NJIT is New Jersey's Science & Technology University. With roots going back to 1881, when it was founded as Newark Technical School, New Jersey Institute of Technology observed its 125th anniversary in 2006.

Located in University Heights, Newark, NJ, home to more than 30,000 college students, NJIT's campus is just 10 miles from New York City.

Playing a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future, NJIT, as a major public technological university, is an important pipeline for the flow of technology into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university helps to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$83 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities on the 45-acre campus, including biomedical engineering labs and a campus center.

INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAMS

NJIT offers 92 degree programs — 33 undergraduate, 40 master's and 19 doctoral programs — through six schools:

New Jersey School of Architecture
College of Science and Liberal Arts
School of Management
Albert Dorman Honors College
College of Computing Sciences

NJIT has 416 full-time faculty; more than 98 percent of whom hold the highest degree in their field. The student-faculty ratio is 13:1, with more than 5,200 undergraduate students and nearly 2,800 graduate students. Our students hail from 33 states and more than 100 countries to rank eighth in the nation for diversity.

Albert Dorman Honors College enrolls more than 500 students who take advantage of honors courses, research opportunities, advising and mentoring. Honors College students have SAT scores ranking in the top 10 percent nationally.

RESEARCH

NJIT drew more than \$75 million in research funding in 2005 and faculty members welcome student collaboration on research projects.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT


NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies. NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element, together with instruction, research and community service. More than 60 technology start-up companies, many of which hire NJIT students, are on campus.

THE CAREER EDGE

All 10 of the majors with the highest starting salaries for 2005-06 grads are in engineering, computing and business, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers.

Computer and data processing services lead the list of the 10 fastest-growing occupations in projections compiled by the US Department of Labor. Computer-related employment is expected to grow 117 percent by 2008, according to the Career Guide to Industries.





As technology changes all fields, those with science and technology backgrounds are positioned to lead. Among the CEOs of the S&P 500 companies, engineering is the single largest undergraduate degree and more than half of CEOs have undergraduate degrees in engineering, business management, science, math and computing.

THE GLOBAL EDGE

The diversity in NJIT's student body and faculty prepares graduates to understand and succeed in the global marketplace. NJIT was named among the world's top 500 universities in a study by the Institute of Higher Education, Shanghai Jiao Tong University.

THE TECHNOLOGY EDGE

NJIT has been designated one of the nation's most technologically sophisticated universities by Forbes.com and a Princeton Review survey and the university has received major funding from the National Science Foundation and the National Security Agency in recent years.

THE ACADEMIC EDGE

NJIT has long been a national leader in applying new technologies and approaches to the educational experience. NJIT was a pioneer in requiring computer science for students in all majors and the School of Architecture has led innovations in teaching CAD and digital design. The school's innovative "paperless" first-year program was recently cited by Campus Technology Magazine.

Students have a wide range of educational choices in building an interest-tailored program. Among their options are cross-enrolling at neighboring Rutgers to enrich their program with subjects such as music and languages.

NJIT students learn emerging technologies from the researchers behind the technologies, developing valuable marketplace skills. Real-world experience through experiential learning makes graduates more marketable, with many co-op opportunities leading to permanent jobs.

THE REGIONAL EDGE

New Jersey, with America's highest concentration of pharmaceutical, hi-tech, biotech, and medical device companies is the place to study technology. It has the nation's highest per capita number of engineers and scientists as residents, while also leading in per capita rate of patents issued. Further, the Newark-New York region is a living laboratory for architecture and building sciences, environmental engineering and transportation.

THE RESEARCH EDGE

NJIT has been designated by the State of New Jersey as the Homeland Security Technology Systems Center and NJIT operates the world-renowned Big Bear Solar Observatory.

A HISTORY OF NJIT

From the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age, New Jersey Institute of Technology has a rich history with its beginnings developing from the industrial age.

In 1881, an act of the New Jersey State Legislature, recognizing an urgent need, sought a home for what would be the state's technical school. The efforts of Newark's public and private sectors resulted with the opening of Newark Technical School, addressing the state's need.

Over time, the university expanded its curriculum and mission. In 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By the middle of the 20th century, Newark Technical School was transformed into the robust Newark College of Engineering.

The post-war period was one of enormous activity with regular expansion of the campus, as well as the introduction of doctoral level programs. In 1975, with the addition of the New Jersey School of Architecture, the institution had evolved into a technological university, emphasizing a broad range of degrees and dedication to significant research and public service. Newark College of Engineering, stronger than ever, remained intact, but a new university name — New Jersey Institute of Technology — reflected the institution's expanded mission.

A broadened mission called for the creation of a residential campus and the opening of NJIT's first dormitory in 1980 began a period of steady growth that continues. Two new schools were established during the 1980s—the College of Science and Liberal Arts (1982) and the School of Industrial Management (1988). The Albert Dorman Honors College was established in 1994, and the newest school, the College of Computing Sciences, was created in 2001.



DR. ROBERT A. ALTENKIRCH

President




Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch, formerly vice president for research at Mississippi State University (MSU), joined NJIT as the university's seventh president in July 2002. During his tenure as MSU vice president for research, science and engineering, expenditures as reported to National Science Foundation (NSF) increased dramatically—75% from 1997 to 2001.

Prior to his appointment as vice president at MSU, Altenkirch served as professor of mechanical and materials engineering and dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture at Washington State University. From 1988 to 1995, he was professor of mechanical engineering and dean of the College of Engineering at MSU. He also served as professor and chair of mechanical engineering at the University of Kentucky.

In addition to the research program, his responsibilities encompassed congressional relations, intellectual property management and economic development. While dean of engineering at MSU, he led the effort to secure National Science Foundation funding for the establishment of the MSU NSF Engineering Research Center for Computational Field Simulation in 1990. Additionally, the Center was instrumental in helping the State of Mississippi attract a \$1 billion Nissan manufacturing plant.

Altenkirch holds a PhD from Purdue University, an MS from the University of California, Berkeley, and a BSME from Purdue, all in mechanical engineering. He is the author of over 50 publications and nearly 100 presentations in combustion and heat transfer and served as principal investigator for ten Space Shuttle experiments investigating the spread of fire in reduced gravity. He is a Fellow of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

DR. JOEL BLOOMVice President of
Academic and Student Services

Dr. Joel Bloom has worked at NJIT since July 1990. In his current position, he is responsible for nine divisions of the university, including Physical Education and Athletics.

Dr. Bloom is also Dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College, which enrolls more than 525 students who are typically in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class.

Prior to NJIT, Dr. Bloom spent seven years as assistant Commissioner in the New Jersey Department of Education. He is currently the Chair of the NASULGC Council of Chief Student Affairs Officers and the Newark Consortium Board for Pre-College Education.

Dr. Bloom earned his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees from Hunter College, and holds a Master's and Doctorate from Columbia University Teachers College.

**LENNY KAPLAN**

Director of Athletics



Since taking over as head of NJIT's division of physical education and athletics in August 2000, Lenny Kaplan was instrumental in establishing a sound NCAA Division II program, setting the stage for the reclassification into NCAA Division I.

Kaplan helped solidify and expand an NJIT program that was entering its fourth year in Division II when he arrived in Newark and in late 2002, after discussions with university President Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch and Vice President Dr. Joel Bloom, Kaplan began the task of steering NJIT's programs into Division I, a process that is set to reach fruition with full championship eligibility in 2009-10.

Along the way, NJIT has enhanced the athletics program, particularly in areas that will benefit the student-athletes directly.

The sports offerings have expanded to 19 varsity sports, and since 2004, NJIT has renovated its two main on-campus venues—Lubetkin Field and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center. The school also signed a 10-year partnership to play its home baseball in the Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and agreed to host basketball in the new home of the NHL's New Jersey Devils.

In 2005-06, NJIT's outstanding home facilities allowed it to host two ECAC Division II postseason championships—women's soccer in the fall and baseball in the spring.

Under Kaplan's leadership, many teams achieved regional and national Division II ranking. Success for several women's teams was unprecedented, with basketball, tennis and soccer all reaching postseason play for the first time.

Additionally, men's volleyball captured a 2007 divisional championship in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association.

Before coming to NJIT, Lenny Kaplan served 11 years at Manhattan College, where he began as Manhattan's director of operations and then advanced to assistant athletics director.

Kaplan, a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration, resides in Merrick, NY, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.

Blazing the trail for the rest of the New Jersey Institute of Technology athletic program, men's soccer marked its first season as a full member of NCAA Division I in 2005.

That means the Highlanders are eligible for postseason championship play at the highest level of the college game and they will chase a berth in the NCAA Men's College Cup field.

Having obtained full Division I status, men's soccer is at the vanguard of NJIT's overall athletic reclassification. The men's journey to the top level began in 2003, under the NCAA's two-year single-sport per gender reclassification process. Highlanders women's soccer began a similar two-year process in 2005, with full Division I status and championship eligibility arriving in the 2007 season.

Also in 2005, the NCAA gave NJIT the green light to reclassify the remainder of its athletics program to Division I from Division II, a four-year process that will bring all Highlander sports to Division I championship eligibility in 2009-10.

The move for men's soccer advanced quickly after November 2002 discussions among President Robert A. Altenkirch, Vice President Joel Bloom and Athletics Director Lenny Kaplan. From there, came a proposal from Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a

plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I.

In rapid succession, the Atlantic Soccer Conference accepted NJIT as a member, Newark product Pedro Lopes, who had made his name as a star player and then assistant coach at Rutgers, was named head coach of the Highlanders and the NCAA received and accepted NJIT's formal application for reclassification.

Less than a year after those first discussions, NJIT, in September 2003, was in its first season of reclassification. The process continued into 2004, with all of the necessary compliance, including a schedule comprised exclusively of Division I opponents.

Off the field, enhanced scholarship and operating budgets enabled Lopes, who spent more than a decade in the national-level program at Rutgers, to strengthen the Highlanders. Before the 2004 season, assistant coach Javier Velasco gained full-time status and Lubetkin Field added a SprinTurf artificial surface to go with lighting and seating for more than 1,000 spectators, making for a first-class home facility.

NJIT's arrival in college soccer's big-time was underlined in 2005 when the Highlanders took on eventual Division I national champion Maryland. In addition to the champion Terrapins, NJIT has played numerous other

top teams. In 2005, the Highlanders played a tie against Stony Brook, which later posted a win in the NCAAs.

"NJIT, by what it has done with our program, has shown every prospective student-athlete that it wants its student-athletes to experience college athletics and academics at the highest level," said Lopes.

Upgrading athletics has been a priority for Dr. Altenkirch since he was selected as the seventh President of NJIT in May 2002.

"As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university athletically with our academic peers," said Altenkirch. "It will also enable us to recruit the best and brightest student-athletes, improve athletics facilities available to the entire NJIT community, gain regional and national visibility, and build strong linkages with students that will carry over to their days as alumni."

The NJIT men's soccer program has made 17 postseason appearances, including 1960, when the school, then called Newark College of Engineering, was NAIA national champion. Seventeen Highlanders have been named All-Americans and in 55 seasons, the team has 379 victories and a winning percentage of .528.

PEDRO LOPES*Head Coach*

Newark product Pedro Lopes became NJIT's ninth men's soccer head coach in July 2003, having previously spent seven seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Rutgers.

Assisting longtime head coach Bob Reasso, Lopes was involved in every aspect of leading Rutgers' national-level program. At NJIT, he has tapped that experience in building the Highlanders. Under Lopes' leadership, the Highlander program evolved to compete at the top level of the college game. Indeed, the 2005 Highlanders took on eventual NCAA Division I national champion Maryland just two years after competing in Division II during Lopes' first season at the helm.

With Lopes at the helm, NJIT men's soccer has been the vanguard of a transition that will see the entire athletic program advance to NCAA Division I championship eligibility —a level reached by men's soccer in 2005.

Under his steady hand, the growth of the Highlanders was apparent in 2005, as the team earned much-improved results, setting a school record with five ties, including one against Stony Brook, which would go on to win a game in the NCAA Division I College Cup championship field. Between 2004, NJIT's first season against Division I competition, and 2005, the Highlanders made dramatic strides, cutting their goals allowed total by more than half and also improving their offensive goals total.

In 2006, the Highlanders again improved

their season wins total from the previous year. On top of that, NJIT was 2-3-1 in league play, remaining in contention for the postseason Atlantic Soccer Conference tournament heading into the final weekend. Only a hard-fought 1-0 road loss at eventual champion Adelphi kept NJIT from its first Division I postseason play. At season's end, the Highlanders had improved their defensive stats again, yielding 28 goals in 2006, down slightly from 30 in 2005.

Lopes began coaching as a volunteer assistant at Rutgers in 1995, and then spent one season with Centenary (NJ) College before returning to the Scarlet Knights as a full-time assistant coach. He is also the Coaching Director for the Jersey Knights Soccer Club.

An integral part of championship teams his whole life as a player, Lopes was an All-American at Rutgers in both 1993 and 1994 and a two-time recipient of the Bob McNulty Award as team Most Valuable Player. He played in four NCAA Tournaments, including two Final Four appearances, with a national runner-up finish in 1990.

He was Atlantic 10 Conference Player of the Year in 1994, when Rutgers advanced to the Final Four for the third time in five seasons. In all four of his seasons, the Scarlet Knights won the A-10 championship and appeared in the NCAA Tournament. Rutgers was the national runner-up in 1990. He scored the game-winning goal in the 1993 Atlantic 10 Championship game and started all 86 games in his collegiate career. Not surprisingly, he was inducted into the Rutgers Olympic Hall of Fame class of 2004.

Lopes was a member of the United States U-23 National Team in 1993 and 1994 and he later played professionally with the NJ Imperials. Before college, Lopes was a High School All-American and New Jersey Player of the Year at perennial nation power St. Benedict's Prep in Newark.

Pedro and his wife, Heather, were married in June 2006 and they reside in North Brunswick, NJ. The couple is expecting its first child in October 2007.



JAVIER VELASCO

Assistant Coach



Full-time assistant Javier Velasco joined the NJIT staff prior to the 2003 season and he assists head coach Pedro Lopes with all aspects of the program. Concentrating on recruiting and scouting, Velasco is also responsible for the day-to-day operations of the program, coordinating travel and scheduling among his many responsibilities.

As a player, Velasco was a member of Centenary (NJ) College's 1995 NAIA national championship team and was Most Valuable Player of the title game. After playing at Kean University, Velasco embarked on a seven-year pro career, playing for teams in New Jersey in addition to one professional year in his native Ecuador, where he had won a U16 national title in 1989, representing the State of Manabi.

Moving to the United States, he was All-State at North Brunswick (NJ) High School and he spent two years playing club soccer with the Union Lancers, where he won a U17 state title in 1992 and was an U18 state finalist the following year.

Velasco is a 2000 graduate of Kean, with a degree in International Business. He is single and resides in Kearny, NJ.

OREN DANIEL

Assistant Coach



Having joined the NJIT staff before the 2004 season, Daniel brought seven years of club coaching experience, as well as an international professional playing background with him to NJIT.

He received a BS degree in management science and information systems from Rutgers in 1996, before playing five years of professional soccer, including two seasons with New Jersey-based teams, as well as teams in Slovakia and Israel. He owns a United State Soccer Federation "C" coaching license.

A native of Tulsa, Oklahoma, Daniel is a litigation analyst for AEGIS Insurance Services. He resides in Hoboken, NJ.

As New Jersey Institute of Technology men's soccer enters its fourth year competing at college soccer's top level, the Highlanders will be able to count on experienced players throughout the roster.

Seniors comprise a relatively small part of the roster, but they are joined by a solid group of juniors, many of whom already have two years as starters under their belts. Likewise, the team has a group of sophomores with starting experience, joined by a talented class of newcomers, including freshmen and transfers.

"We're still a young team—the bulk of our players are no more than juniors," said head coach Pedro Lopes. "This is where the time players have been together comes into play. I believe they're beginning to understand that every team goes into streaks. The question is—have they learned to deal with adversity? Also, to keep playing at a high level if they get the lead."

NJIT's move, starting with the first Division I schedule in 2004, has been a challenge, albeit expected. Coinciding with the move up, NJIT underwent a roster renovation in Lopes' debut season in 2003. The result—a team that would have been rebuilding at its former Division II level was also faced with a step up to Division I competition. Said Lopes: "We were thrown into the lion's den."

Having learned the hard lessons of 2004, the 2005 team, with a strong class of recruits, showed immediately that it was a team to be reckoned with. Opening 2005 at Boston University, a team that had advanced to the second round of the 2004 Division I College Cup, NJIT led for nearly 80 minutes, went behind, 2-1, but came back to tie before finally falling, 3-2, in overtime.

That 2005 opener foreshadowed a season that had another overtime loss and a school-record five double overtime ties. In addition, the Highlanders played four regulation games decided by a single goal.

Despite playing four matches against 2005 College Cup qualifiers, including eventual national champion Maryland, the Highlanders cut their goals against to 30, down from 62 in 2004.

Last year opened with promise, as NJIT set its Division I scoring record in a 5-0 win over Iona and then played to a hard-fought 1-0 loss against Boston University. The Highlanders posted a new Division I season high for wins, including a 2-3-1 record in the Atlantic Soccer Conference that saw enter the



final weekend with its first postseason berth in sight, only to fall, 1-0, in the season finale at eventual conference champ, Adelphi.

There were many more 2006 contests like the hard-fought match against BU than there were like the big win over Iona. On defense, the Highlanders held nine of their last 10 foes to two, or fewer, goals, but could only cash in two wins (both in overtime) and two ties.

"The biggest obstacle we faced was scoring goals," said Lopes. "Eventually, opponents will get a chance and score and that's what happened to us a lot last year. We'd miss good chances and then they'd score, or they'd score early and we just weren't able to score after that."

Not surprisingly, Lopes sought answers on the recruiting trail. "We tried to recruit players with a team attacking approach and the ability to score. We want to have more players who are a threat."

Lopes sees scoring as the key to improvement "If we can put some goals away, it will change the game," said the coach, who also counts on internal development. "Instead of us chasing the play, they will have to chase us and you will get a completely different game with us in the lead."

Among the returnees expected to play a role are flashy midfielder Osvaldo Perez, Swedish sophomores Erik Magnusson and Gustav Warfving and junior central midfielder Kayo Emojong.

Perez, who was limited to 10 games in 2006, converted twice in his three shots on goal and is creative on the ball.

Magnusson was a second-team all-ASC honoree and Warfving was the only Highlander to start all 16 games. "They're good players who now know what to expect from Division I soccer and I think that will help them be even better," Lopes said.

Emojong will be crucial in the middle of the field. Said Lopes: "Kayo is the engine of the team."

Senior Brian Nash, who came to NJIT after two years at Iona, did well creating opportunities for his Highlander teammates and is a potential starter.

Among the newcomers, Frank Carr, Brian Caine and Frank Vogas bear watching from the outset.

Carr, who posted 24 goals and 14 assists as a senior, was one of New Jersey's top high school stars a year ago. He was Middlesex

County Player of the Year, as well as all-state second team.

Vogas, as well, was all-New Jersey second team and is a goal scorer picked to play in the Annual Senior All-Star game, as well as in the May North-South All-Star game sponsored by the MLS Red Bulls. One of two natives of Jamaica who come to NJIT from Florida, Caine can help the Highlanders either at forward or in the midfield.

On the other end, NJIT is exceptionally deep in the final line of defense, with three goalkeepers experienced as Division I starters.

Josh Osit, a junior who played his first season for NJIT in 2006, started 13 times, with two shutouts, 65 saves and a 1.67 goals against average. Collin Cunning, now a senior, was an all-Atlantic Soccer Conference honoree in 2005. He played in seven 2006 contests and had a save percentage of .822. Ryan Sutherland, who redshirted in 2006, started four times in 2005, including NJIT's first-ever Division I win (2-0 vs. Manhattan on September 10).

"Right now, Josh is the number one, but Collin is very close to being a number one and Ryan is pushing the other two guys," said Lopes. "I will feel comfortable with whichever one of them wins the job."

The rest of the defense includes some of the team's steadiest and most experienced players. Senior captain Bobby Herrera is as reliable a player as NJIT has. "We look upon

him as a center back or defensive midfielder and he's a big, tough guy and team leader," said the coach.

Junior Rafael Barrera, returning for his third-year as a starter, is set as the center back. Fellow junior Scott Rietze is another third-year starter and team leader as a captain. Junior Dylan Broadley adds still more experience. "Dylan has played almost every minute and he understands his role," commented Lopes. "He can get our attack going, while also solidifying the right side of our defense."

Talented sophomore Michael Bento figures to contribute after a bout with mono short-circuited his freshman year. He had won a starting job, only to be forced to the sidelines. Said Lopes. "He's a very good player and I think we'll see more of that now that he's healthy."

Sophomore, Patrick O'Driscoll, progressed in his rookie year, appearing in 13 games, with seven starts.

Senior captain Dario Brito, a fiery leader, who has played in 10 games the last three seasons and underwent offseason surgery and freshmen Oshane Moodie are expected to solidify the left back spot. Moodie, like Caine, from Jamaica by way of Florida, was a Broward County all-star. A star track sprinter in high school, his speed is an asset on the soccer pitch, as well.

Freshman Pat Amato, New Jersey prep all-state player, is also in the mix.

Since moving to Division I, Lopes and NJIT have played eventual national champion Maryland in 2005, as well as numerous teams that reached NCAA postseason play.


This year, the Highlanders have added new challenges to the conference schedule and intriguing return dates. NJIT will fly across the country for a pair of early September games, visiting San Diego State, one of the top teams on the Pacific Coast and then taking on the University of San Diego two days later.

Later on, the Highlanders will travel down the New Jersey Turnpike for an October 10 game at Rutgers—the first Division I soccer meeting between the two schools.

"We try to put our players in position to compete against top teams," said Lopes. "San Diego and San Diego State are both excellent programs and Rutgers is a model for what we can become."

The New Jersey Institute of Technology soccer teams play their home games and practice on campus at Lubetkin Field, a first-class venue for college soccer.

Lubetkin Field, with two borders on the corner of Warren Street and Lock Street on the West end of NJIT's University Heights campus, is an all-weather facility, with 24/7 availability for competition or practice.

Outfitted with SprinTurf artificial grass in the summer of 2004, Lubetkin Field also includes lighting for night contests, bleacher seating for more than 1,000 spectators, a press box and scoreboard.

The fully-enclosed facility, with its entrance a few feet opposite the entrance of the indoor Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center, can take its place alongside any college soccer facility in the Northeast.

The home of Highlanders soccer was chosen as the venue when NJIT hosted the six-team, three-day 2005 ECAC Division II women's soccer championship tournament. In the fall of 2005, when the Northeast was hit with record rainfall, games went on without a hitch at Lubetkin Field, thanks to the quality of the surface. Indeed, with the rain

disrupting schedules around the region, some crucial Big East contests involving Seton Hall were moved to Lubetkin Field. Those games, too, went off without a hitch.

The NJIT soccer teams also have full access to the facilities in the Fleisher Center. These include the fitness area (containing computer-controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units and an indoor track), a free-weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), a martial arts center and an aerobics dance studio.

The NJIT men's and women's basketball teams and men's and women's volleyball teams play their home games in the Fleisher Athletic Center gymnasium, which, in the summer of 2006, underwent renovation to include installation of a new floor and baskets, new lighting, new sound system and new scoreboards, along with entirely new seating for approximately 1,500 spectators after the first phase of renovation. The back bay 'C gym' can be sectioned off from the main competition floor, making the facility useful for intramurals, physical education classes and campus recreation time, while being able to host multiple simultaneous events.

A six-lane swimming pool in Fleisher Athletic Center is home to the NJIT men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads play on the four outdoor lighted tennis courts behind Fleisher Athletic Center. The NJIT Campus Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.


Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, opened in 1999 at a cost of \$30 million and with a seating capacity of 6,200, became the home of NJIT baseball in 2004. In a joint December 2005 press conference, New York Yankees manager Joe Torre was a featured speaker as NJIT and the Newark Bears announced a 10-year partnership that cemented the downtown stadium as the home of all Highlanders home games for the decade to come.

NJIT, which offers a growing list of club sports, also has a robust intramural program, which makes use of the numerous athletic facilities. Each student must pass two physical education classes as a graduation requirement. Offerings include aerobics, archery, bowling, dance, fencing, golf, karate, swimming, skiing, strength training and conditioning, volleyball and water safety.



NEWARK: THE RENAISSANCE CITY

NJIT is located in the heart of New Jersey's largest city. A major urban center, Newark is a city on the move. Some 30,000 undergraduate, graduate and professional students attend classes in University Heights at the city's four public institutions of higher learning: NJIT, Rutgers-Newark, the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, and Essex County College.

NEWARK: NEW JERSEY'S COLLEGE TOWN

Adjacent to NJIT is the Newark campus of Rutgers University.

NJIT and Rutgers enjoy an exceptionally close and productive consortial relationship within the thriving University Heights section of Newark. NJIT and Rutgers students have library privileges at both campuses. NJIT students may also enrich their educational experience by enrolling in Rutgers-Newark courses and in full degree programs in disciplines not offered at NJIT, such as art, music, geology and psychology.

Each year the two universities co-sponsor a common season of theatrical productions, as well as 'World Week,' a joint program of honors colloquia, and a variety of other cultural and social activities.

NEW JERSEY/ NEW YORK METROPOLITAN REGION

The NJIT campus is in one of the nation's most exciting cultural and business regions. Advantages include:

PRUDENTIAL CENTER

The new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils is going up in downtown Newark at the corner of Mulberry and Edison streets, about one mile from the NJIT's University Heights campus.

Scheduled for completion in time for the Devils' 2007-08 season, the building is set to be the centerpiece of the city's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. In addition to the world's best hockey, 'The Rock' will be home to numerous entertainment and sporting events, including NCAA Division I basketball, with at least one NJIT home game in the building's first year.

The arena, with seating for 17,500 spectators, will feature a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as the latest in ice-surface technology and a gourmet restaurant overlooking the ice for Devils games. The building will contain 850,000 square feet of space, 9,000 tons of steel, eight million pounds of structural steel and 25,000 cubic yards of concrete.

RED BULL PARK

The Red Bulls of Major League Soccer and AEG New York broke ground in September 2006 for Red Bull Park, a 25,000-seat soccer stadium and a major component of the Harrison MetroCentre development, located across the Passaic River, about two miles from NJIT's campus.



The \$100 million 'soccer specific' stadium will feature a 360-degree European-style roof/canopy covering the majority of the seating. When completed in the summer of 2008, Red Bull Park will be the home of the MLS Red Bulls, international soccer and other events. AEG developed and operates 'soccer specific' stadiums in California and in Illinois.

The multi-billion dollar Harrison MetroCentre will feature three million square feet of office space; 3,500 residential units; 300,000 square feet of retail space and over 10,000 decked parking spaces when completed.

BEARS AND EAGLES RIVERFRONT STADIUM

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the professional baseball Newark Bears and since 2004 the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999. With a seating capacity of 6,200, "The Den" affords fans an up-close view of the



action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major league-caliber press box.

In December 2005, NJIT and the Bears held a joint press conference to herald a new partnership that includes a 10-year deal that extends Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium as the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball.

HERNAN "CHICO" BORJA

Hernan Borja was an all-America soccer player in his career at New Jersey Institute of Technology from 1977 to 1980 under coach Mal Simon. From NJIT, the man known as 'Chico' would earn a spot on one of the world's most famous club teams, the Cosmos, as well as a regular spot on the United States National team throughout the 1980's and also a career as one of the greatest indoor soccer players in world history.

With apologies to the baseball Yankees, it's quite likely that when it came to worldwide recognition, the most famous US-based team in any sport in the 1970's and 1980's was the Cosmos of the North American Soccer League.

In addition to playing in front of crowds exceeding 70,000 at Giants Stadium, the Cosmos routinely made world tours that drew sellout crowds on four continents. The club home of all-time greats Pele and Franz Beckenbauer, the Cosmos lineup was studded with world-class stars from South America and Europe. Among the regular attendees at Cosmos home games were celebrities ranging from Mick Jagger to Henry Kissinger.

Hernan 'Chico' Borja stepped from the fields of NJIT into the Cosmos spotlight, playing regularly and frequently starting for the famed club in 1981, 1982 and 1984.



When the Cosmos and the NASL departed the scene, Borja stayed in North America, moving to the indoor game with the Major Indoor Soccer League, the top indoor circuit in North America until 1992. Borja was one of the greatest players in that league's 14-year history, finishing fourth all-time in assists (338) and eighth in total points (612).

His greatness as an indoor star was underscored in 1992, when FIFA, the world's governing body for all soccer, named him to its all-World Championship first team for futsal, FIFA's 5 v 5 official indoor game.

He remained active in the outdoor game and it was rare for the United States National Team to play a game without him in the line-up at any time during the 1980's. He was a starter in full international competition in 1982, 1983, 1984 (3 matches), 1985 (2 matches) and 1988 (4 matches).

Playing for Team USA, he scored goals in three different full international matches, first finding the back of the net in a 2-0 win over Haiti on April 8, 1983. He later scored one of the two US goals in a 2-1 win over Trinidad and Tobago on May 15, 1985, in a qualifying match for the 1986 World Cup. Finally, he scored the only goal for the United States in a 3-1 loss vs. Chile on June 3, 1988.

The Newark College of Engineering (NCE) soccer team became national champions on November 26, 1960. Not before and not since has any NCE/NJIT athletic team accomplished this feat.

The championship game of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) tournament was halted by darkness after 16 minutes, 45 seconds, of overtime play and NCE tied with Elizabethtown College, 2-2. The teams were declared co-national champions by the NAIA, and NCE had completed its first (and still only) undefeated season, 12-0-1.

Under the leadership of sixth-year head coach Mal Simon, the Highlanders swept through the 1960 regular season with a 10-0 record, outscoring their opponents by a combined 41-9, including four shutouts. They then won the NAIA Area #3 championship and advanced to the national semifinals with a 2-1 victory against Pratt Institute.

NCE needed two overtimes to defeat Fitchburg State in the semis, and set up the championship meeting with Elizabethtown. The match, played at Slippery Rock State University, proceeded to the fourth extra period before being stopped. Sophomore Andy Handwerker and senior Gary Freimuth scored the Highlander goals.

After the season, halfback Werner Zorn was named NCE's first All-American. Only a junior, Zorn repeated the honor in 1961. Zorn, Savicky and Handwerker were named all-area, while sophomore Alex Khowaylo was selected the outstanding NAIA goalkeeper.

Many members of the 1960 team were still a part of the Highlanders the following year, when NCE again completed the regular season undefeated. The Highlanders returned to the national championship game, but lost to Howard University, 3-2, on a goal with 18 seconds remaining in regulation. From 1960 to 1962, NCE amassed a three-year record of 26-2-1 (.914).

Notes: NCE changed affiliation from the NAIA to NCAA Division III in 1974. The university changed its name to NJIT in 1975. The Highlanders reclassified to Division II in 1997 and to Division I in 2004.

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

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
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

The Atlantic Soccer Conference is the conference home for NJIT men's soccer.

The ASC postseason tournament brings together the top four regular season teams who meet in a two-day single-elimination event to determine the ASC champion. This year's tournament will be held on November 16 and 18 at the home field of the regular season champion.

Established in 2000, the ASC was a perfect fit for NJIT men's soccer when the Highlanders made the move up to NCAA Division I. NJIT became eligible for the conference championship in 2005, the year Highlanders men's soccer became a full championship-eligible member of NCAA Division I.

The ASC was founded by nine institutions offering Division I men's soccer while holding various NCAA classifications in their other sports. The founding members were: Adelphi, University at Albany, Binghamton, Florida International, Hartwick, Howard, Oneonta State, Philadelphia and Stony Brook.

Following the ASC's first season, Albany and Stony Brook moved their entire athletic programs to the America East Conference and Binghamton did the same in 2001.

In May 2003, NJIT was accepted as a new member and it played a conference schedule in 2004, but was not eligible for postseason play, a privilege that would arrive in the 2005 season.

In 2002, the ASC became an automatic qualifier to the NCAA College Cup for the first time. Florida International claimed the ASC's first berth.

FIU has since departed, as its entire athletic program moved into Conference USA. Also gone from among the founding members are: Oneonta State, which has reclassified men's soccer to conform with its overall program, which is NCAA Division III; and Hartwick, which became an associate member of the Mid-American Conference.

Following the Highlanders as newer members of the ASC are Longwood, which completed the reclassification of its entire athletic program to NCAA Division I. Florida Atlantic was new to the ASC for 2006. FAU, previously was part of another ASC—the Atlantic Sun Conference, needed a new home for men's soccer, when the rest of its program moved to the Sun Belt Conference, which does not sponsor men's soccer.

Florida Atlantic is a team to be reckoned with, having played for seven of the last 10 conference titles in its old home, the Atlantic Sun.

The 2007 lineup of institutions in the Atlantic Soccer Conference is: Adelphi, Florida Atlantic, Howard, Longwood, NJIT and Philadelphia.
