ATHLETICS FACILITIES

The NJIT men's and women's swim teams compete and practice in Fleisher Pool. The six-lane facility on the first floor of the **Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center** is also staffed by certified lifeguards for recreational swimming.

Additionally, the teams have access to all of the other facilities in the athletic center. These include the **fitness area** (containing computer-controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units and an indoor track), **two weight rooms** (free-weight and hammer-strength), **four racquetball courts**, a **martial arts center**, and **four lighted outdoor hardcourt tennis courts**.

The Highlanders' men's and women's basketball and volleyball teams play their home events in the main gymnasium of the **athletic center**. The facility can entertain crowds of up to 1,500, and is also open to the campus community for recreation during selected hours.

Lubetkin Field, home to the men's and women's soccer teams, recently underwent a \$1.2 million renovation project, including the installation of SprinTurf artificial grass and a running track. It contains a midfield scoreboard and pressbox facilities, and its bleacher seating can hold approximately 1,000 spectators.

NJIT is in the midst of a multi-year agreement with the independent Newark Bears Professional Baseball Club to play Highlanders home baseball games at **Bears & Eagles Riverfront Stadium** in downtown Newark.

ERIC RASMUSSEN Head Coach



Beginning his 24th year of college coaching, Eric Rasmussen returns for his fourth campaign as head coach at NJIT. Rasmussen's 14 years experience coaching at the NCAA Division I level will be invaluable as he leads the Highlanders in their reclassification to Division I.

Rasmussen's Division I experience includes work with some of the top college and international-level coaches in the country. As a graduate assistant at the University of Texas, he worked directly under eight-time NCAA Coach of the Year Eddie

Reese, who will lead the US Men's Swimming teams in the 2008 Olympics. A member of every US Men's Olympic coaching staff since 1988, Coach Reese has led the Longhorns to nine NCAA crowns, including two when Rasmussen was his assistant.

Rasmussen also worked as the head counselor/coach for the Longhorn Swimming Camp for many summers, guiding some of the most promising age-group swimmers in the nation. In that role, he worked under two more Olympic head coaches; Mark Schubert and Richard Quick. After an outstanding college coaching career, Schubert was named USA National Team Coach/General Manager and will direct Team USA at the 2008 and 2012 Olympic Games. Quick, also a six-time U.S. Olympic coach, recently took over at Auburn after a 17-year run at Stanford.

"Having the opportunity to work for and, more importantly, learn from these outstanding coaches has been a major influence on my coaching technique," says Rasmussen. "Observing their styles, all different but all incredibly successful, provided me a lifetime worth of knowledge about swimming and about people. To have had the opportunity to be mentored by these men early in my career is priceless."

Returning to his native New Jersey from Texas, Rasmussen served eight years as a head coach at Division I Saint Peter's College in Jersey City, leading the men's and women's swimming and diving teams. During his eight-year run, he orchestrated a mass overhaul of the school's records, with many of the records being broken numerous times. Upon his departure, only two school records predated Rasmussen's tenure as head coach.

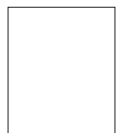
Immediately prior to his taking over at NJIT, Rasmussen was an assistant at Division I Loyola (MD) College. During his three-year stay in Baltimore, the Greyhounds experienced a great deal of success and Rasmussen was instrumental in recruiting of some top swimmers, including a high school state champion and a USA Swimming senior national qualifier. In 2004 and 2005, he helped guide a swimmer to consecutive conference MVP titles. The culmination of his efforts came at the 2005 Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference championship meet where Loyola swimmers recorded over 50 personal best swims, breaking 19 school records and three conference records.

Rasmussen began coaching at Ocean County College (NJ). During his six years at OCC, Rasmussen led over 40 athletes to the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) championships where they collected nine All-American certificates.

Additionally, Rasmussen has coached at three NCAA YES clinics, worked as an assistant to the meet directors at the 1988 Olympic Swimming Trials, and served as the assistant ticket manager at the 2004 Women's NCAA Division I championships. He recently completed a six-summer run as a guest coach at the Lehigh University Swimming Camp and was a guest coach at the prestigious Navy Swimming Camp.

A 1983 Phi Kappa Phi graduate of Ithaca College with a bachelor of science in Physical Education, Rasmussen also attended graduate school at the University of Texas. Born in nearby Irvington, NJ, Rasmussen resides in Toms River, NJ.

ANA OSSA Assistant Coach



Ana Ossa, a native of Bogota, Colombia graduated from NJIT in January 2007 with a degree in electrical engineering.

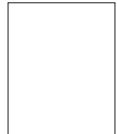
By far the finest female swimmer in school history, she completed her intercollegiate career in 2005-06 and was honored as NJIT's Female Athlete of the Year in each of the last three years.

She completed her career as the holder of 16 of 17 individual school records, lacking only the mark in the 50-yard freestyle. She set and re-set the record for most of the events many time.

At the Metropolitan championships in her senior year, she scored points in all three events that she entered, setting new school records each time.

Ana represented New Jersey Institute of Technology as part of National Girls and Women in Sports Day (NGWSD) on February 12, 2007 at halftime of women's basketball game between Seton Hall and Villanova in South Orange, NJ.

ROB FRANC Assistant Coach



A 2007 graduate of the New Jersey Institute of Technology, Rob Franc is in his first season on the swimming coaching staff.

He completed his intercollegiate career in 2006-07 and holds two individual school-records in the 50 breast stroke and the 200 breast stroke.

He also shares school-record honors as a member of the 200 free, 200 medley and 800 free relay teams.

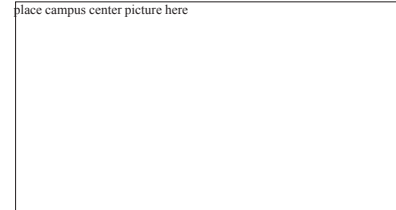
NEWARK: THE RENAISSANCE CITY

New Jersey Institute of Technology, the state's public technological research university, enrolls more than 8,000 students in bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees in 92 degree programs offered by six colleges: Newark College of Engineering, New Jersey School of Architecture, College of Science and Liberal Arts, School of Management, Albert Dorman Honors College, and College of Computing Sciences. NJIT is renowned for expertise in architecture, applied mathematics, wireless communications and networking, solar physics, advanced engineered particulate materials, nanotechnology, neural engineering and e-learning. In 2006, Princeton Review named NJIT among the nation's top 25 campuses for technology and top 150 for best value. U.S. News & World Report's 2007 Annual Guide to America's Best Colleges ranked NJIT in the top tier of national research universities.

NJIT's history spans from the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age. Newark was a factory town when the tuition-free evening school was founded in 1881 to support local industries. From the early days, science and technology have been the engines fueling the university's development.

Over time, the university both anticipated and responded to change by expanding its curriculum and mission. By 1975, NJIT offered a broad range of undergraduate and graduate degrees. All programs included significant research and public service components with the goal of providing an academic environment that fostered intellectual depth and breadth, as well as social responsibility.

Today, continuing a fourfold mission of instruction, research, economic development and public service, NJIT is among the leading comprehensive technological universities in the nation, with state-of-the-art facilities on its 45-acre campus in Newark and a solar observatory in Big Bear, California.

The clock tower and carillon sit in a European-style plaza adjacent to the Campus Center.
