its national championship game when he was there in 1994.

After playing at Kean University in 1996, Velasco embarked on a seven-year pro career, playing for teams in New Jersey in addition to one professional year in his native Ecuador. He remains active as a player in top Metropolitan area semi pro leagues.

As a youth, he won a U16 national title in 1989 in Ecuador, representing the State of Manabi.

Moving to the United States, he was all-state at North Brunswick (NJ) High School and he spent two years playing club soccer with the Union Lancers, where he won a U17 state title in 1992 and was an U18 state finalist the following year.

Velasco is a 2000 graduate of Kean, with a degree in management science, majoring in international business with a minor in Spanish.

He resides in Kearny, NJ, and was married in January 2008 to Alejandra, who is also from Ecuador.

men's soccer competition, NJIT has a veteran roster for the first time. Of the 29 players on the preseason roster, 15 have at least two years experience in the program and seven more have a full year at NJIT.

"What the seniors do is going to be very important for our program," said coach Pedro Lopes. "We're going to lean on them to show what Division I training is like and what you do to get ready for what an opponent is going to bring."

In the past, with little Division I experience, both as individuals and as a program, that lack of understanding was an elusive concept for the Highlanders.

NJIT's move, starting with the first Division I schedule in 2004, has been challenging. That first year, a team that would have been rebuilding at the Division II level, was also faced with a step up to Division I competition.

Having learned the hard lessons of 2004, the 2005 team, with a strong class of recruits (this year's seniors), showed immediately that things had changed. Opening 2005 at Boston University, which had advanced to the second round of the 2004 Division I College Cup, NJIT led for nearly 80 minutes before finally falling, 3-2, in overtime.

That 2005 season had another overtime loss and a school-record five double overtime ties and despite playing four matches against 2005 College Cup qualifiers, including eventual national champion Maryland, the Highlanders cut their goals against by more than half.

The 2006 season opened with promise, as NJIT set its Division I scoring high in a 5-0 win over lona in the first game and the Highlanders posted a new Division I season high for wins.

Last year, in the second game, NJIT scored what was unquestionably its most impressive win of the Division I. The Highlanders traveled to California and stunned San Diego State, which was ranked in the top 25 in two national polls, by a score of 2-0. The Aztecs, who had finished second in the Pac 10 the preceding season, went 7-1-1 over the next nine matches, including 3-0-1 against nationally ranked teams.

Unfortunately for the Highlanders, there would be no more eye popping wins in 2007, although they did qualify for conference postseason play for the first time in the Division I era, falling to eventual Atlantic Soccer Conference champion Florida Atlantic, 1-0, in the conference semifinal.

However, the San Diego State game, and a later loss at powerful Rutgers, revealed some of the possibilities that exist for NJIT if it can improve its ability to score.

Once they got past that first season of Division I competition in 2004, the Highlanders have settled in as a team that is competitive on the defensive end. Indeed, NJIT has held 38 opponents to two, or fewer, goals in regulation time in 51 games since the start of the 2005 season. No opponent has scored more than the four goals put home in 2005 by Maryland, the national champion-to-be.

Given the steady NJIT defense, there is little doubt that lack of scoring has been the biggest obstacle in NJIT's efforts to go from competitive to regular winner.

But it may not take a lot to tip the scales. In the upset win at San Diego State, NJIT got on the board in the 67th minute on a goal by Erik





Magnusson, held off a series of bids by the Aztecs and then sealed it with less than two minutes left when Magnusson connected again.

About a month later, the Highlanders scored on the first shot of the game against Rutgers and nursed the 1-0 lead into the 73rd minute. Unable to cash in a couple of excellent chances, the Highlanders were nipped on two late goals. Nonetheless, they looked like a better team against a top-quality team such as Rutgers than they often did playing from behind against lesser foes.

Searching for that little extra on offense, the Highlanders may have the correct formula, as they can finally field a team with multiple proven scoring threats.

In the past, opponents have worried about stopping one man. In 2005, the man was Eddie Romero, who scored five of the team's 14 goals. In 2006, no one scored more than two goals. In 2007, Magnusson scored six of the team's 12 goals.

Now, Romero and Magnusson should be on the field at both times, which should benefit them as individuals, not to mention the whole team.

Romero, the leading scorer in 2004 and 2005, left NJIT in 2006, before transferring back and sitting out 2007 at NJIT. Magnusson came to NJIT in 2006 and has been all-conference both of his seasons.

In addition to the two proven goal-getters, NJIT has Gustav Warfving, who is a threat in his own right and works extremely well in concert with his roommate, Eriksson. Veterans Osvaldo Perez, Kayo Emojong and Kevin Blanco also add skill and energy to the attack and rookie Chico Lugo is another player to watch, according to Lopes. "Chico can improve our wide position play. He can take people 1-v-1 and he gets up and down the field," said the coach.

Looking at the offense as a whole, Lopes is optimistic: "Attacking is something we know we have to improve, but we have a good returning core and Eddie (Romero) and Chico are two guys who can have an impact on the attack."

Emojong, a strong two-way player, took a larger role in the offense last year and he literally ran with it, using his speed and skill on the ball to set the pace in the middle of the field. Perez, a gifted dribbler, and Blanco, an all-out high energy player, bear watching, as well.

Still, NJIT isn't likely to bury anyone in a flurry of goals. For that reason, Lopes hasn't forgot-

ten about the other end of the field. "We gave up some soft goals last year and that's something we have to eliminate," said Lopes. "Playing defense for 90 minutes is something we haven't always done and it's going to be crucial for us this year."

Some of the team's most experienced players can be found on the defense. "Scott (Rietze), Rafa (Rafael Barrera) and Josh (Osit) are going to be difference-makers for us," said Lopes.

Osit, who played one season at UMBC, made his debut in 2006 and started 13 times, posting two shutouts. Last year he started 12 of the team's 17 games and notched two more shutouts. His likely backup is Ryan Sutherland, who redshirted in 2006 and 2007, but started four times in 2005, including NJIT's first-ever Division I win (2-0 vs. Manhattan on September 10).

Rietze and Barrera are both set to be four-year starters on the back line and Rietze is entering his third year as a team captain.

Another four-year regular, Dylan Broadley, who had been a fullback most of his college career, is set to move to the midfield, which is seen as a better position for him.

Another re-positioned player, sophomore Pat Amato, who played forward in 2007, figures to strengthen the defense, along with junior Michael Bento, who is hoping for a healthy junior season after illness cut short his rookie year and an ankle injury slowed him last year.

One player who isn't likely to move out of his role is junior Devon Newton, who, after a quiet freshman season, took over a starting job and never let go in 2007. He can be a defensive midfielder or a back. Alex Brito, a 2007 newcomer, also earned a regular call on defense and is right in the picture again this season, as is junior Patrick O'Driscoll.

Oshane Moodie, a sophomore, logged valuable playing time on defense as a freshman last year. He played in 14 games with 11 starts and his high school teammate, Brian Caine, saw action in 10 matches.

Veterans Quaison Carter, Marco Gaspar and Tom Dores will also compete for action and Dores will have the opportunity to suit up with his brother, Michael, a freshman.

Arto Altincatal and Tiago Rodrigues are returnees, while the remainder of the freshman class is Shmad Abu-Hakmeh, Chris Fawzy, Luis Granizo and Tito Nurudeen, all of whom completed their high school careers in New Jersey in 2007.



VTHLETICS FACILITIES

The New Jersey Institute of Technology soccer teams play their home games and practice on campus at Lubetkin Field, a first-class venue for college soccer.

Lubetkin Field, with two borders on the corner of Warren Street and Lock Street on the West end of NJIT's University Heights campus, is an all-weather facility, with 24/7 availability for competition or practice.

Outfitted with SprinTurf artificial grass in the summer of 2004, Lubetkin Field also includes lighting for night contests, bleacher seating for more than 1,000 spectators, a press box and scoreboard.

The fully-enclosed facility, with its entrance a few feet opposite the entrance of the indoor Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center, can take its place alongside any college soccer facility in the Northeast.

The home of Highlanders soccer was chosen as the venue when NJIT hosted the six-team, three-day 2005 ECAC Division II women's soccer championship tournament. In the fall of 2005, when the Northeast was hit with record rainfall, games went on without a hitch at Lubetkin Field, thanks to the quality of the surface. Indeed, with the rain disrupting schedules around the region, some crucial Big East contests involving Seton Hall were moved to Lubetkin Field. Those games, too, went off without a hitch.

The NJIT soccer teams also have full access to the facilities in the Fleisher Center. These include the fitness area (containing computercontrolled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units and an indoor track), a free-weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), a martial arts center and an aerobics dance studio.

The NJIT men's and women's basketball teams and men's and women's volleyball teams play their home games in the Fleisher Athletic Center gymnasium, which, in the summer of 2006, underwent renovation to include installation of a new floor and baskets, new lighting, new sound system and new scoreboards, along with entirely new seating for approximately 1,500 spectators after the first phase of renovation. The back bay 'C gym' can be sectioned off from the main competition floor, making the facility useful for intramurals, physical education classes and campus recreation time, while being able to host multiple simultaneous events.

A six-lane swimming pool in Fleisher Athletic Center is home to the NJIT men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads play on the four outdoor lighted tennis courts behind Fleisher Athletic Center. The NJIT Campus Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.


Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, opened in 1999 at a cost of \$30 million and with a seating capacity of 6,200, became the home of NJIT baseball in 2004. In a joint December 2005 press conference, New York Yankees manager Joe Torre was a featured speaker as NJIT and the Newark Bears announced a 10year partnership that cemented the downtown stadium as the home of all Highlanders home games for the decade to come.

NJIT, which offers a growing list of club sports, also has a robust intramural program, which makes use of the numerous athletic facilities. Each student must pass two physical education classes as a graduation requirement. Offerings include aerobics, archery, bowling, dance, fencing, golf, karate, swimming, skiing, strength training and conditioning, volleyball and water safety.

Adjacent to NJIT is the Newark campus of Rutgers University.



Each year the two universities co-sponsor a common season of theatrical productions, as well as 'World Week,' a joint program of honors colloquia, and a variety of other cultural and social activities.

Prudential Center

The new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils is in downtown Newark at the corner of Mulberry and Edison streets, about one mile from the NJIT's University Heights campus.

Opened in October 2007, 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of the city's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. In addition to the world's best hockey, it will be home to numerous entertainment and sporting events, including NJIT basketball. In 2007-08, NJIT hosted six basketball games there on four dates and there are plans to play more games in 2008-09 in North America's newest major arena.

The arena, with seating for 18,500 spectators, features a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as the latest in ice-surface technology and a gourmet restaurant overlooking the ice for Devils games. The building contains 850,000 square feet of space, 9,000 tons of steel, eight million pounds of structural steel and 25,000 cubic yards of concrete.

Red Bull Park

The Red Bulls of Major League Soccer and AEG New York broke ground in September 2006 for Red Bull Park, a 25,000-seat soccer stadium and a major component of the Harrison MetroCentre development, located across the Passaic River, about two miles from NJIT's campus.



The \$100 million 'soccer specific' stadium will feature a 360-degree European-style roof/ canopy covering the majority of the seating. When completed in the summer of 2008, Red Bull Park will be the home of the MLS Red Bulls, international soccer and other events. AEG developed and operates 'soccer specific' stadiums in California and in Illinois.

The multi-billion dollar Harrison MetroCentre will feature three million square feet of office space; 3,500 residential units; 300,000 square feet of retail space and over 10,000 decked parking spaces when completed.

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium





Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the professional baseball Newark Bears and since 2004 the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999. With a seating capacity of 6,200, "The Den" affords fans an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major leaguecaliber press box.

In December 2005, NJIT and the Bears held a joint press conference to herald a new partnership that includes a 10-year deal that extends Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium as the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball.

The Rich Highlanders Soccer Legacy

Hernan "Chico" Borja Spread NJIT's Name Around the Globe



Hernan Borja was an all-America soccer player in his career at New Jersey Institute of Technology from 1977 to 1980 under coach Mal Simon.

For more than a decade, he carried NJIT's name with him around the world as a professional player, first with the famed Cosmos of New York and then as one of the greatest indoor soccer players of his era.

From NJIT, the man known as 'Chico' would earn a spot on one of the world's most famous club teams, the Cosmos, as well as a regular spot on the United States National team throughout the 1980's and also a career as one of the greatest indoor soccer players in world history.

With apologies to the baseball Yankees, it's quite likely that when it came to worldwide recognition, the most famous US-based team in any sport in the 1970's and 1980's was the Cosmos of the North American Soccer League.

In addition to playing in front of crowds exceeding 70,000 at Giants Stadium, the Cosmos routinely drew sellout crowds during tours to four continents. The club home of alltime greats Pele and Franz Beckenbauer, the Cosmos lineup was studded with world-class stars from South America and Europe. Among the regular attendees at Cosmos home games were celebrities ranging from Mick Jagger to Henry Kissinger.

Hernan 'Chico' Borja stepped from the fields of NJIT into the Cosmos spotlight, playing regularly and frequently starting for the famed club in 1981, 1982 and 1984.

When the Cosmos and the NASL departed the scene, Borja stayed in North America, moving to the indoor game with the Major Indoor Soccer League, the top indoor circuit in North America until 1992. Borja was one of the greatest players in that league's 14-year history, finishing fourth all-time in assists (338) and eighth in total points (612).

His greatness as an indoor star was underscored in 1992, when FIFA, the world's governing body for all soccer, named him to its all-World Championship first team for futsal, FIFA's 5 v 5 official indoor game.

He remained active in the outdoor game and it was rare for the United States National Team to play a game without him in the lineup at any time during the 1980's. He was a starter in full international competition in 1982, 1983, 1984 (3 matches), 1985 (2 matches) and 1988 (4 matches).

Playing for Team USA, he scored goals in three different full international matches, first finding the back of the net in a 2-0 win over Haiti on April 8, 1983. He later scored one of the two US goals in a 2-1 win over Trinidad and Tobago on May 15, 1985, in a qualifying match for the 1986 World Cup. Finally, he scored the only goal for the United States in a 3-1 loss vs. Chile on June 3, 1988.

He remains active in soccer as a coach and two of his former players, Oshane Moodie and Brian Caine came north from Florida to NJIT, where they played as freshmen in 1970.

Chico was not alone in earning all-America honors for NJIT (NCE). Indeed, he is one of 10 players to receive the coveted recognition playing for the Highlanders.

NCE/NJIT All-Americans

Here is a brief look at the other nine all-Americans, with notes from their induction into the NJIT Hall of Fame:

Werner Zorn, 1960, 61



Werner Zorn, a soccer player from 1958-61, was Newark College of Engineering's first all-American and a key member of the 1960 NAIA national championship soccer team. NCE was NAIA national runner-up in 1961.

Alex Khowaylo, 1962



Alex Khowaylo, a soccer player from 1960-63 was an outstanding goalie for the soccer team at Newark College of Engineering from 1959 to 1962, including being named "all-America" and winning the NAIA national championship in 1960. NCE was NAIA national runner-up in 1961.

John Rapsomanikis, 1963



John Rapsomanikis, was a member of the men's soccer team from 1960-63.

Myron Worobec, 1964



Myron Worobec, was an outstanding soccer player at Newark College of Engineering from 1962-65. A prolific scorer he was named all-East, all-Area, all-America, a member of the U.S. Pan American team and a member of the U.S. Olympic team.

inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame for his outstanding contributions as a soccer player at Newark College of Engineering from 1964-66, including being selected two-time all-American, the region's Most Valuable Player, and team captain. Ali Hubey, 1969, 70, 71



Ali Hubey, a member of the 1969-71 men's soccer team was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame for his performance on the field which earned him all-American recognition for three consecutive seasons 1969, 1970, 1971. He was team MVP in 1970 and was named to the NJIT/NCE Centennial alltime soccer team.

Fabian Hurtado, 1971, 74 (HM)



Fabian Hurtado was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame as the holder of career scoring records with 65 goals and as first-team all-American in soccer in 1974. He was all-State and all-Area for three years and all-NAIA in 1973.

Joe Dias, 1975 (HM)



Joe Dias, a soccer player from 1973-76, his performance earned all-America honors in 1976 as well as all-Area and all-State in both 1975 and 1976, he finished with 34 career goals placing him third all-time.

Kenneth Hammond, 1977 (HM)



Kenny Hammond, was an outstanding soccer player from 1974-77. His team reached three NCAA Tournaments and had a combined record of 35-15-2. Among NJIT's top 10 all-time goal scorers, he earned Honorable Mention all-America honors in 1977 and went on to play three seasons of professional soccer.

Andrew Bakun, 1981



Andrew Bakun, was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame for his outstanding achievements as an athlete in soccer from 1978-81. A four-year starter, Bakun was a versatile performer. He played three positions during his career at NJIT, earning all-State honors as a sophomore and all-Area accolades his junior year. He earned the 16th all-American award in NCE/NJIT men's soccer history following his senior season of 1981. Bakun scored eight career goals.

Raymond Paulius, 1983



Ray Paulius played soccer at NJIT from 1980-83, during which time the Highlanders posted a combined record of 36-26-2. In 1983, he was honored as a first-team all-America and is one of two men in school history to earn first-team all-America recognition in NCAA Division III from National Soccer the Coaches Association of America. Paulius was a quad-captain and all-American his senior year. The team MVP in 1983, Ray was first-team all-State and all-Region honoree that year as the Highlanders advanced to the finals of the ECAC postseason tournament.

The Newark College of Engineering (NCE) soccer team became national champions on November 26, 1960. Not before and not since has any NCE/NJIT athletic team accomplished this feat.

The championship game of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) tournament was halted by darkness after 16 minutes, 45 seconds, of overtime play and NCE tied with Elizabethtown College, 2-2. The teams were declared co-national champions by the NAIA, and NCE had completed its first (and still only) undefeated season, 12-0-1.

Under the leadership of sixth-year head coach Mal Simon, the Highlanders swept through the 1960 regular season with a 10-0 record, outscoring their opponents by a combined 41-9, including four shutouts. They then won the NAIA Area #3 championship and advanced to the national semifi nals with a 2-1 victory against Pratt Institute.

NCE needed two overtimes to defeat Fitchburg State in the semis, and set up the championship meeting with Elizabethtown. The match, played at Slippery Rock State University, proceeded to the fourth extra period before being stopped. Sophomore Andy Handwerker and senior Gary Freimuth scored the Highlander goals. After the season, halfback Werner Zorn was named NCE's first All-American. Only a junior, Zorn repeated the honor in 1961. Zorn, Savicky and Handwerker were named all-area, while sophomore Alex Khowaylo was selected the outstanding NAIA goalkeeper.

Many members of the 1960 team were still a part of the Highlanders the following year, when NCE again completed the regular season undefeated. The Highlanders returned to the national championship game, but lost to Howard University, 3-2, on a goal with 18 seconds remaining in regulation. From 1960 to 1962, NCE amassed a three-year record of 26-2-1 (.914).

Notes: NCE changed affiliation from the NAIA to NCAA Division III in 1974. The university changed its name to NJIT in 1975. The Highlanders reclassified to Division II in 1997 and to Division I in 2004.



The Atlantic Soccer Conference has been the conference home for NJIT men's soccer since the program began Division I competition in 2004.

This year's conference lineup, in addition to NJIT, includes founding members Adelphi and Howard, plus Longwood and the newest member, Houston Baptist, which begins conference play in 2008.

The 2008 ASC postseason tournament will bring together all five conference teams, with the fourth and fifth seeds playing off on November 12 and the winner advancing to the four-team semifinals on November 14, with a champion being crown on November 16. This year's tournament will be hosted by Longwood University in Farmville, VA.

Established in 2000, the ASC was a perfect fit for NJIT men's soccer when the Highlanders made the move up to Division I. NJIT became eligible for the conference championship in 2005, the year Highlanders men's soccer became a full championship-eligible member of NCAA Division I.

In May 2003, NJIT was accepted as a new member and played a conference schedule in 2004, but was not eligible for conference postseason play until 2005.

The ASC was founded by nine institutions offering Division I men's soccer while holding various NCAA classifications in their other sports, or competing in conferences that did not sponsor men's soccer. The founding members were: Adelphi, Albany, Binghamton, Florida International, Hartwick, Howard, Oneonta State, Philadelphia and Stony Brook.

In 2002, the ASC became an automatic qualifier to the NCAA College Cup for the first time. Florida International claimed the ASC's first berth.

Albany and Stony Brook moved their entire athletic programs to the America East Conference after the 2000 season and Binghamton did the same in 2001. FIU later departed to Conference USA.

Also gone from among the founders are: Oneonta State and Philadelphia, which reclassified men's soccer to conform with their overall athletics programs (Oneonta, Division III; Philadelphia, Division II); and Hartwick, which is now an associate member of the Mid-American Conference.

Florida Atlantic competed in the ASC in 2006 and 2007 and won the conference championship in its second season.
