NJIT is New Jersey's Science & Technology University. With roots going back to 1881, when it was founded as Newark Technical School, New Jersey Institute of Technology observed its 125th anniversary in 2006.

Located in University Heights, Newark, New Jersey, home to more than 30,000 college students, NJIT's campus is just 10 miles from New York City.

Playing a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future, NJIT, as a major public technological university, is an important pipeline for the flow of technology into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university helps to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$83 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities on the 45-acre campus, including biomedical engineering labs and a campus center.

Instructional Programs

NJIT offers 96 degree programs — 36 undergraduate, 41 master's and 19 doctoral programs — through six schools:

NJIT has 416 full-time faculty; more than 98 percent of whom hold the highest degree in their fie0 than 5,300 undergraduate students and more than 2,800 graduate students. Our students hail from 33 states and more than 100 countries to rank eighth in the nation for diversity.

Albert Dorman Honors College enrolls more than 500 students who take advantage of honors courses, research opportunities, advising and mentoring. Honors College students have SAT scores ranking in the top 10 percent nationally. With more than 44,000 alumni, NJIT is rated by US News and World Report as a top-tier national research university offering bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees.

Research

NJIT drew more than \$75 million in research funding in 2005 and faculty members welcome student collaboration on research projects.

Economic Development

NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies. NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element, together with instruction, research and community service. More than 60 technology start-up companies, many of which hire NJIT students, are on campus.



The Career Edge

All 10 of the majors with the highest starting salaries for 2005-06 grads are in engineering, computing and business, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers.

Computer and data processing services lead the list of the 10 fastest-growing occupations in projections compiled by the US Department of Labor. Computer-related employment is expected to grow 117 percent by 2008, according to the Career Guide to Industries.

As technology changes all fields, those with science and technology backgrounds are positioned to lead. Among the CEOs of the S&P 500 companies, engineering is the single largest undergraduate degree and more than half of CEOs have undergraduate degrees in engineering, business management, science, math and computing.

The Global Edge

The diversity in NJIT's student body and faculty prepares graduates to understand and succeed in the global marketplace. NJIT was named among the world's top 500 universities in a study by the Institute of Higher Education, Shanghai Jiao Tong University.

The Technology Edge

NJIT has been designated one of the nation's most technologically sophisticated universities by Forbes.com and a Princeton Review survey and the university has received major funding from the National Science Foundation and the National Security Agency in recent years.

The Academic Edge

NJIT has long been a national leader in applying new technologies and approaches to the educational experience. NJIT was a pioneer in requiring computer science for students in all majors and the School of Architecture has led innovations in teaching CAD and digital design. The school's innovative "paperless" first-year program was recently cited by Campus Technology Magazine.

Students have a wide range of educational choices in building an interest-tailored program. Among their options are cross-enrolling at neighboring Rutgers to enrich their program with subjects such as music and languages.



NJIT students learn emerging technologies from the researchers behind the technologies, developing valuable marketplace skills. Realworld experience through experiential learning makes graduates more marketable, with many co-op opportunities leading to permanent jobs.

The Regional Edge

New Jersey, with America's highest concentration of pharmaceutical, hi-tech, biotech, and medical device companies is the place to study technology. It has the nation's highest per capita number of engineers and scientists as residents, while also leading in per capita rate of patents issued. Further, the Newark-New York region is a living laboratory for architecture and building sciences, environmental engineering and transportation.

The Research Edge

NJIT has been designated by the State of New Jersey as the Homeland Security Technology Systems Center and NJIT operates the world-renowned Big Bear Solar Observatory.

A History of NJIT

From the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age, New Jersey Institute of Technology has a rich history with its beginnings developing from the industrial age.

In 1881, an act of the New Jersey State Legislature, recognizing an urgent need, sought a home for what would be the state's technical school. The efforts of Newark's public and private sectors resulted with the opening of Newark Technical School, addressing the state's need.

Over time, the university expanded its curriculum and mission. In 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By the middle of the 20th century, Newark Technical School was transformed into the robust Newark College of Engineering.

The post-war period was one of enormous activity with regular expansion of the campus, as well as the introduction of doctoral level programs. In 1975, with the addition of the New Jersey School of Architecture, the institution had evolved into a technological university, emphasizing a broad range of degrees and dedication to significant research and public service. Newark College of Engineering, stronger than ever, remained intact, but a new university name - New Jersey Institute of Technology - reflected the institution's expanded mission.

A broadened mission called for the creation of a residential campus and the opening of NJIT's first dormitory in 1980 began a period of steady growth that continues. Two new schools were established during the 1980s the College of Science and Liberal Arts (1982) and the School of Industrial Management (1988). The Albert Dorman Honors College was established in 1994, and the newest school, the College of Computing Sciences, was created in 2001.



Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch President

Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch, formerly vice president for research at Mississippi State University (MSU), joined NJIT as the university's seventh president in July 2002. During his tenure as MSU vice president for research, science and engineering, expenditures as reported to National Science Foundation (NSF) increased dramatically—75% from 1997 to 2001.

Prior to his appointment as vice president at MSU, Altenkirch served as professor of mechanical and materials engineering and dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture at Washington State University. From 1988 to 1995, he was professor of mechanical engineering and dean of the College of Engineering at MSU. He also served as professor and chair of mechanical engineering at the University of Kentucky.

In addition to the research program, his responsibilities encompassed congressional relations, intellectual property management and economic development. While dean of engineering at MSU, he led the effort to secure National Science Foundation funding for the establishment of the MSU NSF Engineering Research Center for Computational Field Simulation in 1990. Additionally, the Center was instrumental in helping the State of Mississippi attract a \$1 billion Nissan manufacturing plant.

Altenkirch holds a PhD from Purdue University, an MS from the University of California, Berkeley, and a BSME from Purdue, all in mechanical engineering. He is the author of over 50 publications and nearly 100 presentations in combustion and heat transfer and served as principal investigator for ten Space Shuttle experiments investigating the spread of fire in reduced gravity. He is a Fellow of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.



Dr. Joel Bloom Vice President of Academic and Student Services

Dr. Joel Bloom has worked at NJIT since July 1990. In his current position, he is responsible for nine divisions of the university, including Physical Education and Athletics.

Dr. Bloom is also Dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College, which enrolls more than 525 students who are typically in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class.

Prior to NJIT, Dr. Bloom spent seven years as assistant Commissioner in the New Jersey Department of Education. He is currently the Chair of the NASULGC Council of Chief Student Affairs Officers and the Newark Consortium Board for Pre-College Education. Dr. Bloom earned his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees from Hunter College, and holds a Master's and Doctorate from Columbia University Teachers College.



Lenny Kaplan Director of Athletics

Since taking over as head of NJIT's division of physical education and athletics in August 2000, Lenny Kaplan was instrumental in establishing a sound NCAA Division II program, setting the stage for the reclassification into NCAA Division I.

Kaplan helped solidify and expand an NJIT program that was entering its fourth year in Division II when he arrived in Newark and in late 2002, after discussions with university President Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch and Vice President Dr. Joel Bloom, Kaplan began the task of steering NJIT's programs into Division I, a process that is set to reach fruition with full championship eligibility in 2009-10.

Along the way, NJIT has enhanced the athletics program, particularly in areas that will benefit the student-athletes directly.

The sports offerings have expanded to 19 varsity sports, and since 2004, NJIT has renovated its two main on-campus venues—Lubetkin Field and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center. The school also signed a 10year partnership to play its home baseball in the Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium and agreed to host basketball in the new home of the NHL's New Jersey Devils.

In 2005-06, NJIT's outstanding home facilities allowed it to host two ECAC Division II postseason championships—women's soccer in the fall and baseball in the spring.

Under Kaplan's leadership, many teams achieved regional and national Division II ranking. Success for several women's teams was unprecedented, with basketball, tennis and soccer all reaching postseason play for the first time.

Additionally, men's volleyball captured a 2007 divisional championship in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association.

Before coming to NJIT, Lenny Kaplan served 11 years at Manhattan College, where he began as Manhattan's director of operations and then advanced to assistant athletics director.

Kaplan, a 1988 graduate of St. John's University with a degree in athletics administration, resides in Merrick, NY, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.



Sports Medicine

NJITs sports medicine is moving forward with expanded facilities and a staff of three full-



time trainers led by head trainer Roger Olean, MEd/ATC, with assistant trainers Michael Douglas, MS/ATC, and Matt Koscs, MS/ATC. They work with team physicians Louis Rizio, MD, and Rutvik (Rudy) Patel, DO.

Roger Olean

Olean, an intercollegiate athletic trainer since 1992, returned in the summer of 2008 to NJIT, where he was head trainer from 2000-05.

Olean, who earned his bachelor's degree from Slippery Rock (PA) University in 1991 and his master's degree from Springfield (MA) College in 1998, has served on the training staffs at four colleges and three high schools.

He began his career at Hood College in 1992 and also worked on the Springfield College staff while pursuing his master's. After his first tour with the Highlanders, he spent two years at SUNY Cobleskill. Olean also worked at three high schools.

Douglas, a Newark native,

trainer/director of basketball operations for the NBA Development League Albuquerque Thunderbirds. Combining those stops with a multi-year stint as assistant trainer with the then-Memphis Grizzlies, Douglas is the only athletic trainer to serve teams in all three leagues that fall under the NBA umbrella.

At the collegiate level, he was head athletic trainer at Palm Beach Atlantic and at Spelman and was a graduate assistant trainer at Morehouse College in Atlanta.

Douglas has been a summer assistant trainer with the NFL Buffalo Bills and was head trainer of the Richmond (VA) Rhythm pro basketball team. He earned his bachelor's degree from Morehouse and his master's degree from Life University School of Graduate Studies in Georgia.

Matt Koscs, who earned both his bachelor's (2005) and master's (2008) degrees from the

came to NJIT in July 2008. As an undergrad, he was recipient of the Paris Delligatti Memorial Award for Excellence in Athletic Training.

University of Delaware,

Prior to NJIT, he served three years as head trainer

at Hodgson Vocational Technical High School in Newark, DE. He was head trainer for the Delaware Dynasty semi-pro soccer team, as well as with the Kirkwood Soccer Club and was employed at Christiana Care Physical Therapy Plus, in Newark, DE, where he was an athletic trainer and Director of Athletic Training Services in a clinical setting.

Dr. Rizio is a board certified orthopedic surgeon and is fellowship trained in the field of sports medicine. He is a graduate of Rutgers and after earning his medical degree from the UMDNJ/New Jersey Medical School, Dr. Rizio completed his orthopedic residency at Tufts University in Boston.

He then completed a sports medicine fellowship at the University of Miami. During his fellowship, he was assistant team physician of the Miami Dolphins, the Miami Hurricanes and the Florida Marlins.

Dr. Rizio, who specializes in sports-related injuries, practices at the New Jersey Sports Medicine Institute. Prior to starting his own practice, Dr Rizio was the Chief of Sports Medicine at the NJ Medical School from 2000-2005.

Dr. Patel practices in association with Dr. Rizio. A cum laude graduate of NYIT, Dr. Patel earned his DO from the New York College of Osteopathic Medicine. He was chief resident in Family Medicine at the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School in New Brunswick, NJ, from 2003 to 2006.

Academic Enrichment

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment (CAPE) added a new component with the hiring in 2007 of Erika Rigby McCourt, whose position as Associate Director of CAPE was created for the specific purpose of serving the needs of NJIT's student-athletes.

She focuses on five key areas: academic support, career development, personal development, leadership and community service including the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and CHAMPS Life Skills for NJIT's nearly 300 student-athletes.

In 2008, NJIT will add an eligibility certification officer/academic advisor, who will work with Rigby McCourt under her supervision.

Erika Rigby McCourt came to NJIT from Seton Hall University, where she was Associate Director of Academic Support



Services for the Pirates athletic program from 2004 until she left for NJIT. At Seton Hall, she worked directly with men's basketball, women's soccer, women's volleyball and swimming, assisting in class scheduling, tests and tutoring sessions.

The Jersey City, NJ, native is working with her fourth Division I program in a career that began in 1997 at Northern Arizona, where she was director of the Academic Enrichment Program. She returned home, serving as Academic/Athletic Coordinator at Saint Peter's College, where she was responsible for the academic progress of over 300 studentathletes in 20 sports, from 1999 to 2004.

Rigby McCourt graduated from Providence College, where she was an intercollegiate runner who earned Big East Conference all-academic honors. She earned master's degrees from Northern Arizona and from Saint Peter's and she is pursuing her doctorate in higher education at Seton Hall.

A member of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletes, she is on the NCAA Initial Eligibility Waiver Committee. She also previously worked in the office of former United States Senator Bill Bradley of New Jersey.

Erika married Robert McCourt, the head men's soccer coach at Monmouth University, in May 2008 and they reside in Oakhurst, NJ.

NJIT's Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment, headed by Dr. Marybeth Boger, is a resource available to all students within NJIT's Student Services Division. The CAPE provides academic support services and activities to enhance students' academic and professional development and it works with academic and administrative departments to help students develop the necessary analytical and problem-solving skills to become independent learners.

CAPE provides tutoring, student success workshops and testing accommodations. 5

New Jersey Institute of Technology athletics is on the move to the top level of college athletics—NCAA Division I.

The reclassification is well underway, as the NCAA has okayed NJIT to reclassify its entire athletics program to Division I, a four-year process that will bring all Highlander sports to full Division I status and championship eligibility in 2009-10.



All of the programs that previously competed in Division II having moving up to face Division I competition effective in 2006-07.

Two sports—men's soccer and women's soccer—are paving the way on a faster NCAA track that allows lower division schools to elevate one sport in each gender to Division I in a process that takes two years to complete.

NJIT men's soccer became a full member of NCAA Division I at the start of the 2005 season, when the Highlanders arrived at championship eligibility. The men's journey to the top level began in 2003. NJIT women's soccer began a similar two-year process in 2005, with full Division I status and championship eligibility arriving with the 2007 season.

The larger process of advancing the entire program to Division I takes four years to complete and includes application, a detailed strategic plan and in-depth annual review of the institution's progress in moving toward its goal of complying with NCAA Division I rules and building a strong, broad-based athletics program.

NJIT's move to Division I has gone quickly since the November 2002 discussions among President Robert A. Altenkirch, Vice President Joel Bloom and Athletics Director Lenny Kaplan.

From there, came a proposal from Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I. Little more than two years later, the NCAA approved NJIT's proposal to advance its entire program to Division I.

Along the way, scholarship and operating budgets have been enhanced, with expanded coaching staffs, increased scholarship dollars and upgraded facilities for competition and practice.

Upgrading athletics has been a priority for Dr. Altenkirch since he was selected as the seventh President of NJIT in May 2002.

"As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university athletically with our academic peers," said Altenkirch. "It will also enable us to recruit the best and brightest student-athletes, improve athletics facilities available to the entire NJIT community, gain regional and national visibility, and build strong linkages with students that will carry over to their days as alumni."

Moving to Division I has allowed NJIT studentathletes to test themselves in competition against their peers from all over the country, including competition against teams from the nation's best conferences.

Along the way, two NJIT opponents (Maryland men's soccer in 2005 and Penn State men's volleyball in 2008) have faced the Highlanders in the regular season and then gone on to win their respective national championship.





Ryan McNeil Head Coach

Ryan McNeil, who came to NJIT in August 2004, is leading a resurgence of the university's two volleyball teams.

Originally hired as head coach of the men's team and assistant coach of the women's team, he served as interim head coach of the women's team in 2005 and became permanent head coach for the 2006 season. He has been the men's head coach since 2005. And he has made a positive mark on both teams.

On the men's side, taking over a team that last had a winning record in 2000, he guided his first squad to a .500 overall record in 2005 and followed that up with Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association playoff appearances in 2006, 2007 and 2008. NJIT won the regular season championship of the EIVA Hay Division with a 9-1 division record in 2007. In 2008, NJIT advanced to the semifinals of the EIVA playoffs, where the Highlanderss were eliminated in a spirited, 3-2 defeat at the hands of George Mason, ranked 11th nationally.

On the women's side, McNeil assisted on a 2004 team that made a double-digit jump in wins from the previous season and then became interim head coach in 2005 and permanent head coach in 2006.

In 2006, he led NJIT into its first season of Division I competition. Despite facing Division I competition with only two starters returning from the previous year, the Highlanders won 10 matches, surpassing the team's nine wins in its last season at the Division II level in 2005.

Sporting a lineup of three freshmen and four sophomores in the top seven, McNeil guided the young 2006 squad to a 7-7 mark over the last 14 matches. In 2007, the Highlander women took another step, logging 13 wins three more than in 2006—and NJIT won five of its last seven 2007 regular season matches.

Championship-level volleyball is nothing new to McNeil, who was a standout player in both

Canada and the United States. Later, as an assistant coach at Lewis University in Illinois, he helped coach the men's team that won the 2003 national championship match and the women's team that qualified for two NCAA Division II Tournaments.

A native of Montego Bay, Jamaica, McNeil resided in Ontario, Canada, for 15 years. He was MVP of two college teams in Canada— Sheridan College and Ryerson University.

Transferring south of the border to Lewis University in Illinois, McNeil played on the Flyers' 1998 national semifinalists. He turned to coaching at Lewis, assisting with both the men's and women's teams.

In his two years as an assistant with the Lewis men, they qualified for the NCAA tournament twice, won two Midwest Intercollegiate Volleyball Conference crowns and captured the 2003 national title match.

He coached with the Lewis women for four seasons and during his tenure the Flyers made the NCAA Tournament twice and achieved national ranking in 2002.

McNeil resides in Newark.





Jose Reynaldo Martins Assistant Coach

With a championship background as a volleyball player, Jose Reynaldo (JR) Martins (pronounced mar-TEENS) joined the NJIT coaching staff at the start of the 2006-07 academic year.


The native of Sao Paulo, Brazil, is the assistant to head coach Ryan McNeil with both the Highlanders men's and women's teams.

Martins, a 2004 graduate of Lewis University in Romeoville is also a graduate of Pontific Catholic University of Campinas in his home country.

He was a four-year player at Lewis, where he was also a team captain and played on the Lewis team that captured the 2003 NCAA national championship match. A dean's list student for eight semesters at Lewis, he was an Academic All-America in 2004.

A veteran of the Brazilian army, he has coached collegiate volleyball in Brazil and then club volleyball in the Midwestern United States, before returning to Brazil, where he played and coached club ball.

His presence was felt at the beginning of his NJIT tenure, as he helped Ryan McNeil coach the Highlander women to a strong opening venture into Division I competition and then the men's team to a 19-10 overall record and the 2007 Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association Hay Division championship.





Melissa Golob Graduate Assistant Coach

A 2007 graduate of the University of Maryland Baltimore County, Melissa Golob joined the NJIT coaching staff as a graduate assistant in time for the start of the 2008 men's volleyball season.

She assisted with the Highlander men's run to the semifinals of the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association playoff semifinals, while also assisting with the women's team's nontraditional season in the spring of 2008.

Golob, who majored in biology and minored in psychology at UMBC, was a Division I women's volleyball player in college, competing for the Retrievers from 2003 to 2005.

She is also a graduate of Broadneck High School in Annapolis, MD, where she was an honor roll student in addition to being captain of the volleyball team.



Words such as "building" or "rebuilding" get thrown around a lot in sports to the point that they lose some of their meaning. For NJIT women's volleyball, however, "building" is a fitting description as the program enters its third season of NCAA Division I competition.

Back in the 1980's when NJIT was a Division III program, the Highlanders posted 20-plus win records in four out of five seasons. But the Division II era (1998 to 2005) was a difficult one for volleyball. The Highlanders were 9-20 in 2005, their final season of Division II competition and it was one of their best in eight years at that level.

Moving up to face DI teams in 2006, the Highlanders actually upped their win total to 10 in the first year and were 7-7 over the last 14 matches.

In 2007, the building continued and NJIT collected 13 wins, equaling the program's highest total in a 15-year period. Indeed, the 2007 Highlanders overcame a 1-11 start to go 12-10 over their last 22 regular season matches.

The building continues in the 2008 season, which will be the last for the two players— Agnieszka Pregowska and Danielle Thompson— remaining from NJIT's final Division II team. It also marks the last year of reclassification before NJIT women's volleyball becomes a championship-eligible member of Division I.

Five of the 12 players on the preseason roster are freshmen and they will be asked to contribute immediately as they combine with the two seniors, four juniors and a sophomore, all of whom have contributed to making NJIT stronger against Division I opponents than it was against Division II opponents.

The 2005 season saw the arrival of Pregowska and Thompson, who assumed leading on-court roles as freshmen in NJIT's final Division II campaign. Three more key players—Kristy Haeckel, Kasha Hornstein and Sabrina Baby—came on in 2006. Transfer Erica Schultz, now a junior, and Baaba Hughes came aboard in 2007.

This year's freshman class has an international flavor, with two players coming from Brazil and one from Canada, along with two New Jersey products.

Pregowska and Thompson entered with a splash 2005 and were solid in 2006. Pregowska, New Jersey's 2004 state high school Player of the Year, was an instant star for NJIT, ranking fourth nationally in NCAA Division II in kills per game for 2005. As a sophomore, with a more diverse attack, she was second on the team in points per game



and third in digs per game and attack percentage. Last year, she led in points per game, hitting percentage and blocks.

Thompson, a two-year starting setter, averaged more assists per game in Division I than she had in Division II, stepping up to average 9.56 assists in 2006. In 2007, slowed by injury, she shared setting duties with the transfer, Schultz, and was second on the team at 4.98 assists per game.

Haeckel headlined the strong 2006 freshman class, emerging as team leader in kills, blocks and points per game. She was Female Newcomer of the Year for the entire Highlander athletic program for 2006-07. She, too, had some injury trouble in 2007, but nonetheless led the team in kills per game.

Hornstein, a complete player, played in 136 of 140 games and edged Haeckel for the team lead in total kills. Baby, the tireless libero, led the 2007 Highlanders in digs by a wide margin (nearly double the total of the next player) and in aces, also by a wide margin (71 to 50 for the next-highest player). She led in the same two categories as a freshman.

Pregowska, Haeckel and Baby were each chosen to the all-Division I Independent second team.

Erica Schultz, who transferred to NJIT last year, was an honorable mention selection on the same all-Independent team. A defensive specialist at Louisiana Tech, she expanded her role and was NJIT's assists leader (6.36 per game) and also played as a hitter, notching 174 kills.

Hughes, the only sophomore on the squad, showed more and more as her freshman season progressed and wound up starting 10 matches.

Coach Ryan McNeil, who doubles as NJIT's men's coach, can only hope that the added Brazilian flavor on NJIT women's volleyball has a similar impact to what it had for his highly successful men's team. The Highlander men, who extended 11th-ranked George Mason to five sets before losing in the semifinals of the conference tournament, two steps from the four-team national championship field, featured three Brazilian starters.

With assistant coach JR Martins and Baby already having made a positive impact on the NJIT women's program, they are joined by compatriots Renata Pandolfo and Juliana Araujo. Pandolfo even attended the same secondary school as former NJIT men's stars Leonardo Paludo and Eduardo Welter.

McNeil, who is from Canada, crossed the border to recruit another freshman, Chanelle Preradovich, who was a club teammate of Baaba Hughes. Both hail from the Toronto area.

The two New Jersey recruits are setter Audrey Snell from Bogota and Courtney Hughes from Maplewood.

"The program is getting to where we want it to be and we're shooting to have an above. .500 season," said McNeil, who was interim head coach of the NJIT women in 2005 and shed the interim tag in 2006. "I'm comfortable with the mix of new players and experienced players. We'll have more options this year than we've ever had.

"We're looking for team consistency in hitting, setting and serving and we want to develop the attitude that once we're in a close game, we're going to win."

NJIT opens its season in Texas at UTEP's Sun Bowl Invitational, the first of six tournaments for the Highlanders this season, including two they will host at NJIT (Highlanders Challenge, September 12 and 13; and Halloween Classic, October 31 and November 1). The season ended at the Division I Independent Tournament hosted by Utah Valley on November 21 and 22.







The NJIT men's and women's volleyball teams play their home matches in the newly-renovated gymnasium of the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center.

In the summer of 2006, the Fleisher Athletic Center gym underwent renovation to include installation of a new floor and baskets, new lighting, new sound system and new scoreboards, along with entirely new seating for approximately 1,500 spectators after the first phase of renovation.

The back bay, "C gym," area can be sectioned off from the main floor, making the entire gymnasium useful for intramurals, physical education classes and campus recreation time. It is capable of hosting simultaneous separate events.

The volleyball teams also have access to all of the other facilities in the athletic center. These include the fitness area (containing computercontrolled biking equipment, Cybex resistance units, and an indoor track), a free-weight room and a hammer-strength weight room, four racquetball courts (which can be converted for squash), and a martial arts/fencing center.

A six-lane swimming pool is home to NJIT's men's and women's swimming teams, while the two varsity tennis squads utilize the four lighted outdoor hardcourt tennis courts behind the building. The NJIT Campus Center houses six regulation bowling lanes.



Lubetkin Field, with an entrance a few feet opposite the entry to Fleisher Athletic Center is a first-class venue for college soccer. Outfitted with SprinTurf artificial grass in the summer of 2004, Lubetkin Field also includes lighting for night contests, bleacher seating for more than 1,000 spectators, a press box and scoreboard.

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium in downtown Newark, opened in 1999 at a cost of \$30 million and with a seating capacity of 6,200 became the home of NJIT baseball in 2004.

In a joint December 2005 press conference, New York Yankees manager Joe Torre was a featured speaker as NJIT and the professional Newark Bears announced a 10-year partnership that secured the downtown stadium as the site of all Highlanders home games for the decade to come.

NJIT basketball will also be a tenant in the new downtown Prudential Center, the state-ofthe-art home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils. The Highlanders hosted six games on four dates in 2007-08 at the 'The Rock' and NJIT plans to increase its presence in North America's newest major sports arena in 2008-09.


NJIT, which offers a growing list of club sports, also has a robust intramural program, which makes use of the numerous athletic facilities. Each student must pass two physical education classes as a graduation requirements, with offerings including aerobics, archery, bowling, dance, fencing, golf, karate, swimming, skiing, strength training and conditioning, volleyball, and water safety.

Adjacent to NJIT is the Newark campus of Rutgers University.


NJIT and Rutgers enjoy an exceptionally close and productive consortial relationship within the thriving University Heights section of Newark. NJIT and Rutgers students have library privileges at both campuses. NJIT students may also enrich their educational experience by enrolling in Rutgers-Newark courses and in full degree programs in disciplines not offered at NJIT, such as art, music, geology and psychology.

Each year the two universities co-sponsor a common season of theatrical productions, as well as 'World Week,' a joint program of honors colloquia, and a variety of other cultural and social activities.

Prudential Center

The new home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils is in downtown Newark at the corner of Mulberry and Edison streets, about one mile from the NJIT's University Heights campus.

Opened in October 2007, 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of the city's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. In addition to the world's best hockey, it will be home to numerous entertainment and sporting events, including NJIT basketball. In 2007-08, NJIT hosted six basketball games there on four dates and there are plans to play more games in 2008-09 in North America's newest major arena.

The arena, with seating for 18,500 spectators, features a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as the latest in ice-surface technology and a gourmet restaurant overlooking the ice for Devils games. The building contains 850,000 square feet of space, 9,000 tons of steel, eight million pounds of structural steel and 25,000 cubic yards of concrete.

Red Bull Park

The Red Bulls of Major League Soccer and AEG New York broke ground in September 2006 for Red Bull Park, a 25,000-seat soccer stadium and a major component of the Harrison MetroCentre development, located across the Passaic River, about two miles from NJIT's campus.



The \$100 million 'soccer specific' stadium will feature a 360-degree European-style roof/ canopy covering the majority of the seating. When completed in the summer of 2008, Red Bull Park will be the home of the MLS Red Bulls, international soccer and other events. AEG developed and operates 'soccer specific' stadiums in California and in Illinois.

The multi-billion dollar Harrison MetroCentre will feature three million square feet of office space; 3,500 residential units; 300,000 square feet of retail space and over 10,000 decked parking spaces when completed.

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium



Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the professional baseball Newark Bears and since 2004 the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999. With a seating capacity of 6,200, "The Den" affords fans an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major league-caliber press box.

In December 2005, NJIT and the Bears held a joint press conference to herald a new partnership that includes a 10-year deal that extends Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium as the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball. POSTSEASON

Route 78 East: Take Route 78 East to Rt. 21 North. Turn left on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren St. traffic light (Raymond Blvd. becomes Lock St.) Fleisher Athletic Center & Lubetkin Field will be on your right.

Route 22 East: Take Route 22 East to Route 21 North. Turn left on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. pass Warren Street Stop Light and Fleisher Athletic Center & Lubetkin Field will be on your right.

Route 21 North: Follow Rt. 21 North to Raymond Blvd. Turn left onto Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren St. traffic light (Raymond Blvd. becomes Lock St.) Fleisher Athletic Center & Lubetkin Field will be on your right.

Route 21 South: Follow Rt. 21 South (McCarter Highway) to Raymond Blvd. Turn Right on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren St. traffic light (Raymond Blvd. becomes Lock St.) Fleisher Athletic Center & Lubetkin Field will be on your right.

New York Thruway: Thruway to Exit 14A, Garden State Parkway. Follow Garden State Parkway directions above.

George Washington Bridge: NJ Turnpike South to Exit 15W. Follow Route 280 West directions above.

Lincoln Tunnel: West on Rt. 3 to Rt. 21 South. Turn right onto Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. pass Warren Street Stop Light and Fleisher Athletic Center & Lubetkin Field will be on your right.

From Brooklyn, Queens and Long Island: Take Verrazano-Narrows Bridge (Interstate 278) and follow 278 across Staten Island. Cross Goethels Bridge. Follow signs to New Jersey Turnpike North and follow New Jersey Turnpike directions above.

NJIT women's volleyball will compete as a Division I Independent in 2008, but starting in 2009, the Highlanders will be part of the expanded multi-sport Great West Conference.

On July 10, 2008, NJIT was one of six institutions to announce it had joined the expansion of the Great West Conference to form a Division I all-sports league that will conduct championship competition in several sports in 2008-09 and then begin full conference scheduling and championships in 2009-10.


The announcement was made simultaneously by the six institutions and by the conference office, which is led by Commissioner Ed Grom.

The Great West, which has existed for four years as a football-only league in the NCAA's Division I Football Championship Subdivision (formerly known as I-AA), is expanding into an all-sports league with the addition of NJIT, Texas-Pan American, Utah Valley, Houston Baptist, University of North Dakota and University of South Dakota.

The all-sports version of the Great West Conference will eventually offer championships in 14 sports, 11 of which are sponsored by NJIT, including: men's and women's basketball; baseball; women's volleyball; women's tennis; men's and women's cross country; men's and women's indoor track and field; and, men's and women's outdoor track and field.

Cross country and indoor and outdoor track and field championships are planned for 2008-09, with the full complement scheduled to kick in the following year in 2009-10.

NJIT, Texas-Pan American and Utah Valley have been playing each other in multiple sports, including home-and-home games in men's and women's basketball, since NJIT began competing against Division I competition for the first time in 2006-07.



NJIT and Utah Valley are scheduled to complete their NCAA reclassification and become active championship-eligible members of NCAA Division I in 2009-10. North Dakota and South Dakota will be active members of Division I in 2012-13 and Houston Baptist will arrive in 2014-15. Texas-Pan American has been an active Division I program for many years.

The expanded conference is not eligible for automatic Division I championship postseason qualification, but will offer the benefit of conference championship competition, stable scheduling opportunities in all conference sports and individual recognition for student-athletes through weekly and season all-conference recognition. The individual awards programs for student-athletes will begin in 2008-09.

NJIT's sports that do not come under the Great West umbrella will continue in their existing conferences—men's soccer in the Atlantic Soccer Conference, women's soccer in the United Soccer Conference and men's volleyball in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association, which has an automatic NCAA postseason berth, which was claimed this year by eventual 2008 national champion, Penn State.

In addition, NJIT will continue to schedule competition against top non-conference regional and national opponents. Two NJIT opponents—Maryland in men's soccer and Penn State in men's volleyball have won national championships following seasons in which they faced the Highlanders. Meanwhile, NJIT teams will continue to compete regularly with opponents from the Big East, Atlantic 10, America East, Ivy League, Patriot League, MAAC and Northeast Conference.
