

About NJIT



NJIT is New Jersey's Science & Technology University. With roots going back to 1881, when it was founded as Newark Technical School, New Jersey Institute of Technology observed its 125th anniversary in 2006.

Located in University Heights, Newark, NJ, home to more than 30,000 college students, NJIT's campus is just 10 miles from New York City.

Playing a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future, NJIT, as a major public technological university, is an important pipeline for the flow of technology into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university helps to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In recent years, NJIT has put tens of millions of dollars toward new and improved buildings and facilities on the 48-acre campus, including biomedical engineering labs and a campus center.

Instructional Programs

NJIT offers an ever-expanding array of educational programs, with many new programs added in the last five years and more to come. In 2014 NJIT lists 125 undergraduate and graduate degree programs through six schools:

The student-faculty ratio is 16:1, with over 7,000 undergraduate students and nearly 3,000 graduate students. Our students hail from 33 states and more than 100 countries to rank eighth in the nation for diversity.



Albert Dorman Honors College enrolls more than 500 students who take advantage of honors courses, research opportunities, advising and mentoring. Honors College students have SAT scores ranking in the top 10 percent nationally.

About NJIT

Research

NJIT's research expenditures totaled more than \$110 million in FY2014 and faculty members welcome student collaboration on research projects.

As of September 1, 2014, NJIT had 185 issued U.S. Patents and 133 pending U.S. patent applications.

Economic Development

NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies. NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element, together with instruction, research and community service.

The Enterprise Development Center (EDC) at NJIT is New Jersey's largest high technology and life science business incubator, and one of the largest in the nation. EDC resident companies have attracted more than \$80 million in third-party funding since entering the incubator, and generated revenues of \$50 million last year. The approximately 90 member companies employ roughly 500 people.

A History of NJIT

From the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age, New Jersey Institute of Technology has a rich history with its beginnings developing from the industrial age.


In 1881, an act of the New Jersey State Legislature, recognizing an urgent need, sought a home for what would be the state's technical school. The efforts of Newark's public and private sectors resulted with the opening of Newark Technical School, addressing the state's need.

Over time, the university expanded its curriculum and mission. In 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By the middle of the 20th century, Newark Technical School was transformed into the robust Newark College of Engineering.

The post-war period was one of enormous activity with regular expansion of the campus, as

well as the introduction of doctoral level programs. In 1975, with the addition of the New Jersey School of Architecture, the institution had evolved into a technological university, emphasizing a broad range of degrees and dedication to significant research and public service. Newark College of Engineering, stronger than ever, remained intact, but a new university name -- New Jersey Institute of Technology – reflected the institution's expanded mission.

A broadened mission called for the creation of a residential campus and the opening of NJIT's first dormitory in 1980 began a period of steady growth that continues. Two new schools were established during the 1980s--the College of Science and Liberal Arts (1982) and the School of Industrial Management (1988). The Albert Dorman Honors College was established in 1994, and the College of Computing Sciences, was created in 2001. Beginning in 2009 the College of Architecture and Design was created to house the New Jersey School of Architecture and the new school of Art and Design.




Administration

Dr. Joel Bloom

President, New Jersey Institute of Technology

Appointed President of New Jersey Institute of Technology on January 12, 2012 by unanimous

vote of NJIT's Board of Trustees, Joel S. Bloom started his career in industry working as an economist.



He subsequently became an educator and administrator for the New York City public schools. Prior to coming to New Jersey, he worked as a research director and instructor at Teachers College, Columbia University.

In New Jersey, he managed state and federally-funded curriculum development and training centers for the state. From 1983 through 1990, Dr. Bloom served as assistant commissioner in the NJ Department of Education for the Division of General Academic Education. He was responsible for managing many of the education department's initiatives including competency testing, curriculum content standards, pre-school programs, establishment of 17 model effective schools, over 300 grants and contracts, and a \$24 million budget.

Immediately prior to his appointment as President, he served as Interim President from September 2011 until January 2012.

Prior to that, he was NJIT's Vice President for Academic and Student Services, as well as founding dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College.

Indeed, since joining NJIT in July 1990, Dr. Bloom has served the university in many capacities.

Promoted in 1996 to Vice President for Academi and Student Services, he was responsible for nine divisions of the university, including pre-college programs, enrollment management, continuing professional education, career development services, dean of student services, freshman studies, educational opportunity programs, library services, physical education and athletics.

Dr. Bloom was appointed as the first dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College in 1998, in addition to his vice president responsibilities. The Honors College enrolls over 650 students who come from 15 states and several foreign countries. The average SAT score is over 1340 and the majority of the incoming freshman class members graduated in the top 15 percent of their high school class. More than 50 percent of the Honors College students maintain a grade-point average higher than 3.5.

Dr. Bloom is chair of the Science Park Board, treasurer of the NJ President's Council, and treasurer of the NJEDge.Net Board. In addition, he serves as a member of the following boards: the Board for Communities and Schools, Newark Alliance, Philadelphia Alliance for Minority Participation, La Casa de Don Pedro, and the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities Presidents Council. Dr. Bloom has been the recipient of national and state education awards, as well as federal, foundation and corporate grant awards. He has published journal articles and presented papers on school improvement, curriculum development, college transition and student assessment.

Dr. Bloom holds a master's degree and a doctorate from Teachers College, Columbia University. He also earned master's and bachelor's degrees from Hunter College of the City University, New York City.

Charles J. Fey Vice President for Academic and Student Services



Dr. Fey joined NJIT in September 2012 with 39 years of leadership experience in student services as Vice President of Academic Support and Student Affairs.

At NJIT, he continues his commitment to creating a campus climate that promotes student achievement and student success. His personal philosophy of student engagement extends to the development of innovative programs that inspire challenging and engaging student experiences and encourage each student to reach for his/her dream and work until it is achieved.

Dr. Fey's strong record of accomplishments demonstrates his deep understanding of emerging issues and trends that affect metropolitan campuses and the students who attend them. In addition to his direct involvement with

students, Fey oversees numerous offices and departments at NJIT, including including Intercollegiate Athletics, Recreation and Intramurals, Physical Education.

Fey actively participates in student affairs business on a national level and holds or has held board positions in ACPA, NASPA, and APLU. He was the founding president of the Massachusetts College Personnel Association and was president of the Texas Association of College and University Personnel Association Fey has received numerous awards including the Esther Lloyd Jones Professional Service Award from ACPA; is a Diamond Honoree of ACPA's Foundation; twice received the Outstanding Service award from the Commission on Administrative Leadership of ACPA; and an exemplary service award from MCPA.

Fey earned his bachelor's degree in liberal arts and his masters of education degree in counselor education, college student personnel services, both from The Pennsylvania State University. He holds a doctorate in higher education administration from Texas A&M University.

Prior to NJIT, he was the Vice President for Student Affairs at The University of Akron; was Vice President for Student Affairs at University of Maryland, Baltimore County (UMBC); Dean of Students at the University of Texas at El Paso; served as Vice President and Dean of Student Life at Our Lady of the Lake University in San Antonio; Dean of Students at St. Mary's University, also in San Antonio; Associate Dean of Student Affairs at Keene (NH) State College; Director of Housing/Resident Life at Catholic University of America; and in numerous student affairs and other administrative posts at Newbury Junior College in Boston.

Married to Melba Ann Fey since 1985, Charlie and Melba have two daughters, Kelly Prestel, living in Boston, and Chelsea Fey, living in Arlington, VA and two sons, Lloyd Lopez and Matt Lopez, who live in San Antonio.

Administration

Lenny Kaplan *Director of Athletics*



Since taking over as head of NJIT's division of physical education and athletics in August 2000, Lenny Kaplan has been instrumental in guiding NJIT's reclassification to NCAA Division I.

First, Kaplan helped stabilize and expand a program that was entering its fourth year in Division II when he arrived in Newark. In late 2002, after discussions with then-President Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch and then-Vice President Dr. Joel Bloom, Kaplan took on the task of steering NJIT's programs into Division I, a process that reached fruition with the NCAA's granting active Division I status, with full championship eligibility effective September 1, 2009.

Throughout Kaplan's tenure, NJIT has enhanced the athletics program, particularly in areas that benefit the student-athletes directly. A hallmark in achieving that aim was

the Highlanders Athletics Campaign, which announced in the summer of 2009 that it had raised \$5.4 million against a goal of \$5 million. Of the \$5 million in the goal, \$3 million was for facilities, \$1.5 million for athletics scholarships, and \$500,000 for program support.

The sports offerings have expanded to its current 19 varsity programs, with the newest, men's lacrosse set to debut in 2015. Since 2004, NJIT has renovated its two main on-campus venues—Lubetkin Field at Mal Simon Stadium and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center. Further, the newest facility, the Naimoli Family Athletic and Recreational Facility, a 25,600-square foot building opened in March 2011 as a heated and air conditioned space that includes indoor tennis courts used for intercollegiate competition.

On Kaplan's watch, the school signed a 10-year partnership to play all home baseball in the professional Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and later agreed to host basketball in the Prudential Center, the downtown Newark home of the NHL's New Jersey Devils.

Under Kaplan's leadership, many teams achieved regional and national Division II ranking. Success for several women's teams was unprecedented, with basketball, tennis and soccer all reaching postseason play for the first time under his administration.

Additionally, men's volleyball captured a 2007 divisional championship in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association and the next year reached the EIVA playoff semifinals hosted by eventual 2008 national champion Penn State.

In 2009-10, NJIT's first full year as an active member of NCAA Division I, the women's volleyball team and senior Sabrina Baby became the school's first national statistical champions at the Division I level, as team and individual leaders, respectively in digs per set. Baby was honored as NJIT's first CoSIDA Academic All-America in the Division I era, earning third-team national honors.

Christian Baumbach made history in 2009 when he was NJIT's first Division I individual sport conference champion, taking first place in the Great West Conference cross country race and in the prestigious IC4A University Division race, a competition held for the 101st time in 2009.

Kaplan guided the Highlanders into the all-sports Great West Conference and the women's tennis team won back-to-back GWC titles in 2011 and 2012. In 2012-13, both NJIT basketball teams captured GWC crowns, with the men winning their regular season title and the women's winning the GWC postseason tournament.

Two Highlanders men's basketball standouts—Isaiah Wilkerson (Class of 2012) and Chris Flores (Class of 2013)—received honorable mention on the Associated Press All-America team, the first such national honorees for NJIT at the Division Llevel.

Wilkerson continued his career as a professional in the NBA D-League and Flores and women's basketball star Rayven Johnson (Class of 2013) went overseas to professional careers in Germany.

In 2012-13, baseball pitcher Mark Leiter, Jr., was selected by the Philadelphia Phillies organization in the Major League Baseball First-Year Player draft and fellow pitcher Tripp Davis signed as a free agent with the Kansas City Royals organization.

In 2103-14, Marko Drijic became the first NJIT men's soccer player to be selected to the All-Region season honors from the NSCAA at the highest level, earning NSCAA/Continental Tire Division I Men's All-North Atlantic Region honors, while men's tennis player Markus Schultz advanced to the round of 16 at the 2013 USTA/ITA National Regional Championships, the furthest any NJIT tennis player has advanced at the ITA tournament.

Two members of the NJIT men's basketball team, Terrence Smith and Damon Lynn finished the 2013-14 season ranked in the top 4 in the nation—Smith third in individual field-goal percentage and Lynn fourth in 3-point field goals made. NJIT men's fencer David Kong whose weapon is the foil, earned a 16-place finish at the US National Championships and ranks 24th in the nation and 14th under 20. He placed 18th in the men's foil competition at the 2014 NCAA Fencing Championships, becoming the first NJIT fencer in 10 years to advance to the championships.

John Porteous became the first NJIT track and field athlete to qualify to the 2014 NCAA Track and Field Regional, earning a spot in the men's 400-meter hurdles.

Two NJIT sports, women's tennis and men's soccer, were invited to join automatic qualifying Division I conferences in their respective sports. Women's tennis is in the America East Conference, reaching the AEC final in 2014 and men's soccer is one of programs in the Sun Belt Conference, which is sponsoring the sport in 2014 for the first time since 1995.

Before coming to NJIT, Lenny Kaplan served 11 years at Manhattan College, where he began as Manhattan's director of operations and was assistant athletics director from 1991-2000.

Kaplan, a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration, resides in Merrick, NY, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.

Matt Koscs, ATC, Head Athletic Trainer

Matt Koscs, who earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from University of Delaware, has served NJIT as head trainer since July 2009, a year after he joined the staff as an assistant trainer.

As an undergraduate at Delaware, he was recipient of the Paris Delligatti Memorial Award for Excellence in Athletic Training. He earned his MS in Exercise Science from Delaware in 2008.

Prior to his arrival at NJIT, Matt served three years as the head athletic trainer at Hodgson Vocational Technical High School in Newark, DE, from 2005 to 2008.

In addition to his work at the high school level, he was head athletic trainer for the Delaware Dynasty semi-pro soccer team in Wilmington, as well as with the Kirkwood Soccer Club in New Castle in 2005 and 2006.

He was employed from 2005 to 2008 at Christiana Care Physical Therapy Plus, in Newark, DE, where he was an athletic trainer and was the Director of Athletic Training Services in a clinical setting.

He is a NATABOC certified athletic trainer, as well as holding additional certifications as a professional rescuer and in first aid.

He resides in Metuchen, NJ with his wife Kristin and daughters Eloise, Claire and Madeleine.



Paul Grayner, ATC, Assistant Athletic Trainer

Paul Grayner, who joined the NJIT staff as an assistant athletic trainer late in the 2008 calendar year, has a diverse background in athletic training, having served at the college and professional levels, as well as in a fitness center setting.

A graduate of Saint Leo College in Florida and holder of a master's degree from American University in Washington, DC, Grayner has served as both a head and assistant trainer in the past.

From the mid-1970s to the mid-1980s, he was a trainer in the minor league systems of the New York Yankees and New York Mets from 1977 to 1985 and in 1984 he was assistant trainer with the Mets. He later worked with the Long Island Knights professional basketball team.

At the collegiate level, he was head trainer at Division I Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ from 1989 to 1998 and he earlier worked as an assistant trainer at Hofstra (1982-85) and Adelphi (1985) on Long Island before joining FDU as an assistant (1986-89).

In addition to his work in athletic training, Grayner is a financial services representative and a life insurance sales representative.

He resides in Dumont, NJ.



Brittany Vorndran, ATC, Assistant Athletic Trainer

Brittany Vorndran, who joined the NJIT staff as an assistant athletic trainer in the summer of 2012, earned her bachelor's degree, majoring in athletic training, from Bridgewater (MA) State University in 2010 and was the school's 2008-09 Athletic Training Student of the Year.

She earned her master's in Kinesiology at James Madison University in Harrisonburg, VA, in May 2012.

At James Madison, she worked with the cross country, track and field, tennis and cheerleading teams.

A resident of Millville, NJ, she has worked as a substitute teacher for the Millville Board of Education.



Melissa Maskery, ATC, Assistant Athletic Trainer

Melissa Maskery, who joined the NJIT staff as an assistant athletic trainer in the summer of 2013, earned her bachelor's degree, majoring in athletic training and minoring in strength and conditioning, from the

University of Delaware in 2011.

She earned her master's in athletic training at Temple University in May 2013.

As a graduate assistant, she worked in Philadelphia with several Division I teams at Drexel University and as an undergraduate, on the medical staff for Delaware's 2010 Division I Football Championship Series (formerly known as Division I-AA) national runner-up.

She has worked as a trainer at numerous summer camps and before coming to NJIT, she earned the 2013 Merit Award for Research in the College of Health Sciences & Social Work and was the recipient of Drexel University Dragon Award for Leadership.

Kyle Tuohy, ATC, Assistant Athletic Trainer

Kyle Tuohy, a 2014 summa cum laude graduate of East Stroudsburg (PA) University, joined the NJIT athletic training staff in September 2014.

Tuohy, who will attend graduate school while working

at NJIT, won multiple awards from his alma mater, including the David Carylon Athletic Training Outstanding Student Award in May 2014.

He had varied clinical internship experience starting in the Fall Semester 2012 and continuing through his senior year.

His internships included stints with the East Stroudsburg women's basketball team; Parkland High School and Pen Argyl High School, both in Pennsylvania; the Tennessee Smokies professional baseball team, Class AA minor league affiliate of the Chicago Cubs; and Lafayette College in Easton, PA, where he worked closely with the Leopards football team in season and also worked with athletes from all in-season sports in the Fall Semester.

He holds several profession-related certifications, including from the National Athletic Trainers Association.

Prior to starting his own practice, Dr Rizio was the Chief of Sports Medicine at the NJ Medical School from 2000-2005. He currently is a professional, college, and high school team physician.

In 2013, Dr. Rizio was honored by the magazine New Jersey Monthly on its "Jersey Choice Top Doctors" list.

Strength and Conditioning

There are many ways to make a team better and a vital path to improvement comes with the mantra "bigger, stronger, faster."

It's how teams get better from within by maximizing individual and team performance in competition. The Strength and Conditioning staff also works closely with the Athletic Training Staff in the areas of injury prevention and rehabilitation.

In the summer and fall of 2014, NJIT's Strength and Conditioning took new direction with the appointment of Bobby Fisk as Head Strength and Conditioning Coach and Drew Culp as Fisk's Assistant Coach.

Bobby Fisk, who was a basketball player in his own college days and coached the sport after college, comes to NJIT from Xavier University in Cincinnati, where he was assistant coach of strength and conditioning for

the entire Musketeers' program, which competes in the Big East Conference.

Fisk, a native of Schenectady, NY, spent over two years at Hobart and William Smith Colleges in Geneva, NY, where, as head strength and conditioning coach, he worked with successful teams, including women's soccer (William Smith College), which won the 2013 NCAA Division III National Championship; football (Hobart), which advanced to the 2012 Division III national quarterfinals and the regional finals in 2011 and 2013; and basketball, where Hobart reached the second round of the 2012 NCAA Tournament.

Moving to the Division I level with Xavier in 2013-14, Fisk worked with all 16 of the school's teams, with a primary assignment to women's basketball, men's and women's soccer, baseball, and men's and women's tennis.

He is a graduate of the State University of New York College at Oneonta (BS, Business Economics, 2008), Averett University of Danville, VA (MBA, 2010), and California University of Pennsylvania (MS in Exercise Science, Performance Enhancement & Injury Prevention, 2013)

As a student-athlete, Fisk was a men's basketball player at NCAA Division I UMBC in Baltimore for three years before transferring to Oneonta, where he was on the team for two years, serving as captain as a senior and earning All-State University of New York Athletic Conference honorable mention.

As a senior for Oneonta's Red Dragons, he finished 16th in the nation in Division III in 3-point shooting percentage (.441) and 22nd in 3-pointers made per game (3.2) as a senior at Oneonta.

After graduation from Oneonta, he entered coaching while pursuing his master's degree at Averett, serving that program as assistant men's basketball coach (two years) and head strength and conditioning coach (one year).

Having received his master's degree from

Averett in December 2010, he returned home to the Schenectady area and worked April 2011 to July 2011 as assistant strength and conditioning coach at nearby Siena College and with the minor professional basketball Albany Legends (head strength and conditioning coach).

Fisk holds multiple certifications and professional memberships.



Drew Culp, Assistant Strength & Conditioning

NJIT's head strength and conditioning coach Bobby Fisk named Drew Culp to be his assistant coach in September 2014.

Culp, who earned his bachelor's degree from Penn State University in 2010 and his master's degree from

Penn State in 2012, most recently served as a volunteer assistant strength and conditioning coach at nearby Seton Hall prior to accepting his position with NJIT.

At Seton Hall, Culp worked with the school's Big East Conference men's and women's basketball teams, as well as with the men's soccer team.

Between college and coming to New Jersey, Culp worked at Velocity Sports Performance in Irvine, CA. He was a Sports Performance Coach and Assistant Sports Performance Director. Specifically, he was the Head Strength and Conditioning Coach for the El Toro High School football team and also assisted in training National Football League combine athletes. He also offered private training to athletes in a range of sports and age levels.

Drew Culp was a graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach at Penn State, working with the Nittany Lions football team for over a year through preseason 2012 and working with 11 Olympic Sports teams in his final semester.

He holds multiple certifications, including both strength and conditioning and first aid and CPR.

Academic Enrichment



Sandra Taylor, Director of The Learning Center

Sandra Taylor was appointed as Director of The Learning Center in late September 2014 after serving as Interim Director for the previous 16 months.

She joined NJIT in January 2010 as Academic Advisor for Student-

Athletes working in NJIT's Center for Academic and Personal Enrichment (CAPE), which has since been renamed as The Learning Center.

She mentored student-athletes in the areas of academic support, personal development, leadership, and community service. She was instrumental in bringing the Chi Alpha Sigma Honor Society for student-athletes to campus and has been individually certified from the N4A (National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics) as an academic advisor for student-athletes.

In May 2013, she was elevated to Interim Director of CAPE and presided over its transition to the Learning Center in August of 2014. The Learning Center provides academic support to all students, mentoring and workshops, tutoring in areas outside of math and writing, and testing accommodations for students with disabilities. She has served on NJIT's Strategic Planning, Academic Advising, Retention and Persistence, Customer Service, Student Satisfaction, and Athletic Oversight Committees.

Prior to joining NJIT, Taylor spent 17 years as a key member of the Manhattan College Department of Athletics. She earned both her bachelor's degree in secondary education and her master's degree in special education from Manhattan College and is working on her doctorate in educational leadership at St. Mary's University in Winona, MN.

Working in the athletics department at Manhattan, a founding member of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference, Taylor was Associate Director of Athletics and Senior Woman Administrator, having filled those posts from 1996 until joining NJIT in 2010,

Administration

For much of her time on the Manhattan staff (1995 to 2003), she was Chief Athletic Department Compliance Officer, with responsibility for Manhattan's adherence to NCAA Division I, MAAC and college regulations. She began her service at Manhattan as Athletic Department Ticket Manager, serving in that capacity from 1993 to 2003.

In her time at Manhattan, she served on numerous NCAA, conference and internal college committees, including service on the NCAA Division I Management Council from 2004 to 2007 and as chair of the NCAA Women's Lacrosse Committee from 2002 to 2006.

At the conference level, she chaired the MAAC Women's Basketball Committee from 1997 to 2009 and also served on four other sport committees, as well as on the MAAC Committee on Athletic Administration, with service as vice-chair in 2008-09.

Internally at Manhattan, her assignments included service on the Middle States Review in 2000 and on the NCAA Certification Committee.

Sandra and her husband, Ken, who is Associate Commissioner for Men's Basketball and Baseball at the MAAC, reside in Monroe Township, NJ, with their daughters, Katherine, who was born in May 2004, and Samantha, who was born in July 2009.



Mike Spisto, Eligibility Certification Officer/Academic Advisor for Athletics

Mike Spisto moved to administration as NJIT's Eligibility Certification Office/ Academic Adviser for Athletics in the Spring of 2013, working in the Center for Academic and Personal Enrichment (CAPE), now named

The Learning Center.

For the previous five years, he was the top assistant coach on the men's basketball staff, working with head coach Jim Engles in an association that culminated with the Highlanders capturing the 2013 regular season championship of the Great West Conference.

In addition to 14 years college coaching—five at NJIT—he served as Director of Athletics at the State University of New York at Delhi in the two years before he joined Engles' coaching staff with the Highlanders.

He had two stints as head coach at SUNY at Delhi sandwiched around three years as a Division I assistant with Rider and Albany (NY). He began his coaching career with two years an assistant at his alma mater. Division III SUNY Oneonta.

At Delhi, which is also an alma mater, he was head coach from 1999 to 2001, left to become a Division I assistant and then returned for another two-year stint as head coach from 2004 to 2006 before becoming AD at Delhi.

His head coaching record in four years at SUNY Delhi was 86-31 and both stints included championships and coaching awards. His first Division I coaching assignment came at Rider University in 2001-02, where he worked alongside Jim Engles as an assistant when Rider captured its first-ever Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference regular season championship.

Heading to the University at Albany (NY), he helped recruit the team that would win back-to-back America East Conference championships.

Spisto's coaching career began at Oneonta State following his 1997 graduation. In addition to his bachelor's degree from Oneonta, he earned an associate's degree from SUNY Delhi, as well as an MSS from United States Sports Academy.

He played at both Delhi and Oneonta and was allregion twice at Delhi, where he is the career assists leader. At Oneonta he was captain as a senior after winning an ECAC title his junior year.

Mike and his wife, Katie-Lynn, reside in Staten Island, NY, with their young children: sons Michael (9) and Christopher (6), and daughter Alyssa (2).

Remembering Joe Caiola



On June 29, 2014, NJIT athletics lost one of its top administrators, Assistant Director of Athletics Joe Caiola, who passed away unexpectedly at the age of 57 in Fort Myers, Florida.

As hard-working and vital a contributor as he was the department's day-to-day operation, more important to the many that knew him was the way Joe touched so many lives with his warm personality and kind spirit.

Born in Newark on February 16, 1957, Joe Caiola earned two degrees from NJIT, a Bachelor of Science, cum laude, with a major in engineering technology in 1980, and a Master of Science in Management in 1984. He previously earned an Associate in Applied Science in 1978 from Brookdale Community College (Lincroft, NJ) in 1978.

While he was an undergraduate at NJIT, Caiola was a two-year member of the men's basketball team. In his final college game on February 29, 1980, Joe exploded for a career-high 40 points against Concordia of New York. In addition to being Joe's personal career-best, that 40-point total is sixth on the all-time list for the Highlanders, who have fielded intercollegiate basketball teams since 1922.

Upon graduation from NJIT, Caiola embarked on a career in marketing and management in technical staff augmentation and contract engineering services. He held that position full-time for over a decade and later began working as a developer of single-family homes.

However, sports remained a passion for Joe and, along with his full-time work, he became a part-time coach in boys basketball in the mid-1990s.

Not long after, he returned to NJIT as an assistant men's basketball coach in 1997 and soon added responsibilities as an Assistant Director of Athletics. Having spent 17 years on the staff at NJIT, he was the longest-tenured employee of the department among administrators and coaches. At the time of his passing, Joe held the title of Assistant Athletics Director for Business, Facilities, and Events Management.

In addition to his work for NJIT, he was active in youth basketball and baseball in Edison, NJ, his hometown for the last 29 years of his life.

An avid bike rider who, on more than one occasion, rode from Edison to Newark and back, a round-trip of nearly 50 miles, Joe also continued to play recreational basketball in his 50s and played every year in the annual NJIT Alumni basketball games, which he helped organize. He played

throughout the most recent alumni game, held in February 2014.

Joe Caiola was a special person, universally well-liked among his NJIT co-workers and his friendliness and his kind spirit were evident almost immediately when he met new people.


He enthusiastically took on new tasks on the job, no matter how difficult, and he was always the first to help others. Many a co-worker could tell personal stories of how Joe helped them in a time of need.

He worked especially closely with the Highlander baseball program and often traveled to the team's away games. He was the administrator-incharge at several away Great West Conference baseball tournaments across the country and when NJIT hosted the 2013 Great West Conference Tournament, the last one for the GWC, he was Tournament Director, a post he also held when NJIT hosted previous baseball and soccer championship tournaments. Joe also accompanied other Highlander teams when they traveled to far away tournaments.

He is survived by his wife Carol and their two sons, Joe and Anthony. Both sons followed in their father's path, attending and graduating from NJIT. Joe, the elder of the Caiola brothers earned both bachelor's and master's degrees, while Anthony earned a bachelor's degree and played as member of the Highlanders baseball team for four years, completing his playing career in 2012.

His sons and their accomplishment were a special source of pride and joy for Joe. If you knew Joe well enough to speak to him regularly, you would hear news about all that his boys were doing as their lives progressed from high school all the way through college and entering the job market.

Joe is also survived by his parents, Nicholas and Filomena, and by his brother, Nicholas, Jr., in addition to numerous in-laws, nieces, nephews and cousins.

NJIT & NCAA Division I

Beginning on September 1, 2009, the entire NJIT athletics program officially gained across-the-board active membership in NCAA Division I, completing a process that began officially in 2003.

NJIT, its teams and student-athletes enjoy the full benefits of Division I membership, including eligibility for Division I postseason championship competition and the inclusion of the Highlanders among the national Division I leaders in statistics maintained by the NCAA.

Within months of NJIT's active Division I membership, the school won its first national Division I statistical championships, as women's volleyball players Sabrina Baby led the nation in digs per set and her teammates captured the team crown for digs, as well.

The NCAA's decision to make NJIT a full member of Division I completed a specific timetable that required NJIT and its Department of Athletics to meet a series of annual benchmarks before proceeding to the next step in the process.

NJIT, which competed in NCAA Division II beginning in 1997-98 and in NCAA Division III for more than two decades before that, made its first formal move toward Division I reclassification with men's soccer paving the way in 2003. That move grew out of November 2002 meetings among then-President Robert A. Altenkirch, then Vice President Joel Bloom (who would later succeed Altenkirch as NJIT's President) and Director of Athletics Lenny Kaplan. From there came a proposal for Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I. Little more than two years later, the NCAA approved NJIT's proposal to begin advancing its entire program to Division I.

Men's soccer achieved active Division I status in 2005 and NJIT women's soccer

became postseason-eligible in 2007. The remaining programs also began reclassifying in 2005, with active status taking longer for an entire athletics program than under the single-sport- pergender track used for the two soccer programs.

In 2005-06 the lion's share of the competition for all but the men's soccer program came at the Division II level. In 2006-07, 2007-08, and 2008-09, NJIT's teams competed at the Division I level and fully complied with NCAA Division I rules, but were not eligible for championships at the top level.

Every facet of the program has been enhanced in the move to Division I with a

special emphasis placed on studentathlete welfare. Facility upgrades have gone along with sports medicine staff expansion, a strength and conditioning program, and academic enrichment. NJIT has built a model NCAA Division I rules compliance regimen within its athletics program and across the entire university.

Further, the Board of Trustees embraced the transition to Division I as part of the University's strategic plan to enhance the quality of campus life for all students as NJIT makes the transition to being a residential university.

NJIT's teams have competed throughout the United States, taking on opponents from schools that are instantly recognizable for their stature in academics and athletics.

NJIT student-athletes have faced opponents every lvy League institution, as well as the Patriot League, including Army and Navy, Buckell, Lafayette, and Lehigh.

The Highlanders have also competed against teams from every Division I conference with teams either in the Northeast or Mid-Atlantic States, including the America East, American Athletic, Atlantic 10, Big East, Colonial Athletic Association, Metro Atlantic Athletic, Mid-Eastern Athletic, and Northeast.

The eighth New Jersey-based institution in Division I, NJIT has competed against all

seven of its home state peers, including Rutgers and Seton Hall.

In addition, Highlander teams have taken on squads from power conferences such as the ACC, Big Ten, Big 12, and Pac-12.

Two high-profile opponents, Maryland in men's soccer in 2005 and Penn State in men's volleyball in 2008, won national championships following the same regular seasons in which they faced NJIT.

NJIT joined its first Division I conference in 2009-10 when the Great West became an all-sports conference and women's tennis captured back-to-back league titles in 2011 and 2012. In 2012-13, the final year of the GWC, NJIT men's basketball was regular season champion and NJIT

women's basketball was GWC Tournament champion.

Moving on from the Great West, NJIT women's tennis joined the America East Conference in 2013-14 and finished as conference runner-up in 2014, the Highlanders' first try at the AEC title. NJIT men's soccer began play as a member of the Sun Belt Conference in 2014, with the Sun Belt champion earning an automatic qualifying berth in the Division I College Cup field.

Also in 2013-14, NJIT men's swimming became one of three new members in the Coastal Collegiate Swimming Association (CCSA), a 15-member Division I association.

Athletics Facilities

The New Jersey Institute of Technology teams play home games and practice in a combination of facilities on campus and off.

The on-campus facilities include Lubetkin Field at Mal Simon Stadium for outdoor sports and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center for indoor sports. In addition, NJIT in 2011 opened is the Naimoli Family Athletic and Recreational Facility, a multi-purpose indoor facility on the site of the former outdoor tennis courts.

Off-campus venues include Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, a professional minor league stadium that is the home of NJIT baseball; the Prudential Center, home of the NHL Devils and NBA Nets, which has hosted selected NJIT basketball games; and, Branch Brook Park in Newark and Van Cortlandt Park in the Bronx, home sites for NJIT cross country. All except for Van Cortlandt Park are less than two miles from the NJIT campus.

Lubetkin Field at Mal Simon Stadium

The men's and women's soccer teams play their home games and practice on campus at Lubetkin Field at Malc Simon Stadium, a first-class venue for college soccer.

The field on the west end of NJIT's University Heights campus is an all-weather facility, with 24/7 availability for competition or practice. Outfitted with SprinTurf artificial grass in the summer of 2004, Lubetkin Field at Mal Simon Stadium also includes lighting for night contests, bleacher seating for more than 1,200 spectators, a press box and scoreboard.

The fully-enclosed facility, with its entrance a few feet opposite the entrance of the indoor Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center, can take its place alongside any college soccer facility in the Northeast.

The home of Highlanders soccer served as the host site for the first-ever Great West Conference

women's soccer championship tournament in November 2009. Previously, NJIT hosted the three-day 2005 ECAC Division II women's soccer championship tournament.

In the fall of 2005, when the Northeast was hit with record rainfall, games went on without a hitch at Lubetkin Field, thanks to the quality of the surface. Indeed, with the rain disrupting schedules around the region, some crucial Big East contests involving Seton Hall were moved to NJIT's home field. Those games, too, went off without a hitch.

Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center

The NJIT men's and women's basketball teams and men's and women's volleyball teams play their home games in the Fleisher Athletic Center gymnasium, while the swimming and diving team competes and practices in building's pool. The Fleisher Center also houses intercollegiate fencing, as well as all athletic department offices, varsity and general weight and fitness rooms, and the athletic training room.

In the summer of 2006, the gym underwent renovation to include installation of a new floor and baskets, new lighting, new sound system and new scoreboards, along with entirely new seating for approximately 1,500 spectators after the first phase of renovation. The back bay 'C gym' can




Soccer locker room at Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center

be sectioned off from the main competition floor, making the facility useful for intramurals, physical education classes and campus recreation time, while being able to host multiple simultaneous events.

A six-lane swimming pool in Fleisher Athletic Center is home to the NJIT swimming team. Fencing has its own area on the second floor of the building.

In addition to all athletic department offices, the Fleisher Athletic Center also houses the sports medicine staff in the Athletic Training Room and the varsity weight room, supervised by the head strength and condition coach. The building's third floor is home to a fitness center, which is open for use by all students and staff.



Athletics Facilities

The Naimoli Family Athletic & Recreation Facility

Opened in 2011, the facility is approximately 25,600 square feet. The Naimoli Family Center will be a multi-purpose space for athletics, community recreation, and gatherings involving large numbers of people.

Built on top of the old outdoor tennis courts adjoining the Fleisher Athletic Center, construction of this new building has been made possible, in part, by a generous gift from Vincent Naimoli '62, Chairman and CEO of Anchor Industries International and Chairman Emeritus/Founder of the Tampa Bay Rays major league baseball team.

The facility houses courts for tennis and is available for other athletic and recreational activities, including practice for basketball and volleyball. It is heated and air conditioned, with flooring appropriate for the intended athletics and recreational activities.

Its indoor tennis courts offer vital year round practice and playing opportunities for NJIT's intercollegiate tennis teams, which have been consistently successful in the transition to Division I. In 2011, the women's tennis team became NJIT's first conference championship team in the Division I era.




The Naimoli Family Athletic & Recreation Facility

Branch Brook Park and Van Cortlandt Park

A hallmark of the NJIT cross country program under veteran coach Al Alonso is its ability to host cross country competition that have made Highlander-sponsored races a popular destination for schools from throughout the New York/New Jersey area.

In 2009, NJIT hosted the Great West Conference championships at Van Cortlandt Park in the Bronx, and the course, which is home to some of the most prestigious events in the sport, is also the home venue for other annual NJIT-hosted races. Branch Brook Park, which is a public park of Essex County,

reaches into several towns, including Newark, with the park entrance less than a mile from the NJIT campus.

Track Facilities

The NJIT men's and women's indoor track & field team trains at the Jersey City Armory which is home to a 6-lane indoor 200m track while the outdoor track & field team trains at the Nat Turner Park 6-lane outdoor 400m track.



Prudential Center

In October 2007, the Prudential Center ushered in a new era in sports and entertainment in Newark and the entire northern New Jersey area.

Prudential Center is the cornerstone in the revitalization and renaissance of downtown Newark. In addition to the arena, Newark will soon add scores of condominiums, restaurants, themed bars and mixed retail establishments. Prudential Center, one of the finest arenas in the country, is New Jersey's home for hockey, basketball, concerts and numerous other events.

A public/private partnership between the City of Newark and Devils Arena Entertainment made the \$375 million Prudential Center a reality that is changing the face of downtown Newark and making it a destination place for sports and live entertainment in the region.

"The Rock" is located about a mile from NJIT's University Heights campus and is known best as the home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils and the former home of the National Basketball Association New Jersey Nets.

The arrival of the spectacular Prudential Center nearly coincided with NJIT's arrival as an NCAA Division I institution--the first in Newark and the newest in New Jersey in more than 20 years. The Rock opened one year after NJIT began Division I competition as part of its NCAA reclassification which is now complete.

In the arena's inaugural year, NJIT played host to six basketball games on four dates, including four men's basketball games and two women's games. Included was the first women's basketball game in the building's history, when the Highlanders entertained Cornell on January 15, 2008.

The Highlanders hosted additional basketball games in subsequent years and have played there each year of the building's existence. Further, NJIT's club ice hockey team plays all of its home games

in the full-size Devils practice rink facility (AmeriHealth Pavilion), which adjoins the main arena and has an 800-seat capacity. And one of the special events held in the main arena is NJIT's annual commencement.

Athletics Facilities

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium: Home of the NJIT Highlanders

Joe Torre, then the manager of the New York Yankees, visited New Jersey Institute of Technology on December 8, 2005 to herald a new partnership between NJIT's baseball team, the Highlanders, and Newark professional baseball.

Torre was on hand as the Highlanders signed a 10-year contract to play their home games at Bears & Eagles Riverfront Stadium in Newark.

"I think this partnership is nothing but aces," Torre said during a press conference at NJIT. "It's a partnership between two class organizations that will make for nothing but a lot of fun for everyone."

For the previous two years, the Highlanders played their home games at the stadium. But the team's longer-term commitment to play at the stadium came as NJIT elevated its baseball program to Division I.


"NJIT is bringing Division I baseball to this great stadium," said NJIT President Robert A. Altenkirch, "which will generate the highest level of excitement. It's a great partnership that allows NJIT to play intercollegiate baseball in a great facility, maybe the best for college baseball in the country."

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of professional baseball in Newark, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999.

With a seating capacity of 6,200 Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadiums affords everyone in attendance an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major league-caliber press box featuring two radio booths and two television booths.

The name, Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, honors Newark's rich baseball history. The original Bears were a farm team for the New York Yankees up until 1949 and the Eagles were a very successful Negro League team that played in Newark until 1950.

Newark: The Renaissance City

NJIT is located in the heart of New Jersey's largest city, Newark, with a population of over 300,000, making it the 65th-largest city in the United States. A major urban center, Newark is a city on the move.

Newark: New Jersey's College Town

Some 30,000 undergraduate, graduate, and professional students attend classes in the University Heights section, which is home to NJIT, Rutgers-Newark, Rutgers Biomedical and Health Services, and Essex County College.

Adjacent to NJIT to the east, is the Newark campus of Rutgers University and the two schools enjoy an exceptionally close and productive relationship. NJIT and Rutgers students have library privileges at both campuses. NJIT students may also enrich their educational experience by enrolling in Rutgers-Newark courses and in full degree programs in disciplines not offered by NJIT, such as art, music, geology, and psychology.

Each year, the two universities co-sponsor a common season of theatrical productions, as well as 'World Week', a joint program of honors colloquia, and a variety of other cultural and social activities.

NJIT also enjoys a cooperative relationship with its neighbor to the west in the University Heights area, UMDNJ, with several joint degree programs.

New Jersey/New York Metropolitan Region

NJIT and Newark are a part of a region that is a magnet not only to the rest of the United States, but also to the world.

In Newark and neighboring northern New Jersey alone, attractions such as the Prudential Center, New Jersey Performing Arts Center, Meadowlands Sports Complex, Red Bull Arena, Liberty Science Center, and numerous others are minutes away by car and in most cases accessible by public transportation. Literally dozens of shopping malls are within a 20-minute drive of Newark, as well.

Midtown Manhattan, with all that it and the rest of New York City offer, is less than 15 miles from the NJIT campus.

NJIT students have regular access to discount tickets for Broadway shows, museums, concerts, and sporting events.

The school also sponsors weekend trips throughout the northeastern United States, with activities such as skiing, boating, swimming, hiking, and more.

The spectacular Jersey shore is less than an hour away by car and winter sports are within a couple of hours drive to the west and north.

Sports & Entertainment Around Newark

NJIT, with its campus in Newark, NJ, sits in a region that abounds with major professional sports unlike any other in the United States and perhaps in the world. There are nine teams in the major professional leagues (MLB, NFL, NBA, and NHL) located in New York City, northern New Jersey and Long Island.

Only one of nine major teams is more than 25 miles from Newark, but most, including MetLife Stadium (Giants and Jets NFL football), Madison Square Garden (NBA Knicks, NHL Rangers), are much closer.

The three closest professional sports venues (listed below) are within three miles of NJIT's campus and can be accessed in a matter of minutes at low cost by public transportation, beginning with Newark Light Rail, from campus.


Prudential Center

The home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils is in downtown Newark at the corner of Mulberry and Edison streets, about one mile from the NJIT's University Heights campus.

Opened in October 2007, 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of the city's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. In addition to NHL hockey, it has hosted numerous entertainment and sporting events, including NJIT basketball.

NJIT played basketball in the Rock in the inaugural year and in each year since. Indeed, NJIT hosted the first women's basketball game ever played in the Prudential Center on January 15, 2008 (NJIT vs. Cornell).

The arena, with full-capacity seating for 18,500 spectators, features a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as the latest in ice-surface technology and a gourmet restaurant overlooking the ice for Devils games. The building contains 850,000 square feet of space, 9,000 tons of steel, eight million pounds of structural steel and 25,000 cubic yards of concrete.



Sports & Entertainment Around Newark



Red Bull Arena

Located in Harrison, NJ, just across the Passaic River from Newark and less than three miles from the NJIT campus, the new home of the New York Red Bulls (opened in March 2010) sets the standard for soccer venues across North America.

The state-of-the-art soccer-specific facility is a major component of a multi-billion dollar development.

Red Bull Arena has a number of key design elements which give its seating bowl a close-to-the-action feeling and the unique stadium roof design extends from its leading edge over the entire seating bowl and then curve down to the concourse.

The overall seating capacity for soccer is 25,000, including 30 luxury suites (20 lower level and 10 upper level) and 1,116 club seats. Other amenities include three stadium clubs and two retail outlets.



Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of professional baseball and, since 2004, the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999. With a seating capacity of 6,200, "The Den" affords fans an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major league-caliber press box.

In December 2005, NJIT and the Bears held a joint press conference to herald a new partnership that includes a 10-year deal that extends Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium as the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball.

NJIT Men's Soccer Joins Sun Belt Conference as Affiliate Member; Sun Belt Champ to Get NCAA Berth

The Sun Belt Conference announced in February 2014 that men's soccer will be the 18th championship sport for the conference and that NJIT will be one of three men's soccer affiliate members of the Sun Belt, with play beginning in the 2014 season. The Sun Belt champion, to be chosen in a postseason tournament, will automatically qualify for a spot in the NCAA Division I College Cup field.



The men's soccer component of

the Sun Belt Conference will consist of teams representing full-time members Appalachian State University (Boone, NC), Georgia Southern University (Statesboro), and Georgia State University (Atlanta), plus affiliate members NJIT, Hartwick College (Oneonta, NY), and Howard University (Washington, DC).

The teams will play a single round-robin conference schedule consisting of five regular season games, followed by a conference tournament to be hosted by a member institution. In 2014, Georgia Southern will host the Sun Belt Conference tournament on November 13, 14, and 16.

The championship format will see the top two teams from the regular season earning a bye into the tournament semifinals. The championr will earn the coveted automatic qualifying bid to the NCAA Men's Soccer Championship.

"NJIT is very excited to be part of the Sun Belt Conference," said Director of Athletics Lenny Kaplan. "It gives our student-athletes and coaches the competition and championship opportunity they deserve."

Coach Didier Orellana said: "It's an exciting day for the NJIT men's soccer program and Highlander family. It's always special to be a part of history and have an opportunity to compete for postseason play against highly reputable soccer programs and be a part of the highly-respected Sun Belt Conference. These developments are not only advantageous for men's soccer, but will surely elevate NJIT's national exposure."

This move to add men's soccer to its championship offerings actually is a rebirth of the sport in the Sun Belt,

which conducted men's soccer championships from 1976 to 1995.

"The reintroduction of men's soccer to the Sun Belt Conference means that we will be able to provide valuable opportunities for student-athletes and deliver them a first-class championship experience," said Sun Belt Conference Commissioner Karl Benson. "Our new affiliate members provide us with a full field of

competitive teams and we welcome them to the Sun Belt Conference.

"We are looking forward to having an automatic qualifier in the sport to represent us in the NCAA postseason," said Benson. "And we are optimistic at the possibility of sending multiple teams to the tournament field each year."

For NJIT, the opportunity to play in the Sun Belt Conference is a boon for its men's soccer program, which played as a Division I Independent in 2012 and 2013.

The first NJIT program to move to the Division I level in 2004, men's soccer was then part of the Atlantic Soccer Conference, which had an automatic qualifying berth for the NCAAs until 2007, when it fell below the minimum number of programs needed to retain an NCAA bid. The ASC continued without an NCAA bid for its champion from 2008 to 2011, but folded after that.

The three new affiliate members of the Sun Belt were all part of the old ASC at some point, with Howard belonging for the entirety (2000-2011), NJIT belonging from 2004 to 2011, and Hartwick, a founding member in 2000, departing for the Mid-American Conference, where it played from 2007 through 2013.

Among the three full members of the Sun Belt Conference with men's soccer, Appalachian State previously played in the Southern Conference, posting a 4-7-7 overall record in 2013; Georgia Southern also played in the Southern Conference and was 9-10 overall in 2013; Georgia State was 9-9-1 in 2013 as an Independent and made the NCAA field as recently as 2011, when it was in the Colonial Athletic Association.



Head Coach Didier Orellana



Didier Orellana, who helped build NJIT's most successful Division I men's soccer team as an assistant coach, was promoted to head coach of the Highlanders in March 2013.

Orellana was the lead assistant for NJIT in 2011 and 2012, when the team set a school Division I record for wins (10) and finished ranked eighth in the final North Atlantic Region coaches' poll.

He took over the NJIT head coaching job from Cesar Markovic, who resigned to become head coach at Siena College.

In 2011, NJIT, which began Division I men's soccer competition in 2004, tied the program D-I record for most wins, with five. In 2012, the Highlanders made a huge leap, doubling their wins total to 10.

NJIT's success in 2012 was recognized with nearcontinuous Top 10 ranking in the weekly National Soccer Coaches Association North Atlantic Region poll throughout the season and the final eighth-place ranking.

"I'm excited to have Didier step up and build upon what he helped start as an assistant," said NJIT Director of Athletics Lenny Kaplan in announcing the coaching move. "I'm confident he'll keep the great turnaround we've had and move us toward being one of the top teams in the region year in and year out."

In Orellana's first season at the helm, he led NJIT to a 7-9-2 record in 2013 against an Independent schedule that saw the Highlanders play 12 of their 18 matches away from home, including a pair of one-goal losses on the road against nationally-ranked St. John's (#19 at the time) and Fairleigh Dickinson (#22).

Orellana, who holds a bachelor's degree from Southern Connecticut State University and a master's degree from Queens (NY) College, has coached soccer at all three levels of the NCAA. He began his career as an assistant coach at Division II New York Institute of Technology (2001-05), before serving six seasons as head coach at Division III Manhattanville (2005-10). He signed on as top assistant at NJIT early in the 2011 calendar year.

In six seasons as head coach at Manhattanville (2005-10), he produced 56 wins, putting him atop that school's career coaching list. In 2009, his Valiants posted a 13-5-1 record and he was honored as Freedom Conference Coach of the Year. The following year, Manhattanville was 10-6-1 in his final season before he came to NJIT as Markovic's top assistant.

In his first college coaching job, Orellana was part of a turnaround that saw NYIT go from a 3-14 record in 2000 to a 14-2-2 record in 2003 that included a berth in the NCAA Division II Tournament.

As an undergraduate student-athlete at Southern Connecticut, Orellana played for one of the top Division II programs in the country, winning the 1995 Division II National Championship and reaching the national semifinals in his three other seasons.

Orellana's coach at Southern Connecticut was Ray Reid, now the head coach at the University of Connecticut and owner of the secondhighest career winning percentage (.770) in all of Division I soccer. Coach Reid has three Division



II National Championships at Southern on his resume, as well as one Division I national crown at UConn.

As highly-respected a coach as there is in the college game, Reid is enthusiastic in his support of his former player. "NJIT is getting a steal, a home run" said the UConn coach of Orellana. "He is a great young man who, even when he was playing, I thought would become a coach and be very good at it. Didier was always a hard worker and he asked all the right questions so that he understood everything we were doing and why-and he's worked his way up in the coaching profession. He'll do a great job for NJIT."

Orellana was also endorsed by his NJIT predecessor, Cesar Markovic, who counts Tom Giovatto, the successful Division I coach at St. Francis Brooklyn, and Jack Stefanowski, the national team coach of Nepal, among his former assistants who have gone on to head coaching success in their own right.

"Didier is absolutely ready for the challenge and I am very happy that he is the one taking my place," said Markovic. "His years of head coaching experience in Division III have now been combined with the last two years at NJIT. He combines a tremendous passion for soccer with a cerebral approach to the game that will make him a success."

Orellana, who had responsibility in all aspects of the NJIT program in his two years as an assistant, said this when named to his current post: "I'm humbled and extremely grateful to Lenny Kaplan and the rest of the NJIT administration for giving me this opportunity," the new head coach said. "I'm looking forward to continuing what's already in place and I have so many things I want us to do as a team and as a program."

Didier and his wife, Elizabeth, reside in Queens, NY, with their twin boys Gabriel and Alejandro (6) and daughter Alysia (5).



Assistant Coach David Janezic



David Janezic joined the NJIT men's soccer coaching staff in Spring 2013, coming on as an assistant to newly-appointed head coach Didier Orellana.

A New Jersey product who played at Raritan High School in Hazlet and then in the NCAA Division I program at Monmouth University, Janezic came to NJIT having been head men's soccer coach at Brookdale Community College in Lincroft

in 2012 as well as with the USSDA U15/16's Academy and NJSA04-United States Development Academy.

He led Brookdale to the National Junior College Athletic Association Region XIX and Garden State Athletic Conference championships in 2012, with a 10-1-1 conference record, a 10-1-1 region record and an 18-4-1 overall record. The Jersey Blues advanced to the NJCAA Division III National Tournament under Janezic's guidance. He was named GSAC and Region XIX Coach of the Year for his leadership and Brookdale ranked 9th in the final national poll, as well as leading the nation in goals against average.

At the club level, Janezic's team was ranked 49th in the country and he worked alongside Tab Ramos, a member of the National Soccer Hall of Fame and head coach of Under-20 United States National Team.

Before becoming head coach at Brookdale, Janezic was an assistant men's coach at NCAA Division II Caldwell College.

He began his college coaching career at his alma mater, Monmouth, working there from 1997-2001 and then served as Director of Coaching for the Hazlet Soccer Association from 2002 to 2009 before returning to the college ranks with Caldwell.

As a player at Monmouth from 1992 to 1996, Janezic earned team, conference, and regional honors and went on to play professionally, including a stint with the indoor Philadelphia Kixx in 1997-98 and outdoors with the Central Jersey Riptide. Before college, Janezic earned state, area, and county honors for Raritan HS, where he was a captain.

David and his wife Maryann, reside in Aberdeen, NJ with daughter Macy Quinn and newborn son Landon Robert.

Assistant Coach Evan Brandsdorfer



Evan Brandsdorfer joined the NJIT men's soccer staff as an assistant coach in the summer of 2014, having most recently served as an assistant men's coach at Drew University in Madison, NJ.

The East Brunswick, NJ resident is a 2012 graduate of Temple University, where he was 3-year player for the Division I Owls after transferring from the University of North Florida.


A Dean's List student at Temple and member of the Athletic Director's honor roll, Brandsdorfer earned his master's degree from the University of Stirling in Scotland, United Kingdom. There, he played on teams and served as an assistant coach for Eddy May, a former Scottish U21 international player.

In addition to his work with the Stirling XI, he also assisted with Falkirk FC, a team in the Scottish Professional Football (soccer) League.

While still in college, he was a summer marketing intern with the New York Red Bulls of Major League Soccer and a soccer intern with YSC Sports in Pennsylvania. He also began coaching and training players. Beginning in 2008, he was a trainer/coach in East Brunswick and in 2013, he was a lead trainer for the Dinamo Zagreb (Croatia) Youth Academy New Jersey elite camp.

He broke into college coaching stateside with Drew, where he assisted head coach Lenny Armuth in leading the NCAA Division III program to an 11-4-5 record in 2013.

Volunteer Assistant Coach Chris Condron



Veteran coach Chris Condron joined the NJIT men's soccer coaching staff as a volunteer assistant coach ahead of the 2014 season.

Condron is a 1994 graduate of Elizabethtown (PA) College, where he played four years. Coincidentally, Elizabethtown was 1960 co-national champion of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics along with Newark College of Engineering

(NJIT's name at the time).

By the time Condron was in college, Elizabethtown, like NJIT, had moved from the NAIA to the NCAA. In four seasons, Condron played on four NCAA Division III Tournament teams, which posted a combined record of 82-10-6. He contributed 25 goals and 19 assists in his career. He went on to play after college with the New Jersey Riptide.

As a college head coach, Condron guided Keuka College, an NCAA Division III program in the Finger Lakes region of upstate New York, in 2001 and 2002. Keuka was conference champion both years and he earned Coach of the Year honors in 2001 before leading his team to the ECAC postseason semi-finals the following year.

Moving to New Jersey, Condron was head coach of Rutgers-Newark in 2003 and 2004. As an assistant coach, he was on the staff at Clarkson University and later coached at Drew University (2005-2007) and most recently at Kean University (2012-13).

Between college posts, he was varsity 'B' team head coach at national prep power St. Benedict's Prep in Newark. Indeed, including his past as head coach at Rutgers-Newark and his work at St. Benedict's, his addition to the staff at NJIT gives him the rare trifecta of having coached soccer at three schools in the University Heights neighborhood of Newark.

He has extensive camp and club coaching experience and he served two seasons as North American scout for a professional team in Belgium.



Undefeated 1960 NAIA National Soccer Champions

Unbeaten national champions. It's a name only a select few college teams in any sport have ever worn.

One of those teams was the soccer team from Newark College of Engineering in 1960.

That team from NCE, coached by J. Malcolm (Mal) Simon, in his sixth year, with assistance from Lou DeVito, and captained by Guy Cilento and Bill Garro, sailed through its schedule, winning all 10 games and outscoring the opposition, 41-9. They allowed more than one goal in a game just twice (4-2 win over Trenton State and 5-3 win over Drew).

Facing Pratt in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Area #3 championship at Stevens in Hoboken, NJ, the Highlanders came out ahead, 2-1, earning a spot in the national semifinals.

The last two rounds of the national tournament were hosted by Slippery Rock State in Pennsylvania and the last two games proved to be the most challenging.

In the national semifinals, it took two overtimes, but Fitchburg State of Massachusetts became NCE's 12th victim in as many starts--3-2, NCE.

All the tension of the semifinal match turned out to be prologue, as the championship game against Elizabethtown College of Pennsylvania on November 26 proved even more suspenseful still.

In the end, the NCE and Elizabethtown played on and on through four goals, regulation time and four overtimes. Finally, nature stepped in, as darkness brought things to a halt with the score tied 2-2 after 16 minutes, 45 seconds of overtime play.

The NAIA declared the two teams co-national

champions and the Highlanders ended their season with both an unbeaten record (12-0-1) and a national

The roster of that 1960 team was a true reflection of New Jersey, as every player resided in the Garden State. Indeed, most of those were from the immigrant-rich communities in the region, which nurtured a level of play not found in many other parts of the country.

Twelve different players scored goals that year, paced by John Savicky, with nine. Andy Handwerker scored eight, while Anatole Kulyk and Ed Cruz added six apiece.

After the season, halfback Werner Zorn was named as NCE's first NAIA All-American, an honor he would repeat in 1961. Zorn, Savicky and Handwerker were all-area and Alex Khowaylo was selected as the outstanding NAIA goalkeeper.

Unbeaten national champions. It sounds just as sweet 50 years later and counting.

Many members of the 1960 team were still part of the Highlanders the following year, when NCE again completed the regular season undefeated. The Highlanders returned to the national championship game, but lost to Howard University (an annual foe to this day since both teams have become NCAA Division I programs). That 1961 championship loss to Howard came with just 18 seconds remaining in regulation time. From 1960 to 1962, NCE amassed a three-year combined record of 26-2-1.

Notes: NCE changed its national affiliation from NAIA to NCAA Division III in 1974. The university changed its name to NJIT in 1975. The Highlanders reclassified within the NCAA to Division II in 1997 and to Division I in 2004.

The Highlanders Rich Soccer Legacy

Hernan "Chico" Borja Spread NJIT's Name Around the Globe



Hernan Borja was an all-America soccer player in his career at New Jersey Institute of Technology from 1977 to 1980 under coach Mal Simon.

For more than a decade, Borja carried NJIT's name with him around the world as

a professional player, first with the famed Cosmos of New York and then as one of the greatest indoor soccer players of his era.

From NJIT, the man known as 'Chico' would earn a spot on one of the world's most famous club teams, the Cosmos, as well as a regular spot on the United States National Team throughout the 1980's and also a career as one of the greatest indoor soccer players in world history.

With apologies to the baseball Yankees, it's quite likely that when it came to worldwide recognition, the most famous US-based team in any sport in the 1970's and 1980's was the Cosmos of the North American Soccer League.

In addition to playing in front of crowds 70,000 exceeding at Giants Stadium, the Cosmos routinely drew sellout crowds during tours to four continents. The club home of all-time greats Pele and Franz Beckenbauer, the Cosmos lineup was studded with world-class stars from South America and Europe. Among the regular attendees at Cosmos home games were celebrities ranging from Mick Jagger to Henry Kissinger.

> Hernan 'Chico' Borja stepped from the fields of NJIT into the Cosmos spotlight, playing regularly and frequently starting for the famed club in 1981, 1982 and 1984.

When the Cosmos and the NASL departed the scene, Borja moved to the indoor game with the Major Indoor Soccer League, the top indoor circuit in North America until 1992. Borja was one of the greatest players in that league's 14-year history, finishing fourth all-time in assists (338) and eighth in total points (612).

His greatness as an indoor star was underscored in 1992, when FIFA, the world's governing body for all soccer, named him to its all-World Championship first team for futsal, FIFA's 5 v 5 official indoor game.

He remained active in the outdoor game throughout and it was rare for the United States National Team to play a game without him in the lineup at any time during the 1980's. He was a starter in full international competition in 1982, 1983, 1984 (3 matches), 1985 (2 matches) and 1988 (4 matches).

Playing for Team USA, he scored goals in three different full international matches, first finding the back of the net in a 2-0 win over Haiti on April 8, 1983. He later scored one of the two US goals in a 2-1 win over Trinidad and Tobago on May 15, 1985, in a qualifying match for the 1986 World Cup. Finally, he scored the only goal for the United States in a 3-1 loss vs. Chile on June 3, 1988.

He remains active in soccer as a coach and two of his former players, Oshane Moodie and Brian Caine came north from Florida to NJIT, where they began playing as freshmen in 2007.

Chico was not alone in earning all-America honors for NJIT (NCE). Indeed, he is one of 12 players to receive the coveted recognition playing for the Highlanders.

NCE/NJIT All-Americans

Here is a brief look at the other nine all-Americans, with notes from their induction into the NJIT Hall of Fame:



Werner Zorn, 1960, 61

Werner Zorn, a soccer player from 1958-61, was Newark College of Engineering's first all-American and a key member of the 1960 NAIA national championship soccer team. NCE was NAIA national runner-up in 1961.



Alex Khowaylo, 1962

Alex Khowaylo, a soccer player from 1960-63 was an outstanding goalie for the soccer team at Newark College of Engineering from 1959 to 1962, including being named "all-America" and winning the NAIA national championship in 1960. NCE was NAIA national runner-up in 1961.



John Rapsomanikis, 1963

John Rapsomanikis, was a member of the men's soccer team from 1960-63.



Myron Worobec, 1964

Myron Worobec, was an outstanding soccer player at Newark College of Engineering from 1962-65. A prolific scorer he was named all-East, all-Area, all-America, a member of the U.S. Pan American team and a member of the U.S. Olympic team.



Myron Bakun, 1965, 66

Myron Bakun, was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame for his outstanding contributions as a soccer player at Newark College of Engineering from 1964-66, including being selected two-time all-American, the region's Most Valuable Player, and team captain. His soccer and leadership abilities were a model for all to follow.



Ali Hubey, 1969, 70, 71

Ali Hubey, a member of the 1969-71 men's soccer team was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame for his performance on the field which earned him all-American recognition for three consecutive seasons 1969, 1970, 1971. He was team MVP in 1970 and was named to the NJIT/NCE Centennial all-time soccer team.



Fabian Hurtado, 1971, 74 (HM)

Fabian Hurtado was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame as the holder of career scoring records with 65 goals and as first-team all-American in soccer in 1974. He was all-State and all-Area for three years and all-NAIA in 1973. He remains the all-time record-holder in the NAIA Tournament for most shots in a game, firing 18 against Goshen of Indiana in 1973. Hurtado went on to play professionally, including a stint in

1975 with the Dallas Tornado of the old North American Soccer League, which was the top league in North America.



Joe Dias, 1975 (HM)

Joe Dias, a soccer player from 1973-76, his performance earned all-America honors in 1976 as well as all-Area and all-State in both 1975 and 1976, he finished with 34 career goals placing him third all-time.



Kenneth Hammond, 1977 (HM)

Kenny Hammond, was an outstanding soccer player from 1974-77. His team reached three NCAA Tournaments and had a combined record of 35-15-2. Among NJIT's top 10 all-time goal scorers, he earned Honorable Mention all-America honors in 1977 and went on to play three seasons of professional soccer.



Andrew Bakun, 1981

Andrew Bakun, was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame for his outstanding achievements as an athlete in soccer from 1978-81. A four-year starter, Bakun was a versatile performer. He played three positions during his career at NJIT, earning all-State honors as a sophomore and all-Area accolades his junior year. He earned the 16th all-American award in NCE/NJIT men's soccer history following his senior season of 1981. Bakun scored eight career goals.



Raymond Paulius, 1983

Ray Paulius played soccer at NJIT from 1980-83, during which time the Highlanders posted a combined record of 36-26-2. In 1983, he was honored as a first-team all-America and is one of two men in school history to earn first-team all-America recognition in NCAA Division III from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America. Paulius was a quadcaptain and all-American his senior year. The team MVP in

1983, Ray was first-team all-State and all-Region honoree that year as the Highlanders advanced to the finals of the ECAC postseason tournament.
