



The New Jersey Institute of Technology men's soccer team has 30 players on its preseason roster, the most in head coach **Ricky Hill**'s five seasons. As a result, there is heated competition for virtually every starting spot. Hill believes the depth will play the biggest role in reversing fortunes from last season's 4-11 finish.

"We knew that our level of play had improved over the previous season," Hill said, "but we didn't show it on paper. Our young men hope to correct that. Our biggest problem was that we weren't putting our scoring chances away consistently. With more depth, we won't lose intensity when we substitute."

The 2002 schedule includes the much-improved Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference foes plus several established non-league opponents.

"The conference teams are improving every year," Hill said. "That's necessary for any of us to get to the next level. Our nonconference opponents include many perennial NCAA Tournament teams, and being competitive with them will solidify our accomplishments."

**GOALKEEPERS:** A pair of newcomers, freshman **René Cevallos** and first-year junior **Christopher Goy**, will challenge two-year incumbent **Jason Manzi** (3-8, 2.13 GAA, 1 ShO in 2001) for the starting job.

**DEFENDERS:** The return of sophomore **Mike Baffuto**, who took a year off from school after starting all 19 games in 2000, will help make up for the graduation of co-captains **Shelby Sharpe** and **Alex Perdomo**. Three-time letterwinner and co-captain **Paul Ray** (7 GP, 1a) will move back from the midfield, while sophomores **Adam Gross** (14 GP, 1a) and **Andrew Ma** (16 GP, 1g 2a) are also returning starters. Junior **Mario Douglas** (15 GP, 1g 5a), one of the team's top playmakers, will be worked back into the mix after rehabilitating a preseason injury.

Veteran Trinidad natives **Kevin DePaiva** (7 GP), a senior, and junior **Shannon Abraham** (2 GP, 3 shots), provide depth along with freshman **Gideon Ki**.

"The key to our defense will be if the competition has to adjust to us, rather than the other way around," Hill said.

**MIDFIELDERS:** The Highlanders expect a big season from junior **Cherno Cham** (14 GP, team-high 6a), who Hill feels is versatile and consistent enough to rotate from his outside midfield spot to the backfield when necessary. Veterans **Robby Davis** and **Geoffrey Hickman** will try to hold off newcomers **Rafiqul Chowdhury**, **Phil Montano**, and **Behrang Noochirwani** for the other starting spots.

**FORWARDS:** All-conference selection **Christopher Wilson** (15 GP, 8g) and sophomore **Kevin Rojas-Britto** (13 GP, 1g) are the returning starters, but they, too, will be pushed, most notably transfer **Keith Samuel**. Senior **Daniel Ganjali**, redshirt freshmen **Oswald Fombrum** and **Amr Mohamed**, and rookies **Ranston Coke** and **Julius Hoyes**, are also challengers.

A wild-card for Hill could be senior co-captain **Brent McKim**. He suffered a serious leg injury during spring workouts, but if he recovers in time, McKim can help out at virtually any position.

### DR. ROBERT A. ALTENKIRCH

#### *President*

**Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch** was selected the seventh president of NJIT in May 2002. He succeeds Dr. Saul K. Fenster, who retired after 24 years of service to the university.



Altenkirch, a mechanical engineer, was most recently the vice president for research at Mississippi State University (MSU). He brings to NJIT a wide background in university research, teaching and administration, with extensive experience in program development, fundraising and federal relations. He has served the University of Kentucky as professor and chair of mechanical engineering, MSU as professor and dean of the College of Engineering, and Washington State University as professor and dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture.

Altenkirch holds a Ph.D. from Purdue University, a M.S. from the University of California-Berkeley, and a B.S.M.E. from Purdue. A native of St. Louis, Missouri, he is a member of several professional societies and a reviewer for numerous professional journals.

### DR. JOEL BLOOM

#### *Vice-President for Academic and Student Services*

**Dr. Joel Bloom** has worked at NJIT since July 1990. In his current position, he is responsible for nine divisions of the university, including physical education and athletics.

Bloom is also dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College, which enrolls 460 students from 15 states and several foreign countries.

Prior to NJIT, Bloom spent seven years as assistant commissioner in the New Jersey Department of Education. He currently chairs the State College Advisory Bound Board and the Newark Consortium Board for Pre-College Education.

Bloom earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Hunter College, and holds a master's and doctorate from Columbia University Teachers College.



### LENNY KAPLAN

#### *Director of Athletics*

After serving 11 years in the athletics department at Division I Manhattan College, **Lenny Kaplan** was

appointed in August 2000 to NJIT's newly created position of senior administrator for athletics, physical education, recreation and intramurals.

Kaplan is a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration. After three years as Manhattan's director of operations, he served as an assistant athletics director from 1991-2000.

Kaplan is a native of Commack, Long Island, and attended Commack High School South. He resides in Merrick, New York, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.



### RICKY HILL

#### Head Coach

**Ricky Hill** is no stranger to successful Division-II soccer programs, and hopes to attain the level of excellence as a coach that he enjoyed as a player. Now in his fifth season as NJIT's head men's soccer coach, he is the University's longest-tenured active coach. Hill has amassed a 22-43-1 overall record.

Hill started his collegiate career at Florida Institute of Technology (FIT), and was a part of FIT's 1988 Division-

II national championship team. He then transferred to Essex County College (ECC) in Newark, where he was named first-team all-region and all-conference. He is a two-time athletic hall of fame inductee at ECC.

A few years later, he finished his playing career at East Stroudsburg University (ESU), earning Adidas Scholar-Athlete All-American honors and helping ESU to the 1992 Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference championship.

Hill is a 1994 graduate of ESU, and was an assistant coach at his alma mater from 1994-96. He has had stints as the head boys' soccer and head girls' track & field coach at Delaware Valley Regional High School.

A native of London, England, Hill possesses an English Football Association coaching license, and has also served as the Highlanders' athletic trainer. He resides in Newark, N.J.

### ALBERT NGUIDJOL

Assistant Coach

**Albert Nguidjol** begins his first season of collegiate coaching in the United States by joining the NJIT staff.

Nguidjol (pronounced *NID-jull*) is the chair of the National and International Competitions Commission for the Cameroon Soccer Federation, a position he has held since 2000. His tenure has been highlighted by Cameroon's gold medal in the 2000 Sydney Olympics. He has also been the deputy secretary general of the Cameroon Soccer Players Association since 1995.

From 1985-95, Nguidjol was the head coach of several teams in Cameroon, winning two Division 2 and one Division 1 league championships. His Ocean de Kribi team was a finalist in the Cameroon Cup in 1994-95.

As a player, Nguidjol earned 25 Caps with the Cameroon national team from 1970-85. He played on two Unity Cup and one Cameroon Cup championship teams, and won several gold medals with the Cameroon National University Team from 1976-81.

Nguidjol received a master's degree in physical education from the National Institute of Youth and Sports in Yaounde, Cameroon, in 1976, and was a high school and university physical education teacher in his homeland from 1981-95. He is currently a coach with the soccer training program of the Rahway YMCA and resides in Newark.

### EMMANUEL KOFIE

Assistant Coach

**Emmanuel Kofie** is in his second year as NJIT's goalkeepers' coach.

He brings an abundance of professional and international experience to the Highlanders.

Kofie was a member of the national team in his native Ghana for eight years. Kofie and "The Black Stars" made 25 international appearances, including the 1964 Olympic Games in Tokyo.

Kofie played 10 professional seasons, including five in Ghana's first division. He was the starting keeper for the New York Ukrainians of the Metropolitan Soccer League from 1970-72 and for the New York Cosmos of the North American Soccer League from 1971-74.

Kofie was the head women's and assistant men's coach from 1990-95 at Essex County College (ECC) in Newark. He performs several goalkeeping clinics annually, and is still active as a keeper and assistant coach for the A-League Staten Island Vipers.

An East Orange resident, Kofie is a student-athlete counselor and recruiter at ECC, from which he received his associate's degree in 1996. He is pursuing a bachelor of science degree in physical education and fitness from Montclair State University.

### Newark: New Jersey's College Town

Adjacent to NJIT is the Newark campus of Rutgers University.

NJIT and Rutgers enjoy an exceptionally close and productive consensual relationship within the thriving University Heights section of Newark. NJIT and Rutgers students have library privileges at both campuses. NJIT students may also enrich their educational experience by enrolling in Rutgers-Newark courses and in full degree programs in disciplines not offered at NJIT, such as art, music, geology and psychology.

Each year the two universities co-sponsor a common season of theatrical productions, as well as "World Week," a joint program of honors colloquia, and a variety of other cultural and social activities.

### New Jersey/New York Metropolitan Region

The NJIT campus is in one of the nation's most exciting cultural and business regions. Advantages include:

- Minutes from New Jersey Performing Arts Center, Liberty Science Center, Meadowlands Sports Complex, Manhattan and all of its attractions, Newport Center Mall, and Secaucus Outlet Center.
- Discount tickets for Broadway shows, museums, concerts, and sporting events.
- Weekend trips throughout the Northeastern United States: skiing, boating, swimming, hiking, and much more.
- The spectacular Jersey shore is less than one hour away.

## Athletics Facilities

The NJIT soccer teams play their home games at **Lubetkin Field**, a lighted, natural-grass campus facility adjacent to the **Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center**.

Lubetkin, which is also home to the Highlanders' baseball team, contains a scoreboard and pressbox facilities, and has seating to hold approximately 1,000 spectators. The field is also used for physical education and intramurals.

The NJIT men's and women's basketball and volleyball teams play their home games in **Entwistle Gymnasium**, the main facility in the Fleisher Center. Entwistle seats approximately 1,500 spectators. The back bay, "C gym," area can be sectioned off from the main floor, making the entire gymnasium useful

for intramural events, physical education classes, and campus recreation time, and able to host multiple events simultaneously.

The women's soccer team also has access to all of the other facilities in the athletic center. These include the fitness area (containing computer-controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units, and an indoor track), a free-weight room and a hammer-strength weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), a martial arts center, and an aerobics/dance studio. A six-lane swimming pool is home to NJIT's men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads utilize the four lighted outdoor hardcourt tennis courts behind the building.

NJIT's history spans from the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age. Newark was a factory town when the tuition-free evening school was founded in 1881 to support local industries. From the early days, science and technology have been the engines fueling the university's development.

Over time, the university both anticipated and responded to change by expanding its curriculum and mission. Most notably, in 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By 1975, NJIT offered a broad range of undergraduate and graduate degrees. All programs included significant research and public service components with the goal of providing an academic environment that fostered intellectual depth and breadth, as well as social responsibility.

Today, continuing a fourfold mission of instruction, research, economic development and public service, NJIT is among the leading comprehensive technological universities in the nation. The university has state-of-the-art facilities with more than 2,000,000 square-feet of space located on a 45-acre campus in Newark, a Technology and Engineering Center at our 125-acre campus in Mount Laurel, N.J., shared with Burlington County College, and a solar observatory in Big Bear, Calif.

### NJIT's Six Colleges

While there has been tremendous growth and diversification at NJIT, its roots are in engineering education. For more than eight decades, **Newark College of Engineering** (NCE) has been preparing engineering students to use science, mathematics, technology and problem-solving skills to design, construct, test and main-

tain products, services, and information systems.

The **New Jersey School of Architecture**, established in 1973, is one of the largest architecture schools in the nation and is nationally recognized for the innovative integration of computer technology into the design curriculum.

The **College of Science and Liberal Arts** (CSLA), established in 1982, is moving into the forefront of many national research activities from solar astronomy to computational and mathematical modeling. CSLA provides students with the skill sets for the professional marketplace including literacy in the computer, mathematical, physical and biological sciences, as well as the traditional liberal arts disciplines.

The **School of Management**, established in 1988, combines the best of the traditional business disciplines (e.g., finance, marketing, accounting, e-commerce) with the power of information and technology management to develop professionals who can manage and communicate effectively.

The **Albert Dorman Honors College**, established in 1993, offers one of the nation's leading technologically oriented honors programs for students who are prepared to undertake a rigorous and individualized course of study.

The **College of Computing Sciences**, established in 2001, encompasses a department of computer science, focused on both the theoretical areas of computing and the development of new computer technology, as well as a department of information systems, concentrated on applications involving people and organizations.

The Newark College of Engineering (NCE) soccer team became national champions on November 26, 1960. Not before and not since has any NCE/NJIT athletic team accomplished this feat.

The championship game of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) tournament was halted by darkness after 16 minutes, 45 seconds, of overtime play and NCE tied with Elizabethtown College, 2-2. The teams were declared co-national champions by the NAIA, and NCE had completed its first (and still only) undefeated season, 12-0-1.

Under the leadership of sixth-year head coach **Mal Simon**, the Highlanders swept through the 1960 regular season with a 10-0 record, outscoring their opponents by a combined 41-9, including four shutouts. They then won the NAIA Area #3 championship

and advanced to the national semifinals with a 2-1 victory against Pratt Institute.

NCE needed two overtimes to defeat Fitchburg State in the semis, and set up the championship meeting with Elizabethtown. The match, played at Slippery Rock State University, proceeded to the fourth extra period before being stopped. Sophomore **Andy Handwerker** and senior **Gary Freimuth** scored the Highlander goals.

The team's balanced scoring attack was led by freshman **John Savicky** with nine goals. Handwerker had eight tallies, followed by senior **Anatole Kulyk** and sophomore **Ed Cruz** with six each.

After the season, halfback **Werner Zorn** was named NCE's first All-American. Only a junior, Zorn re-

peated the honor in 1961. Zorn, Savicky and Handwerker were named all-area, while sophomore **Alex Khowaylo** was selected the outstanding NAIA goalkeeper.

Many members of the 1960 team were still a part of the Highlanders the following year, when NCE again completed the regular season undefeated. The Highlanders returned to the national championship game, but lost to Howard University, 3-2, on a goal with 18 seconds remaining in regulation. From 1960 to 1962, NCE amassed a three-year record of 26-2-1 (.914).

*(Notes: NCE changed affiliation from the NAIA to NCAA Division III in 1974. The university changed its name to NJIT in 1975. The Highlanders reclassified to Division II in 1997.)*

When NJIT reclassified its athletics programs to NCAA Division II from Division III in 1997, it joined the New York Collegiate Athletic Conference (NYCAC). After three years of NYCAC play, the Highlanders began a new era in the fall of 2000 as members of the **Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference** (CACC).



The CACC is in a transitional phase. For the last two seasons, NJIT was only league school with full NCAA membership. The others were in a provisional period while switching affiliation from the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). However, five other CACC members have completed their provisional requirements and will make their NCAA debuts in 2002-03: Bloomfield College, Caldwell College, Dominican (N.Y.) College, Felician College, and Teikyo Post University.

The CACC has allowed the Highlanders to save tremendously on travel time and costs. NJIT is centrally located in the conference, and four other member schools are in New Jersey, allowing the opportunity to foster local rivalries.
