NJIT is New Jersey's Science & Technology University. With roots going back to 1881, when it was founded as Newark Technical School, New Jersey Institute of Technology observed its 125th anniversary in 2006.

Located in University Heights, Newark, NJ, home to more than 30,000 college students, NJIT's campus is just 10 miles from New York City.

Playing a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future, NJIT, as a major public technological university, is an important pipeline for the flow of technology into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university helps to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$83 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities on the 45-acre campus, including biomedical engineering labs and a campus center.

INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAMS

NJIT offers 92 degree programs — 33 undergraduate, 40 master's and 19 doctoral programs — through six schools:

New Jersey School of Architecture
College of Science and Liberal Arts
School of Management
Albert Dorman Honors College
College of Computing Sciences

NJIT has 416 full-time faculty; more than 98 percent of whom hold the highest degree in their field. The student-faculty ratio is 13:1, with more than 5,200 undergraduate students and nearly 2,800 graduate students. Our students hail from 33 states and more than 100 countries to rank eighth in the nation for diversity.

Albert Dorman Honors College enrolls more than 500 students who take advantage of honors courses, research opportunities, advising and mentoring. Honors College students have SAT scores ranking in the top 10 percent nationally.

RESEARCH

NJIT drew more than \$75 million in research funding in 2005 and faculty members welcome student collaboration on research projects.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT


NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies. NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element, together with instruction, research and community service. More than 60 technology start-up companies, many of which hire NJIT students, are on campus.

THE CAREER EDGE

All 10 of the majors with the highest starting salaries for 2005-06 grads are in engineering, computing and business, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers.

Computer and data processing services lead the list of the 10 fastest-growing occupations in projections compiled by the US Department of Labor. Computer-related employment is expected to grow 117 percent by 2008, according to the Career Guide to Industries.





As technology changes all fields, those with science and technology backgrounds are positioned to lead. Among the CEOs of the S&P 500 companies, engineering is the single largest undergraduate degree and more than half of CEOs have undergraduate degrees in engineering, business management, science, math and computing.

THE GLOBAL EDGE

The diversity in NJIT's student body and faculty prepares graduates to understand and succeed in the global marketplace. NJIT was named among the world's top 500 universities in a study by the Institute of Higher Education, Shanghai Jiao Tong University.

THE TECHNOLOGY EDGE

NJIT has been designated one of the nation's most technologically sophisticated universities by Forbes.com and a Princeton Review survey and the university has received major funding from the National Science Foundation and the National Security Agency in recent years.

THE ACADEMIC EDGE

NJIT has long been a national leader in applying new technologies and approaches to the educational experience. NJIT was a pioneer in requiring computer science for students in all majors and the School of Architecture has led innovations in teaching CAD and digital design. The school's innovative "paperless" first-year program was recently cited by Campus Technology Magazine.

Students have a wide range of educational choices in building an interest-tailored program. Among their options are cross-enrolling at neighboring Rutgers to enrich their program with subjects such as music and languages.

NJIT students learn emerging technologies from the researchers behind the technologies, developing valuable marketplace skills. Real-world experience through experiential learning makes graduates more marketable, with many co-op opportunities leading to permanent jobs.

THE REGIONAL EDGE

New Jersey, with America's highest concentration of pharmaceutical, hi-tech, biotech, and medical device companies is the place to study technology. It has the nation's highest per capita number of engineers and scientists as residents, while also leading in per capita rate of patents issued. Further, the Newark-New York region is a living laboratory for architecture and building sciences, environmental engineering and transportation.

THE RESEARCH EDGE

NJIT has been designated by the State of New Jersey as the Homeland Security Technology Systems Center and NJIT operates the world-renowned Big Bear Solar Observatory.

A HISTORY OF NJIT

From the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age, New Jersey Institute of Technology has a rich history with its beginnings developing from the industrial age.

In 1881, an act of the New Jersey State Legislature, recognizing an urgent need, sought a home for what would be the state's technical school. The efforts of Newark's public and private sectors resulted with the opening of Newark Technical School, addressing the state's need.

Over time, the university expanded its curriculum and mission. In 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By the middle of the 20th century, Newark Technical School was transformed into the robust Newark College of Engineering.

The post-war period was one of enormous activity with regular expansion of the campus, as well as the introduction of doctoral level programs. In 1975, with the addition of the New Jersey School of Architecture, the institution had evolved into a technological university, emphasizing a broad range of degrees and dedication to significant research and public service. Newark College of Engineering, stronger than ever, remained intact, but a new university name — New Jersey Institute of Technology — reflected the institution's expanded mission.

A broadened mission called for the creation of a residential campus and the opening of NJIT's first dormitory in 1980 began a period of steady growth that continues. Two new schools were established during the 1980s—the College of Science and Liberal Arts (1982) and the School of Industrial Management (1988). The Albert Dorman Honors College was established in 1994, and the newest school, the College of Computing Sciences, was created in 2001.



DR. ROBERT A. ALTENKIRCH

President



Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch, formerly vice president for research at Mississippi State University (MSU), joined NJIT as the university's seventh president in July 2002. During his tenure as MSU vice president for research, science and engineering, expenditures as reported to National Science Foundation (NSF) increased dramatically—75% from 1997 to 2001.


Prior to his appointment as vice president at MSU, Altenkirch served as professor of mechanical and materials engineering and dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture at Washington State University. From 1988 to 1995, he was professor of mechanical engineering and dean of the College of Engineering at MSU. He also served as professor and chair of mechanical engineering at the University of Kentucky.

In addition to the research program, his responsibilities encompassed congressional relations, intellectual property management and economic development. While dean of engineering at MSU, he led the effort to secure National Science Foundation funding for the establishment of the MSU NSF Engineering Research Center for Computational Field Simulation in 1990. Additionally, the Center was instrumental in helping the State of Mississippi attract a \$1 billion Nissan manufacturing plant.

Altenkirch holds a PhD from Purdue University, an MS from the University of California, Berkeley, and a BSME from Purdue, all in mechanical engineering. He is the author of over 50 publications and nearly 100 presentations in combustion and heat transfer and served as principal investigator for ten Space Shuttle experiments investigating the spread of fire in reduced gravity. He is a Fellow of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

DR. JOEL BLOOM

*Vice President of
Academic and Student Services*




Dr. Joel Bloom has worked at NJIT since July 1990. In his current position, he is responsible for nine divisions of the university, including Physical Education and Athletics.

Dr. Bloom is also Dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College, which enrolls more than 525 students who are typically in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class.

Prior to NJIT, Dr. Bloom spent seven years as assistant Commissioner in the New Jersey Department of Education. He is currently the Chair of the NASULGC Council of Chief Student Affairs Officers and the Newark Consortium Board for Pre-College Education.

Dr. Bloom earned his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees from Hunter College, and holds a Master's and Doctorate from Columbia University Teachers College.



LENNY KAPLAN

Director of Athletics



Since taking over as head of NJIT's division of physical education and athletics in August 2000, Lenny Kaplan was instrumental in establishing a sound NCAA Division II program, setting the stage for the reclassification into NCAA Division I.

Kaplan helped solidify and expand an NJIT program that was entering its fourth year in Division II when he arrived in Newark and in late 2002, after discussions with university President Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch and Vice President Dr. Joel Bloom, Kaplan began the task of steering NJIT's programs into Division I, a process that is set to reach fruition with full championship eligibility in 2009-10.

Along the way, NJIT has enhanced the athletics program, particularly in areas that will benefit the student-athletes directly.

The sports offerings have expanded to 19 varsity sports, and since 2004, NJIT has renovated its two main on-campus venues—Lubetkin Field and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center. The school also signed a 10-year partnership to play its home baseball in the Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and agreed to host basketball in the new home of the NHL's New Jersey Devils.

In 2005-06, NJIT's outstanding home facilities allowed it to host two ECAC Division II postseason championships—women's soccer in the fall and baseball in the spring.

Under Kaplan's leadership, many teams achieved regional and national Division II ranking. Success for several women's teams was unprecedented, with basketball, tennis and soccer all reaching postseason play for the first time.

Additionally, men's volleyball captured a 2007 divisional championship in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association.

Before coming to NJIT, Lenny Kaplan served 11 years at Manhattan College, where he began as Manhattan's director of operations and then advanced to assistant athletics director.

Kaplan, a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration, resides in Merrick, NY, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.

SPORTS MEDICINE

NJIT's sports medicine staff has a new look with the addition of new athletic trainers Amanda Albright, MS/ATC/L and Michael Douglas, MS, AT, C.



Michael Douglas

They work with team physicians Louis Rizio, MD, and Rutvik (Rudy) Patel, DO.

Douglas, a native of Newark, has an extensive athletic training background, having worked in professional and collegiate environments in a career that began in 1995.

Most recently before NJIT, he was head trainer of the Women's National Basketball Association Houston Comets, a job he held after serving as head trainer/Director of Basketball Operations for the NBA Development League Albuquerque Thunderbirds.

Combining those stops with a multi-year stint as assistant trainer with the NBA's Memphis Grizzlies, Douglas holds the distinction of being the only athletic trainer to serve teams in all three leagues that fall under the NBA umbrella.

At the collegiate level, he was head athletic trainer at Palm Beach Atlantic University and at Spelman College in Atlanta. He was also a graduate assistant trainer at his undergraduate alma mater, Morehouse College in Atlanta.

Douglas has additional experience as a summer assistant trainer with the NFL Buffalo Bills in three different seasons and he was head trainer of the Richmond (VA) Rhythm of the International Basketball League.

He earned his bachelor's degree from Morehouse College and his master's degree from Life University School of Graduate Studies in Georgia.



Amanda Albright

Amanda Albright comes to NJIT from Bloomsburg (PA) University, where she advanced through the ranks from athletic training graduate assistant, to part-time assistant athletic trainer and then to full-time assistant athletic trainer.

Albright, who earned her bachelor's degree from Slippery Rock (PA) University, received her master's degree from Bloomsburg.

In addition to her athletic training work, she was a Physical Therapy Aide in Slippery Rock and in Lock Haven, PA.

Dr. Rizio is a board certified orthopedic surgeon and is fellowship trained in the field of sports medicine. He is a graduate of Rutgers and after earning his medical degree from the UMDNJ/New Jersey Medical School, Dr. Rizio completed his orthopedic residency at Tufts University in Boston.

He then completed a sports medicine fellowship at the University of Miami. During his fellowship, he was assistant team physician of the Miami Dolphins, University of Miami Hurricanes, and the Florida Marlins.

Dr. Rizio, who specializes in sports-related injuries, practices at the New Jersey Sports Medicine Institute. Prior to starting his own practice, Dr. Rizio was the Chief of Sports Medicine at the NJ Medical School from 2000-2005. He currently is a professional (New Jersey Pride professional lacrosse), college, and high school team physician.

Dr. Patel practices in association with Dr. Rizio. A cum laude graduate of New York Institute of Technology, Dr. Patel earned his DO from the New York College of Osteopathic Medicine. He was chief resident in Family Medicine at the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School in New Brunswick, NJ, from 2003 to 2006.

ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment (CAPE) took on a new facet with the hiring of Erika Rigby, whose position as Associate Director of CAPE was created for the specific purpose of supporting the academic and professional enrichment of NJIT's student-athletes.

She focuses on five key areas: academic support, career development, personal development, leadership and community service including the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and CHAMPS Life Skills for NJIT's nearly 300 student-athletes in 19 intercollegiate sports.

Erika Rigby came to NJIT from Seton Hall University, where she was Associate Director of Academic Support Services for the Pirates ath-

letic program from 2004 until taking her current post in the fall of 2007. At Seton Hall, she worked directly with men's basketball, women's soccer, women's volleyball and swimming, assisting in class scheduling, tests and tutoring sessions.



Erika Rigby

The Jersey City, NJ, native is working with her fourth Division I program in a career that began in 1997 at Northern Arizona, where she was director of the Academic Enrichment Program.

She returned to her hometown, serving as Academic/Athletic Coordinator at Saint Peter's College, where she was responsible for the academic progress of over 300 student-athletes in 20 sports, from 1999 to 2004.

Rigby holds a bachelor's degree in psychology from Providence College, where she was an intercollegiate runner who earned Big East Conference all-academic honors.

She earned two master's degrees—one from Northern Arizona in educational leadership and one from Saint Peter's in administration and supervision—and she is pursuing her doctorate in higher education at Seton Hall.

A member of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletes, she is on the NCAA Initial Eligibility Waiver Committee.

She also worked in the office of former United States Senator Bill Bradley of New Jersey.

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment, headed by Dr. Marybeth Boger, is a resource available to all students within NJIT's Student Services Division. It provides academic support services and activities to enhance students' academic and professional development.

The CAPE works together with academic and administrative departments to help students develop the necessary analytical and problem-solving skills to become independent learners.

CAPE provides individual tutoring sessions, group tutorial sessions, student success workshops and testing accommodations.

New Jersey Institute of Technology athletics is on the move to the top level of college athletics—NCAA Division I.

The exciting news came in the summer of 2005, when the NCAA gave NJIT the green light to reclassify its entire athletics program from Division II to Division I, a four-year process that will bring all Highlander sports to full Division I status and championship eligibility in 2009-10.

Two sports—men's soccer and women's soccer—are paving the way under NCAA rules that allow Division II or Division III schools to elevate one sport in each gender to Division I in a process that takes two years to complete.

NJIT men's soccer is already a full member of NCAA Division I, having arrived at championship eligibility in the 2005 season. The men's journey to the top level began in 2003, under the NCAA's single-sport per gender reclassification process. Highlanders women's soccer began a simi-

lar two-year process in 2005, with full Division I status and championship eligibility arriving in the 2007 season.

The larger process of advancing the entire program to Division I takes four years to complete and includes application, a detailed strategic plan and in-depth annual review of the institution's progress in moving toward its goal of complying with NCAA Division I rules and building a strong, broad-based athletics program.

New Jersey Institute of Technology's move to Division I has gone quickly since the November 2002 discussions among President Robert A. Altenkirch, Vice President Joel Bloom and Athletics Director Lenny Kaplan.


From there, came a proposal from Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I. Little more than two years later, the NCAA approved NJIT's proposal to advance its

entire program to Division I.

Along the way, scholarship and operating budgets have been enhanced, with expanded coaching staffs, increased scholarship dollars and upgraded facilities for competition and practice.

Upgrading athletics has been a priority for Dr. Altenkirch since he was selected as the seventh President of NJIT in May 2002.

"As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university athletically with our academic peers," said Altenkirch. "It will also enable us to recruit the best and brightest student-athletes, improve athletics facilities available to the entire NJIT community, gain regional and national visibility, and build strong linkages with students that will carry over to their days as alumni."



RYAN McNEIL

Head Coach



Ryan McNeil, who came to NJIT in August 2004, is leading a resurgence of the university's two volleyball teams.

Originally hired as head coach of the men's team and assistant coach of the women's team, he served as interim head coach of the women's team in 2005 and became permanent head coach for the 2006 season. He has been the men's head coach since 2005. And he has made a positive mark on both teams.

On the men's side, taking over a team that last had a winning record in 2000, he guided his first squad to a .500 overall record in 2005 and followed that up with Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association playoff appearances in 2006 and 2007 and the championship of the EIVA Hay Division with a 9-1 division record in 2007.

In 2006, the Highlander men made the EIVA playoffs for the first time since 2000. And in 2007, NJIT posted a 19-10 record, compiling the program's best wins total since it was 20-13 in 1995.

The first-place Hay Division finish in 2007 has earned the Highlanders promotion to the EIVA's higher power-rated division, the Tait, where NJIT will compete for the first time since 2002.

On the women's side, McNeil assisted on a 2004 team that made a double-digit jump in

wins from the previous season and then became interim head coach in 2005 and permanent head coach in 2006.

In 2006, he led NJIT into its first season of Division I competition. Despite facing Division I competition with only two starters returning from the previous year, the Highlanders won 10 matches, surpassing the team's nine wins in its last season at the Division II level in 2005.

Sporting a lineup of three freshmen and four sophomores in the top seven, McNeil guided the young 2006 squad to a 7-7 mark over the last 14 matches. In 2007, the Highlander women took another step, logging 13 wins—three more than in 2006—and NJIT won five of its last seven 2007 regular season matches.

Championship-level volleyball is nothing new to McNeil, who was a standout player in both Canada and the United States. Later, as an assistant coach at Lewis University in Illinois, he helped coach the men's team that won the 2003 national championship match and the women's team that qualified for two NCAA Tournaments.

A native of Montego Bay, Jamaica, McNeil resided in Ontario, Canada, for 15 years. He was MVP of two college teams in Canada—Sheridan College and Ryerson University.

Transferring south of the border to Lewis University in Illinois, McNeil played on the Flyers' 1998 national semifinalists. He turned to coaching at Lewis, assisting with both the men's and women's teams.

In his two years as an assistant with the Lewis men, they qualified for the NCAA tournament twice, won two Midwest Intercollegiate Volleyball Conference crowns and captured the 2003 national title match. He coached with the Lewis women for four seasons and during his tenure the Flyers made the NCAA Tournament twice and achieved national ranking in 2002.

McNeil resides in Newark.



JOSE REYNALDO MARTINS

Assistant Coach



With a championship background as a volleyball player, Jose Reynaldo (JR) Martins (pronounced mar-TEENS) joined the NJIT coaching staff at the start of the 2006-07 academic year.

The native of Sao Paulo, Brazil, is the assistant to head coach Ryan McNeil with both the Highlanders men's and women's teams.

Martins, a 2004 graduate of Lewis University in Romeoville is also a graduate of Pontific Catholic University of Campinas in his home country.

He was a four-year player at Lewis, where he was also a team captain and played on the Lewis team that captured the 2003 NCAA national championship match. A dean's list student for eight semesters at Lewis, he was an Academic All-America in 2004.

A veteran of the Brazilian army, he has coached collegiate volleyball in Brazil and then club volleyball in the Midwestern United States, before returning to Brazil, where he played and coached club ball.

His presence was felt at the beginning of his NJIT tenure, as he helped Ryan McNeil coach the Highlander women to a strong opening venture into Division I competition and then the men's team to a 19-10 overall record and the 2007 Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association Hay Division championship.




MELISSA GOLOB

Volunteer coach Daniel Cruz joined the NJIT volleyball coaching staff for the start of the 2008 men's volleyball season.

A resident of East Orange, NJ, Cruz has previous experience coaching at the community college level in New Jersey. He began coaching as a baseball assistant at Bergen Community College in Paramus, NJ in September 2003 and added duties as Bergen's head women's volleyball coach in 2004.

He moved on to Passaic County Community College in Paterson, NJ, becoming head women's volleyball coach and head baseball coach in July 2005.

A graduate of Bergen Community College and Coppin State College in Baltimore, MD, Cruz played baseball at both schools from 1998 to 2003. He later earned his master's in education from Saint Peter's College in Jersey City, NJ, in 2006.

He has taught in the Paterson Public Schools since 2005 and as an adjunct mathematics professor at Passaic County Community College since 2006.

NJIT returns to the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association Tait Division for the first time since the 2001 season after two seasons near and, finally, at the top of the EIVA Hay Division.

Last season, NJIT finished first in the Hay with a 9-1 division mark, which returned the squad to the EIVA playoffs for a second straight year.

From his first day at NJIT, coach Ryan McNeil's goal was to win the lower-powered Hay Division. His Highlanders finished second in his second year and first in his third year. Now, McNeil's goal is to win the stronger Tait Division.

"Our team is physically ready," said the coach. "It's all a matter of being mentally ready to compete on a daily basis and to truly believe in themselves and each other.

"Sports is 40 percent physical and 60 percent mental. If you truly believe you're better than your opponent. And you truly believe in your teammates, it will happen. You will win."

Looking at things in more tangible terms, McNeil said: "The last couple of years we've played Tait teams and outside teams, such as USC, Cal State Northridge, Pacific and the Chicago teams (Loyola and Lewis) that were comparable to the teams in the Tait. Our guys won some of those matches and learned from all of them.

"The guys that have been here know that the top teams are good, but not unbeatable. As a team, they know what it takes to play on the top level. We're in the deep end of the pool, but we're good swimmers."

Not a tall team, NJIT has only one veteran, 6-foot-7 Greg Wagner, who is taller than 6-5. The answer there is practice and exceptional athletic ability. "The team has worked very hard to improve on our blocking," said McNeil.

Athletic ability comes into play with the likes of 6-4 Rob Thomas, 6-1 Amobi Armstrong, 6-4 Leonardo Paludo and 6-3 Eduardo Welter can more than hold their own on the front line against taller opponents.

McNeil welcomes back a veteran squad, including all starters among 11 letterwinners, from last season's team that finished 19-10 overall.

The team has three senior starters (plus a senior libero), led by 2007 all-EIVA 2nd team opposite Leonardo Paludo (468 points, 4.3 k/g, 2.16 d/g). He tied for 12th in the nation in points per game (5.03), 14th in service aces per game (.398) and 18th in digs per game (2.16). With the exposure he'll get playing in the Tait Division, Paludo has a chance to earn even higher honors than he has in the past.

Paludo, one of three Brazilians on the team, is joined by classmate and fellow Brazilian Eduardo Welter, who was a nationally-ranked hitter in 2005 and 2006 before spending most of last season as a libero, due to a troublesome back. He moved back to hitter late in the season and is penciled in to play there again in 2008. Welter tied for 12th in the nation in digs per game (2.40). A fiery leader, a healthy Welter is primed to make an impact at the top level, as well.

The third Brazilian is junior setter Rodrigo Correa (11.55 a/g; 20th in the nation).

Junior middle Amobi Armstrong, an exceptional athlete, accounted for 370.5 points a year ago and senior middle Greg Wagner had an impressive .449 hitting percentage. Sophomore Charles Bell, another outstanding pure athlete, showed improvement as his freshman year progressed and appears ready to take a step up along with the higher level of competition.

Seniors Mike Nonnenmann (co-captain, setter) and Chris Sidayao (libero) are valuable contributors, as well. Nonnenmann and Correa, the junior, will both see significant playing time in the crucial setter spot.

Thomas, a junior, is what basketball people call "long" with a wingspan and jumping ability that enable him to play taller than his listed height of 6-foot-4. He came to NJIT as a raw product and has seen more playing time as he adjusts to the demanding level of play. He was in 39 games in 18 matches a year ago and should see action as a starter or top front row reserve this year.

Freshmen Steve Sylvester and Scott McHugh figure to challenge for front row playing time, as well. Sylvester is certain to be a contributor at some point and that point could come as soon as this season. McHugh, who stands 5-foot-9, has exceptional jumping ability. Classmate Aaron Rogers is expected to learn the college game this year.

Libero Chuck Richmond is a solid server, while Matthew Sasso and Daniel Paslawsky are veterans who will add depth to the 2008 Highlanders.


There's no doubt that every Tait Division foe is at least as good as and most are better than the teams NJIT faced in the Hay Division. Perennial national contender Penn State (1994 national champion and NCAA Tournament participant in 16 of the last 17 years) will aim for its 20th EIVA title from its familiar perch atop the Tait Division.


However, coach McNeil has had his eyes looking ahead to the time when his team would move up and purposely scheduled challenging non-divisional matches. Last season, the Highlanders had four regular season matches against Tait teams and went 2-2 (defeated Rutgers-Newark and George Mason; lost to Juniata and Princeton).

In addition, the Highlanders faced nationally-ranked Pacific and Cal State Northridge in California and Lewis and Loyola-Chicago in Illinois in 2007. The previous year, NJIT took on Lewis, Loyola and Southern California as three of its first six 2006 foes.

This year's non-EIVA schedule is formidable, as well. The Highlanders will make their annual trip to Chicago for matches against Loyola (#11 in the final 2007 national poll) and Lewis (March 14 and 15, respectively) and they will also visit Midwestern power Ball State (#13 in the nation in 2007) on a separate trip on January 26. A week after the Chicago trip, NJIT will head to California for two matches at Pacific (#15 in 2007).

The New Jersey Institute of Technology volleyball teams play their home matches in the newly-renovated gymnasium of the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center.

The Fleisher Athletic Center gym, also home to NJIT basketball, in the summer of 2006 underwent renovation to include installation of a new floor and baskets, new lighting, new sound system and new scoreboards, along with entirely new seating for approximately 1,500 spectators after the first phase of renovation. The back bay 'C gym' can be sectioned off from the main competition floor, making the facility useful for intramurals, physical education classes and campus recreation time, while being able to host multiple simultaneous events.

The NJIT volleyball teams also have full access to the other facilities in the Fleisher Center. These include the fitness area (containing computer-controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units and an indoor track), a free-weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), a martial arts center and an aerobics dance studio.

A six-lane swimming pool in Fleisher Athletic Center is home to the NJIT men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads play on the four outdoor lighted tennis courts behind Fleisher Athletic




Center. The NJIT Campus Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.

Lubetkin Field, with its entrance a few feet from the entrance of the Fleisher Athletic Center, is a first-class venue for college soccer. Outfitted with SprinTurf artificial grass in the summer of 2004, Lubetkin Field also includes lighting for night contests, bleacher seating for more than 1,000 spectators, a press box and scoreboard.


Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, opened in 1999 at a cost of \$30 million and with a seating capacity of 6,200, became the home of NJIT baseball in 2004. In a joint December 2005 press conference, New York Yankees manager Joe Torre was a featured speaker as NJIT and the Newark Bears announced a 10-year partnership that cemented the downtown stadium as the home of all Highlanders home games for the decade to come.

NJIT, which offers a growing list of club sports, also has a robust intramural program, which makes use of the numerous athletic facilities. Each student must pass two physical education classes as a graduation requirement. Offerings include aerobics, archery, bowling, dance, fencing, golf, karate, swimming, skiing, strength training and conditioning, volleyball and water safety.



NEWARK: THE RENAISSANCE CITY

NJIT is located in the heart of New Jersey's largest city. A major urban center, Newark is a city on the move. Some 30,000 undergraduate, graduate and professional students attend classes in University Heights at the city's four public institutions of higher learning: NJIT, Rutgers-Newark, the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, and Essex County College.

NEWARK: NEW JERSEY'S COLLEGE TOWN

Adjacent to NJIT is the Newark campus of Rutgers University.

NJIT and Rutgers enjoy an exceptionally close and productive consortial relationship within the thriving University Heights section of Newark. NJIT and Rutgers students have library privileges at both campuses. NJIT students may also enrich their educational experience by enrolling in Rutgers-Newark courses and in full degree programs in disciplines not offered at NJIT, such as art, music, geology and psychology.

Each year the two universities co-sponsor a common season of theatrical productions, as well as 'World Week,' a joint program of honors colloquia, and a variety of other cultural and social activities.

PRUDENTIAL CENTER

The new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils is going up in downtown Newark at the corner of Mulberry and Edison streets, about one mile from the NJIT's University Heights campus.

Opened in October 2007, 'The Rock' is set the centerpiece of the city's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. In addition to the world's best hockey, it will be home to numerous entertainment and sporting events, including NJIT basketball. In December 2007 and January 2008, NJIT will host two stand-alone men's games and two men's/women's doubleheaders in North America's newest major arena.

The arena, with seating for 18,500 spectators, features a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as the latest in ice-surface technology and a gourmet restaurant overlooking the ice for Devils games. The building will contain 850,000 square feet of space, 9,000 tons of steel, eight million pounds of structural steel and 25,000 cubic yards of concrete.

RED BULL PARK

The Red Bulls of Major League Soccer and AEG New York broke ground in September 2006 for Red Bull Park, a 25,000-seat soccer stadium and a major component of the Harrison MetroCentre development, located across the Passaic River, about two miles from NJIT's campus.




The \$100 million 'soccer specific' stadium will feature a 360-degree European-style roof/canopy covering the majority of the seating. When completed in the summer of 2008, Red Bull Park will be the home of the MLS Red Bulls, international soccer and other events. AEG developed and operates 'soccer specific' stadiums in California and in Illinois.

The multi-billion dollar Harrison MetroCentre will feature three million square feet of office space; 3,500 residential units; 300,000 square feet of retail space and over 10,000 decked parking spaces when completed.

BEARS AND EAGLES RIVERFRONT STADIUM

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the professional baseball Newark Bears and since 2004 the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999. With a seating capacity of 6,200, "The Den" affords fans an up-close view of the



action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major league-caliber press box.

In December 2005, NJIT and the Bears held a joint press conference to herald a new partnership that includes a 10-year deal that extends Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium as the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball.








New Jersey Institute of Technology men's volleyball is a member of the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association. The EIVA contains 13 members from all three NCAA Divisions. The champion of the EIVA Tournament receives an automatic qualifier into the four-team NCAA National Collegiate Championship.

Founded in 1971 as the Eastern Collegiate Volleyball League, the EIVA was given its current name in 1985. Penn State made EIVA and NCAA history in 1994 by becoming the first non-California school to win the national title.

The league has been realigned several times, with the latest move occurring before the 2006 season. In 2004 and 2005, the EIVA had three divisions, but the alignment was dropped back to two divisions—the Tait and the Hay—for 2006.

The EIVA groups its highest power-rated teams into the same division, the Tait. To account for changes in the relative strength of the teams, the EIVA has a system of promotion and relegation similar to European soccer. At the end of the season, the champion of the second power-rated division (Hay) is promoted to the Tait Division for the following season. Meanwhile, the bottom team in the Tait is relegated to the Hay Division for the following season.

As the 2007 EIVA Hay Division champion, NJIT has earned promotion to the EIVA Tait Division, where the Highlanders will play in 2008. This season's Tait Division matches include home and away contests against Penn State, Saint Francis (PA), George Mason, Juniata, Princeton and East Stroudsburg.

NJIT reached the EIVA finals in 1999, losing to Penn State, and returned to the semifinals in 2000. The Highlanders won the now-defunct EIVA Division II Tournament in 1998 and 1999. Prior to reclassifying to Division II, they won the EIVA Division III championship in 1991 and 1997 and were the Division III runners-up in 1993 and 1995.
