Season Outlook

The New Jersey Institute of Technology women's soccer team enters its opening game with just 13 players on its roster. It would be easy for head coach **Tom Romano** to prepare himself for a difficult, trying season, but he chooses to have a positive outlook.

"This team has the best work ethic, attitude, and commitment of any in my four years here," said Romano, who owns all ten victories in program history. "We have two young, new captains in Sarah Buchala and Erin Salgado, and they have set the tone in a positive manner. There's definitely a more varsity, less recreational feel."

While an open tryout is planned to try to add some depth, Romano feels the current unit is capable of squeaking itself into the conference playoffs, which would mean finishing fourth among the seven teams eligible for NCAA postseason. NJIT was tied for ninth in the 11-team Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference in 2001.

"There's no question the kids will be exhausted, and that it may cost us here or there," Romano said. But we're looking at that fourth spot as a realistic goal."

With the Highlanders having just 10 victories in five years as a Division II member, Romano has once again scheduled a smattering of Division III opponents to ease the transition. But NJIT will also be tested against quality regional opponents like Saint Rose, Green Mountain and Queens, in addition to the improving CACC slate.

GOALKEEPERS: Junior **Kate Duncan**, a starting forward on the NJIT women's basketball team, is playing her first season of collegiate soccer. Duncan played for Romano at Paramus Catholic High. Graduate student **Mary Kate Romano**, daughter of the coach, is the back-up.

"Kate has a chance to have the best goalkeeper season in school history," Romano said. "She's an excellent keeper and we won't move her from there."

DEFENDERS:

Whether the Highlanders are in their diamond or flat-four backfield, sophomore **Sarah Buchala** (15 GP, 2g 5a) will anchor the defense. Freshman **Elizabeth Leichtnam** joins Buchala in the middle, with sophomores **Corina Guishard** at left fullback and **Karisa Solt** (13 GP, 1g) on the right. Sophomore **Joy Intasamakul** is another option.



Sophomore Joy Intasamakul (0) is one of four returning starters.

MIDFIELDERS: Redshirt freshman **Erin Salgado** will run the offense from her center midfield position. Leading returning scorer **Karina Merchan** (15 GP, 12g 7a) will be given the freedom to move forward from her midfield spot when she senses an opportunity. Completing the unit will be **Mary Kate Romano** and freshman **Jayna Misiunas** as the left and right halfbacks. Junior **Jennifer Herrera** is a capable substitute at any midfield or backfield position.

FORWARDS: A pair of freshmen, **Jillian Misiunas** and **Dinah Kotei**, will man the front line.

DR. ROBERT A. ALTENKIRCH

President

Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch was selected the seventh president of NJIT in May 2002. He succeeds Dr. Saul K. Fenster, who retired after 24 years of service to the university.

Altenkirch, a mechanical engineer, was most recently the vice president for research at Mississippi State University (MSU). He brings to NJIT a wide background in university research, teaching and administration, with extensive experience in program development, fundraising and federal relations. He has served the University of Kentucky as professor and chair of mechanical engineering, MSU as professor and dean of the College of Engineering, and Washington State University as professor and dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture.

Altenkirch holds a Ph.D. from Purdue University, a M.S. from the University of California-Berkeley, and a B.S.M.E. from Purdue. A native of St. Louis, Missouri, he is a member of several professional societies and a reviewer for numerous professional journals.



DR. JOEL BLOOM

Vice-President for Academic and Student Services

Dr. Joel Bloom has worked at NJIT since July 1990. In his current position, he is responsible for nine divisions of the university, including physical education and athletics.

Bloom is also dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College, which enrolls 460 students from 15 states and several foreign countries.

Prior to NJIT, Bloom spent seven years as assistant commissioner in the New Jersey Department of Education. He currently chairs the State College Advisory Board and the Newark Consortium Board for Pre-College Education.

Bloom earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Hunter College, and holds a master's and doctorate from Columbia University Teachers College.



LENNY KAPLAN

Senior Administrator for Athletics, Physical Education, Recreation and Intramurals

After serving 11 years in the athletics department at Division-I Manhattan College, **Lenny Kaplan** was appointed in August 2000 to NJIT's newly created position of senior administrator for athletics, physical education, recreation and intramurals.



Kaplan is a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration. After three years as Manhattan's director of operations, he served as an assistant athletics director from 1991-2000.

Kaplan is a native of Commack, Long Island, and attended Commack High School South. He resides in Merrick, New York, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.

TOM ROMANO

Head Coach

Now in his fourth season as the head women's soccer coach at NJIT, **Tom Romano** owns all 10 victories in program history.

Romano, the only person to coach



the Highlanders for more than one season, was the head girls' coach at Paramus (N.J.) Catholic High School from 1993-98. Prior to that, he was the first varsity boys' soccer coach at St. Joseph of the Palisades High.

At NJIT, Romano is also the head men's and women's swimming coach and the director of intramurals.

A graduate of Marist High in Bayonne, Romano received a bachelor of arts degree in history from St. Peter's College in 1972. After two years as an army first lieutenant in the first infantry division "Big Red One," he earned his MBA in accounting from Fairleigh Dickinson University in 1981.

Romano resides in Hasbrouck Heights with his wife, Mary Ellen. The Romanos have two daughters, Mary Kate, 25, and Elizabeth, 21.

Assistant Coach

Herold Jean France begins his third season as Tom Romano's primary assistant. He also coached with Romano for one season at Paramus Catholic High School.



France earned an associate's degree in science of liberal arts from Essex County College in 1999. That fall, he played for the NJIT men's soccer squad before joining the women's staff while he was still an undergraduate. He received his bachelor's in general management in May 2002.

France is a USSF Grade 8 referee and owns USSF and NSCAA coaching licenses. An Irvington resident, he has played in both junior and adult leagues in his native Haiti.



LIZ ROMANO

Assistant Coach

Liz Romano, the younger of head coach Tom Romano's two daughters, begins her first season of collegiate coaching after a successful playing career at The College of New Jersey.

Romano was a member of TCNJ's Division-III national championship team as a sophomore in 2000. In three years with the Lions, she played in 63 games (starting 21) and recorded three goals and eight assists. TCNJ reached the NCAA Tournament in each of her seasons.

Prior to attending TCNJ, Romano played for her father at Paramus Catholic and was an NJSIAA Scholar-Athlete as a senior. She earned 10 varsity letters in soccer, swimming and track. She also played on four New Jersey State Cup championship soccer teams, including three consecutive with the Torpedoes in U17, U18 and U19.

Romano was recently accepted into a joint master's program with Rutgers University-Newark. She expects a bachelor's degree in law & justice from TCNJ in 2003 and a master's in 2004 from Rutgers.

Newark: New Jersey's College Town

Adjacent to NJIT is the Newark campus of Rutgers University.

NJIT and Rutgers enjoy an exceptionally close and productive consorial relationship within the thriving University Heights section of Newark. NJIT and Rutgers students have library privileges at both campuses. NJIT students may also enrich their educational experience by enrolling in Rutgers-Newark courses and in full degree programs in disciplines not offered at NJIT, such as art, music, geology and psychology.

Each year the two universities co-sponsor a common season of theatrical productions, as well as "World Week," a joint program of honors colloquia, and a variety of other cultural and social activities.

New Jersey/New York Metropolitan Region

The NJIT campus is in one of the nation's most exciting cultural and business regions. Advantages include:

- Minutes from New Jersey Performing Arts Center, Liberty Science Center, Meadowlands Sports Complex, Manhattan and all of its attractions, Newport Center Mall, and Secaucus Outlet Center.
- Discount tickets for Broadway shows, museums, concerts, and sporting events.
- Weekend trips throughout the Northeastern United States: skiing, boating, swimming, hiking, and much more.
- The spectacular Jersey shore is less than one hour away.

NJIT's history spans from the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age. Newark was a factory town when the tuition-free evening school was founded in 1881 to support local industries. From the early days, science and technology have been the engines fueling the university's development.

Over time, the university both anticipated and responded to change by expanding its curriculum and mission. Most notably, in 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By 1975, NJIT offered a broad range of undergraduate and graduate degrees. All programs included significant research and public service components with the goal of providing an academic environment that fostered intellectual depth and breadth, as well as social responsibility.

Today, continuing a fourfold mission of instruction, research, economic development and public service, NJIT is among the leading comprehensive technological universities in the nation. The university has state-of-the-art facilities with more than 2,000,000 square-feet of space located on a 45-acre campus in Newark, a Technology and Engineering Center at our 125-acre campus in Mount Laurel, N.J., shared with Burlington County College, and a solar observatory in Big Bear, Calif.

NJIT's Six Colleges

While there has been tremendous growth and diversification at NJIT, its roots are in engineering education. For more than eight decades, **Newark College of Engineering** (NCE) has been preparing engineering students to use science, mathematics, technology and problem-solving skills to design, construct, test and main-

tain products, services, and information systems.

The **New Jersey School of Architecture**, established in 1974, is one of the largest architecture schools in the nation and is nationally recognized for the innovative integration of computer technology into the design curriculum.

The **College of Science and Liberal Arts** (CSLA), established in 1982, is moving into the forefront of many national research activities from solar astronomy to computational and mathematical modeling. CSLA provides students with the skill sets for the professional marketplace including literacy in the computer, mathematical, physical and biological sciences, as well as the traditional liberal arts disciplines.

The **School of Management**, established in 1988, combines the best of the traditional business disciplines (e.g., finance, marketing, accounting, e-commerce) with the power of information and technology management to develop professionals who can manage and communicate effectively.

The **Albert Dorman Honors College**, established in 1993, offers one of the nation's leading technologically oriented honors programs for students who are prepared to undertake a rigorous and individualized course of study.

The **College of Computing Sciences**, established in 2001, encompasses a department of computer science, focused on both the theoretical areas of computing and the development of new computer technology, as well as a department of information systems, concentrated on applications involving people and organizations.

NJIT Mission Statement

NJIT is a **public, urban, research university** committed to the **pursuit of excellence** in:

- undergraduate, graduate, and continuing professional **education**, preparing students for productive careers and amplifying their potential for lifelong personal and professional growth;
- the conduct of **research** in such multi-disciplinary areas as environmental engineering, materials science, manufacturing, productivity enhancement, infrastructure systems, communications, and an array of bio-related sciences and technologies;
- contributing to the state's **economic development** through partnerships and joint ventures with the busi-

ness community and through the development of intellectual property;

- **service** to both its local communities and the broader society of the state and nation by conducting public policy studies, making educational opportunities widely available, and initiating community-building projects.

NJIT **prepares its graduates** for positions of leadership as professionals and as citizens, **provides educational opportunities** for a broadly diverse student body, **responds to needs** of large and small businesses, state and local governmental agencies, and civic organizations, and **advances the uses of technology** as a means of improving the quality of life.

NJIT: A "MOST-WIRED" UNIVERSITY

NJIT has perennially been named a "Most Wired" university by Yahoo! Internet Life magazine in its annual rankings. As such, the university is nationally recognized as a pioneer in the use of computing and information technologies.

As a public research university, NJIT is educating leaders for a technology-driven economy. The university is rethinking educational programs to emphasize marketplace skills, and redesigning its methods of delivering education. Indeed, computing and information technology underpin every facet of the NJIT mission.

NJIT received Carnegie Foundation designation as a Doctoral II university in 1994 and has been ranked among the top universities by U.S. News and World Report every year since. NJIT expends more than \$51 million in a panoply of research and development partnerships with industry, government, and other universities. NJIT researchers are making important advances in a wide range of areas, including the biosciences, manufacturing, microelectronics, multimedia, transportation, computer science, solar astrophysics, environmental engineering and science, and architecture and building science.

For more than a century, NJIT has been an important conduit through which technology flows into society. NJIT plays an essential role in the economic and social life of the state and nation. At NJIT, the objective is to provide graduates with analytic skills, as well as an ability to integrate the work of multiple disciplines to manage and lead knowledge-based and technology-dependent businesses.

The mission of a technological university requires that NJIT continue to recognize emerging trends in the economy, the sciences, and technology, and to anticipate their impact on society by developing appropriate educational and research programs.

Athletics Facilities

The NJIT soccer teams play their home games at **Lubetkin Field**, a lighted, natural-grass campus facility adjacent to the **Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center**.

Lubetkin, which is also home to the Highlanders' baseball team, contains a scoreboard and pressbox facilities, and has seating to hold approximately 1,000 spectators. The field is also used for physical education and intramurals.

The NJIT men's and women's basketball and volleyball teams play their home games in **Entwisle Gymnasium**, the main facility in the Fleisher Center. Entwisle seats approximately 1,500 spectators. The back bay, "C gym," area can be sectioned off from the main floor, making the entire gymnasium useful

for intramural events, physical education classes, and campus recreation time, and able to host multiple events simultaneously.

The women's soccer team also has access to all of the other facilities in the athletic center. These include the fitness area (containing computer controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units, and an indoor track), a free-weight room and a hammer-strength weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), a martial arts center, and an aerobics/dance studio.

A six-lane swimming pool is home to NJIT's men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads utilize the four lighted outdoor hardcourt tennis courts behind the building.

The Hazell Student Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.

When NJIT reclassified its athletics programs to NCAA Division II from Division III in 1997, it joined the New York Collegiate Athletic Conference (NYCAC). After three years of NYCAC play, the Highlanders began a new era in the fall of 2000 as members of the **Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference (CACC)**.

The CACC is in a period of transition. For the last two seasons, NJIT was only league school with full NCAA membership. The others were in a provisional period while switching affiliation from the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). However, six other CACC members have completed their provisional requirements and will make their NCAA debuts in 2002-03: Bloomfield College, Caldwell College, Dominican (N.Y.) College, Felician College, Georgian Court College, and Teikyo Post University.

The CACC has allowed the Highlanders to save tremendously on travel time and costs. NJIT is centrally located in the conference, and four other member schools are in New Jersey, allowing the opportunity to foster local rivalries.
