

RICKY HILL Head Coach

William "Ricky" Hill is no stranger to successful Division-II soccer programs, and hopes to attain the level of excellence as a coach that he enjoyed as a player.

He began his collegiate career at Essex County College in Newark, where he was named first-team all-region and all-conference. Hill then transferred to Florida Institute of Technology, and was a part of FIT's 1988 Division-II national championship team. A few years later, he finished his playing career at East Stroudsburg University, earning Adidas Scholar-Athlete All-America honors and helping ESU to the 1992 Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference championship.

Hill completed his bachelor's degree in 1994 and master's degree in 1998 at ESU, both in physical education and health. He is a former assistant coach at both ESU (1994-96) and FIT (1997), and had stints as the head boys' soccer and head track & field coach at Delaware Valley Regional High School.

A native of London, England, Hill recently completed his third season at NJIT, and has also served as the Highlanders' athletic trainer. He resides in Newark.


#10 CARLOS GOMEZ

2000 SEASON RECAP

In its inaugural year in the Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference, and fourth as a member of NCAA Division II, the New Jersey Institute of Technology men's soccer team looked to set a firm foundation and establish credibility in 2000.

After an 0-3 start, NJIT went 8-7-1 for the rest of the season. Included in that stretch were two victories against teams that defeated the Highlanders in 1999, Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference powers Lock Haven University and Millersville University. The Highlanders' final 8-10-1 record represented a four-game improvement from the previous year, and included four come-from-behind victories.

"This season, we proved we were a force to be reckoned with in our new conference," said third-year head coach **Ricky Hill**. "Our performances against established Division-II programs during our nonconference schedule showed that we can play at this level. And coming from behind on four different occasions shows our never-say-die attitude."

The team also showed improvement in the classroom, boasting the largest number of NJIT Scholar-Athlete Award winners in Hill's three seasons. In total, 11 men's soccer players, with a cumulative grade-point average of 3.3, won the award.

"We are proud that this is the largest number of scholar-athletes that we have had on our team," Hill said. "It shows that we are striving to epitomize the essence of what a true scholar-athlete represents."

By returning 16 players off a 22-man squad, including nine starters, the Highlanders look to make a significant impact next season.

"This season we started four freshmen who came in and were able to make an immediate impact," Hill said. "The caliber of freshmen and transfer students that will be joining us for the fall of 2001 have the same capabilities and will make us a much deeper team."

ATHLETIC FACILITIES

The NJIT men's soccer team plays its home games at Lubetkin Field, on campus grounds immediately adjacent to the Estelle and "Zoom" Fleisher Athletic Center.

Lubetkin, a lighted, natural grass facility, is also home to the Highlanders' two men's soccer and baseball teams, as well as several physical education classes and intramural events. It contains a midfield scoreboard and pressbox facilities, and its bleacher seating can hold approximately 1,000 spectators.

The team has access to all of the facilities in the Fleisher Athletic Center. These include the Fleisher fitness center and weight room, a six-lane swimming pool, four racquetball courts, a martial arts center, and an aerobics/dance studio. The pool is home to NJIT's men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads host meets and hold practices at four lighted outdoor hardcourt tennis courts behind the building.

The Highlander's men's and women's basketball and men's and women's volleyball teams play at Entwistle Gymnasium, also housed in the Fleisher Center. Entwistle, which can entertain crowds of up to 1,500, is open to the campus community during selected hours for recreation.

NJIT also offers several club sports, including bowling, cricket, golf, judo, lacrosse and wrestling. The Hazell Student Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.

UNIVERSITY INFORMATION



New Jersey Institute of Technology is a public research university enrolling more than 8,800 bachelor's, master's and doctoral students in 80 degree programs through its five colleges: Newark College of Engineering, New Jersey School of Architecture, College of Science and Liberal Arts, School of Management, and the Albert Dorman Honors College. Research initiatives include manufacturing, microelectronics, multimedia, transportation, computer science, solar astrophysics, environmental engineering and science, and architecture and building science.

According to *Yahoo! Internet Life* magazine rankings, NJIT is America's "most wired" public university. *U.S. News and World Report's* "2000 Annual Guide to America's Best Colleges" ranked NJIT among the nation's top universities, and *Money* magazine's most recent issue of "Best College Buys" rated NJIT as the sixth-best value among U.S. science and technology schools and among the top 100 overall. In September, 1999, *Mademoiselle* ranked NJIT as the second-most Internet-connected university in the nation.

NJIT history spans from the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age. Newark was a factory town when the tuition-free evening school was founded in 1881 to support local industries. The first 90 students studied algebra, geometry, trigonometry, chemistry, physics and drawing. The range of courses offered is testimony to the fact that, from the beginning, NJIT's programs have provided a broad-based foundation to prepare students for success in the workplace. From those early days, science and technology have been the engines fueling the university's development.
