

Season Outlook

The New Jersey Institute of Technology men's soccer team is without some vital parts of the 2000 squad. Fourth-year head coach **Ricky Hill** expects to overcome their loss with unity, teamwork and depth to make the 50th season in program history a success.

Gone to graduation from last year's 8-10-1 squad are honorable-mention all-Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference (CACC) midfielder **Meres Doliscat** (12 GP, 1g 1a), top playmaker **Amadou Mbaye** (13 GP, 3g 6a) and defenders **Matt Sweeney** (18 GP, 1a) and **Claudio Barbaran** (16 GP, 1a). But the Highlanders received two more hits in pre-season when leading scorer **Carlos Gomez** (11 GP, 10g 5a), a first-team all-conference forward, left the team for personal reasons, and starting defender **Michael Baffuto** (19 GP) transferred.

Hill, however, is focusing his attention on the personnel that remains, and feels that there is enough talent present to achieve success.

"We have a more cohesive group of young men than we did last year," Hill said, "and we're coming together quicker. That should help us compensate for what we've lost. We'd be selling ourselves short not to think that we can finish at the top of the conference table."

GOALKEEPERS: Sophomore

Jason Manzi (18 GP, 2.05 GAA, 2 ShO) is the incumbent. He will be pushed by transfer **Cyril Loisel**.

FORWARDS: Hill hopes to keep junior **Brent McKim** (19 GP, 5g 3a) in the front this season. McKim, NJIT's leading returning scorer, played in every part of the field last year, including backup keeper. Sophomore **Daniel Ganjali** (9 GP) looks for an increased role, and newcomers

Mustapha Kamara and **Kevin Rojas-Brito** should provide stiff competition to the starting forwards. Juniors **Robby Davis** and **Kevin DePaiva** will also see time.

MIDFIELDERS: Junior **Paul Ray** (17 GP, 5g 2a), an honorable-mention all-CACC choice, is a threat to move forward and score at any time. Sophomore **Cherno**

Cham (18 GP, 2a) comes off a solid

rookie season at defensive midfield. Freshmen **Andrew Ma**, **Daniel Silva** and **Christopher Wilson** will also make a push.

DEFENDERS: This is the Highlanders' deepest and most experienced unit, even with the loss of Baffuto. Co-captains **Alex Perdomo** (14 GP), the sweeper, and **Shelby Sharpe** (18 GP, 1g), and sophomore **Mario Douglas** (13 GP, 1g) are all returning starters. Redshirt Jorge Padilla is back from a broken foot, and freshman **Adam Gross** has been impressive in the pre-season.

Administration

DR. SAUL K. FENSTER

President

Dr. Saul K. Fenster is the sixth president of New Jersey Institute of Technology. Prior to joining NJIT in 1978, he served in various faculty and administrative capacities at Fairleigh Dickinson University, including six years as provost of the Rutherford campus.



Fenster is a mechanical engineer. He earned a bachelor's degree from the City College of New York, a master's degree from Columbia University and a Ph.D. from the University of Michigan. He has authored and co-authored two textbooks and numerous research papers and technical articles. His industrial experience includes a period as senior research engineer with the Sperry Rand Corporation and as a partner in an industrial consulting firm.

Fenster has served on many statewide task forces, commissions and committees. He is currently the chair of the New Jersey Commission on Science and Technology and the Research and Development Council of New Jersey.

DR. JOEL BLOOM

Vice-President for Academic and Student Services

Dr. Joel Bloom has worked at NJIT since July 1990, and is currently vice-president for academic and student services. He is responsible for nine divisions of the university, including physical education and athletics.

Bloom is also the dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College, which enrolls 460 students from 15 states and several foreign countries.

Prior to NJIT, Bloom spent seven years as assistant commissioner in the New Jersey Department of Education. He currently chairs the State College Advisory Board Board and the Newark Consortium Board for Pre-College Education.

Bloom earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Hunter College, and holds a master's and doctorate from Columbia University Teachers College.



LENNY KAPLAN

Senior Administrator for Athletics, Physical Education, Recreation and Intramurals

After serving 11 years in the athletics department at Division-I Manhattan College, **Lenny Kaplan** was appointed in August 2000 to NJIT's newly-created position of senior administrator for athletics, physical education, recreation and intramurals.

Kaplan is a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration. After three years as Manhattan's director of operations, he served as an assistant athletics director from 1991-2000. At NJIT, he reports to Dr. Joel Bloom, vice president for academic and student services.

Kaplan is a native of Commack, Long Island, and attended Commack High School South. He resides in Manhattan with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.

Coaching Staff

RICKY HILL

Head Coach

William "Ricky" Hill is no stranger to successful Division-II soccer programs, and hopes to attain the level of excellence as a coach that he enjoyed as a player. He begins his fourth season as NJIT's head men's soccer coach with a record of 18-32-1, including an 8-10-1 season in 2000.

Hill started his collegiate career at Florida Institute of Technology (FIT),



and was a part of FIT's 1988 Division-II national championship team. He then transferred to Essex County College (ECC) in Newark, where he was named first-team all-region and all-conference. He is a two-time athletic hall of fame inductee at ECC.

A few years later, he finished his playing career at East Stroudsburg University (ESU), earning Adidas Scholar-Athlete All-American honors and helping ESU to the 1992 Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference championship.

Hill is a 1994 graduate of ESU, and was an assistant coach at his alma mater from 1994-96. He has had stints as the head boys' soccer and head track & field coach at Delaware Valley Regional High School.

A native of London, Hill possesses an English Football Association coaching license, and has also served as the Highlanders' athletic trainer. He resides in Newark.

ANTHONY CREECE

Assistant Coach

Anthony Creece is new to NJIT's men's soccer staff, but not to working with Ricky Hill.



Creece is a graduate of East Stroudsburg University (ESU), where he was a three-time all-Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) selection.

As a junior in 1992, he and Hill were teammates, helping the Warriors to the PSAC championship. Creece was the team's most valuable player and ESU's senior athlete of the year in 1993.

After playing professionally for the Philadelphia Freedom of the USISL in 1993 and 1994, Creece was teamed with Hill again at ESU. From

1994-96, both were assistant coaches under Jerry Sheska. The Warriors won PSAC titles and earned NCAA Tournament berths in 1994 and 1995.

Creece, who also was an assistant women's coach at ESU from 1997-98, is the director of athletics at Notre Dame High School in East Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania. He had been Notre Dame's head girls' soccer coach for the last six seasons, earning league coach of the year honors in 1997 and 1998. Creece resides in Stroudsburg.

EMMANUEL KOFIE

Assistant Coach

Emmanuel Kofie brings an abundance of professional and international goalkeeping experience to the Highlanders.

Kofie was a member of the national team in his native Ghana for eight years. Kofie and "The Black Stars" made 25 international appearances, including the 1964 Olympic Games in Tokyo.

Kofie played 10 professional seasons, including five in Ghana's first division. He was the starting keeper for the New York Ukrainians of the Metropolitan Soccer League from 1970-72 and for the New York Cosmos of the North American Soccer League from 1971-74.

Kofie was the head women's and assistant men's coach from 1990-95 at Essex County College (ECC) in Newark. He performs several goalkeeping clinics annually, and is still active as a keeper and assistant coach for the A-League Staten Island Vipers.

An East Orange resident, Kofie is a student-athlete counselor and recruiter at ECC, from which he received his associate's degree in 1996. He is pursuing a bachelor of science degree in physical education and fitness from Montclair State University.







About NJIT

NJIT's history spans from the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age. Newark was a factory town when the tuition-free evening school was founded in 1881 to support local industries. From the early days, science and technology have been the engines fueling the university's development.

Over time, the university both anticipated and responded to change by expanding its curriculum and mission. Most notably, in 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By 1975, NJIT offered a broad range of undergraduate and graduate degrees. All programs included significant research and public service components with the goal of providing an academic environment that fostered intellectual depth and breadth, as well as social responsibility.

Today, continuing a fourfold mission of instruction, research, economic development and public service, NJIT is among the leading comprehensive technological universities in the nation. The university has state-of-the-art facilities with more than 2,000,000 square-feet of space located on a 45-acre campus in Newark, a Technology and Engineering Center at our 125-acre campus in Mount Laurel, N.J., shared with Burlington County College, and a solar observatory in Big Bear, Calif.

NJIT's Six Colleges

While there has been tremendous growth and diversification at NJIT, its roots are in engineering education. For more than eight decades, **Newark College of Engineering** (NCE) has been preparing engineering students to use science, mathematics, technology and problem-solving skills to design, construct, test and main-

tain products, services, and information systems.

The **New Jersey School of Architecture**, established in 1974, is one of the largerst architecture schools in the nation and is nationally recognized for the innovative integration of computer technology into the design curriculum.

The **College of Science and Liberal Arts** (CSLA), established in 1982, is moving into the forefront of many national research activities from solar astronomy to computational and mathematical modeling. CSLA provides students with the skill sets for the professional marketplace including literacy in the computer, mathematical, physical and biological sciences, as well as the traditional liberal arts disciplines.

The **School of Management**, established in 1988, combines the best of the traditional business disciplines (e.g., finance, marketing, accounting, e-commerce) with the power of information and technology management to develop professionals who can manage and communicate effectively.

The **Albert Dorman Honors College**, established in 1993, offers one of the nation's leading technologically oriented honors programs for students who are prepared to undertake a rigorous and individualized course of study.

The **College of Computing Sciences**, established in 2001, encompasses a department of computer science, focused on both the theoretical areas of computing and the development of new computer technology, as well as a department of information systems, concentrated on applications involving people and organizations.

NJIT Mission Statement

NJIT: A "MOST-WIRED" UNIVERSITY

Yahoo! Internet Life magazine has perennially ranked NJIT as a "most-wired" university. As such, the university is nationally recognized as a pioneer in the use of computing and information technologies.

As a public research university, NJIT is educating leaders for a technology-driven economy. The university is rethinking educational programs to emphasize marketplace skills, and redesigning its methods of delivering education. Indeed, computing and information technology underpin every facet of the NJIT mission.

NJIT received Carnegie Foundation designation as a Doctoral II university in 1994 and has been ranked among the top universities by U.S. News and World Report every year since. NJIT expends more than \$45 million in a panoply of research and development partnerships with industry, government, and other universities. NJIT researchers are making important advances in a wide range of areas, including the biosciences, manufacturing, microelectronics, multimedia, transportation, computer science, solar astrophysics, environmental engineering and science, and architecture and building science.

For more than a century, NJIT has been an important conduit through which technology flows into society. NJIT plays an essential role in the economic and social life of the state and nation. At NJIT, the objective is to provide graduates with analytic skills as well as an ability to integrate the work of multiple disciplines to manage and lead knowledge-based and technology-dependent businesses.

The mission of a technological university requires that NJIT continue to recognize emerging trends in the economy, the sciences, and technology, and to anticipate their impact on society by developing appropriate educational and research programs.

Facilities

NJIT soccer teams play their home games at **Lubetkin Field**, a lighted, natural-grass campus facility adjacent to the **Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center**.

Lubetkin, which is also home to the Highlanders' baseball team, contains a scoreboard and pressbox facilities, and has seating to hold approximately 1,000 spectators. The field is also used for physical education and intramurals.

The NJIT men's and women's basketball and volleyball teams play their home games at **Entwistle Gymnasium**, the main facility in the Fleisher Center. Entwistle seats approximately 1,500 spectators. The back bay, "C gym," area can be sectioned off from the main floor, making the entire gym-

nasium useful for intramural events, physical education classes, and campus recreation time, and able to host multiple events simultaneously.

The women's soccer team also has access to all of the other facilities in the athletic center. These include the fitness area (containing computer controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units, and an indoor track), weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), a martial arts center, and an aerobics/dance studio. A six-lane swimming pool is home to NJIT's men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads host matches and practices at four lighted outdoor hardcourt tennis courts behind the building. The Hazell Student Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.

The facilities are also used by NJIT's club sport offerings, which include bowling, cricket, golf, judo, men's lacrosse and wrestling.



Visitors or members of the campus community are encouraged to check out the new electronic message board to the right of the gym entrances to the Fleisher Athletic Center.

The board, installed in January 2001, provides department and campus news 24 hours a day on a flashy amber-colored LED display. Those approaching from the campus green area can learn such tidbits as upcoming events, recreational classes, new staff members, and intramural champions, as well as the latest varsity scores and highlights.

1960 National Champs

The Newark College of Engineering (NCE) soccer team became national champions on November 26, 1960. Not before and not since has any NCE/NJIT athletic team accomplished this feat.

The championship game of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) tournament was halted by darkness after 16 minutes, 45 seconds, of overtime play and NCE tied with Elizabethtown College, 2-2. The teams were declared co-national champions by the NAIA, and NCE had completed its first (and still only) undefeated season, 12-0-1.

Under the leadership of sixth-year head coach **Mal Simon**, the Highlanders swept through the 1960 regular season with a 10-0 record, outscoring their opponents by a combined 41-9, including four shutouts. They then won the NAIA Area #3 championship and advanced to the national semifinals with a 2-1 victory against Pratt Institute.

NCE needed two overtimes to defeat Fitchburg State in the semis, and set up the championship meeting with Elizabethtown. The match, played at Slippery Rock State University, proceeded to the fourth extra period before being stopped. Sophomore **Andy Handwerker** and senior **Gary Freimuth** scored the Highlander goals.

The team's balanced scoring attack was led by freshman **John**



Savicky with nine goals. Handwerker had eight tallies, followed by senior **Anatole Kulyk** and sophomore **Ed Cruz** with six each.

After the season, halfback **Werner Zorn** was named NCE's first All-American. Only a junior, Zorn repeated the honor in 1961. Zorn, Savicky and Handwerker were named all-area, while sophomore **Alex Khawaylo** was selected the outstanding

NAIA goalkeeper.

Many members of the 1960 team were still a part of the Highlanders the following year, when NCE again completed the regular season undefeated.

The Highlanders returned to the national championship game, but lost to Howard University, 3-2, on a goal with 18 seconds remaining in regulation. From 1960 to 1962, NCE amassed a three-year record of 26-2-1 (.914).

(Note: NCE changed affiliation from the NAIA to NCAA Division III in 1974. The university changed its name to NJIT in 1976.)

When NJIT reclassified its athletic programs to NCAA Division II from Division III in 1997, the Highlanders joined the New York Collegiate Athletic Conference (NYCAC). After three years of NYCAC play, the Highlanders began a new era in the fall of 2000 as members of the **Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference** (CACC).



NJIT is the only school in the 12-member CACC with full NCAA membership. The other institutions possess provisional NCAA status, as they are in the process of switching affiliation from the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA).

The CACC has allowed the Highlanders to save tremendously on travel time and costs. NJIT is centrally located in the conference, and four other member schools are in New Jersey, allowing the opportunity to foster local rivalries.
