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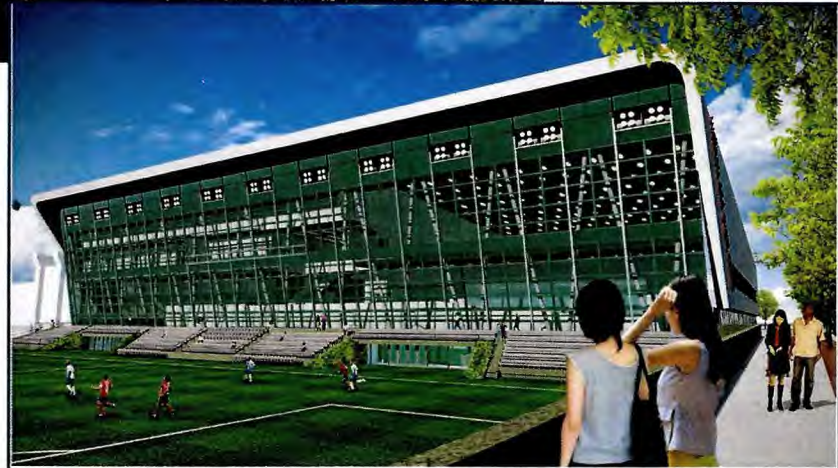

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THE NJIT WELLNESS AND EVENTS CENTER

NJIT hosted a groundbreaking ceremony on Thursday, November 12, 2015 for the Wellness and Events Center (WEC), a sleek new building that has the promise to become the social centerpiece of a revamped campus.



The Wellness and Events Center (WEC) is a \$102 million building that will be constructed on the site of the current Lubetkin Field at Mal Simon Stadium athletic field. WEC will extend across the length of the field, which will later be rebuilt on the north side of the building. The construction of WEC, which began after the groundbreaking, will be finished in the fall of 2017.

The WEC will accommodate the rapid growth of the school's athletic department, student body, and campus community. In addition to a number of conference, academic, and community facilities, the building will house a first-class basketball arena, natatorium, locker rooms, indoor track, concessions, suites, offices, and a fitness center.

The 3,500 seat basketball arena will compare favorably with many Division I mid-major facilities throughout the country, allowing NJIT to continue to grow their men's and women's basketball programs.

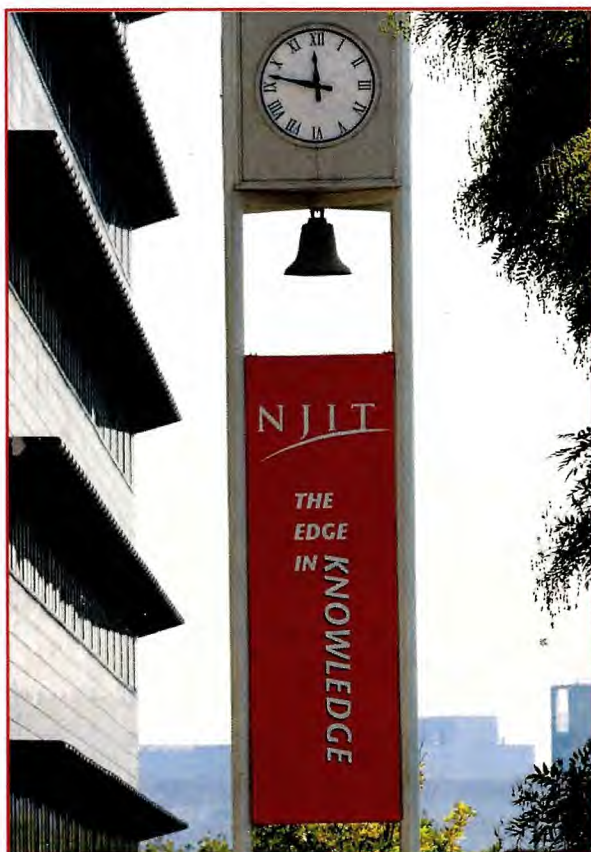


WEC will have many amenities, just some of which include:

- A 25-meter swimming pool with diving area
- A fitness center with cardio equipment and weights
- Lounges, study areas and multipurpose rooms
- An indoor 10,000 square feet turf space
- Two practice courts for intramural and intercollegiate sports
- A running track that will encircle the concourse of the first-floor arena
- The arena will seat 3,500 people, but the bleachers are designed to retract, allowing the floor space in the arena to triple in size.
- The expanded floor space will host campus events and professional conferences
- An inside path on the first floor will allow students to walk from the subway and other areas on Lock Street to the main campus quad
- A 30-foot-wide promenade between Tiernan Hall
- The outside steps and the open space on WEC's northside are designed for students to sit comfortably
- WEC will be three stories high and its north side will be all windows, through which natural light will flood into the building. The tall windows will overlook the new athletic field.

In recent years, NJIT has put tens of millions of dollars toward new and improved buildings and facilities on the 48-acre campus, including biomedical engineering labs and a campus center.

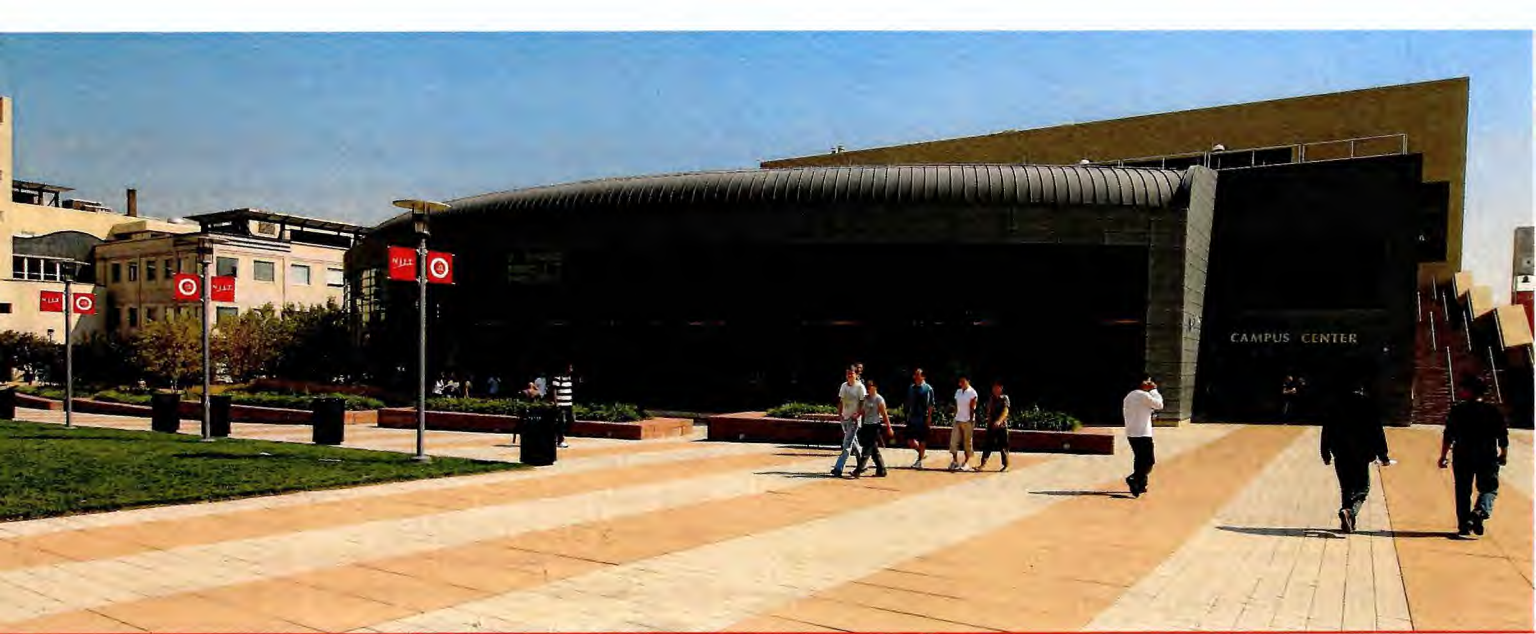
Instructional Programs

NJIT has 277 tenured or tenure track faculty; 99 percent of whom hold doctoral degrees or the highest degree attainable in their field. The student-faculty ratio is 16:1, with over 7,000 undergraduate students and nearly 3,000 graduate students. Our students hail from 33 states and more than 100 countries to rank eighth in the nation for diversity.

Albert Dorman Honors College enrolls more than 500 students who take advantage of honors courses, research opportunities, advising and mentoring. Honors College students have SAT scores ranking in the top 10 percent nationally.

About NJIT

Research

NJIT's research expenditures totaled more than \$110 million in FY2014 and faculty members welcome student collaboration on research projects.

As of September 1, 2014, NJIT had 185 issued U.S. Patents and 133 pending U.S. patent applications.

Economic Development

NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies. NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element, together with instruction, research and community service.

The Enterprise Development Center (EDC) at NJIT is New Jersey's largest high technology and life science business incubator, and one of the largest in the nation. 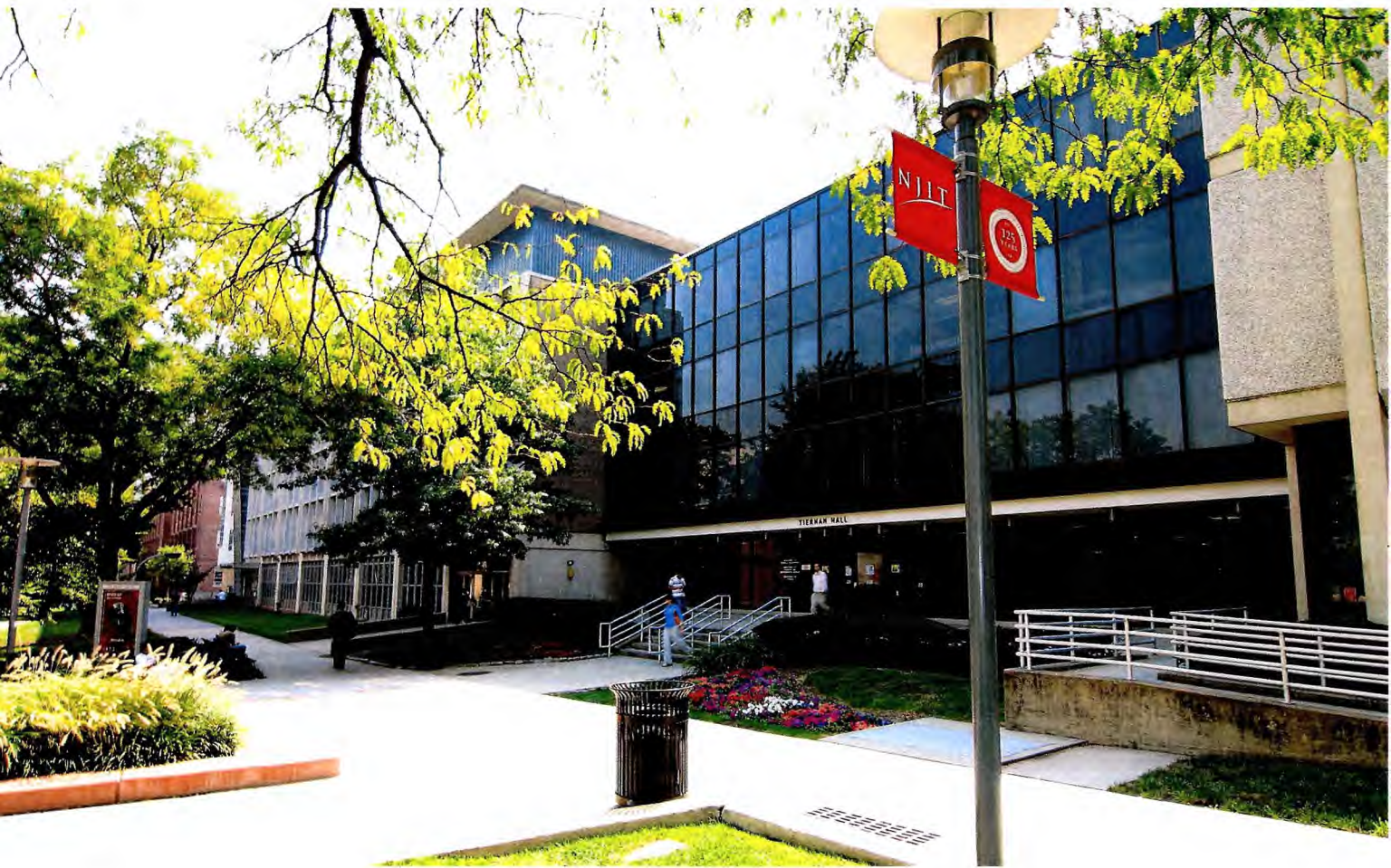

New Jersey, with America's highest concentration of pharmaceutical, hi-tech, biotech, and medical device companies is the place to study technology. About NJIT

A HISTORY OF NJIT

From the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age, New Jersey Institute of Technology has a rich history with its beginnings developing from the industrial age.

In 1881, an act of the New Jersey State Legislature, recognizing an urgent need, sought a home for what would be the state's technical school. The efforts of Newark's public and private sectors resulted with the opening of Newark Technical School, addressing the state's need.

Over time, the university expanded its curriculum and mission. In 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By the middle of the 20th century, Newark Technical School was transformed into the robust Newark College of Engineering.

The post-war period was one of enormous activity with regular expansion of the campus, as well as the introduction of doctoral level programs. In 1975, with the addition of the New Jersey School of Architecture, the institution had evolved into a technological university, emphasizing a broad range of degrees and dedication to significant research and public service. Newark College of Engineering, stronger than ever, remained intact, but a new university name -- New Jersey Institute of Technology -- reflected the institution's expanded mission.

A broadened mission called for the creation of a residential campus and the opening of NJIT's first dormitory in 1980 began a period of steady growth that continues. Two new schools were established during the 1980s--the College of Science and Liberal Arts (1982) and the School of Industrial Management (1988). The Albert Dorman Honors College was established in 1994, and the College of Computing Sciences, was created in 2001. Beginning in 2009 the College of Architecture and Design was created to house the New Jersey School of Architecture and the new school of Art and Design.



NJIT and NCAA Division I

Beginning on September 1, 2009, the entire NJIT athletics program officially gained across-the-board active membership in NCAA Division I, completing a process that began officially in 2003.

NJIT, its teams and student-athletes enjoy the full benefits of Division I membership, including eligibility for Division I postseason championship competition and the inclusion of the Highlanders among the national Division I leaders in statistics maintained by the NCAA.

Within months of NJIT's active Division I membership, the school won its first national Division I statistical championships, as women's volleyball player Sabrina Baby led the nation in digs per set and her teammates captured the team crown for digs, as well.

The NCAA's decision to make NJIT a full member of Division I completed a

specific timetable that required NJIT and its Department of Athletics to meet a series of annual benchmarks before proceeding to the next step in the process.

NJIT, which competed in NCAA Division II beginning in 1997-98 and in NCAA Division III for more than two decades before that, made its first formal move toward Division I reclassification

with men's soccer paving the way in 2003. That move grew out of November 2002 meetings among then-President Robert A. Altenkirch, then Vice President Joel Bloom (who would later succeed Altenkirch as NJIT's President) and Director of Athletics Lenny Kaplan. From there came a proposal for Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I. Little more than two

years later, the NCAA approved NJIT's proposal to begin advancing its entire program to Division I.

Men's soccer achieved active Division I status in 2005 and NJIT women's soccer became postseason-eligible in 2007. The remaining programs also began reclassifying in 2005, with active status taking longer for an entire athletics program than under the single-sport- per-gender track used for the two soccer programs.

In 2005-06 the lion's share of the competition for all but the men's soccer program came at the Division II level. In 2006-07, 2007-08, and 2008-09, NJIT's teams competed at the Division I level and fully complied with NCAA Division I rules, but were not eligible for championships at the top level.

Every facet of the program has been enhanced in the move to Division I with a special emphasis placed on student-athlete welfare. Facility upgrades have gone along with support staff expansion. NJIT has built

a model NCAA Division I rules compliance regimen within its athletics program and across the entire university.

Further, the Board of Trustees embraced the transition to Division I as part of the University's strategic plan to enhance the quality of campus life for all students.

NJIT's teams compete throughout the United States, taking on opponents from schools that are instantly recognizable for their stature in academics and athletics.

NJIT student-athletes have faced opponents every Ivy League institution, as well as the Patriot League, including Army and Navy, Buckell, Lafayette, and Lehigh.

The Highlanders have also competed against teams from every Division I conference with teams either in the Northeast or Mid-Atlantic States, including the America East, American Athletic, Atlantic 10, Big East, Colonial

Athletic Association, Metro Atlantic Athletic, Mid-Eastern Athletic, and Northeast.

The eighth New Jersey-based institution in Division I, NJIT has competed against all seven of its home state peers, including Rutgers and Seton Hall.

In addition, Highlander teams have taken on squads from power conferences such as the ACC, Big Ten, Big 12, and Pac-12.

NJIT joined its first Division I conference in 2009-10 when the Great West became an all-sports conference and women's tennis captured back-to-back league titles in 2011 and 2012. In 2012-13, the final year of the GWC, NJIT men's basketball was regular season champion and NJIT women's basketball was GWC Tournament champion.

Moving on from the Great West, NJIT women's tennis joined the America East Conference in 2013-14

and finished as conference runner-up in 2014, the Highlanders' first try at the AEC title. NJIT men's soccer began play as a member of the Sun Belt Conference in 2014. Also in 2013-14, NJIT men's swimming became one of three new members in the Coastal Collegiate Swimming Association (CCSA).

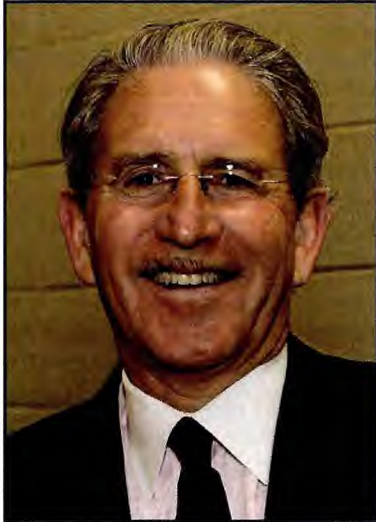
In June 2015, NJIT and the Atlantic Sun Conference announced that the Highlanders would become the newest full member of the ASUN. Founded in 1978 as the Trans America Athletic Conference, the conference took on its present name following the 2001 season.

The ASUN Conference will be the home of 13 of NJIT's varsity teams in 2015-16, with men's soccer moving over from the Sun Belt in 2016-17, bringing the total of ASUN teams from NJIT to 14.

Administration



DR. JOEL BLOOM

President, New Jersey Institute of Technology

Appointed President of New Jersey Institute of Technology on January 12, 2012 by unanimous vote of NJIT's Board of Trustees, Joel S. Bloom started his career in industry working as an economist.

He subsequently became an educator and administrator for the New York City public schools. Prior to coming to New Jersey, he worked as a research director and instructor at Teachers College, Columbia University.

In New Jersey, he managed state and federally-funded curriculum development and training centers for the state. From 1983 through 1990, Dr. Bloom served as assistant commissioner in the NJ Department of Education for the Division of General Academic Education. He was responsible for managing many of the education department's initiatives including competency testing, curriculum content standards, pre-school programs,

establishment of 17 model effective schools, over 300 grants and contracts, and a \$24 million budget.

Immediately prior to his appointment as President, he served as Interim President from September 2011 until January 2012. Prior to that, he was NJIT's Vice President for Academic and Student Services, as well as founding dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College.

Indeed, since joining NJIT in July 1990, Dr. Bloom has served the university in many capacities.

Promoted in 1996 to Vice President for Academic and Student Services, he was responsible for nine divisions of the university, including pre-college programs, enrollment management, continuing professional education, career development services, dean of student services, freshman studies, educational opportunity programs, library services, physical education and athletics.

Dr. Bloom was appointed as the first dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College in 1998, in addition to his vice president responsibilities. The Honors College enrolls over 650 students who come from 15 states and several foreign countries. The average SAT score is over 1340 and the majority of the incoming freshman class members graduated in the top 15 percent of their high school class. More than 50 percent of the

Honors College students maintain a grade-point average higher than 3.5.

Dr. Bloom is chair of the Science Park Board, treasurer of the NJ President's Council, and treasurer of the NJEDGE Net Board. In addition, he serves as a member of the following boards: the Board for Communities and Schools, Newark Alliance, Philadelphia Alliance for Minority Participation, La Casa de Don Pedro, and the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities Presidents Council. Dr. Bloom has been the recipient of national and state education awards, as well as federal, foundation and corporate grant awards. He has published journal articles and presented papers on school improvement, curriculum development, college transition and student assessment.

Dr. Bloom holds a master's degree and a doctorate from Teachers College, Columbia University. He also earned master's and bachelor's degrees from Hunter College of the City University, New York City.

Administration



LENNY KAPLAN

Assistant Vice President/Director of Athletics

Since taking over as head of New Jersey Institute of Technology's division of physical education and athletics in August 2000, Kaplan has been instrumental in guiding the program's growth, first at the NCAA Division II level and, since late 2002, in its successful reclassification to NCAA Division I.

Kaplan's tenure at NJIT has seen growth in the institution and in its athletics program on multiple fronts.

NJIT announced plans in 2015 to build a new Wellness and Events Center, a \$102 million on-campus facility with an opening targeted for Fall 2017.

On July 1, 2015, NJIT accepted an opportunity to become the eighth full member of the multisport ASUN Conference for 14 Highlander teams. The ASUN was the first multi-sport postseason-qualifying home at the Division I level for NJIT.

However, NJIT is a long-time member of the EIVA, which is one of four automatic qualifying conferences in the sport of men's volleyball in Division I-II. Kaplan, has been appointed a four-year term on the NCAA Division I Men's Volleyball Committee in 2016, will serve on a committee that is charged with oversight of the NCAA Volleyball Championship, including, but not limited to team selection, seeding, officials, offering guidance to the host institution as necessary, areas of sport growth and rules changes.

In September 2015, Lenny Kaplan was lauded at the annual Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Honors Luncheon as one of two named Administrator of the Year in Division I.

He has been a member of the Division I-AAA

Athletics Directors Association (DI-AAA ADA) Executive Committee since 2012-13. The Division I-AAA Athletics Directors Association's mission is to enhance initiatives common to its Division I-AAA membership (the Division I institutions that do not sponsor football).

Going back to his arrival at NJIT, Kaplan helped stabilize and expand a program that was entering its fourth year in Division II. In late 2002, after discussions with then-university President Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch and Vice President (now President) Dr. Joel Bloom, Kaplan took on the task of steering NJIT's programs into Division I, an arduous process that reached fruition with the NCAA's granting active Division I status, with full championship eligibility effective September 1, 2009.

Throughout Kaplan's tenure, NJIT has enhanced the athletics program, particularly in areas that benefit the student-athletes directly. Today, NJIT's sports offerings have expanded to the current 19 varsity programs.

Since 2004, NJIT has renovated its two main on-campus venues—Lubetkin Field at Mal Simon Stadium at Lubetkin Field and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center prior to launching the development of the new Wellness and Events Center.

Under Kaplan's leadership, NJIT in 2011 brought on line the Naimoli Family Recreation Center to enhance recreational and intercollegiate opportunities on campus. The Naimoli Center is the home of both NJIT tennis teams.

NJIT athletics has also forged a presence in downtown Newark, playing all home baseball in the professional Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and also hosting select basketball home games in the Prudential Center, home of the NHL's New Jersey Devils. The NJIT club hockey team also plays all of its home contests in the Barnabas Health Hockey House, which is part of the Prudential Center complex.

Under Kaplan's leadership, many teams achieved regional and national Division II ranking. Success for several women's teams was unprecedented, with basketball, tennis and soccer all reaching postseason play for the first time in his administration.

Additionally, men's volleyball captured a 2007 divisional championship in the Eastern

Intercollegiate Volleyball Association and the next year reached the EIVA playoff semifinals hosted by eventual 2008 national champion Penn State.

Kaplan guided the Highlanders toward further stability with membership in the newly-expanded all-sports Great West Conference, which offers a conference home for 11 of NJIT's varsity sports.

In 2009-10, NJIT's first year as a full active member of Division I, the women's volleyball team and senior Sabrina Baby became the school's first national statistical champions at the Division I level, as team and individual leaders, respectively, digs per set. Baby was honored as the school's first CoSIDA Academic All-America in the Division I era, earning third-team national honors.

Christian Baumbach, a sophomore at the time, made history in 2009 as NJIT's first individual conference champion at the Division I level, when he won the Great West Conference men's cross country race. He also won the prestigious IC4A University Division race in the 101st annual running of that contest.

In 2010-11, the Highlanders earned their first-ever Division I conference team championship when women's tennis captured the Great West title in May.

In 2012, following a run to the championship game of the Great West Conference tournament, senior captain Isaiah Wilkerson received honorable mention on the Associated Press Division I All-America team, becoming the first NJIT student-athlete to earn honors from the AP in the Division I era.

By practically any measure, the 2012-13 year was the most successful for NJIT athletics since the program made the move to NCAA Division I competition, beginning in 2004 with men's soccer.

Both NJIT basketball teams captured Great West Conference championships—a first for those sports at the Division I level. In fact, the women's team, which won the 2013 Great West Tournament, had never won a conference tournament title at any level since beginning play in 1986-87, and the men, who won multiple championships in Division III, had not finished first in a conference since 2002-03 at the Division II level.

NJIT men's basketball reached the CollegeInsider.com semifinals in back-to-back seasons (2014-15; 2015-16), including two 20-win seasons in a row under then-head coach Jim Engles. The Highlanders, who competed in their first season as a member of the ASUN Conference (2015-16), finished tied for second place and played in a school-record 35 games.

On an individual level, all-American Damon Lynn became NJIT's all-time leading scorer (at all levels) with 2,153 points, following the 2016-17 season. He is the D-I active career leader in three-pointers made at 434 -- which ranks fifth in NCAA history.

Men's volleyball Jabarry Goodridge, concluded his four-year career at NJIT in 2017, earning his second American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) All-America recognition and became the Highlanders' first Division I-II honorable mention as a junior (2016). Goodridge also became the first Highlander student-athlete to receive NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship prestigious award.

NJIT's women's basketball Alana Dudley was selected 2017 ASUN Conference Woman of the Year and nominated as NCAA Woman of the Year.

Men's Outdoor Track and Field's Erick McNamara became NJIT's first men's outdoor individual ASUN Conference champion, capturing the javelin title in 2017.

Impressive news came in June after the conclusion of 2012-13 competition, in less than a week, senior pitcher Mark Leiter, Jr. was selected in the 22nd round of the annual Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft by the Philadelphia Phillies and classmate and fellow pitcher Tripp Davis signed a free agent contract to play in the Kansas City Royals organization.

Leiter was called up to the Philadelphia Phillies from the Phillies Class AAA team, the Lehigh Valley (PA) Iron Pigs and made his major league debut against the Dodgers on April 29, 2017, pitching a 1-2-3 seventh inning.

Men's basketball star Chris Flores, also a 2013 graduate, was one of six prospects brought in by the Brooklyn Nets on June 12 for a closed

workout in preparation for the 2013 NBA Draft. Joining Flores among the six prospects in his workout were players from such perennial college basketball powers as Kentucky, North Carolina, and Pitt.

Men's soccer made the biggest mark among the fall teams, notching 10 wins to double the previous Division I high for a program that brought NJIT (then NCE) its only national championship with an NAIA national title in an undefeated 1960 season.

The NJIT men's tennis team had their best Division I season, posting a 16-6 record. The leader was freshman Markus Schultz, who hails from Hagersten, Sweden. Named Newcomer of the Year for the overall NJIT athletics program, Schultz was 20-1 in singles and finished the year ranked 18th in the NCAA Division I Northeast Region by the authoritative ITA. He is the first NJIT tennis player to earn ITA regional ranking at the Division I level (women's players Julia Doci in 2005 and the late Fatima Kasem in 2004-05 were regionally ranked by the ITA in Division II).

In outdoor track and field, junior Kelsey Jackson became NJIT's first woman individual Great West Conference champion when she captured the high jump title. The NJIT men won their first-ever team championship in the Collegiate Track Conference, competing as one of 17 teams that included teams from all three NCAA divisions.

NJIT's growing success in Division I competition has been accompanied by a continued commitment to excellence in the university's rigorous academic environment. The combined grade point average of Highlander student-athletes has been above 3.0 for 13 straight semesters through Fall 2016.

Before coming to NJIT, Lenny Kaplan 11 years at Manhattan College, where he began as Manhattan's director of operations and was assistant athletics director from 1991-2000.

Kaplan, a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration, resides in Merrick, NY, with his wife, Nancy. They are the parents of two sons, Michael, a student at Lafayette College, and Joshua, who is in high school.

Matt Koscs, ATC, Head Athletic Trainer

There are many ways to make a team better and a vital path to improvement comes with the mantra "bigger, stronger, faster".

It's how teams get better from within by maximizing individual and team performance in competition. The Strength and Conditioning staff also works closely with the Athletic Training Staff in the areas of injury prevention and rehabilitation.

In the summer and fall of 2014, NJIT's Strength and Conditioning took new direction with the appointment of Bobby Fisk as Head Strength and Conditioning Coach and Drew Culp as Fisk's Assistant Coach.



Bobby Fisk, Head Strength & Conditioning Coach

Bobby Fisk, who was a basketball player in his own college days and coached the sport after college,

competes in the Big East Conference.

Fisk, a native of Schenectady, NY, spent over two years at Hobart and William Smith Colleges in Geneva, NY, where, as head strength and conditioning coach, he worked with successful teams, including women's soccer (William Smith College), which won the 2013 NCAA Division III National Championship; football (Hobart), which advanced to the 2012 Division III national quarterfinals and the regional

finals in 2011 and 2013; and basketball, where Hobart reached the second round of the 2012 NCAA Tournament.

Moving to the Division I level with Xavier in 2013-14, Fisk worked with all 16 of the school's teams, with a primary assignment to women's basketball, men's and women's soccer, baseball, and men's and women's tennis.

He is a graduate of the State University of New York College at Oneonta (BS, Business Economics, 2008), Averett

Sandra Taylor, Director of The Learning Center

Sandra Taylor was appointed as Director of The Learning Center in late September 2014 after

serving as Interim Director for the previous 16 months.

She joined NJIT in January 2010 as Academic Advisor for Student-Athletes working in NJIT's Center for Academic and Personal Enrichment (CAPE), which has since been renamed as The Learning Center.

Mike Spisto, Eligibility Certification Officer/Academic Advisor for Athletics

Mike Spisto moved to administration as NJIT's Eligibility Certification Office/Academic

Adviser for Athletics in the Spring of 2013, working in the Center for Academic and Personal Enrichment (CAPE), now named The Learning Center.

For the previous five years, he was the top assistant coach on the men's basketball staff, working with head coach Jim Engles in an association that culminated with the Highlanders capturing the 2013 regular season championship of the Great West Conference.

Athletics Facilities



With construction underway on-campus for the new Wellness and Events Center, which is scheduled to open in Fall 2017, the New Jersey Institute of Technology soccer and men's lacrosse teams play home games and practice in a combination of facilities off campus.

The on-campus facilities include the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center for indoor sports. In addition, NJIT in 2011 opened the Naimoli Family Athletic and Recreational Facility, a multi-purpose indoor facility on the site of the former outdoor tennis courts.

Off-campus venues include the Prudential Center, home of the NHL Devils, which has hosted selected NJIT basketball games; and Branch Brook Park in Newark and Van Cortlandt Park in the Bronx, home sites for NJIT cross country. All except for Van Cortlandt Park are less than two miles from the NJIT campus.

KEAN UNIVERSITY — EAST CAMPUS FACILITY

The new Wellness and Events Center is just another example of NJIT's commitment to building and expanding their athletic facilities in order to compete at the highest level. Until its completion in Fall 2017, the NJIT men's and women's soccer home field for the 2016 season will be in Union, NJ, on the campus of Kean University – East Campus Facility.

The East Campus Facility on the campus of Kean University has been the long-time home for the Kean's men's and women's soccer programs.

The facility, a grass stadium, has two practice fields and a 1,200 seat capacity at the East Campus.

Lubetkin Field at Mal Simon Stadium, the home of the NJIT Highlanders through Fall 2015 served as the host site for the first Great West Conference women's soccer tournament in November 2009 and previously, NJIT hosted the three-day ECAC Division II women's soccer championship tournament..

Athletics Facilities



ESTELLE AND ZOOM FLEISHER ATHLETIC CENTER

The NJIT men's and women's basketball teams and men's and women's volleyball teams play their home games in the Fleisher Athletic Center gymnasium, while the swimming and diving team competes and practices in building's pool. The Fleisher Center also houses intercollegiate fencing, as well as all athletic department offices, varsity and general weight and fitness rooms, and the athletic training room.

In the summer of 2006, the gym underwent renovation to include installation of a new floor and baskets, new lighting, new sound system and new scoreboards, along with entirely new seating for approximately 1,500 spectators after the first phase of renovation. The back bay 'C gym' can be sectioned off from the main competition floor, making the facility useful for intramurals, physical education classes and campus recreation time, while being able to host multiple simultaneous events.

A six-lane swimming pool in Fleisher Athletic Center is home to the NJIT swimming team. Fencing has its own area on the second floor of the building.

In addition to all athletic department offices, the Fleisher Athletic Center also houses the sports medicine staff in the Athletic Training Room and the varsity weight room, supervised by the head strength and condition coach. The building's third floor is home to a fitness center, which is open for use by all students and staff.

THE NAIMOLI FAMILY ATHLETIC & RECREATION FACILITY

Opened in 2011, the facility is approximately 25,600 square feet. The Naimoli Family Center will be a multi-purpose space for athletics, community recreation, and gatherings involving large numbers of people.

Built on top of the old outdoor tennis courts adjoining the Fleisher Athletic Center, construction of this new building has been made possible, in part, by a generous gift from Vincent Naimoli '62, Chairman and CEO of Anchor Industries International and Chairman Emeritus/Founder of the Tampa Bay Rays major league baseball team.

The facility houses courts for tennis and is available for other athletic and recreational activities, including practice for basketball and volleyball. It is heated and air conditioned, with flooring appropriate for the intended athletics and recreational activities.

Its indoor tennis courts offer vital year round practice and playing opportunities for NJIT's intercollegiate tennis teams, which have been consistently successful in the transition to Division I. In 2011, the women's tennis team became NJIT's first conference championship team in the Division I era.

TRACK FACILITIES

The NJIT men's and women's indoor track & field team trains at the Jersey City Armory which is home to a 6-lane indoor 200m track while the outdoor track & field team trains at the Nat Turner Park 6-lane outdoor 400m track.

BRANCH BROOK PARK AND VAN CORTLANDT PARK

A hallmark of the NJIT cross country program under veteran coach Al Alonso is its ability to host cross country competition that have made Highlander-sponsored races a popular destination for schools from throughout the New York/New Jersey area.

In 2009, NJIT hosted the Great West Conference championships at Van Cortlandt Park in the Bronx, and the course, which is home to some of the most prestigious events in the sport, is also the home venue for other annual NJIT-hosted races. Branch Brook Park, which is a public park of Essex County, reaches into several towns, including Newark, with the park entrance less than a mile from the NJIT campus.



RED BULL ARENA

Located in Harrison, NJ, just across the Passaic River from Newark and less than three miles from the NJIT campus, the new home of the New York Red Bulls (opened in March 2010) sets the standard for soccer venues across North America.

The state-of-the-art soccer-specific facility is a major component of a multi-billion dollar development.

Red Bull Arena has a number of key design elements which give its seating bowl a close-to-the-action feeling and the unique stadium roof design extends from its leading edge over the entire seating bowl and then curve down to the concourse.

The overall seating capacity for soccer is 25,000, including 30 luxury suites (20 lower level and 10 upper level) and 1,116 club seats. Other amenities include three stadium clubs and two retail outlets.

NJIT and the ASUN Conference



July 1, 2015 will go down as one of the most important days in the history of athletics at New Jersey Institute of Technology.

On that day, NJIT formally became a full member of the Atlantic Sun Conference, giving a Division I conference home to 14 of the 19 Highlander intercollegiate sports. For NJIT, which began the transition to NCAA Division I in 2003-04, becoming a championship-eligible member of the NCAA's highest level on September 1, 2009, membership in the ASUN offers the University's student-athletes the full Division I experience for the first time.

BUILDING

The student-athletes of the ASUN consistently achieve academic accolades at all levels...

- Three institutions set record highs in the 2014-15 ASUN All-Academic honors. More than 68 percent of the student-athletes in the ASUN posted a 3.0 grade point average or better, setting a new ASUN record, including the nearly 86 percent of Lipscomb student-athletes honored as the Bisons claimed the league Academic Trophy for the second-straight year.
- For the sixth-consecutive year more than 60 percent of the ASUN's teams were honored, a first for the conference. Also, for the third straight year at least three institutions recorded new highs in their final percentages of student-athletes honored academically.
- In addition to the institutional highs in the ASUN All-Academic honors, a total of eight sports also recorded percentage highs and four sports also turned in totals of at least 80 percent of the teams recording a 3.0 GPA or better.

- Eleven total ASUN Conference male and female soccer programs received Team Academic honors from the NSCAA, and seven of eight ASUN women's soccer teams were recognized by the NSCAA.
- A total of eleven ASUN student athletes were honored with Capital One Academic All-District honors, with USC Upstate men's soccer player Marvin Schmiede earning All-American accolades based on his performance on and off the pitch.

WINNERS

... while performing at a high level in the competitive arena ...

- Three men's basketball teams earned invitations to postseason play with North Florida in the NCAA, while FGCU and USC Upstate both earned spots in the CIT. For the seventh-straight season, the conference earned a postseason victory as the Spartans defeated James Madison, 73-72 in the opening round.
- Ty Greene (USC Upstate) capped an exceptional career earning Player of the Year honors in the ASUN, as well as national recognition by capturing the Lou Henson Award as the National Mid-Major Player of the Year.
- The 2015 ASUN Men's Basketball Championship Final drew in a conference record 6,155 fans.
- FGCU women's basketball spent six weeks in the national rankings, en route to conference record-tying seventh seed in the NCAA Tournament. The Eagles posted the league's first women's basketball tournament victory since 1998 with a 75-67 opening round victory against Oklahoma State.
- Every ASUN conference basketball game was aired on the ESPN family of networks. The ASUN accounted for 20 percent of ESPN3's college basketball inventory.
- USC Upstate softball advanced to the NCAA tournament for the third consecutive year, picking up a win against Fairfield. It marked the sixth consecutive time an ASUN team has won an NCAA Regional match up.
- FGCU women's soccer hosted Auburn in the 2014 NCAA Tournament, marking the first time in school history an NCAA Championship event took place on campus and the first time an ASUN women's soccer team hosted a tournament contest.

- For the first time in conference history two ASUN Volleyball teams were awarded spots in the NCAA Tournament field of 64 with Jacksonville receiving the automatic bid and Lipscomb earning the league's first at large selection.
- Men's golf sent a record-tying four teams to the NCAA Regionals, giving the conference at least two teams in Regional play for eight-straight years.
- FGCU men's tennis head coach CJ Weber was named the Wilson/Intercollegiate Tennis Association Southeast Region Coach of the Year.
- North Florida's Donnie Dewees was selected in the second round by the Chicago Cubs, giving the ASUN three players in the last three years selected in the first two rounds of the MLB First Year Player Draft (Max Pentecost, 2014 and Chris Anderson, 2013)

- A total of 14 ASUN Conference teams posted perfect scores for the 2013-14 academic year and 98 percent cleared the NCAA's standard benchmark in the NCAA's 11th annual Academic Progress Rate report. A total of 67 ASUN teams met or exceeded the most recent four-year Division I APR of 978. Additionally, 69 ASUN teams in the 2013-14 measure posted at or above their sport-specific averages.
- The ASUN also had 14 teams recognized by the NCAA for earning Public Recognition Awards, based on their most recent multi-year APR. These awards are given each year to teams with APRs in the top 10 percent in each sport. The ASUN recorded at least 13 teams for the fourth straight year, and for the seventh consecutive year the ASUN has had at least 10 teams earn the award. The ASUN has totaled 124 Public Recognition Awards since they first were awarded in 2004-05.
- Jacksonville pitcher Brian Holcomb, a 17 year U.S. Navy veteran and wounded warrior, earned his first collegiate start at the age of 34 in 2015.
- The second annual ASUN Winners for Life Team honored student-athletes from each of the eight member institutions who best represent the ASUN's

commitment to "Building Winners for Life." Those student-athletes maintain the highest standards in academic and athletic achievement; represent a true balance between student and athlete; exhibit and promote sportsmanship in the competitive experience; and exhibit leadership through community service on- and off-campus and at home.

- For the second consecutive year, seven ASUN Conference member institutions were named to the 2014 President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll, one with distinction.

The ASUN Conference is a NCAA Division I league with eight member institutions committed to Building Winners for Life. The ASUN meets the challenge of maintaining the highest standards in academic and athletic achievement with a true balance between student and athlete. FERNANDO BARBOTO

Head Coach



Fernando Barboto, who built the Iona College Gaels into one of the top Division I men's soccer programs in the area, led men's soccer at New Jersey Institute of Technology, in 2016.

In announcing the appointment of Barboto as NJIT's fourth head men's soccer coach in the program's Division I era, Kaplan said: "Fernando is a proven Division I head coach with New Jersey roots, who is

respected throughout the region for the program he has built at Iona. We are pleased that he will guide our program and we look forward to a successful future with him as our coach in the years to come."

The Highlanders, under the leadership of Barboto in his first season, reached eight wins, marking the second-highest win total, since competing as an NCAA Division I program (first season 2004). The record stands at 10 set in 2012.

NJIT made its first ASUN Men's Soccer Championship appearance in the teams' first season (2016) as a member of the school's new multi-sport conference, the ASUN Conference. Men's soccer, which played the previous two seasons as an associate member of the Sun Belt Conference, is competing in the ASUN a year later than the other NJIT programs, which began play in the ASUN in 2015-16.

Five Highlanders were named to the ASUN All-Conference team – two named to the second-team and three to the all-freshmen team, in addition to two Highlanders earning ASUN all-Academic honors. Junior Phillip Costa was the first men's soccer player selected to ASUN Fall 2016 Winners For Life Team.

The Highlanders, who began Division I competition in men's soccer in 2004, ranked 10th in the latest NSCAA Southeast Region men's soccer poll (as of November 1). NJIT has been ranked regionally at other times in the past, including 2014, when the Highlanders ranked as high as 7th in the Southeast Region, due

to its affiliation with the Sun Belt Conference, a Southeast-based league, and 2012, when the Highlanders were in the Top 10 of the North Atlantic Region poll for most of the year, finishing 8th in the season-ending regional poll.

The six one-goal wins and seven shutouts this season (most in the ASUN) are the most in a single season in NJIT's Division I era.

The draw against No. 22 North Florida, was the fourth of the season for the Highlanders, marking the third-straight season, the Highlanders have recorded four draws. In the DI era for NJIT (first season 2004), the team record is five set in 2005.

Under Barboto, who completed his 13th season at Iona in November 2015, the Gaels have become a perennial top contender in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference.

Starting in 2008, when Iona posted a record of 11-6-1, the Gaels have reached double-digit wins totals in five of the past eight seasons. They finished 2015 at 10-7-3 overall and 5-3-2 in the MAAC.

In that same eight-year period, Barboto's Gaels have had just one sub-.500 record and that was in 2012, when they finished 7-11 overall, including two close non-conference losses against teams ranked in the Top Six nationally. Iona was 5-2 in MAAC games that season.

Headlining Iona's run of double-digit seasons, the Gaels posted an overall record of 14-2-3 in 2009, earning MAAC Coach of the Year honors for Barboto, and then went 15-4-1 two year later in 2011.

Not surprisingly, given his teams' success, Barboto has helped mold several players who went on to professional soccer, including three in Major League Soccer: Franklin Castellanos (New York Red Bulls); Ignacio Maganto (LA Galaxy); and, Victor Munoz (Sporting Kansas City).

Castellanos was MAAC Offensive Player of the Year in 2013, Maganto took the same honor in 2014, and Marcos Nunez made it three Iona players in a row named MAAC Offensive Player of the Year when he brought home the award in 2015. In doing so, it marked the second time in NCAA Division I history that the same program has had three-straight conference Offensive Players of the Year with a different player winning the honor each time.

Iona under Barboto has had numerous conference award winners. In 2013 alone, the Gaels had five All-MAAC honorees, as well as three NSCAA All-Region selections, and 12 MAAC All-Academic picks.

"I'm excited about the chance to come to NJIT and build a strong program," said Barboto, who met his new team for the first time on Wednesday afternoon. "In meeting with Lenny (Kaplan) and the rest of the people here, I can tell this is a school and department that cares about its men's soccer program," he said. "NJIT is a great academic institution that has the resources to create a winning environment."

"This is an exciting time to be coming here with a new facility (a new stadium adjoining NJIT's \$100 million dollar Wellness and Events Center, now under construction) and a new conference (Atlantic Sun)."

Barboto's recruiting base at Iona has centered around players from the New Jersey/New York metro area, with a sprinkling of international students. He expects to continue that formula at NJIT.

A 1994 graduate of New Jersey's Montclair State University, Barboto first became a Division I head coach at Saint Francis University in Loretto, PA, in 2000.

At Saint Francis, Barboto took over a program that had never won more than four conference games in 11 previous seasons. Under Barboto's guidance, the Red Flash topped their best previous conference record, winning five league games in each of his first two seasons.

He took the helm at Iona in 2003, inheriting a program that had gone winless in 20 matches in 2002. Barboto's first season at the New Rochelle, NY, college produced five wins. He then guided the program to steady progress, getting a winning record of 7-6-5 in 2006, then 8 wins in 2007, before the breakthrough to 11 victories in 2008.

Including that breakthrough season in 2008, Iona's record under Barboto is 85-52-15 over the last eight years.

In conference games, Iona finished on the winning side of the ledger every season from 2006 through 2015. In his 13 seasons at Iona, Barboto's teams were a combined 65-43-10 in Metro Atlantic



Athletic Conference games and his conference record at Saint Francis, which competes in the Northeast Conference, was 13-11-3 in three seasons.

His overall record at Iona, including the building years, was 116-103-27 in 13 seasons. His overall record as a Division I head coach is 133-134-34 in 16 seasons.

Coming to NJIT represents a move closer to home for Barboto, who resides in Cresskill, NJ, with his wife, Betina, and their sons Maximus and Tristan, and daughter Valentina.

As an undergraduate at Montclair State, Fernando Barboto was a four-year letter winner and was National Soccer Coaches Association All-America as senior playing for the perennial Division III powerhouse.

He went on to play six professional seasons with the North Jersey Imperials of the United Soccer League.

He began coaching as head coach of the women's soccer team at Montclair State, a position he held from 1995 through 1998.

Leaving his alma mater, Barboto signed on as an assistant men's coach at Lafayette, where he helped the Leopards win two straight Patriot League championships. He went from Lafayette to become head coach at Saint Francis.

In 2008, Uy was invited to the u20 national team camp, followed by a tournament in Mexico hosted by Chivas Guadalajara and spent time with second division club FK SIAD MOST in Czech Republic.

After graduation, Uy continued his playing career professionally in Asia, playing for the top division in the Philippines, where he earned 10 international caps with the u23 men's national team. With the u23 men's national team, Uy participated in the Asia Cup Qualifiers, World Cup 2018 Playoff Qualifier and Suzuki Cup.

He played for Global FC (2012-2013) and Loyola Meralco Sparks (2013) of the United Football League.

The Long Island native attended high school at IMG Academy in Bradenton, Florida (2006-2007) after being selected for the 2007 US Residency Program, where he earned over 40 caps with the u17 national team.

He played in the National Championship game as a member of the u20 New York Red Bulls and appeared in the final four with the 2011 Long Island Rough Riders PDL.

Uy holds NSCAA National diploma and USSF "C" coaching licenses.

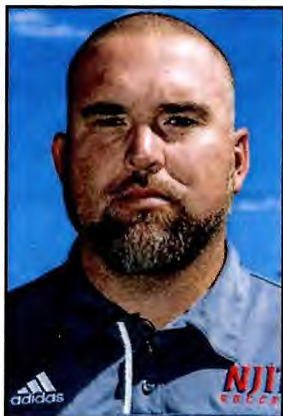
Freitas holds National "B", "C", and "D" coaching licenses.

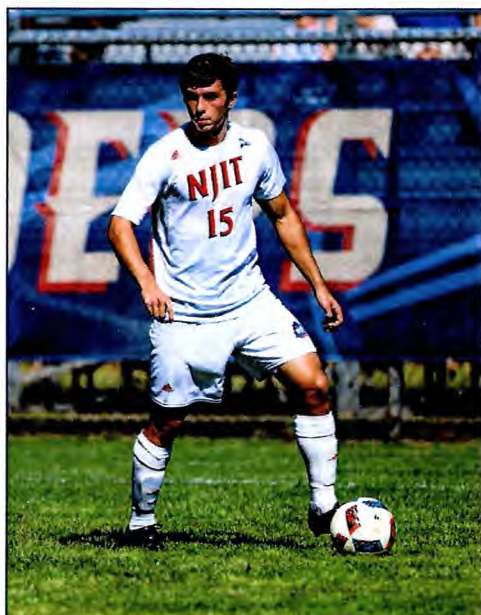

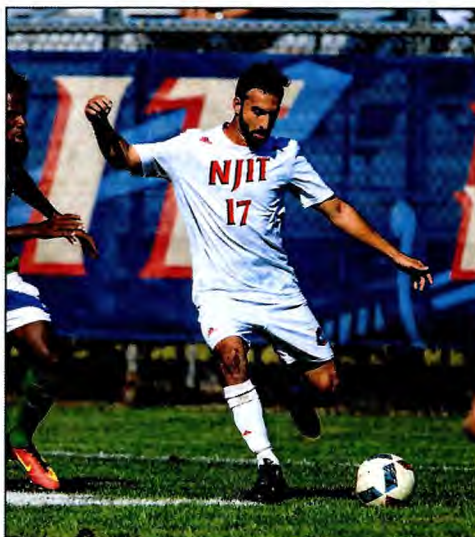

Undefeated 1960 NAIA National Soccer Champions

Unbeaten national champions. It's a name only a select few college teams in any sport have ever worn.

One of those teams was the soccer team from Newark College of Engineering in 1960.

That team from NCE, coached by J. Malcolm (Mal) Simon, in his sixth year, with assistance from Lou DeVito, and captained by Guy Cilento and Bill Garro, sailed through its schedule, winning all 10 games and outscoring the opposition, 41-9. They allowed more than one goal in a game just twice (4-2 win over Trenton State and 5-3 win over Drew).

Facing Pratt in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Area #3 championship at Stevens in Hoboken, NJ, the Highlanders came out ahead, 2-1, earning a spot in the national semifinals.

The last two rounds of the national tournament were hosted by Slippery Rock State in Pennsylvania

and the last two games proved to be the most challenging.

In the national semifinals, it took two overtimes, but Fitchburg State of Massachusetts became NCE's 12th victim in as many starts--3-2, NCE.

All the tension of the semifinal match turned out to be prologue, as the championship game against Elizabethtown College of Pennsylvania on November 26 proved even more suspenseful still.

In the end, the NCE and Elizabethtown played on and on through four goals, regulation time and four overtimes. Finally, nature stepped in, as darkness brought things to a halt with the score tied 2-2 after 16 minutes, 45 seconds of overtime play.

The NAIA declared the two teams co-national champions and the Highlanders ended their season with both an unbeaten record (12-0-1) and a national championship.

The roster of that 1960 team was a true reflection of New Jersey, as every player resided in the Garden State. Indeed, most of those were from the immigrant-rich communities in the region, which nurtured a level of play not found in many other parts of the country.

Twelve different players scored goals that year, paced by John Savicky, with nine. Andy Handwerker scored eight, while Anatole Kulyk and Ed Cruz added six apiece.

After the season, halfback Werner Zorn was named as NCE's first NAIA All-American, an honor he would repeat in 1961. Zorn, Savicky and Handwerker were all-area and Alex Khowaylo was selected as the outstanding NAIA goalkeeper.

Unbeaten national champions. It sounds just as sweet 50 years later and counting.

Many members of the 1960 team were still part of the Highlanders the following year, when NCE again completed the regular season undefeated. The Highlanders returned to the national championship game, but lost to Howard University (an annual foe to this day since both teams have become NCAA Division I programs). That 1961 championship loss to Howard came with just 18 seconds remaining in regulation time. From 1960 to 1962, NCE amassed a three-year combined record of 26-2-1.

Notes: NCE changed its national affiliation from NAIA to NCAA Division III in 1974. The university changed its name to NJIT in 1975. The Highlanders reclassified within the NCAA to Division II in 1997 and to Division I in 2004.

The Highlanders Rich Soccer Legacy

Hernan "Chico" Borja Spread NJIT's Name Around the Globe



Hernan Borja was an all-America soccer player in his career at New Jersey Institute of Technology from 1977 to 1980 under coach Mal Simon.

For more than a decade, Borja carried NJIT's name with him around the world as a professional player, first with the famed Cosmos of New York and then as one of the greatest indoor soccer players of his era.

From NJIT, the man known as 'Chico' would earn a spot on one of the world's most famous club teams, the Cosmos, as well as a regular spot on the United States National Team throughout the 1980's and also a career as one of the greatest indoor soccer players in world history.

With apologies to the baseball Yankees, it's quite likely that when it came to worldwide recognition, the most famous US-based team in any sport in the 1970's and 1980's was

the Cosmos of the North American Soccer League.

In addition to playing in front of crowds exceeding 70,000 at Giants Stadium, the Cosmos routinely drew sellout crowds during tours to four continents. The club home of all-time greats Pele and Franz Beckenbauer, the Cosmos lineup was studded with world-class stars from South America and Europe. Among the regular attendees at Cosmos home games were celebrities ranging from Mick Jagger to Henry Kissinger.

Hernan 'Chico' Borja stepped from the fields of NJIT into the Cosmos spotlight, playing regularly and frequently starting for the famed club in 1981, 1982 and 1984.

When the Cosmos and the NASL departed the scene, Borja moved to the indoor game with the Major Indoor Soccer League, the top indoor circuit in North America until 1992. Borja was one of the greatest players in that league's 14-year history, finishing fourth all-time in assists (338) and eighth in total points (612).

His greatness as an indoor star was underscored in 1992, when FIFA, the world's governing body for all soccer, named him to its all-World Championship first team for futsal, FIFA's 5 v 5 official indoor game.

He remained active in the outdoor game throughout and it was rare for the United States National Team to play a game without him in the lineup at any time during the 1980's. He was a starter in full international competition in 1982, 1983, 1984 (3 matches), 1985 (2 matches) and 1988 (4 matches).

Playing for Team USA, he scored goals in three different full international matches, first finding the back of the net in a 2-0 win over Haiti on April 8, 1983. He later scored one of the two US goals in a 2-1 win over Trinidad and Tobago on May 15, 1985, in a qualifying match for the 1986 World Cup. Finally, he scored the only goal for the United States in a 3-1 loss vs. Chile on June 3, 1988.

He remains active in soccer as a coach and two of his former players, Oshane Moodie and Brian Caine came north from Florida to NJIT, where they began playing as freshmen in 2007.

Chico was not alone in earning all-America honors for NJIT (NCE). Indeed, he is one of 12 players to receive the coveted recognition playing for the Highlanders.



NCE/NJIT All-Americans

Here is a brief look at the other nine all-Americans, with notes from their induction into the NJIT Hall of Fame:

Werner Zorn, 1960, 61

Werner Zorn, a soccer player from 1958-61, was Newark College of Engineering's first all-American and a key member of the 1960 NAIA national championship soccer team. NCE was NAIA national runner-up in 1961.

Alex Khowaylo, 1962

Alex Khowaylo, a soccer player from 1960-63 was an outstanding goalie for the soccer team at Newark College of Engineering from 1959 to 1962, including being named "all-America" and winning the NAIA national championship in 1960. NCE was NAIA national runner-up in 1961.

John Rapsomanikis, 1963

John Rapsomanikis, was a member of the men's soccer team from 1960-63.

Myron Worobec, 1964

Myron Worobec, was an outstanding soccer player at Newark College of Engineering from 1962-65. A prolific scorer he was named all-East, all-Area, all-America, a member of the U.S. Pan American team and a member of the U.S. Olympic team.

Myron Bakun, 1965, 66

Myron Bakun, was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame for his outstanding contributions as a soccer player at Newark College of Engineering from 1964-66, including being selected two-time all-American, the region's Most Valuable Player, and team captain. His soccer and leadership abilities were a model for all to follow.

Ali Hubey, 1969, 70, 71

Ali Hubey, a member of the 1969-71 men's soccer team was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame for his performance on the field which earned him all-American recognition for three consecutive seasons 1969, 1970, 1971. He was team MVP in 1970 and was named to the NJIT/NCE Centennial all-time soccer team.

Fabian Hurtado, 1971, 74 (HM)

Fabian Hurtado was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame as the holder of career scoring records with 65 goals and as first-team all-American in soccer in 1974. He was all-State and all-Area for three years and all-NAIA in 1973. He remains the all-time record-holder in the NAIA Tournament for most shots in a game, firing 18 against Goshen of Indiana in 1973. Hurtado went on to play professionally, including a stint in 1975 with the Dallas Tornado of the old North American Soccer League, which was the top league in North America.

Joe Dias, 1975 (HM)

Joe Dias, a soccer player from 1973-76, his performance earned all-America honors in 1976 as well as all-Area and all-State in both 1975 and 1976, he finished with 34 career goals placing him third all-time.

Kenneth Hammond, 1977 (HM)

Kenny Hammond, was an outstanding soccer player from 1974-77. His team reached three NCAA Tournaments and had a combined record of 35-15-2. Among NJIT's top 10 all-time goal scorers, he earned Honorable Mention all-America honors in 1977 and went on to play three seasons of professional soccer.

Andrew Bakun, 1981

Andrew Bakun, was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame for his outstanding achievements as an athlete in soccer from 1978-81. A four-year starter, Bakun was a versatile performer. He played three positions during his career at NJIT, earning all-State honors as a sophomore and all-Area accolades his junior year. He earned the 16th all-American award in NCE/NJIT men's soccer history following his senior season of 1981. Bakun scored eight career goals.

Raymond Paulius, 1983

Ray Paulius played soccer at NJIT from 1980-83, during which time the Highlanders posted a combined record of 36-26-2. In 1983, he was honored as a first-team all-America and is one of two men in school history to earn first-team all-America recognition in NCAA Division III from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America. Paulius was a quad-captain and all-American his senior year. Follow signs for downtown Newark and Rt. 21 North (left lane exit ramp). Downtown Newark will be in front of you. NYC will be off to your right. Follow Rt. 21 North (McCarter Highway). Turn left on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren Street traffic light and Fleisher Athletic Center, Naimoli Center, and Lubetkin Field at Mal Simon Stadium will be to your right (one soccer goal line runs along Warren Street and the soccer sideline parallels Lock Street).

New Jersey Turnpike: Driving South from North Jersey: Take exit 15W to Route 280 West, then follow Route 280 West directions.

Route 280 West: After drawbridge, take Exit 15A (Rt. 21 South - McCarter Highway). Follow Rt. 21 South to Raymond Blvd. Turn right on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren Street traffic light and Fleisher Athletic Center, Naimoli Center, and Lubetkin Field at Mal Simon Stadium will be to your right (one soccer goal line runs along Warren Street and the soccer sideline parallels Lock Street).

Route 280 East: Take Exit 15 (Rt. 21 South - McCarter Highway).
