About NJIT

NJIT is New Jersey's Science & Technology University. With roots going back to 1881, when it was founded as Newark Technical School, New Jersey Institute of Technology observed its 125th anniversary in 2006.

Located in University Heights, Newark, New Jersey, home to more than 30,000 college students, NJIT's campus is just 10 miles from New York City.

Playing a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future, NJIT, as a major public technological university, is an important pipeline for the flow of technology into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university helps to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$83 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities on the 45-acre campus, including biomedical engineering labs and a campus center.

Instructional Programs

NJIT offers 96 degree programs — 36 undergraduate, 41 master's and 19 doctoral programs — through six schools:

NJIT has 416 full-time faculty; more than 98 percent of whom hold the highest degree in their field. More than 5,300 undergraduate students and more than 2,800 graduate students. Our students hail from 33 states and more than 100 countries to rank eighth in the nation for diversity.

Albert Dorman Honors College enrolls more than 500 students who take advantage of honors courses, research opportunities, advising and mentoring. Honors College students have SAT scores ranking in the top 10 percent nationally.

With more than 44,000 alumni, NJIT is rated by US News and World Report as a top-tier national research university offering bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees.

Research

NJIT drew more than \$75 million in research funding in 2005 and faculty members welcome student collaboration on research projects.

Economic Development

NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies. NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element, together with instruction, research and community service. More than 60 technology start-up companies, many of which hire NJIT students, are on campus.



The Career Edge

All 10 of the majors with the highest starting salaries for 2005-06 grads are in engineering, computing and business, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers.

Computer and data processing services lead the list of the 10 fastest-growing occupations in projections compiled by the US Department of Labor. Computer-related employment is expected to grow 117 percent by 2008, according to the Career Guide to Industries.

As technology changes all fields, those with science and technology backgrounds are positioned to lead. Among the CEOs of the S&P 500 companies, engineering is the single largest undergraduate degree and more than half of CEOs have undergraduate degrees in engineering, business management, science, math and computing.

The Global Edge

The diversity in NJIT's student body and faculty prepares graduates to understand and succeed in the global marketplace. NJIT was named among the world's top 500 universities in a study by the Institute of Higher Education, Shanghai Jiao Tong University.

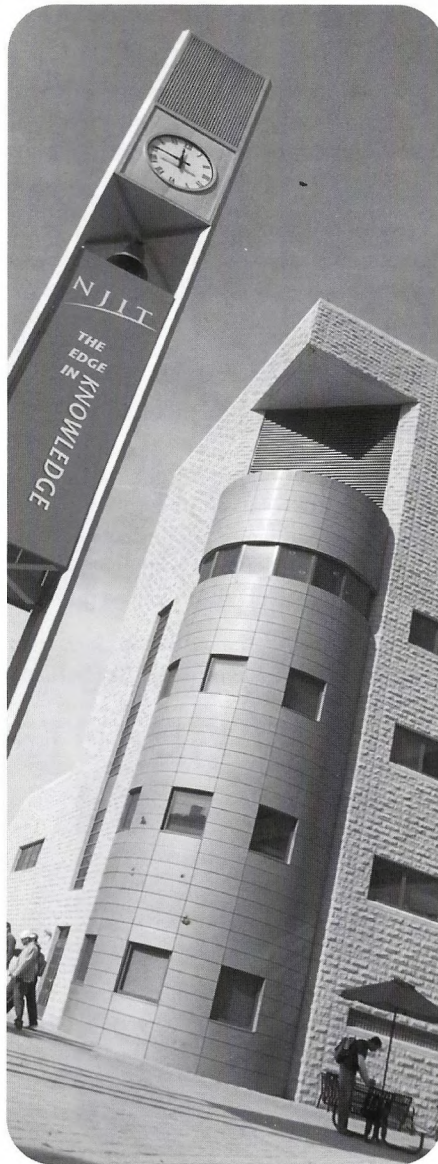
The Technology Edge

NJIT has been designated one of the nation's most technologically sophisticated universities by Forbes.com and a Princeton Review survey and the university has received major funding from the National Science Foundation and the National Security Agency in recent years.

The Academic Edge

NJIT has long been a national leader in applying new technologies and approaches to the educational experience. NJIT was a pioneer in requiring computer science for students in all majors and the School of Architecture has led innovations in teaching CAD and digital design. The school's innovative "paperless" first-year program was recently cited by Campus Technology Magazine.

Students have a wide range of educational choices in building an interest-tailored program. Among their options are cross-enrolling at neighboring Rutgers to enrich their program with subjects such as music and languages.



NJIT students learn emerging technologies from the researchers behind the technologies, developing valuable marketplace skills. Real-world experience through experiential learning makes graduates more marketable, with many co-op opportunities leading to permanent jobs.

The Regional Edge

New Jersey, with America's highest concentration of pharmaceutical, hi-tech, biotech, and medical device companies is the place to study technology. It has the nation's highest per capita number of engineers and scientists as residents, while also leading in per capita rate of patents issued. Further, the Newark-New York region is a living laboratory for architecture and building sciences, environmental engineering and transportation.

The Research Edge

NJIT has been designated by the State of New Jersey as the Homeland Security Technology Systems Center and NJIT operates the world-renowned Big Bear Solar Observatory.

A History of NJIT

From the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age, New Jersey Institute of Technology has a rich history with its beginnings developing from the industrial age.

In 1881, an act of the New Jersey State Legislature, recognizing an urgent need, sought a home for what would be the state's technical school. The efforts of Newark's public and private sectors resulted with the opening of Newark Technical School, addressing the state's need.

Over time, the university expanded its curriculum and mission. In 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By the middle of the 20th century, Newark Technical School was transformed into the robust Newark College of Engineering.

The post-war period was one of enormous activity with regular expansion of the campus, as well as the introduction of doctoral level programs. In 1975, with the addition of the New Jersey School of Architecture, the institution had evolved into a technological university, emphasizing a broad range of degrees and dedication to significant research and public service. Newark College of Engineering, stronger than ever, remained intact, but a new university name — New Jersey Institute of Technology — reflected the institution's expanded mission.

A broadened mission called for the creation of a residential campus and the opening of NJIT's first dormitory in 1980 began a period of steady growth that continues. Two new schools were established during the 1980s—the College of Science and Liberal Arts (1982) and the School of Industrial Management (1988). The Albert Dorman Honors College was established in 1994, and the newest school, the College of Computing Sciences, was created in 2001.



Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch

President

Having joined NJIT as its seventh president in July 2002, Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch is leading the university in a period of multi-layered growth.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$80 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities, while also drawing similar dollars in annual research funding.

Under President Altenkirch, NJIT has expanded its course offerings, with 16 new degree programs added in the 2008-09 academic year alone, and 13 in various stages of development for implementation in the next two years.

Coinciding with the expansion is NJIT's transition from a smaller commuter campus to a larger institution with a larger resident student population. The incoming class of 2012 is the largest in the history of the school, and more than half the freshman class resides on campus.

Tied to that transition is Altenkirch's strong belief that the home institution in New Jersey's largest city needs to be residential and provide the experiences associated with a residential campus. At the same time, Altenkirch is committed to NJIT's involvement with the community in its home city of Newark.

Intercollegiate athletics fits those goals naturally and upgrading NJIT athletics has been a priority of Altenkirch's presidency going back to November 2002 meetings that led to NJIT's reclassification to NCAA Division I.

Adding a personal dimension to his support, Altenkirch, a multi-sport athlete in high school, freshman baseball player at Purdue University, and a former college soccer official, and his wife, Beth, are regular attendees at NJIT competitions, home and away.

Immediately before his selection as president of NJIT, Altenkirch was vice president for research at Mississippi State University (MSU),

a position he held from 1998 to 2002.

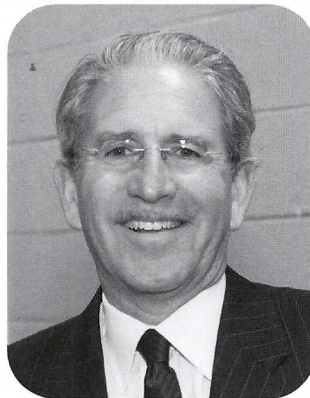
Prior to his appointment as vice president at MSU, Altenkirch served as dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture at Washington State University (1995-98).

From 1988 to 1995, he was dean of the College of Engineering at MSU. He also served as professor and chair of mechanical engineering at the University of Kentucky (1975-88).

Altenkirch holds a PhD from Purdue University, an MS from the University of California, Berkeley, and a BS from Purdue, all in mechanical engineering.

He is the author of over 50 publications and nearly 100 presentations in combustion and heat transfer and served as principal investigator for 10 Space Shuttle experiments investigating the spread of fire in reduced gravity.

He is a fellow of the American Society of Engineers and in 2008 received the Ellis Island Medal of Honor.



Dr. Joel Bloom

Vice President of Academic and Student Services

Dr. Joel Bloom, who joined NJIT in July 1990, is responsible for eight divisions of the university, including physical education and athletics.

In 1998, Bloom was appointed the first dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College in addition to his vice president responsibilities. The honors college enrolls over 500 students, including residents of 15 states and several foreign countries. The combined average SAT score is over 1300 and freshmen typically have ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class. Honors College students maintain a grade point average higher than 3.5.

Prior to his arrival at NJIT, Dr. Bloom served seven years as assistant commissioner of the

New Jersey Department of Education for the Division of General Academic Education. He was responsible for managing many of the education department's initiatives, over 300 grants and contracts, and a \$24 million budget.

Formerly a teacher and school administrator in New York City Public Schools, Dr. Bloom was also a director of research and instructor at Teacher's College, Columbia University.

He is chair of the Greater Newark Consortium for Pre-College Education and vice chair of the State Board for Communities and Schools. He serves further as a member of numerous boards at the state, regional and national levels and has received national and state education awards, as well as federal, foundation and corporate grant awards. He has published journal articles and presented papers on school improvement, curriculum development, college transition and student assessment.

Dr. Bloom holds a master's degree and a doctorate from Teacher's College, Columbia University. He also earned master's and bachelor's degrees from Hunter College of the City University of New York.



Lenny Kaplan

Director of Athletics

Since taking over as head of NJIT's division of physical education and athletics in August 2000, Lenny Kaplan has been instrumental in shaping a new direction for the program.

His first task was to help stabilize and expand a program that was entering its fourth year in Division II when he arrived in Newark. In late 2002, after discussions with university President Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch and Vice President Dr. Joel Bloom, Kaplan took on the task of steering NJIT's programs into Division I, a process that is set to reach fruition with full championship eligibility in 2009-10.

The sports offerings have expanded to 19 varsity programs and since 2004, NJIT has reno-

vated its two main on-campus venues—Lubetkin Field and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center. The school also signed a 10-year partnership to play all home baseball in the professional Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and later agreed to host basketball in the new Prudential Center, downtown Newark home of the NHL's New Jersey Devils.

In 2005-06, NJIT's outstanding home facilities allowed it to host ECAC Division II post-season championships in women's soccer and baseball.

Under Kaplan's leadership, many teams achieved regional and national Division II ranking. Women's teams in basketball, tennis and soccer all reached postseason play for the first time in his administration,

Additionally, men's volleyball captured a divisional championship in the Eastern

Intercollegiate Volleyball Association and the next year reached the EIVA playoff semifinals hosted by eventual 2008 national champion Penn State.

Kaplan guided the program toward further stability with membership in the newly-expanded all-sports Great West Conference, which will offer a conference home for 11 of NJIT's 19 varsity sports.

Before coming to NJIT, Lenny Kaplan served 11 years at Manhattan College, where he began as Manhattan's director of operations and was assistant athletics director from 1991-2000.

Kaplan, a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration, resides in Merrick, NY, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.

Sports Medicine

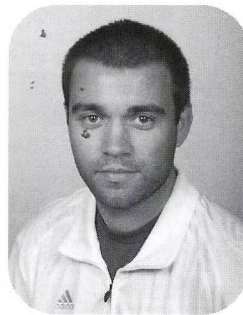
NJIT sports medicine is moving forward with expanded facilities and a staff of three full-time trainers led by head trainer Roger Olean, MEd/ATC, with assistant trainers Paul Grayner, MEd/ATC, and Matt Koscs, MS/ATC. They work with team physicians Louis Rizio, MD, and Rutvik (Rudy) Patel, DO.



Roger Olean

Olean, an intercollegiate athletic trainer since 1992, returned to NJIT in the summer of 2008 after having filled the same position from 2000 to 2005. He earned his bachelor's degree from Slippery Rock (PA) University and his master's degree from Springfield (MA) College and has served on the training staffs at four colleges (NJIT, Hood, Springfield, and SUNY Cobleskill) and three high schools.

Matt Koscs, who earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Delaware, came to NJIT in July 2008. As an undergrad, he was recipient of the Paris

Delligatti Memorial Award for Excellence in Athletic Training.

Prior to NJIT, he served three years as head trainer at Hodgson Vocational Technical High School in Newark, DE. He also worked with soccer clubs in Delaware and was employed at Christiana Care Physical Therapy Plus, in Newark, DE.

Paul Grayner, who holds a bachelor's degree from Saint Leo College in Florida and a master's from American University in Washington, DC, has a diverse background in athletic training, having served at the college and professional levels, as well as in a fitness center setting. He joined the NJIT staff late in 2008.

From the mid-1970s to the mid-1980s, he was a trainer in the minor league systems of the New York Yankees and New York Mets and in 1984 he was assistant trainer with the Mets. He later worked with the Long Island Knights professional basketball team.

At the collegiate level, he was head trainer at

Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ from 1989 to 1998 and earlier worked as an assistant trainer at Hofstra, Adelphi and FDU.

Dr. Rizio is a board certified orthopedic surgeon and is fellowship trained in the field of sports medicine. He is a graduate of Rutgers and after earning his medical degree from the UMDNJ/New Jersey Medical School, Dr. Rizio completed his orthopedic residency at Tufts University in Boston.

He then completed a sports medicine fellowship at the University of Miami and was assistant team physician of the Hurricanes, as well as the Miami Dolphins, the Miami Hurricanes.

Dr. Rizio practices at the New Jersey Sports Medicine Institute. Prior to starting his own practice, Dr Rizio was the Chief of Sports Medicine at the NJ Medical School from 2000-2005.

Dr. Patel practices in association with Dr. Rizio. A cum laude graduate of NYIT, Dr. Patel earned his DO from the New York College of Osteopathic Medicine. He was chief resident in Family Medicine at the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School in New Brunswick, NJ, from 2003 to 2006.

Strength and Conditioning

A formal strength and conditioning program is a key part of a Division I program, with an eye toward maximizing individual and team performance in competition. The strength and conditioning coach also works closely with the

Athletic Training Staff in the areas of injury prevention and injury rehabilitation.

The 2008-09 season brought another dimension to NJIT athletics with the hiring of Dan Huff, CSCS, as the Highlanders' first full-time strength and conditioning coach. In addition to the hiring of a full-time coach to coordinate the strength and conditioning, NJIT renovated the weight rooms and purchased new equipment, with the area dedicated to use by the Highlander teams.

Huff previously served five years as strength and conditioning coordinator at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ, from 2003 to 2008, working with an 18-sport NCAA Division I program.

Huff was Sports Performance Director for Velocity Sports Performance in Wall, NJ, immediately before accepting his position at NJIT. He is a graduate of William Paterson University of New Jersey. He holds numerous certifications.

Academic Enrichment

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment (CAPE) added a new component with the 2007 hiring of Erika Rigby McCourt as Associate Director of CAPE in a position that was created for the specific purpose of serving the needs of NJIT's student-athletes.

She focuses on five key areas: academic support, career development, personal development, leadership and community service including the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and CHAMPS Life Skills for NJIT's nearly 300 student-athletes.

In 2008-09, Tim Wuorinen moved over to CAPE as eligibility certification officer/academic advisor, after having spent the previous five-plus years working in the NJIT Department of Athletics as assistant athletic director and coordinator for compliance and student-athlete services.

Erika Rigby McCourt came to NJIT from Seton Hall University, where she was Associate Director of Academic Support Services for athletics from 2004 until she left for NJIT. At Seton Hall, she worked directly with four teams, including men's basketball.

She is with her fourth Division I program in a career that began in 1997 at Northern Arizona, where she directed the Academic Enrichment Program. She later returned home to New Jersey, serving as Academic/Athletic Coordinator at Saint Peter's College from 1999 to 2004.



Erika Rigby McCourt

Rigby McCourt graduated from Providence College, where she was a Big East Conference all-academic runner. She earned master's degrees from Northern Arizona and from Saint Peter's and is pursuing her doctorate at Seton Hall.

A member of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletes, she is on the NCAA Initial Eligibility Waiver Committee.

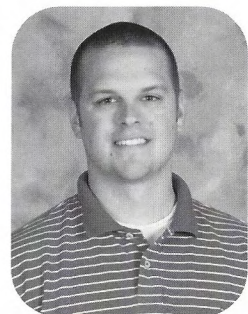
Erika married Robert McCourt, the head men's soccer coach at Monmouth University, in May 2008 and they reside in Oakhurst, NJ.

Tim Wuorinen was a compliance fellow with the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference and worked in the athletic offices of four colleges, including Western New England College, his undergraduate alma mater. In addition to his bachelor's degree from Western New England, he earned a master's degree from NJIT.

Tim and his wife, Tara, who is the academic/athletic coordinator at Saint Peter's College, reside in Aberdeen, NJ.

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment, headed by Dr. Marybeth Boger, is a resource available to all students within NJIT's Student Services Division. The CAPE provides academic support services and activities to enhance students' academic and professional development and it works with academic and administrative departments to help students develop the necessary analytical and problem-solving skills to become independent learners.

CAPE provides tutoring, student success workshops and testing accommodations.



Tim Wuorinen

New Jersey Institute of Technology athletics is on the move to the top level of college athletics—NCAA Division I.

The reclassification is nearly complete, as NJIT closes in on active championship-eligible Division I status, which is slated to arrive for all programs in 2009-10.

Formerly a member of Division II, NJIT got the go-ahead to begin the reclassification process, which began with an exploratory year in 2005-06. All of the programs that previously competed in Division II then moved up to face Division I competition effective in 2006-07.

Two sports—men's soccer and women's soccer—paved the way on a faster NCAA track that allows lower division schools to elevate one sport in each gender to Division I in a process that takes two years to complete.

NJIT men's soccer became a full member of NCAA Division I at the start of the 2005 season, when the Highlanders arrived at championship eligibility. The men's journey to the top level began in 2003. NJIT women's soccer began a similar two-year process in 2005, with full Division I status and championship

eligibility arriving with the 2007 season.

The larger process of advancing the entire program to Division I takes longer and includes application, a detailed strategic plan and in-depth annual review of the institution's progress in moving toward its goal of complying with NCAA Division I rules and building a strong, broad-based athletics program.

NJIT's move to Division I progressed quickly after the November 2002 discussions among President Robert A. Altenkirch, Vice President Joel Bloom and Athletics Director Lenny Kaplan.

From there came a proposal from Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I. Little more than two years later, the NCAA approved NJIT's proposal to advance its entire program to Division I.

Along the way, scholarship and operating budgets have been enhanced, with expanded coaching staffs, increased scholarship dollars and upgraded facilities for competition and practice.

Upgrading athletics has been a priority for Dr. Altenkirch since he was selected as the seventh President of NJIT in May 2002.

"As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university athletically with our academic peers," said Altenkirch. "It will also enable us to recruit the best and brightest student-athletes, improve athletics facilities available to the entire NJIT community, gain regional and national visibility, and build strong linkages with students that will carry over to their days as alumni."

Moving to Division I has allowed NJIT student-athletes to test themselves in competition against their peers from all over the country, including competition against teams from the nation's best conferences.

Along the way, two NJIT opponents (Maryland men's soccer in 2005 and Penn State men's volleyball in 2008) have faced the Highlanders in the regular season and then gone on to win their respective national championship.

Ryan McNeil

Head Coach

Ryan McNeil, who came to NJIT in August 2004, is leading a resurgence of the university's two volleyball teams.

Originally hired as head coach of the men's team and assistant coach of the women's team, he served as interim head coach of the women's team in 2005 and became permanent head coach for the 2006 season. He has been the men's head coach since 2005. And he has made a positive mark on both teams.

On the men's side, taking over a team that last had a winning record in 2000, he guided his first squad to a .500 overall record in 2005 and followed that up with Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association playoff appearances in 2006, 2007, and 2008.

Included in the resurgence was the championship of the EIVA Hay Division with a 9-1 division record in 2007 and then a run to the semifinal round of the 2008 EIVA playoffs.

In 2006, the Highlander men made the EIVA playoffs for the first time since 2000. In 2007, NJIT posted a 19-10 record, compiling the program's best wins total since it was 20-13 in 1995. The 2008 campaign saw the Highlanders win two games in the EIVA playoffs before finally losing their semifinal match in five close sets against George Mason, which was ranked 11th in the nation.

The first-place Hay Division finish in 2007 earned the Highlanders promotion to the EIVA's higher power-rated division, the Tait, where NJIT competed for the first time since 2002.

On the women's side, McNeil assisted on a 2004 team that made a double-digit jump in wins from the previous season and then became interim head coach in 2005 and permanent head coach in 2006.

In 2006, he led NJIT into its first season of Division I competition. Despite facing Division I competition with only two starters returning from the previous year, the Highlanders won 10 matches, surpassing the team's nine wins in its last season at the Division II level.

In 2007, the Highlander women took another step, logging 13 wins—three more than in 2006—and NJIT won five of its last seven 2007 regular season matches. The 2008 Highlander women took yet another step, posting a winning record at 18-16 in just their third season of Division I competition. The 18 wins in 2008 were the most for NJIT women's volleyball since the 1990 squad won 23 matches competing at the Division III level.

Championship-level volleyball is nothing new to McNeil, who was a standout player in both Canada and the United States. Later, as an assistant coach at Lewis University in Illinois, he helped coach the men's team that won the 2003 national championship match and the women's team that qualified for two NCAA Tournaments.

A native of Montego Bay, Jamaica, McNeil resided in Ontario, Canada, for 15 years. He was MVP of two college teams in Canada—Sheridan College and Ryerson University.

Transferring south of the border to Lewis University in Illinois, McNeil played on the Flyers' 1998 national semifinalists. He turned to coaching at Lewis, assisting with both the men's and women's teams.

In his two years as an assistant with the Lewis men, they qualified for the NCAA tournament twice, won two Midwest Intercollegiate Volleyball Conference crowns and captured the 2003 national title match. He coached with the Lewis women for four seasons and during his tenure the Flyers made the NCAA Tournament twice and achieved national ranking in 2002.

McNeil resides in Newark.





Jose Reynaldo Martins

Assistant Coach

With a championship background as a volleyball player, Jose Reynaldo (JR) Martins (pronounced mar-TEENS) joined the NJIT coaching staff at the start of the 2006-07 academic year.

The native of Sao Paulo, Brazil, is the assistant to head coach Ryan McNeil with both the Highlanders men's and women's teams.

His presence has been felt from the beginning of his NJIT tenure, as he helped Ryan McNeil coach the Highlander women to a strong opening venture into Division I competition that has seen them improve their win totals in each of their first three seasons at the top level, including an 18-win season in 2008 that represents the most victories in a season for NJIT in women's volleyball since the 1990 team, competing at the Division III level, posted 23 wins.

NJIT's men's volleyball team posted a 19-10 overall record and won the 2007 Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association Hay Division championship in Martins' first season. And then the 2008 Highlanders advanced to the EIVA playoff semifinals.

Martins, a 2004 graduate of Lewis University in Romeoville is also a graduate of Pontific Catholic University of Campinas in his home country.

He was a four-year player at Lewis, where he was also a team captain and played on the Lewis team that captured the 2003 NCAA national championship match. A dean's list student for eight semesters at Lewis, he was an Academic All-America in 2004.

A veteran of the Brazilian army, he has coached collegiate volleyball in Brazil and then club volleyball in the Midwestern United States, before returning to Brazil, where he played and coached club ball.

Volunteer Assistant Coach

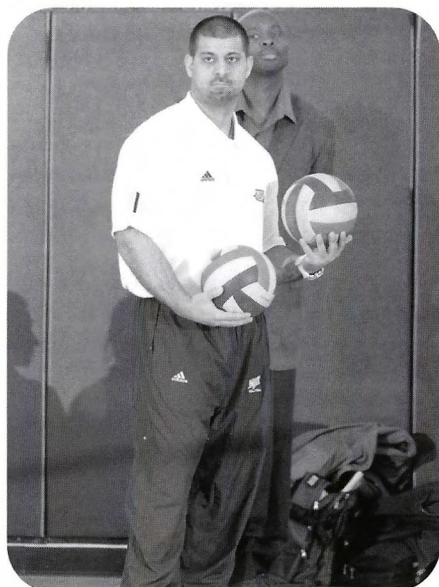
Volunteer coach Daniel Cruz joined the NJIT volleyball coaching staff for the start of the 2008 men's volleyball season.

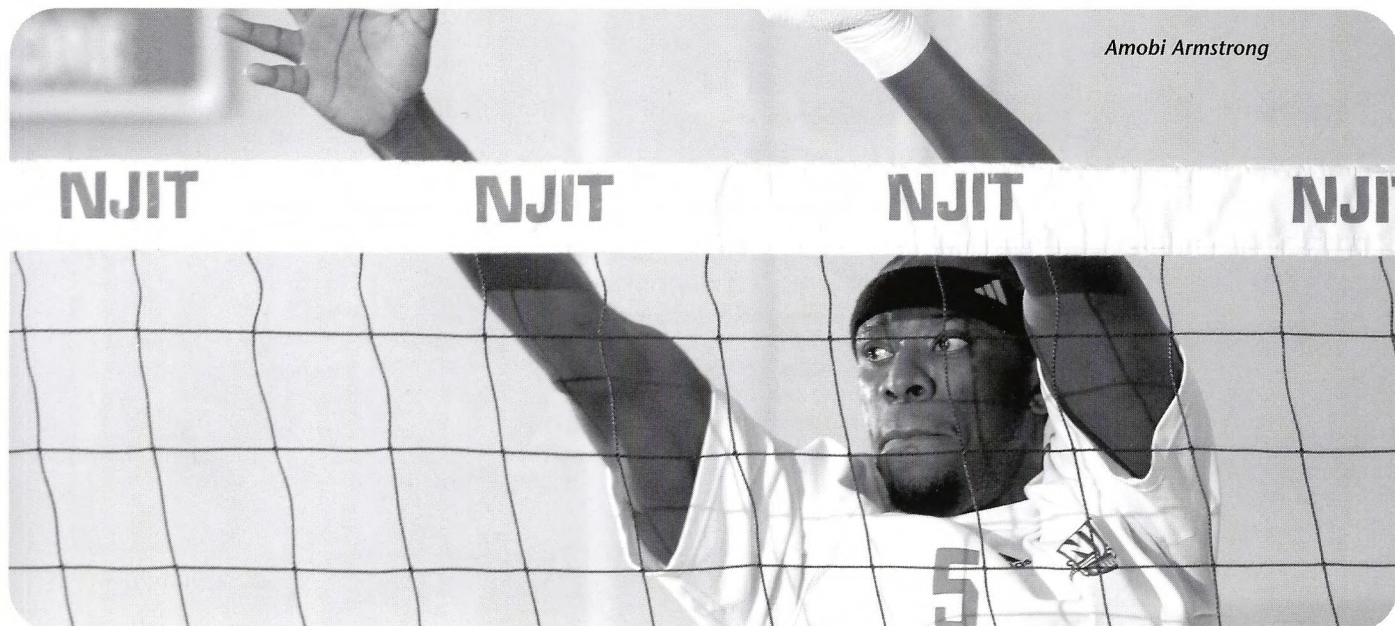

2009 Outlook

From the day Ryan McNeil became NJIT men's coach for the 2005 season, he has set the bar high and 2009 is no exception.

The first job was to get out of a rut that saw the Highlanders fall from the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association's top division (Tait) and manage just 14 combined wins in the four seasons (2001-04) that preceded McNeil's arrival.

The 2005 Highlanders notched an 11-11 mark and McNeil next raised the bar, aiming for the EIVA Hay Division crown, which would promote NJIT back into the Tait.

After a slow start, NJIT finished 2006 strong, making the EIVA playoffs for the first time since 2000. However, the goal of moving up to the Tait had to wait, as the Highlanders finished second in the Hay Division (8-4).

Back in the Hay for another season, NJIT finished in first place in 2007 with a 9-1 division record and won 19 matches overall—the most since the 1999 squad finished 24-5.

Promoted to the Tait for 2008, McNeil's goal was to challenge Penn State and George Mason at the top of the EIVA. The Highlanders

were competitive, but they were part of a group that trailed the two power programs during the regular season.

However, NJIT, in the EIVA playoffs for the third straight season, won two 2008 postseason matches. Advancing to the EIVA semis, NJIT lost, 3-2, to George Mason, ranked 11th in the nation at the time. Penn State would go on to win the EIVA and then the NCAA national championship.

The bar for 2009 is the challenge of continued improvement within the EIVA despite the graduation loss of three of the top four 2008 point-scorers. Leonardo Paludo (440 points), Eduardo Welter (375 points) and Greg Wagner (189.5 points) all graduated, leaving Amobi Armstrong (365.5 points; 2nd team all-East) as the top returnee.

"Losing to George Mason (3-2 after a 2-0 lead) left a bitter taste," said the coach. "We want to pick up where we left off. I expect the guys we have coming in to do as well, maybe better, than the guys they replace when all is said and done."

Armstrong, a veteran on a young squad, has shown improvement in each of his previous seasons, capped by his 2008 all-East recognition as one of the top players in the EIVA. He

led the outside hitters in attack percentage (.252) and was third in overall kills, second in aces and third in blocks. "There's no question he'll carry a heavy load," McNeil said of the high-flying senior.

Senior middle Robert Thomas, too, has shown steady improvement and last year was second on the team in blocks, despite playing in just over half the team's sets (54 of 101), due to injury. He also had a .305 attack percentage

Rodrigo Correa is back for his fourth year at setter, having paced the team in assists in each of his first three seasons, including 2008 (10.93 apg). He'll be joined by impressive freshman Adam Gustafson, putting NJIT in good stead when it comes to starting the attack.

"Our team success will be driven by Amobi (Armstrong) and Rod (Correa) doing well and bringing the team along with them," said McNeil.

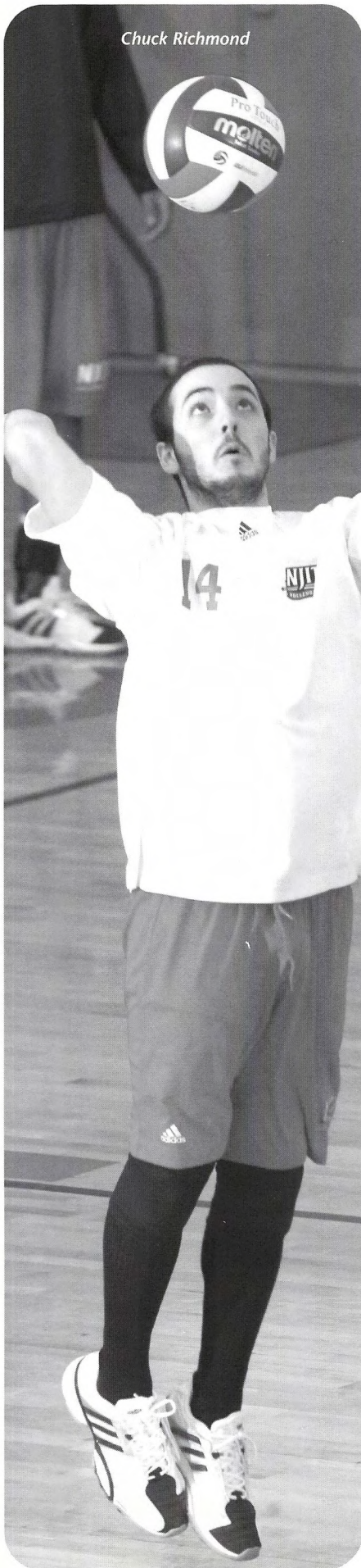
Another key veteran is junior Charles Bell, who was fifth on last year's team with 168.5 points. Bell, who tied for the team lead with 59 blocks, added 120 kills. Said McNeil: "Charles is a player with great potential, but he has to control it."

Much of NJIT's resurgence began with the

addition of the Brazilian stars Paludo and Welter, former high school classmates who were Highlander stars each year of their career. Welter arrived in 2005 and Paludo arrived a year later as a transfer.

The recruiting pipeline from Brazil remained open with the addition of Raphael Mattos, a 6-foot-4 outside hitter. "He's a similar player to Eddie (Welter)," McNeil noted. "He comes to us with more of a volleyball background than Leo (Paludo), who spent his youth as more of a soccer player than a volleyball player."

The Highlanders also got a pleasant lift when Glen De Magalhaes, an all-state player at East Side High School in Newark, decided to stay in his hometown and enroll at NJIT as an architecture major.

"He was a great pickup for us as a walk-on," said the coach. "He's a New Jersey kid with great fundamentals and will be an asset for the program."

Ricky Duran, another freshman, is from New Jersey, but the program's third freshman and tallest player comes from far outside the Garden State. He is 6-foot-8 Nick Jensen from Denmark.

"Nick is the tallest recruit I've had," McNeil said. "This is just his fourth year playing volleyball, so he's still learning. But he's bigger and more physical than the middles we've had."

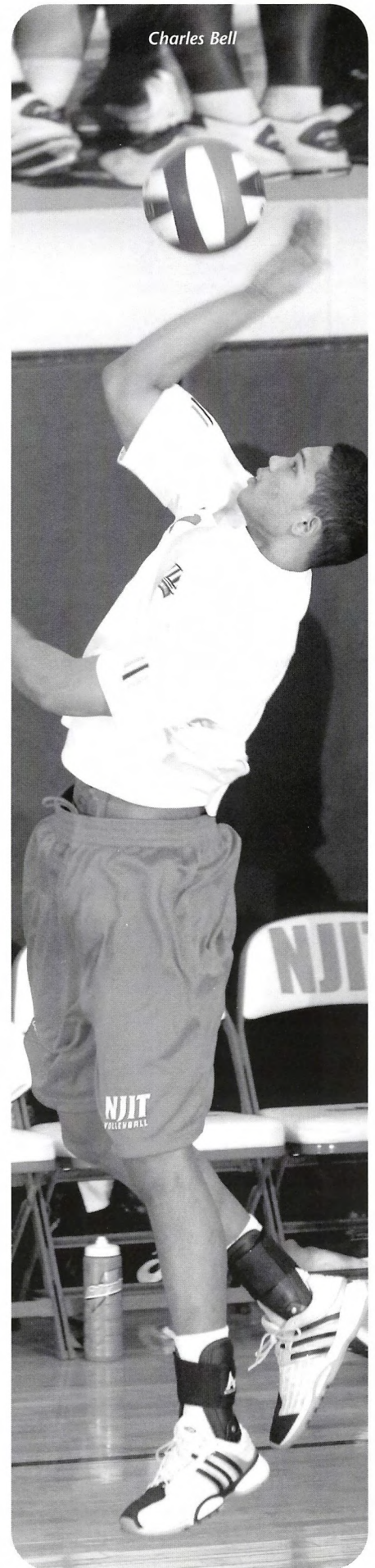
The team's two sophomores, libero Chuck Richmond and middle Steve Sylvester, saw their roles grow as their rookie seasons progressed and senior Doug Thorn will practice with the team.

The NJIT schedule remains strong, with most of the matches coming from the EIVA. The Highlanders will play home-and-home against each member of the EIVA Tait Division, including 2008 national champion Penn State, which will visit the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center on Saturday, April 4.

The Highlanders will also take on EIVA Hay Division teams, including neighborhood rival Rutgers-Newark in the first regular season meeting between the two schools in a number of years. NJIT will also play in Rutgers-Newark's Golden Dome Classic in late January.

Aside from the EIVA, the Highlanders will play three matches in California and then two at Hawai'i (#13 in the final 2008 poll) will be televised in the Aloha State. The California opponents will be Division I contenders Southern California (#12 in the final 2008 poll) and Cal State Northridge (#5 in the final 2008 poll) and Hope International of the NAIA.

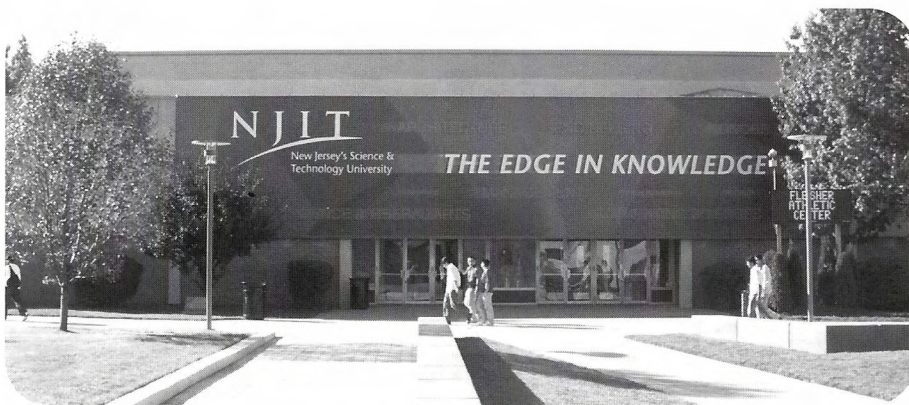
The NJIT men's and women's volleyball teams play their home matches in the newly-renovated gymnasium of the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center.

In the summer of 2006, the Fleisher Athletic Center gym underwent renovation to include installation of a new floor and baskets, new lighting, new sound system and new scoreboards, along with entirely new seating for approximately 1,500 spectators after the first phase of renovation.

The back bay, "C gym," area can be sectioned off from the main floor, making the entire gymnasium useful for intramurals, physical education classes and campus recreation time. It is capable of hosting simultaneous separate events.

The volleyball teams also have access to all of the other facilities in the athletic center. These include the fitness area (containing computer-controlled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units, and an indoor track), a free-weight room and a hammer-strength weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), and a martial arts/fencing center.

A six-lane swimming pool is home to NJIT's men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads utilize the four lighted outdoor hardcourt tennis courts behind the building. The NJIT Campus Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.



Lubetkin Field, with an entrance a few feet opposite the entry to Fleisher Athletic Center is a first-class venue for college soccer. Outfitted with SprinTurf artificial grass in the summer of 2004, Lubetkin Field also includes lighting for night contests, bleacher seating for more than 1,000 spectators, a press box and scoreboard.

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium in downtown Newark, opened in 1999 at a cost of \$30 million and with a seating capacity of 6,200 became the home of NJIT baseball in 2004.

In a joint December 2005 press conference, New York Yankees manager Joe Torre was a featured speaker as NJIT and the professional Newark Bears announced a 10-year partnership that secured the downtown stadium as the site of all Highlanders home games for the decade to come.

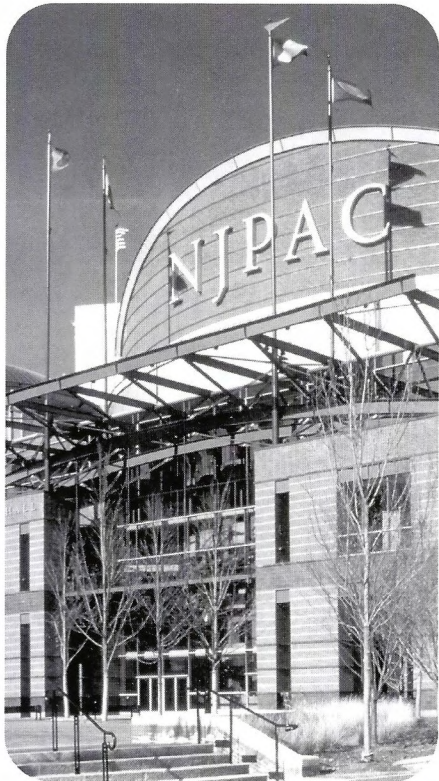
NJIT basketball will also be a tenant in the new downtown Prudential Center, the state-of-the-art home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils. The Highlanders hosted six games on four dates in 2007-08 and five games on four dates at the 'The Rock' in North America's newest major sports arena in 2008-09.

NJIT, which offers a growing list of club sports, also has a robust intramural program, which makes use of the numerous athletic facilities. Each student must pass two physical education classes as a graduation requirements, with offerings including aerobics, archery, bowling, dance, fencing, golf, karate, swimming, skiing, strength training and conditioning, volleyball, and water safety.



Newark: The Renaissance City

NJIT is located in the heart of New Jersey's largest city. A major urban center, Newark is a city on the move. Some 30,000 undergraduate, graduate and professional students attend classes in University Heights at the city's four public institutions of higher learning: NJIT, Rutgers-Newark, the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, and Essex County College.

NJIT and Rutgers enjoy an exceptionally close and productive consortial relationship within the thriving University Heights section of Newark. NJIT and Rutgers students have library privileges at both campuses. NJIT students may also enrich their educational experience by enrolling in Rutgers-Newark courses and in full degree programs in disciplines not offered at NJIT, such as art, music, geology and psychology.

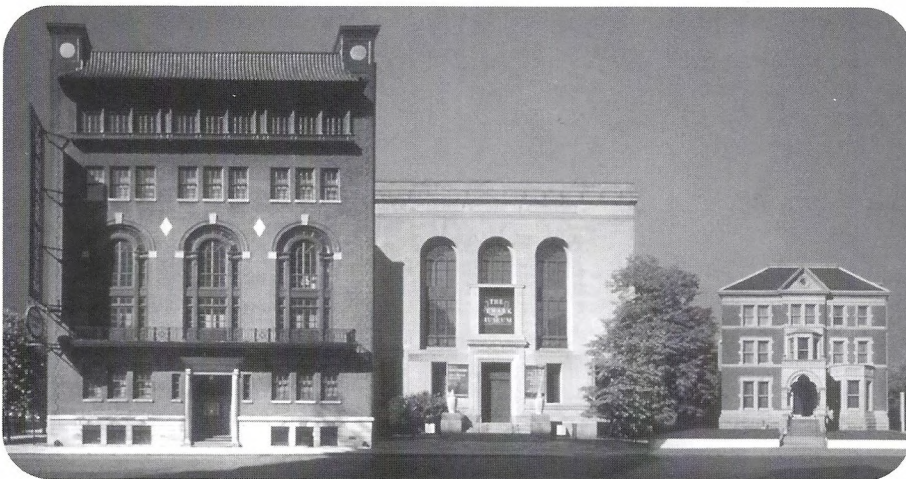
Each year the two universities co-sponsor a common season of theatrical productions, as well as 'World Week,' a joint program of hon-

ors colloquia, and a variety of other cultural and social activities.

Prudential Center

The new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils is in downtown Newark at the corner of Mulberry and Edison streets, about one mile from the NJIT's University Heights campus.

Opened in October 2007, 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of the city's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. In addition to the world's best hockey, it will be home to numerous entertainment and sporting events, including NJIT basketball. In 2007-08, NJIT hosted six basketball games there on four dates and there are plans to play more games in 2008-09 in North America's newest major arena.

The arena, with seating for 18,500 spectators, features a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as the latest in ice-surface technology and a gourmet restaurant overlooking the ice for Devils games. The building contains 850,000 square feet of space, 9,000 tons of steel, eight million pounds of structural steel and 25,000 cubic yards of concrete.

Red Bull Park

The Red Bulls of Major League Soccer and AEG New York broke ground in September 2006 for Red Bull Park, a 25,000-seat soccer stadium and a major component of the Harrison MetroCentre development, located across the Passaic River, about two miles from NJIT's campus.



The \$100 million 'soccer specific' stadium will feature a 360-degree European-style roof/canopy covering the majority of the seating. When completed in the summer of 2008, Red Bull Park will be the home of the MLS Red Bulls, international soccer and other events. AEG developed and operates 'soccer specific' stadiums in California and in Illinois.

The multi-billion dollar Harrison MetroCentre will feature three million square feet of office space; 3,500 residential units; 300,000 square feet of retail space and over 10,000 decked parking spaces when completed.

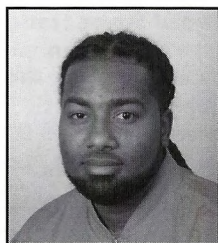
Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium



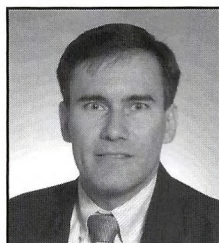
Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the professional baseball Newark Bears and since 2004 the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999. With a seating capacity of 6,200, "The Den" affords fans an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major league-caliber press box.

In December 2005, NJIT and the Bears held a joint press conference to herald a new partnership that includes a 10-year deal that extends Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium as the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball.

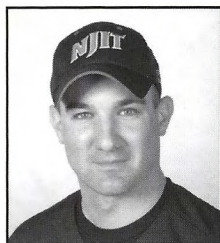




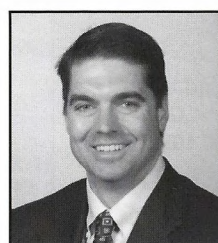
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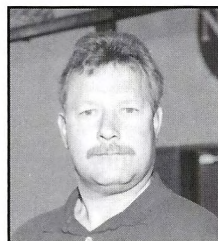

Route 1 & 9 North & South: Take exit marked Newark, Rt. 21 North. Follow Rt. 21 North (McCarter Highway). Turn left on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren St. traffic light (Raymond Blvd. becomes Lock St.) Fleisher Athletic Center & Lubetkin Field will be on your right.

New Jersey Institute of Technology men's volleyball is a member of the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association. The EIVA contains 13 members from all three NCAA Divisions.

The champion of the EIVA playoffs receives an automatic qualifier into the four-team NCAA National Collegiate Championship. The other three teams in the NCAA championship tournament are: the champions of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation, Midwestern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association and an at-large team from one of the three major men's volleyball leagues (EIVA, MIVA, MPSF).

In 2008, Penn State, ranked first in the nation during the regular season with just one loss, won the EIVA playoffs and went on to capture the NCAA championship, as well.

Founded in 1971 as the Eastern Collegiate Volleyball League, the EIVA was given its current name in 1985. Penn State made EIVA and NCAA history in 1994 by becoming the first non-California school to win the national title.

The league has been realigned several times, with the latest move occurring before the 2006 season. In 2004 and 2005, the EIVA had three divisions, but the alignment was dropped back to two divisions—the Tait and the Hay—for 2006.

The EIVA groups its highest power-rated teams into the same division, the Tait. To account for changes in the relative strength of the teams, the EIVA has a system of promotion and relegation similar to European soccer. At the end of the season, the champion of the second power-rated division (Hay) is promoted to the Tait Division for the following season. Meanwhile, the bottom team in the Tait is relegated to the Hay Division for the following season.

As the 2007 EIVA Hay Division champion, NJIT earned promotion to the EIVA Tait Division, where it remains. This season's Tait Division matches include home and away contests against Penn State, Saint Francis (PA), George Mason, Juniata, Princeton, and Springfield.

NJIT reached the EIVA finals in 1999, losing to Penn State, and returned to the semifinals in 2000. The Highlanders won the now-defunct EIVA Division II Tournament in 1998 and 1999. Prior to reclassifying to Division II, they won the EIVA Division III championship in 1991 and 1997 and were the Division III runners-up in 1993 and 1995.

In 2008, NJIT made its deepest run into the EIVA playoffs since 2000. Last year's Highlanders won their first two playoff matches to reach the EIVA semifinals, host by Penn State. NJIT's 2008 run came to an end in a tightly-contested 3-2 (lost set 5, 13-15) to #11 George Mason.
