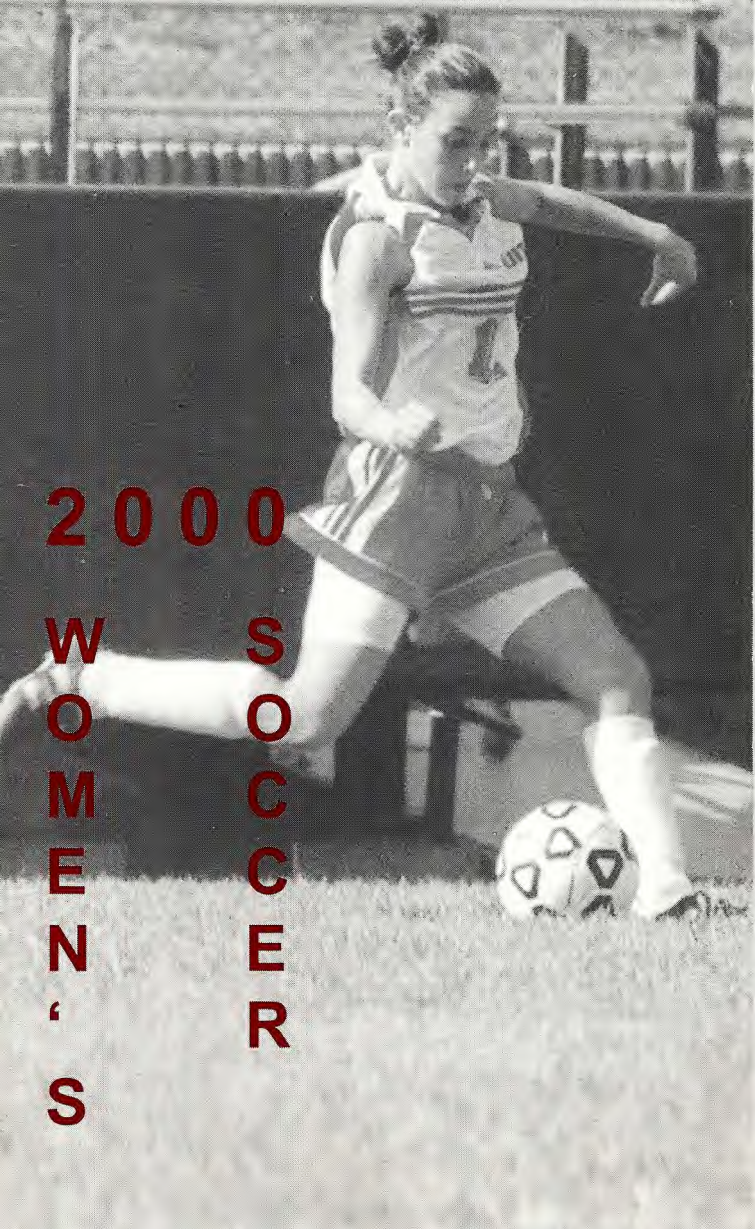

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TOM ROMANO

Head Coach

Tom Romano became the first head coach in five seasons to return to the NJIT women's soccer team for a second year.

Romano, of Hasbrouck Heights, N.J., was the head girls' coach at Paramus Catholic High from 1993 to 1998. Prior to that time, he was the head boys' coach at St. Joseph of the Palisades High. At NJIT, he is also the director of intramurals and the interim men's and women's swim coach.

A graduate of Marist High in Bayonne, Romano received a bachelor of arts degree in history from St. Peter's College in 1972. After two years as an army first lieutenant in the first infantry division "Big Red One," he earned his MBA in accounting from Fairleigh Dickinson University in 1981.

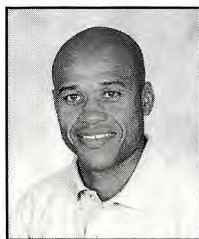
BOBBY CALDERON

2000 SEASON RECAP

The New Jersey Institute of Technology women's soccer team enjoyed a record-setting season in 2000, but according to head coach **Tom Romano**, the Highlanders need to set the bar higher in the coming years.

NJIT completed the fifth season in program history with its most wins (3) and goals (14) ever. The most historic victory was a 6-0 win at the College of Mount Saint Vincent. In that match, the Highlanders set a school record for goals in a game and recorded the program's first-ever shutout. Freshman **Vallerie DeAngelis** set a record of her own with six points on two goals and two assists.

Romano, however, is hopeful all of those modest records say more about where the program has been than where it is headed.

"Going from one win (in 1999) to three wins is great," Romano said, "but it's still not enough. We had some close losses we could have won, so in 2001 we want more improvement, and, with that, more wins."

The Highlanders will look to make up the most ground within the Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference. NJIT went 1-9 in its first year of CACC play and was outscored, 53-3, by conference opponents.

The 2000 roster had 11 freshmen among its 19 members. Several, most notably keeper **Daisy Calderon** and DeAngelis, contributed right away.

"You don't always know how great high school players will do in college," said Romano, a longtime area scholastic coach. "Val and Daisy were two that made the transition well."

Romano hopes to lure another talented group of young athletes this winter to increase the team's levels of talent and depth.

"I am pleased with how the recruiting has gone," he said. "The caliber of recruits we attract is getting better all the time. Between high school seniors and college transfers, we could have as many as six new players with college experience and 12 recruits overall."

Meanwhile, the returning players will not have to wait until the fall to get started on next year.

"For the first time," Romano said, "it looks like we're going to have a spring season. We're hoping to host an indoor league with some local club teams, then play in at least three outdoor tournaments in March and April."

ATHLETIC FACILITIES

The NJIT women's soccer team plays its home games at Lubetkin Field, on campus grounds immediately adjacent to the Fleisher Athletic Center.

Lubetkin, a lighted, natural grass facility, is also home to the Highlanders' men's soccer and baseball teams, as well as several physical education classes and intramural events. It contains a midfield scoreboard and pressbox facilities, and its bleacher seating can hold approximately 1,000 spectators.

The team has access to all of the facilities in the Fleisher Athletic Center. These include the Fleisher fitness center and weight room, a six-lane swimming pool, four racquetball courts, a martial arts center, and an aerobics/dance studio. The pool is home to NJIT's men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads host meets and hold practices at four lighted outdoor hardcourt tennis courts behind the building.

The Highlander's men's and women's basketball and men's and women's volleyball teams play at Entwisle Gymnasium, also housed in the Fleisher center. Entwisle, which can entertain crowds of up to 1,500, is open to the campus community during selected hours for recreation.

NJIT also offers several club sports, including bowling, cricket, golf, judo, lacrosse and wrestling. The Hazell Student Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.

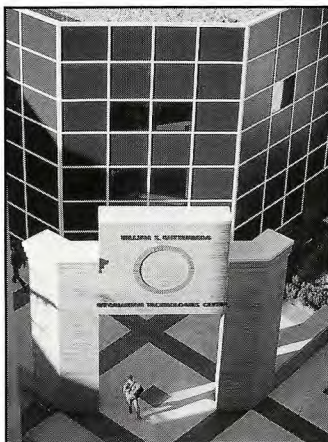
UNIVERSITY INFORMATION



New Jersey Institute of Technology is a public research university enrolling over 8,200 bachelor's, master's and doctoral students in 80 degree programs through its five colleges: Newark College of Engineering, New Jersey School of Architecture, College of Science and Liberal Arts, School of Management, and the Albert Dorman Honors College. Research initiatives include manufacturing, microelectronics, multimedia, transportation, computer science, solar astrophysics, environmental engineering and science, and architecture and building science.

According to *Yahoo! Internet Life* magazine rankings, NJIT has been one of America's top five "most wired" public universities. *U.S. News and World Report's* "2000 Annual Guide to America's Best Colleges" ranked NJIT among the nation's top universities, and *Money* magazine's most recent issue of "Best College Buys" rated NJIT as the sixth-best value among U.S. science and technology schools and among the top 100 overall. In September, 1999, *Mademoiselle* ranked NJIT as the second-most Internet-connected university in the nation.

NJIT history spans from the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age. Newark was a factory town when the tuition-free evening school was founded in 1881 to support local industries. The first 90 students studied algebra, geometry, trigonometry, chemistry, physics and draw-



ing. The range of courses offered is testimony to the fact that, from the beginning, NJIT's programs have provided a broad-based foundation to prepare students for success in the workplace. From those early days, science and technology have been the engines fueling the university's development.
