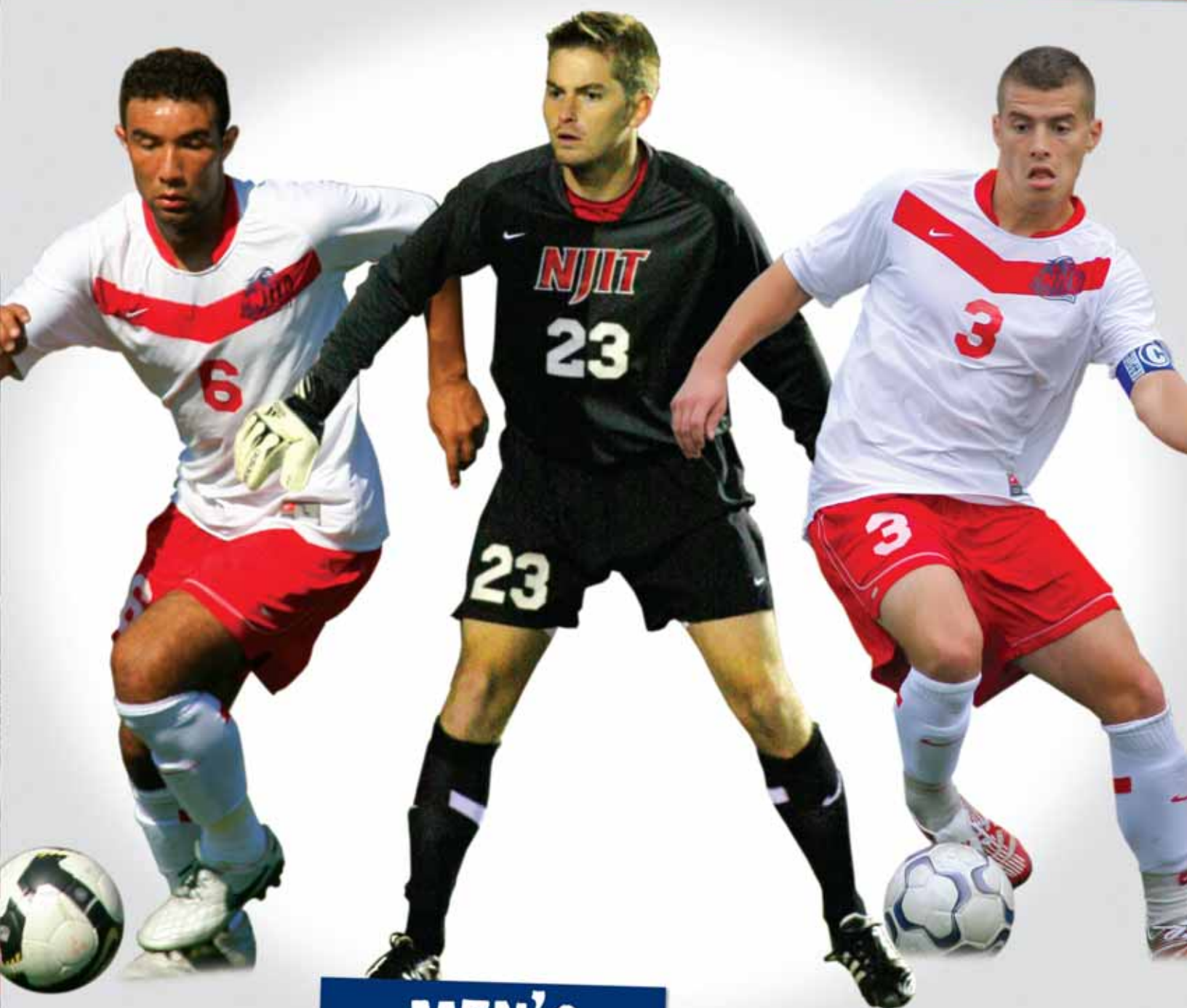

ABOUT NJIT

NJIT is New Jersey's Science & Technology University. With roots going back to 1881, when it was founded as Newark Technical School, New Jersey Institute of Technology observed its 125th anniversary in 2006.

Located in University Heights, Newark, NJ, home to more than 30,000 college students, NJIT's campus is just 10 miles from New York City.

Playing a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future, NJIT, as a major public technological university, is an important pipeline for the flow of technology into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university helps to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$83 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities on the 45-acre campus, including biomedical engineering labs and a campus center.

Instructional Programs

NJIT offers an ever-expanding array of educational programs, with eight new academic programs approved beginning in 2009-10, which comes after the addition of 14 new programs in 2008. As of 2009, NJIT lists 55 bachelor's degree majors, 53 master's degree programs and 19 doctoral programs — through six schools:

College of Architecture and Design
College of Science and Liberal Arts
School of Management
Albert Dorman Honors College
College of Computing Sciences

NJIT has 416 full-time faculty; more than 98 percent of whom hold the highest degree in their field. The student-faculty ratio is 13:1, with more than 5,300 undergraduate students and more than 2,800 graduate students. Our students hail from 33 states and more than 100 countries to rank eighth in the nation for diversity.

Albert Dorman Honors College enrolls more than 500 students who take advantage of honors courses, research opportunities, advising and mentoring.

Honors College students have SAT scores ranking in the top 10 percent nationally.

With more than 44,000 alumni, NJIT is rated by US News and World Report as a top-tier national research university offering bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees.

Research

NJIT drew more than \$75 million in research funding in 2005 and faculty members welcome student collaboration on research projects.

Economic Development

NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies. NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element, together with instruction, research and community service. More than 60 technology start-up companies, many of which hire NJIT students, are on campus.





The Career Edge

All 10 of the majors with the highest starting salaries for 2005-06 grads are in engineering, computing and business, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers.

Computer and data processing services lead the list of the 10 fastest-growing occupations in projections compiled by the US Department of Labor. Computer-related employment is expected to grow 117 percent by 2008, according to the Career Guide to Industries.

As technology changes all fields, those with science and technology backgrounds are positioned to lead. Among the CEOs of the S&P 500 companies, engineering is the single largest undergraduate degree and more than half of CEOs have undergraduate degrees in engineering, business management, science, math and computing.

The Global Edge

The diversity in NJIT's student body and faculty prepares graduates to understand and succeed in the global marketplace. NJIT was named among the world's top 500 universities in a study by the Institute of Higher Education, Shanghai Jiao Tong University.

The Technology Edge

NJIT has been designated one of the nation's most technologically sophisticated universities by Forbes.com and a Princeton Review survey and the university has received major funding from the National Science Foundation and the National Security Agency in recent years.

The Academic Edge

NJIT has long been a national leader in applying new technologies and approaches to the educational experience. NJIT was a pioneer in requiring computer science for students in all majors and the School of Architecture has led innovations in teaching CAD and digital design. The school's innovative "paperless" first-year program was recently cited by Campus Technology Magazine.

Students have a wide range of educational choices in building an interest-tailored program. Among their options are cross-enrolling at neighboring Rutgers to enrich their program with subjects such as music and languages.

NJIT students learn emerging technologies from the researchers behind the technologies, developing valuable marketplace skills. Real-world experience through experiential learning makes graduates more marketable, with many co-op opportunities leading to permanent jobs.

The Regional Edge

New Jersey, with America's highest concentration of pharmaceutical, hi-tech, biotech, and medical device companies is the place to study technology. It has the nation's highest per capita number of engineers and scientists as residents, while also leading in per capita rate of patents issued. Further, the Newark-New York region is a living laboratory for architecture and building sciences, environmental engineering and transportation.

The Research Edge

NJIT has been designated by the State of New Jersey as the Homeland Security Technology Systems Center and NJIT operates the world-renowned Big Bear Solar Observatory.

A History of NJIT

From the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age, New Jersey Institute of Technology has a rich history with its beginnings developing from the industrial age.

In 1881, an act of the New Jersey State Legislature, recognizing an urgent need, sought a home for what would be the state's technical school. The efforts of Newark's public and private sectors resulted with the opening of Newark Technical School, addressing the state's need.

Over time, the university expanded its curriculum and mission. In 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By the middle of the 20th century, Newark Technical School was transformed into the robust Newark College of Engineering.

The post-war period was one of enormous activity with regular expansion of the campus, as well as the introduction of doctoral level programs. In 1975, with the addition of the New Jersey School of Architecture, the institution had evolved into a technological university, emphasizing a broad range of degrees and dedication to significant research and public service. Newark College of Engineering, stronger than ever, remained intact, but a new university name — New Jersey Institute of Technology — reflected the institution's expanded mission.

A broadened mission called for the creation of a residential campus and the opening of NJIT's first dormitory in 1980 began a period of steady growth that continues. Two new schools were established during the 1980s—the College of Science and Liberal Arts (1982) and the School of Industrial Management (1988). The Albert Dorman Honors College was established in 1994, and the newest school, the College of Computing Sciences, was created in 2001. Beginning in 2009 the College of Architecture and Design was created to house the New Jersey School of Architecture and the new school of Art and Design.





ADMINISTRATION



Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch

President

Having joined NJIT as its seventh president in July 2002, Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch is leading the university in a period of multi-layered growth.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$80 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities, while also drawing similar dollars in annual research funding.

Under President Altenkirch, NJIT has expanded its course offerings, with 16 new degree programs added in the 2008-09 academic year alone, and 13 in various stages of development for implementation in the next two years..

Coinciding with the expansion is NJIT's transition from a smaller commuter campus to a larger institution with a larger resident student population. The incoming class of 2012 is the largest in the history of the school, and more than half the freshman class resides on campus.

Tied to that transition is Altenkirch's strong belief that the home institution in New Jersey's largest city needs to be residential and provide the experiences associated with a residential campus. At the same time, Altenkirch is committed to NJIT's involvement with the community in its home city of Newark.

Intercollegiate athletics fits those goals naturally and upgrading NJIT athletics has been a priority of Altenkirch's presidency going back to November 2002 meetings that led to NJIT's reclassification to NCAA Division I.

Adding a personal dimension to his support, Altenkirch, a multi-sport athlete in high school, freshman baseball player at Purdue University, and a former college soccer official, and his wife, Beth, are regular attendees at NJIT competitions, home and away.

Immediately before his selection as president of NJIT, Altenkirch was vice president for research at Mississippi State University (MSU), a position he held from 1998 to 2002.

Prior to his appointment as vice president at MSU, Altenkirch served as dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture at Washington State University (1995-98).

From 1988 to 1995, he was dean of the College of Engineering at MSU. He also served as professor and chair of mechanical engineering at the University of Kentucky (1975-88).

Altenkirch holds a PhD from Purdue University, an MS from the University of California, Berkeley, and a BS from Purdue, all in mechanical engineering.

He is the author of over 50 publications and nearly 100 presentations in combustion and heat transfer and served as principal investigator for 10 Space Shuttle experiments investigating the spread of fire in reduced gravity.

He is a fellow of the American Society of Engineers and in 2008 received the Ellis Island Medal of Honor.



Dr. Joel Bloom

Vice President for Academic and Student Services

Dr. Joel Bloom, who joined NJIT in July 1990, is responsible for eight divisions of the university, including physical education and athletics.

In 1998, Bloom was appointed the first dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College in addition to his vice president responsibilities. The honors college enrolls over 500 students, including residents of 15 states and several foreign countries. The combined average SAT score is over 1300 and freshmen typically have ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class. Honors College students maintain a grade point average higher than 3.5.

Prior to his arrival at NJIT, Dr. Bloom served seven years as assistant commissioner of the New Jersey Department of Education for the Division of General Academic Education. He was responsible for managing many of the education department's initiatives, over 300 grants and contracts, and a \$24 million budget.

Formerly a teacher and school administrator in New York City Public Schools, Dr. Bloom was also a director of research and instructor at Teacher's College, Columbia University.

He is chair of the Greater Newark Consortium for Pre-College Education and vice chair of the State Board for Communities and Schools. He serves further as a member of numerous boards at the state, regional and national levels and has received national and state education awards, as well as federal, foundation and corporate grant awards. He has published journal articles and presented papers on school improvement, curriculum development, college transition and student assessment.

Dr. Bloom holds a master's degree and a doctorate from Teacher's College, Columbia University. He also earned master's and bachelor's degrees from Hunter College of the City University of New York.



Lenny Kaplan

Director of Athletics

Since taking over as head of NJIT's division of physical education and athletics in August 2000, Lenny Kaplan has been instrumental in guiding NJIT's reclassification to NCAA Division I.

Kaplan helped stabilize and expand a program that was entering its fourth year in Division II when he arrived in Newark. In late 2002, after discussions with university President Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch and Vice President Dr. Joel Bloom, Kaplan took on the task of steering NJIT's programs into Division I, a process that reached fruition with the NCAA's granting active Division I status, with full championship eligibility effective September 1, 2009.

Throughout Kaplan's tenure, NJIT has enhanced the athletics program, particularly in areas that benefit the student-athletes directly.

The sports offerings have expanded to 19 varsity programs and since 2004, NJIT has renovated its two main on-campus venues—Mal Simon Stadium at Lubetkin Field and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center. The school also signed a 10-year partnership to play all home baseball in the professional Bears and Eagles



Riverfront Stadium and later agreed to host basketball in the new Prudential Center, downtown Newark home of the NHL's New Jersey Devils.

Under Kaplan's leadership, many teams achieved regional and national Division II ranking. Success for several women's teams was unprecedented, with basketball, tennis and soccer all reaching postseason play for the first time in his administration,

Additionally, men's volleyball captured a 2007 divisional championship in the Eastern Intercollegiate

Volleyball Association and the next year reached the EIVA playoff semifinals hosted by eventual 2008 national champion Penn State.

Kaplan guided the Highlanders toward further stability with membership in the newly-expanded all-sports Great West Conference, which will offer a conference home for 11 of NJIT's 19 varsity sports.

NJIT's outstanding home facilities will allow it to host conference championships in the Great West Conference and allowed it to host ECAC postseason

championships in 2005-06.

Before coming to NJIT, Lenny Kaplan served 11 years at Manhattan College, where he began as Manhattan's director of operations and was assistant athletics director from 1991-2000.

Kaplan, a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration, resides in Merrick, NY, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.

STUDENT-ATHLETE SUPPORT

Sports Medicine

NJIT sports medicine is moving forward with expanded facilities and a staff of three full-time trainers led by head trainer Matt Koscs, MS/ATC, with assistant trainers Paul Grayner, MEd/ATC, and Sandra Brendle, MSED/ATC. They work with team physicians Louis Rizio, MD, and Rutvik (Rudy) Patel, DO.

Matt Koscs, who earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Delaware, came to NJIT as an assistant trainer in July 2008 and moved up to the head trainer position a year later. As an undergrad, he was recipient of the Paris Delligatti Memorial Award for Excellence in Athletic Training.

Prior to NJIT, he served three years as head trainer at Hodgson Vocational Technical High School in Newark, DE. He also worked with soccer clubs in Delaware and was employed at Christiana Care Physical Therapy Plus, in Newark, DE.

Paul Grayner, who holds a bachelor's degree from Saint Leo College in Florida and a master's from American University in Washington, DC, has a diverse background in athletic training, having served at the college and professional levels, as well as in a fitness center setting. He joined the NJIT staff late in 2008.

From the mid-1970s to the mid-1980s, he was a trainer in the minor league systems of the New York Yankees and New York Mets and in 1984 he was assistant trainer with the Mets. He later worked with the Long Island Knights professional basketball team.

At the collegiate level, he was head trainer at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ from 1989 to 1998 and earlier worked as an assistant trainer at Hofstra, Adelphi and FDU.

Sandra Brendle, who joined the NJIT staff as an assistant trainer in the summer of 2009, earned her bachelor's degree, majoring in athletic training from Greensboro (NC) College in 2007. She earned her master's in athletic training at Old Dominion University in May 2009. At ODU, she worked with seven teams and was on the medical staff for the 2008 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Tournament first and second rounds. At Greensboro, she was 2006 Athletic Training Student of the Year and worked on the 2004 NCAA Division III Men's and Women's Soccer Championship tournament medical staff.

Dr. Rizio is a board certified orthopedic surgeon and is fellowship trained in the field of sports medicine. He is a graduate of Rutgers and after earning his medical degree from the UMDNJ/New Jersey Medical School, Dr. Rizio completed his orthopedic residency at Tufts University in Boston.

He then completed a sports medicine fellowship at the University of Miami and was assistant team physician of the Hurricanes, as well as the Miami Dolphins, the Miami Hurricanes.

Dr. Rizio practices at the New Jersey Sports Medicine Institute. Prior to starting his own practice, Dr Rizio was the Chief of Sports Medicine at the NJ Medical School from 2000-2005.

Dr. Patel practices in association with Dr. Rizio. A cum laude graduate of NYIT, Dr. Patel earned his DO from the New York College of Osteopathic Medicine. He was chief resident in Family Medicine at the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School in New Brunswick, NJ, from 2003 to 2006.

Strength and Conditioning

A formal strength and conditioning program is a key part of a Division I program, with an eye toward maximizing individual and team performance in competition. The strength and conditioning coach also works closely with the Athletic Training Staff in the areas of injury prevention and injury rehabilitation.

The 2008-09 season brought another dimension to NJIT athletics with the hiring of Dan Huff, CSCS, as the Highlanders' first full-time strength and conditioning coach. In addition to the hiring of a full-time coach to coordinate the strength and conditioning, NJIT renovated the weight rooms and purchased new equipment, with the area dedicated to use by the Highlander teams.

Huff previously served five years as strength and conditioning coordinator at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ, from 2003 to 2008, working with an 18-sport NCAA Division I program.

Huff was Sports Performance Director for Velocity Sports Performance in Wall, NJ, immediately before accepting his position at NJIT. He is a graduate of William Paterson University of New Jersey. He holds numerous certifications.

Academic Enrichment

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment (CAPE) added a new component with the 2007 hiring of Erika Rigby McCourt as Associate Director of CAPE in a position that was created for the specific purpose of serving the needs of NJIT's student-athletes.

Rigby McCourt will be leaving her post to focus more on raising her infant daughter and NJIT is in the process of filling the position, which focuses on five key areas: academic support, career development, personal development, leadership and community service including the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and CHAMPS Life Skills for NJIT's nearly 300 student-athletes.

In 2008-09, Tim Wuorinen moved over to CAPE as eligibility certification officer/academic advisor, after having spent the previous five-plus years working in the NJIT Department of Athletics as assistant athletic director and coordinator for compliance and student-athlete services.

Erika Rigby McCourt came to NJIT from Seton Hall University, where she was Associate Director of Academic Support Services for athletics from 2004 until she left for NJIT, which was her fourth Division I program in a career that began in 1997 at Northern Arizona, where she directed the Academic Enrichment Program. She later returned home to New Jersey, serving as Academic/Athletic Coordinator at Saint Peter's College from 1999 to 2004.

Tim Wuorinen was a compliance fellow with the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference and he has worked in the athletic offices of four colleges, including Western New England College, his undergraduate alma mater. In addition to his bachelor's degree from Western New England, he earned a master's degree from NJIT.

Tim and his wife, Tara, who is the academic/athletic coordinator at Saint Peter's College, reside in Aberdeen, NJ.

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment, headed by Dr. Marybeth Boger, is a resource available to all students within NJIT's Student Services Division. The CAPE provides academic support services and activities to enhance students' academic and professional development and it works with academic and administrative departments to help students develop the necessary analytical and problem-solving skills to become independent learners.

CAPE provides tutoring, student success workshops and testing accommodations.

NCAA DIVISION I

Blazing the trail for the rest of the New Jersey Institute of Technology athletic program, men's soccer marked its first season as a full member of NCAA Division I in 2005.

That means the Highlanders are eligible for postseason championship play at the highest level of the college game and they will chase a berth in the NCAA Men's College Cup field.

Having obtained active Division I status in 2005, men's soccer was at the vanguard of NJIT's overall athletic reclassification. The men's journey to the top level began in 2003, under the NCAA's two-year single-sport per gender reclassification process.

Highlanders women's soccer began a similar two-year process in 2005, with full Division I status and championship eligibility arriving in 2007. Under a longer process covering the overall program, the remainder of NJIT's 19 varsity sports became active members of Division I effective September 1, 2009.

The move for men's soccer advanced quickly after November 2002 discussions among President Robert A. Altenkirch, Vice President Joel Bloom and Athletics Director Lenny Kaplan. From there, came a proposal from Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I.

In rapid succession, the Atlantic Soccer Conference accepted NJIT as a member, Newark product Pedro Lopes, who had made his name as a star player and then assistant coach at Rutgers, was named head coach of the Highlanders and the NCAA received and accepted NJIT's formal application for reclassification.

Less than a year after those first discussions, NJIT, in September 2003, was in its first season of reclassification. The process continued into 2004, with all of the

necessary compliance, including a schedule comprised exclusively of Division I opponents.

Off the field, enhanced scholarship and operating budgets enabled Lopes, who spent more than a decade in the national-level program at Rutgers, to strengthen the Highlanders. Before the 2004 season, an assistant coach position gained full-time status and Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium at Lubetkin Field added a SprinTurf artificial surface to go with lighting and seating for more than 1,000 spectators, making for a first-class home facility.

NJIT's arrival in college soccer's big-time was underlined in 2005 when the Highlanders took on eventual Division I national champion Maryland. In addition to the champion Terrapins, NJIT has played numerous other top teams.

The Highlanders gained their first win against a Big East foe in 2008, defeating Rutgers a little more than a year after NJIT topped San Diego State for the program's first win over a Top 25-ranked team.

"NJIT, by what it has done with our program, has shown every prospective student-athlete that it wants its student-athletes to experience college athletics and academics at the highest level," said Lopes.

Upgrading athletics has been a priority for Dr. Altenkirch since he was selected as the seventh President of NJIT in May 2002.

"As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university athletically with our academic peers," said Altenkirch. "It will also enable us to recruit the best and brightest student-athletes, improve athletics facilities available to the entire NJIT community, gain regional and national visibility, and build strong

linkages with students that will carry over to their days as alumni."

"As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university athletically with our academic peers," said Altenkirch. "It will also enable us to recruit the best and brightest student-athletes, improve athletics facilities available to the entire NJIT community, gain regional and national visibility, and build strong linkages with students that will carry over to their days as alumni."

A key late benchmark in the Division I reclassification process for NJIT athletics came in the spring of 2009, with successful completion of the NCAA Division I certification self-study. An in-depth project that takes approximately one year to complete and involves an on-campus visit from a Peer Review team, Division I certification, renewable every 10 years, is required of all active Division I institutions.

"We completed a major milestone in demonstrating that we have the infrastructure in place and the commitment to compete at the highest levels, not only academically but now athletically as well," said the President.

With its place in Division I officially certified by the NCAA, NJIT is looking ahead to continued growth. That outlook is consistent with President Altenkirch's frequently expressed view that, "the transition to Division I is just that, a transition, a process rather than an event."

The NJIT men's soccer program has made 17 postseason appearances, including 1960, when the school, then called Newark College of Engineering, was NAIA national champion. Seventeen Highlanders have been named All-Americans and in 58 seasons the team has 388 victories.





COACHING STAFF



Pedro Lopes

Head Coach

Newark product Pedro Lopes became NJIT's ninth men's soccer head coach in July 2003, having previously spent seven seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Rutgers.

Assisting longtime head coach Bob Reasso, Lopes was involved in every aspect of leading Rutgers' national-level program. At NJIT, he has tapped that experience in building the Highlanders.

Under Lopes' leadership, the Highlander program evolved to compete at the top level of the college game. Indeed, the 2005 Highlanders took on eventual NCAA Division I national champion Maryland just two years after competing in Division II during Lopes' first season at the helm.

The Highlanders achieved the greatest victory in the five-year Division I era, stunning San Diego State, 2-0, on September 7, 2007 in San Diego. The Aztecs came in ranked in the top 25 of two national polls and had finished second in the Pac 10 the season before.

NJIT notched another landmark in 2008, a come-from-behind 2-1 win over Rutgers to secure the program's first-ever win over a Big East opponent in the Division I era.

Under his steady hand, the growth of the Highlanders was apparent in 2005, as the team earned much-improved results, setting a school record with five ties, including one against Stony Brook, which would go on to win a game in the NCAA Division I College Cup championship field.



In 2006, the Highlanders again improved their season wins total from the previous year. On top of that, NJIT remained in contention for the postseason Atlantic Soccer Conference tournament heading into the final weekend.

Building on the national-level win over San Diego State, NJIT qualified for conference postseason play at the Division I level for the first time in 2007, playing in the Atlantic Soccer Conference tournament semifinal.

In 2008, the Highlanders had the come-from-behind win over Rutgers and finished with a new school Division I high for wins, including their first-ever ASC postseason tournament win.

Lopes began coaching as a volunteer assistant at Rutgers in 1995, and then spent one season with Centenary (NJ) College before returning to the Scarlet Knights as a full-time assistant coach. He is also the Coaching Director for the Jersey Knights Soccer Club.

An integral part of championship teams his whole life as a player, Lopes was an All-American at Rutgers in both 1993 and 1994 and a two-time recipient of the Bob McNulty Award as team Most Valuable Player. He played in four NCAA Tournaments, including two Final Four appearances, with a national runner-up finish in 1990.

He was Atlantic 10 Conference Player of the Year in 1994, when Rutgers advanced to the Final Four for the third time in five seasons. In all four of his seasons, the Scarlet Knights won the A-10 championship. He scored the game-winning goal in the 1993 Atlantic 10 Championship game and started all 86 games in his collegiate career. Not surprisingly, he was inducted into the Rutgers Olympic Hall of Fame in 2004.

Lopes was a member of the United States U-23 National Team in 1993 and 1994 and he later played professionally with the NJ Imperials. Before college, Lopes was a high school All-American and New Jersey Player of the Year at perennial national power St. Benedict's Prep in Newark.

Pedro and his wife, Heather, were married in June 2006 and they reside in North Brunswick, NJ, with their daughter, Estela Sofia McCloskey Lopes, who was born on October 19, 2007.



Matt Friel

Assistant Coach

Matt Friel, who spent four seasons as an assistant coach at Monmouth University from 2004 to 2007, helping to build the Hawks into one of the top Division I programs in the East, joined the NJIT staff in June of 2009.

Friel, who played under Coach Robert McCourt on the New Jersey Stallions club team in 2000 and 2001, signed on as an assistant coach at Monmouth when McCourt became head coach there in 2004.

With a national RPI rank of 195 at the start, Monmouth became Northeast Conference regular season champion in the second season under McCourt and Friel. The Hawks added second and third straight regular season NEC crowns in 2006 and 2007 and advanced to the program's first NCAA Division I College Cup berth in 2006 and a first-ever weekly national ranking of 15th in October 2006.

Friel, who continued to play high level competitive soccer after college, went overseas to New Zealand in 2008, playing for Waikato FC that year and then for Auckland City FC in 2008-09.

In addition to his first club experience with the Stallions, Friel has played stateside for the Greenville Lions, Carolina Dynamo, and Brooklyn Italians. The Stallions, Dynamo and Italians all captured league championships with Friel in their respective lineups.

At Rutgers, where he graduated in 2000, he appeared in 51 matches (eight starts) in a four-year career that spanned the 1996 to 1999 seasons. He scored twice, including the game-winning tally against Big East foe Pittsburgh in 1997 and the third goal in a 3-3 draw against perennial national power Indiana, also in 1997.

His non-college coaching experience includes work in 2008 in the Waikato, New Zealand area, as well as with youth teams and programs in the United States, with two years in the New Jersey Olympic Development Program. He also does individual training.



Ryan Breznitzky

Assistant Coach

Captain of the 2008 Rutgers men's soccer team, Ryan Breznitzky will make a quick transition to college coaching as he joins the staff of NJIT head coach Pedro Lopes for the 2009 season.

Breznitzky saw his college playing career severely limited by a pair of injuries that kept him to action in one

game his last two years. In four years, he was in 24 games and started 16.

He had a stellar high school career, earning first-team all-New Jersey honors in each of his final two years at Scotch Plains High. He was also a two-time first-team all-East region selection and two-time Union County Player of the Year, plus being Central Jersey Player of the Year as a senior, when he notched 18 goals and 20 assists in leading his team to the state sectional crown.

In club soccer he was a member of the New Jersey State team and the US Regional team from 1998 to 2003.

He has coached with various club teams and was also credited with mentoring the younger Rutgers players when he was sidelined by injury in 2007 and 2008.

Oliver Harder

Volunteer Assistant Coach

With 16 years playing experience and Coach of the Year honors in his native New Zealand, Oliver Harder will take on his first United States college coaching assignment with the 2009 Highlanders.

He is a graduate of the New Zealand Institute of Technology with a bachelor of sport degree and his studies included a semester in the US at Virginia Tech in 2005. As a coach, he was Northland secondary schools Coach of the Year and was head coach of Lynfield High School at the age of 20.

As a player, he played in New Zealand's Northern Premier League for two teams as their first-team goalkeeper. He also played for two teams in New Zealand's highest league, the New Zealand Football Championship.

Since coming to New Jersey, he has worked with young players on travel teams at East Brunswick, South Brunswick, West Windsor, and Greater Flemington.

2009 OUTLOOK

NJIT men's soccer has five seasons of Division I competition under its belt and the most encouraging sustained run in that era came at the close of the 2008 season.

The early part of the season was filled with tantalizing, but ultimately frustrating, matches that included five one-goal losses and a tie.

Finally, on October 22, 2008, the Highlanders came from behind to defeat one of the top teams on their schedule, Rutgers, 2-1. That victory triggered a five-match stretch that saw NJIT enjoy a 3-1-1 record, including the program's first-ever Atlantic Soccer Conference tournament victory, a decisive 3-1 defeat of Howard.

The math was simple, but telling—in the 3-1-1 stretch NJIT netted a total of 10 goals compared to just seven combined in the first 14 contests. The 2008 Highlanders were 4-0 when they scored two goals or more and winless with just two ties in their other matches.

"The progress in our level of play has been significant from year-to-year," coach Pedro Lopes, who has led NJIT since 2003, asserted. "When we had a lot of ties (school-record five in 2005), we were barely holding on at the end of games. By last year we controlled the play in a lot of our games and we created a lot of scoring opportunities. But we need to get where we turn those opportunities into good shots that get past the goalkeeper."

Lopes is looking to combine a solid veteran core with a group of attack-minded newcomers. "The recruiting class was attack-minded and we have returnees who have good experience and understanding of what it takes to compete at this level," said the coach. "Training is more competitive and this group has the potential to be the most complete team we've had here."

Last year's top scorers were Erik Magnusson (11 points; 3 goals; 5 assists) and Eddie Romero (5 goals). Magnusson is back for his senior year, while Romero has graduated. Magnusson enters his final college season with nine career goals and seven assists. He is a three-time all-ASC honoree.

Seniors Osvaldo Perez (5 career goals; 2 in 2008) and Gustav Warfving (4 career goals), and sophomore Chico Lugo, who scored twice last year, are a trio of returnees who know their way to the goal.

All three have flashed impactful skills and are aiming for a stronger sustained impression. Perez has game-changing ability, both on the ball and with his shooting ability, while Warfving adds to the attack when he is on top of his game. Lugo, too, is a gifted player who had a period of adjustment to the physical aspect of Division I soccer.

Four 2009 signees figure to be integral parts of the team's offensive output. They are: midfielders Kevin Connolly (Scotland) and Jack McVey (Isle of Man) and forwards Pete Walker (England) and Rahim Stennett (Jamaica). The first three will be freshmen, while Stennett is a transfer from Cincinnati State Tech after having spent a redshirt year at national power Maryland.

Connolly adds speed to the NJIT attack as a wing midfielder or striker, while McVey is a true center midfielder who is adept on the attack and on defense. Walker is a non-stop competitor who will command the attention of opposing defenses. Stennett, at 6-2, 200, adds a physical presence up top that had been lacking.

Among the other 2009 newcomers, Nathan D'Aversa, a center midfielder who redshirted at Montclair State a year ago, was the second-leading scorer (21 goals) in West Jersey as a senior in 2007 at Hunterdon Central High and true freshman Daniel Correia was the top scorer (17 goals) on an Elizabeth (NJ) High School team that won its state sectional championship. Freshman Franco Gamero, out of nearby Kearny High, also built a reputation as a dangerous scorer in earning numerous honors, including second-team all-state.

Luis Granizo solidified NJIT's midfield as his freshman year progressed in 2008. "Luis is a solid, simple player," said Lopes. "I anticipate him being a force in the middle."

Other veteran midfielders include seniors Tom Does, Quaison Carter and Marco Gaspar, and junior Brian Caine. All have plenty of game action under their belts, with Does, who had an assist in 2008, having appeared in 44 career games. Tom's younger brother, Michael, a redshirt freshman, is back, as well. Chris Fawzy had an assist in four games last year as a freshman and Tiago Rodrigues appeared in two 2008 games.

Timothy Hojnacki and Nico Lue Young are a pair of transfers who joined the Highlanders for the Spring 2009 semester. Hojnacki, who can play midfield or in the back, spent 2008 as a redshirt at Saint Francis (PA), while Young, an all-Broward (FL) County player in high school, attended college in his native Florida, but did not play the sport. Other midfielders include walk-ons Papis Ciss, John-David Gutierrez, and Ismael Espada.

The defense, which has solid experience, sustained a blow when captain Devon Newton sustained a leg injury in a summer game. A first-team all-conference honoree and the only Highlander to start all 20 games in 2008, Newton will miss the entire 2009 season.

Scott Rietze, another captain, missed all of 2008 and is back. However, he was not at full strength when 2009 preseason practice opened. "Scott's health is going to be very important to our team," said Lopes of his fifth-year senior who was all-conference in 2007 and team co-MVP in 2006. "He gives us all a coach could ask for when he's on the field."

Senior Alex Brito, a first-team all-conference pick in 2008, is another defensive anchor. "He's an intelligent player who is someone who can help us anywhere," Lopes said.

Speedy junior Oshane Moodie, who has played in 30 career games, also owns quality game experience.

Michael Bento, who came to NJIT as someone who could become a regular right away, instead has had a series of illness and injury setbacks that have kept him off the field. He played in a combined 15 games his first two years and was out all of 2008. "He's fully healthy now and having him back will solidify our defense," said Lopes.

Another player Lopes is counting on is junior Pasquale Amato, who played out of position as a forward in the fall of 2007, but has been a steady defender since. "He's someone who can control the defensive area for the next couple of years," said the coach.

Freshman Trevor Nye, the only defender in the latest recruiting class, had a fine high school career at Hawthorne (NJ) Christian Academy and also gained quality experience at Red Bull Academy, which is affiliated with the MLS team of the same name. Walk-on Adisa Craig is on the depth chart.

Ryan Sutherland, a sixth-year student, was granted another year of eligibility on an NCAA waiver. He played in 2004 and 2005, but redshirted in 2006 and 2007, before returning in 2008.

The early portion of his career saw him lead the 2004 team in saves and record the program's first-ever Division I win in a 2-0 shutout of Manhattan on September 10, 2005. After missing two years, he was in goal for a 3-2 win at Manhattan on September 13, 2008, but did not become a regular starter until senior Josh Osit was injured and missed the rest of the 2008 season after playing eight games.

Sutherland then backstopped the Highlanders and compiled a 4-7-1 record with a solid 1.55 goals against average. He is the only goalkeeper on the NJIT roster who has seen college game action.

"Ryan's a true leader in back and he's done very well for us when he's gotten the chance," said Lopes.

Goalkeeping depth comes from hard-working junior Arto Altincatal and from walk-on Julian Lopez.

NJIT, which continues to compete in the five-team Atlantic Soccer Conference along with defending tournament champion Longwood, defending regular season champ Adelphi, Howard, and Houston Baptist, also features a fine non-conference schedule.

One of the highlights will be the third annual meeting with Rutgers, as well as games against teams from the Patriot League (Army, Bucknell, Lafayette, and Lehigh), Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (Iona, Manhattan, and Saint Peter's), and Northeast Conference (Fairleigh Dickinson, LIU, Monmouth, Quinnipiac, and St. Francis, NY), plus VMI.

ATHLETICS FACILITIES

The New Jersey Institute of Technology soccer teams play their home games and practice on campus at Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium, a first-class venue for college soccer.

The facility, with two borders on the corner of Warren Street and Lock Street on the West end of NJIT's University Heights campus, is an all-weather facility, with 24/7 availability for competition or practice.

Outfitted with SprinTurf artificial grass in the summer of 2004, Lubetkin Field also includes lighting for night contests, bleacher seating for more than 1,000 spectators, a press box and scoreboard.

The fully-enclosed facility, with its entrance a few feet opposite the entrance of the indoor Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center, can take its place alongside any college soccer facility in the Northeast.

The home of Highlanders soccer was chosen to serve as the host site for the first-ever Great West Conference women's soccer championship tournament in November 2009. Previously, NJIT hosted the three-day 2005 ECAC Division II women's soccer championship tournament.

In the fall of 2005, when the Northeast was hit with record rainfall, games went on without a hitch at Lubetkin Field, thanks to the quality of the surface. Indeed, with the rain disrupting schedules around the region, some crucial Big East contests involving Seton Hall were moved to Lubetkin Field. Those games, too, went off without a hitch.

The NJIT soccer teams also have full access to the facilities in the Fleisher Center. These include the fitness area (containing computer-controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units and an indoor track), a free-weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), a martial arts center and an aerobics dance studio.

The NJIT men's and women's basketball teams and men's and women's volleyball teams play their home games in the Fleisher Athletic Center gymnasium, which, in the summer of 2006, underwent renovation to include installation of a new floor and baskets, new lighting, new sound system and new scoreboards, along with entirely new seating for approximately 1,500 spectators after the first phase of renovation. The back bay 'C gym' can be sectioned off from the main competition floor, making the facility useful for intramurals, physical education classes and campus recreation time, while being able to host multiple simultaneous events.

A six-lane swimming pool in Fleisher Athletic Center is home to the NJIT men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads play on the four outdoor lighted tennis courts behind Fleisher Athletic Center. The NJIT Campus Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, opened in 1999 at a cost of \$30 million and with a seating capacity of 6,200, became the home of NJIT baseball in 2004. In a joint December 2005 press conference, New York Yankees manager Joe Torre was a featured speaker as NJIT and the Newark Bears announced a 10-year partnership that cemented the downtown stadium as the home of all Highlanders home games for the decade to come.

NJIT, which offers a growing list of club sports, also has a robust intramural program, which makes use of the numerous athletic facilities. Each student must pass two physical education classes as a graduation requirement. Offerings include aerobics, archery, bowling, dance, fencing, golf, karate, swimming, skiing, strength training and conditioning, volleyball and water safety.

HAPPENINGS IN & AROUND NEWARK

Prudential Center

The new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils is in downtown Newark at the corner of Mulberry and Edison streets, about one mile from the NJIT's University Heights campus.

Opened in October 2007, 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of the city's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. In addition to the world's best hockey, it is home to numerous entertainment and sporting events, including NJIT basketball. Indeed, NJIT hosted the first women's basketball game in the Prudential Center on January 15, 2008 (NJIT vs. Cornell).

NJIT played in the Rock in the inaugural year and plans are ongoing for the Highlanders to play games each year in North America's newest major arena.

The arena, with full-capacity seating for 18,500 spectators, features a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as the latest in ice-surface technology and a gourmet restaurant overlooking the ice for Devils games. The building contains 850,000 square feet of space, 9,000 tons of steel, eight million pounds of structural steel and 25,000 cubic yards of concrete.

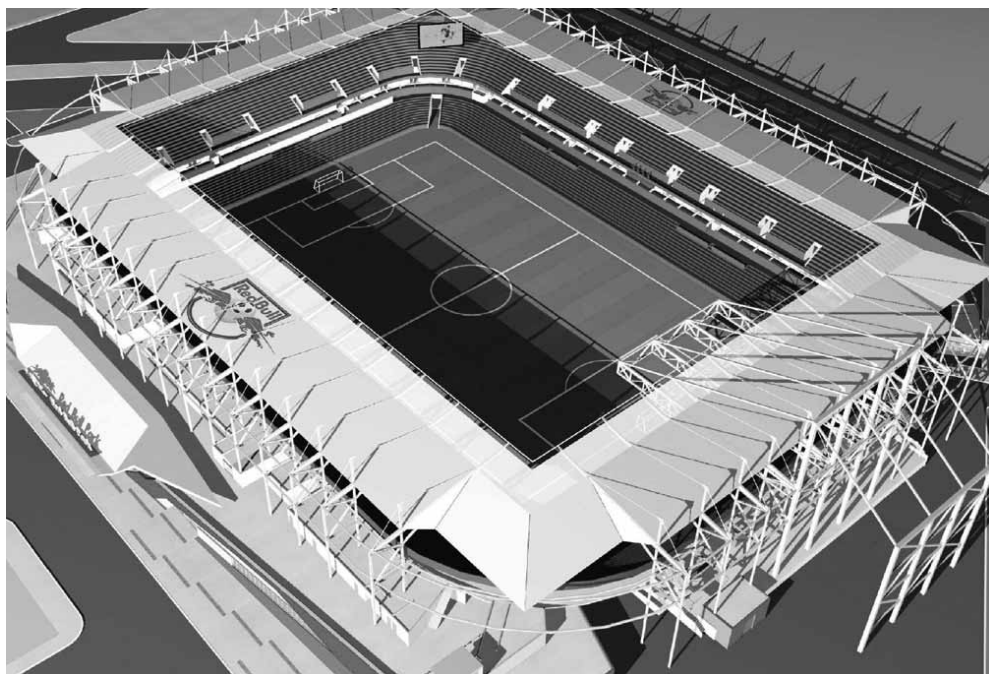


The \$100 million 'soccer specific' stadium will feature a 360-degree European-style roof/canopy covering the majority of the seating. When completed in the summer of 2008, Red Bull Park will be the home of the MLS Red Bulls, international soccer and other events. AEG developed and operates 'soccer specific' stadiums in California and in Illinois.

The multi-billion dollar Harrison MetroCentre will feature three million square feet of office space; 3,500 residential units; 300,000 square feet of retail space and over 10,000 decked parking spaces when completed.

Red Bull Park

The Red Bulls of Major League Soccer and AEG New York broke ground in September 2006 for Red Bull Park, a 25,000-seat soccer stadium and a major component of the Harrison MetroCentre development, located across the Passaic River, about two miles from NJIT's campus.



Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium



Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the professional baseball Newark Bears and since 2004 the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999. With a seating capacity of 6,200, "The Den" affords fans an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major league-caliber press box.

In December 2005, NJIT and the Bears held a joint press conference to herald a new partnership that includes a 10-year deal that extends Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium as the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball.

NCE/NJIT ALL-AMERICANS

Hernan "Chico" Borja

Spread NJIT's Name Around the Globe

Hernan Borja was an all-America soccer player in his career at New Jersey Institute of Technology from 1977 to 1980 under coach Mal Simon.

For more than a decade, he carried NJIT's name with him around the world as a professional player, first with the famed Cosmos of New York and then as one of the greatest indoor soccer players of his era.

From NJIT, the man known as 'Chico' would earn a spot on one of the world's most famous club teams, the Cosmos, as well as a regular spot on the United States National team throughout the 1980's and also a career as one of the greatest indoor soccer players in world history.

With apologies to the baseball Yankees, it's quite likely that when it came to worldwide recognition, the most famous US-based team in any sport in the 1970's and 1980's was the Cosmos of the North American Soccer League.

In addition to playing in front of crowds exceeding 70,000 at Giants Stadium, the Cosmos routinely drew sellout crowds during tours to four continents. The club home of all-time greats Pele and Franz Beckenbauer, the Cosmos lineup was studded with world-class stars from South America and Europe. Among the regular attendees at Cosmos home games were celebrities ranging from Mick Jagger to Henry Kissinger.

Hernan 'Chico' Borja stepped from the fields of NJIT into the Cosmos spotlight, playing regularly and frequently starting for the famed club in 1981, 1982 and 1984.

When the Cosmos and the NASL departed the scene,



Borja stayed in North America, moving to the indoor game with the Major Indoor Soccer League, the top indoor circuit in North America until 1992. Borja was one of the greatest players in that league's 14-year history, finishing fourth all-time in assists (338) and eighth in total points (612).

His greatness as an indoor star was underscored in 1992, when FIFA, the world's governing body for all soccer, named him to its all-World Championship first team for futsal, FIFA's 5 v 5 official indoor game.

He remained active in the outdoor game and it was rare for the United States National Team to play a game without him in the lineup at any time during the 1980's. He was a starter in full international competition in 1982, 1983, 1984 (3 matches), 1985 (2 matches) and 1988 (4 matches).

Playing for Team USA, he scored goals in three different full international matches, first finding the back of the net in a 2-0 win over Haiti on April 8, 1983. He later scored one of the two US goals in a 2-1 win over Trinidad and Tobago on May 15, 1985, in a qualifying match for the 1986 World Cup. Finally, he scored the only goal for the United States in a 3-1 loss vs. Chile on June 3, 1988.

He remains active in soccer as a coach and two of his former players, Oshane Moodie and Brian Caine came north from Florida to NJIT, where they played as freshmen in 1970.

Chico was not alone in earning all-America honors for NJIT (NCE). Indeed, he is one of 10 players to receive the coveted recognition playing for the Highlanders.





NCE/NJIT ALL-AMERICANS

*Here is a brief look at the other nine all-Americans,
with notes from their induction into the NJIT Hall of Fame:*

Werner Zorn, 1960, 61



Werner Zorn, a soccer player from 1958-61, was Newark College of Engineering's first all-American and a key member of the 1960 NAIA national championship soccer team. NCE was NAIA national runner-up in 1961.

Myron Bakun, 1965, 66



Myron Bakun, was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame for his outstanding contributions as a soccer player at Newark College of Engineering from 1964-66, including being selected two-time all-American, the region's Most Valuable Player, and team captain. His soccer and leadership abilities were a model for all to follow.

Kenneth Hammond, 1977 (HM)



Kenny Hammond, was an outstanding soccer player from 1974-77. His team reached three NCAA Tournaments and had a combined record of 35-15-2. Among NJIT's top 10 all-time goal scorers, he earned Honorable Mention all-America honors in 1977 and went on to play three seasons of professional soccer.

Alex Khowaylo, 1962



Alex Khowaylo, a soccer player from 1960-63 was an outstanding goalie for the soccer team at Newark College of Engineering from 1959 to 1962, including being named "all-America" and winning the NAIA national championship in 1960. NCE was NAIA national runner-up in 1961.

Ali Hubey, 1969, 70, 71



Ali Hubey, a member of the 1969-71 men's soccer team was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame for his performance on the field which earned him all-American recognition for three consecutive seasons 1969, 1970, 1971. He was team MVP in 1970 and was named to the NJIT/NCE Centennial all-time soccer team.

Andrew Bakun, 1981



Andrew Bakun, was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame for his outstanding achievements as an athlete in soccer from 1978-81. A four-year starter, Bakun was a versatile performer. He played three positions during his career at NJIT, earning all-State honors as a sophomore and all-Area accolades his junior year. He earned the 16th all-American award in NCE/NJIT men's soccer history following his senior season of 1981. Bakun scored eight career goals.

John Rapsomanikis, 1963



John Rapsomanikis, was a member of the men's soccer team from 1960-63.

Fabian Hurtado, 1971, 74 (HM)



Fabian Hurtado was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame as the holder of career scoring records with 65 goals and as first-team all-American in soccer in 1974. He was all-State and all-Area for three years and all-NAIA in 1973.

Raymond Paulius, 1983



Ray Paulius played soccer at NJIT from 1980-83, during which time the Highlanders posted a combined record of 36-26-2. In 1983, he was honored as a first-team all-America and is one of two men in school history to earn first-team all-America recognition in NCAA Division III from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America. Paulius was a quad-captain and all-American his senior year. The team MVP in 1983, Ray was first-team all-State and all-Region honoree that year as the Highlanders advanced to the finals of the ECAC post-season tournament.

Myron Worobec, 1964



Myron Worobec, was an outstanding soccer player at Newark College of Engineering from 1962-65. A prolific scorer he was named all-East, all-Area, all-America, a member of the U.S. Pan American team and a member of the U.S. Olympic team.

Joe Dias, 1975 (HM)



Joe Dias, a soccer player from 1973-76, his performance earned all-America honors in 1976 as well as all-Area and all-State in both 1975 and 1976, he finished with 34 career goals placing him third all-time.

The Newark College of Engineering (NCE) soccer team became national champions on November 26, 1960. Not before and not since has any NCE/NJIT athletic team accomplished this feat.

The championship game of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) tournament was halted by darkness after 16 minutes, 45 seconds, of overtime play and NCE tied with Elizabethtown College, 2-2. The teams were declared co-national champions by the NAIA, and NCE had completed its first (and still only) undefeated season, 12-0-1.

Under the leadership of sixth-year head coach Mal Simon, the Highlanders swept through the 1960 regular season with a 10-0 record, outscoring their opponents by a combined 41-9, including four shutouts. They then won the NAIA Area #3 championship and advanced to the national semifinals with a 2-1 victory against Pratt Institute.

NCE needed two overtimes to defeat Fitchburg State in the semis, and set up the championship meeting with Elizabethtown. The match, played at Slippery Rock State University, proceeded to the fourth extra period before being stopped. Sophomore Andy Handwerker and senior Gary Freimuth scored the Highlander goals.

After the season, halfback Werner Zorn was named NCE's first All-American. Only a junior, Zorn repeated the honor in 1961. Zorn, Savicky and Handwerker were named all-area, while sophomore Alex Khowaylo was selected the outstanding NAIA goalkeeper.

Many members of the 1960 team were still a part of the Highlanders the following year, when NCE again completed the regular season undefeated. The Highlanders returned to the national championship game, but lost to Howard University, 3-2, on a goal with 18 seconds remaining in regulation. From 1960 to 1962, NCE amassed a three-year record of 26-2-1 (.914).

Notes: NCE changed affiliation from the NAIA to NCAA Division III in 1974. The university changed its name to NJIT in 1975. The Highlanders reclassified to Division II in 1997 and to Division I in 2004.

From Brooklyn, Queens and Long Island: Take Verrazano-Narrows Bridge (Interstate 278) and follow 278 across Staten Island. Cross Goethels Bridge. Follow signs to New Jersey Turnpike North and follow New Jersey Turnpike directions above.

Other Transportation Systems

Newark International Airport: Five miles from the NJIT campus. A minibus (Newark Airlink) or taxi service connects the airport with Penn Station in Newark. Bus, city subway, and taxi connections may be obtained at the station.

The Atlantic Soccer Conference has been the conference home for NJIT men's soccer since the program began Division I competition in 2004.

This year's conference lineup, in addition to NJIT, includes founding members Adelphi and Howard, plus Longwood and the newest member, Houston Baptist, which began conference play in 2008.

The 2009 ASC postseason tournament will bring together all five conference teams, with the fourth and fifth seeds playing off on November 11 and the winner advancing to the four-team semifinals on November 13, with a champion being crown on November 15. This year's tournament will be hosted by Longwood University in Farmville, VA. Longwood hosted the 2008 tournament and emerged as champion.

Established in 2000, the ASC was a perfect fit for NJIT men's soccer when the Highlanders made the move up to Division I. NJIT became eligible for the conference championship in 2005, the year Highlanders men's soccer became a full championship-eligible member of NCAA Division I.

In May 2003, NJIT was accepted as a new member and played a conference schedule in 2004, but was not eligible for conference postseason play until 2005.

The ASC was founded by nine institutions offering Division I men's soccer while holding various NCAA classifications in their other sports, or competing in conferences that did not sponsor men's soccer. The founding members were: Adelphi, Albany, Binghamton, Florida International, Hartwick, Howard, Oneonta State, Philadelphia and Stony Brook.

In 2002, the ASC became an automatic qualifier to the NCAA College Cup for the first time. Florida International claimed the ASC's first berth.

Albany and Stony Brook moved their entire athletic programs to the America East Conference after the 2000 season and Binghamton did the same in 2001. FIU later departed to Conference USA.

Also gone from among the founders are: Oneonta State and Philadelphia, which reclassified men's soccer to conform with their overall athletics programs (Oneonta, Division III; Philadelphia, Division II); and Hartwick, which is now an associate member of the Mid-American Conference. Florida Atlantic competed in the ASC in 2006 and 2007.
