



DR. FRANK KOE Men's Head Coach

In his first season as head coach of the NJIT men's tennis team, **Frank Koe** guided the Highlanders to the best season in recent memory. After two winless seasons prior to Koe's arrival, NJIT finished 2003 with a 7-3 record. Facing an upgraded schedule,

the Highlanders followed up with a 6-7 mark in 2004.

Koe was formerly the head coach at St. Francis University of Pennsylvania. While at St. Francis, he served as professor and chair of the education department. Koe's early coaching experience was at Christiana High School in Newark, Delaware, where he was the assistant coach and taught English and history. Koe possesses 20 years of tennis tournament experience and has won competitions in Pennsylvania, Delaware and New York.

Prior to joining NJIT as the director of the Executive MBA Program in the School of Management in 2001, Koe was the associate director of the Berkley Center for Entrepreneurial Studies at the Stern School of Business, New York University. He has a bachelor's degree and PhD from Pennsylvania State University. His master's degree is from the University of Delaware.

PHIL BABOULIS Women's Head Coach

NJIT graduate **Phil Baboulis** became the head women's tennis coach between the fall 2002 and spring 2003 seasons. The Highlanders have a 9-12 won-lost record in three semesters under Baboulis after recording only one victory in the previous 2 1/2 seasons.



Baboulis is a United States Professional Tennis Association certified instructor with 13 years of teaching experience. He is currently the president of USA Tennis, which runs clinics for children and adults in the New Jersey towns of Bergenfield, Oradell and Parsippany. He is also a teaching professional at the Tenafly Racquet Club.

Baboulis was the first varsity men's tennis coach at Bergen Community College from 1997-99. Prior to that, he was the head boys' coach at Lincoln High School in Jersey City, where he was also a mathematics teacher and assistant boys' basketball coach. As a player, he won singles championships at the 1989 Union County Open and the 1990 Westwood Open.

A 1984 graduate of NJIT, Baboulis played one season of tennis before receiving a bachelor of science degree in computer science. His brother, Paul, is a former baseball captain and MVP for the Highlanders. Baboulis, who attended Teaneck High, resides in Bergenfield.

ATHLETICS FACILITIES

The NJIT men's and women's tennis teams compete and practice on four lighted, outdoor hardcourt tennis courts adjacent to the **Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center**.

Additionally, the teams have access to all of the other facilities in the athletic center. These include the fitness area (containing computer-controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units and an indoor track), two weight rooms (free-weight and hammer-strength), four racquetball courts, a martial arts center, and a six-lane swimming pool.

The Highlanders' men's and women's basketball and volleyball teams play at **Entwisle Gymnasium**, the main gym in the athletic center. Entwisle, which can entertain crowds of up to 1,500, is also open to the campus community during selected hours for recreation.

Lubetkin Field, a lighted, natural grass facility adjacent to the athletic center, is home to the Highlanders' baseball and men's and women's soccer teams, It contains a midfield scoreboard and pressbox facilities, and its bleacher seating can hold approximately 1,000 spectators. The newly-renovated Campus Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.

The above facilities are also used for physical education classes, club sports, and intramurals. Intercollegiate club sports include cricket, judo, lacrosse and track & field.

UNIVERSITY INFORMATION



New Jersey Institute of Technology is a public research university enrolling more than 8,800 bachelor's, master's, and doctoral students in 80 degree programs through its six colleges: Newark College of Engineering, New Jersey School of Architecture, College of Science and Liberal Arts, School of Management, Albert Dorman Honors College, and College of Computing Sciences. Research initiatives include manufacturing, microelectronics, multimedia, transportation, computer science, solar astrophysics, environmental engineering and science, and architecture engineering and building science.

NJIT's history spans from the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age. Newark was a factory town when the tuition-free evening school was

founded in 1881 to support local industries. From the early days, science and techology have been the engines fueling the university's development.

Over time, the university both anticipated and responded to change by expanding its curriculum and mission. Most notably, in 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By 1975, NJIT offered a broad range of undergraduate and graduate degrees. All programs included significant research and public service components with the goal of providing an academic environment that fostered intellectual depth and breadth, as well as social responsibility.

Today, continuing a fourfold mission of instruction, research, economic devel-

opment and public service, NJIT is among the leading comprehensive technological universities in the nation. The university has state-of-the-art facilities with more than 2,000,000 square feet of space located on a 45-acre campus in Newark, plus a solar observatory in Big Bear, California.
