# COURSE DESCRIPTION:

HIST-388 IS A SURVEY OF BRITISH HISTORY FROM THE DEATH OF QUEEN VICTORIA (1901) TO THE DEATH OF DIANA, PRINCESS OF WALES (1997) WITH EMPHASIS ON THE SOCIAL AND POLITICAL TRANSFORMATION RESULTING FROM BRITAIN'S DECLINING ECONOMY AND WORLD POSITION. TOPICS INCLUDE: THE CAUSES AND IMPACT OF THE TWO WORLD WARS, THE TRANSITION FROM LIBERAL DEMOCRACY TO WELFARE STATE, THE TURN FROM EMPIRE TO EUROPE, SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC TRENDS AS WELL AS FOREIGN RELATIONS. PREREQUISITES TO THIS CLASS ARE HUM 101, HUM 102, AND ONE FROM AMONG HUM 211, HUM 211, AND HIST 213 OR THEIR EQUIVALENTS.

# COURSE OBJECTIVES:

KNOWLEDGE OF HISTORY IS OF THE GREATEST IMPORTANCE DUE TO THE FACT THAT THE WORLD WE LIVE IN TODAY IS THE DIRECT RESULT OF VARIOUS HISTORICAL DEVELOPMENTS. THE STUDENTS OF THE COURSE WILL ANALYZE HISTORICAL EVENTS AND MOVEMENTS OF 20TH CENTURY BRITAIN AND ASSESS THEIR SUBSEQUENT SIGNIFICANCE. STUDENTS WILL USE CRITICAL THINKING AND PROBLEM-SOLVING SKILLS TO ANALYZE INFORMATION AND DEVELOP THEIR WRITING SKILLS BY PRODUCING A HISTORICALLY THEMED RESEARCH PAPER. ADDITIONALLY, STUDENTS WILL LEARN HOW TO SYNTHESIZE HISTORICAL AND GEOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION ACQUIRED THROUGH THE UNDERSTANDING OF **MAPS** AND **PRIMARY SOURCE** INFORMATION.

### COURSE GOALS:

UPON COMPLETION OF THIS COURSE, STUDENTS SHOULD SPECIFICALLY BE ABLE TO DO THE FOLLOWING:

- 1. DEMONSTRATE KNOWLEDGE OF THE FUNDAMENTAL CONCEPTS AND HISTORICAL EVENTS AND IDEAS RELATED TO 20TH CENTURY BRITAIN.
- 2. EVALUATE GLOBAL EXCHANGES AND PERSPECTIVES IN CONTEXT OF SOCIAL, POLITICAL, RELIGIOUS, AND INTELLECTUAL TRADITIONS OF THE UNITED KINGDOM.
- 3. READ, ANALYZE, ORGANIZE AND SYNTHESIZE EVIDENCE, HISTORICAL PROBLEMS, AND INTERPRETATIONS CONNECTED TO THE HISTORY OF 20TH CENTURY BRITAIN.

- 1.3 CLARIFY AND SUMMARIZE INFORMATION PERTAINING TO HISTORICAL EVENTS AND IDEAS IN A **RESEARCH PAPER**.
- 2. EVALUATE GLOBAL EXCHANGES AND PERSPECTIVES IN CONTEXT OF SOCIAL, POLITICAL, RELIGIOUS, AND INTELLECTUAL TRADITIONS.
- 2.1 IDENTIFY HISTORICALLY IMPORTANT PLACES AND NATION STATES ON HISTORICAL MAPS.

- 2.2 DISCUSS SOCIAL STRUCTURES, RELIGIOUS IDEAS AND INSTITUTIONS, AND INTELLECTUAL TRADITIONS.
- 3. READ, ANALYZE, ORGANIZE, AND SYNTHESIZE EVIDENCE, HISTORICAL PROBLEMS, AND INTERPRETATIONS CONNECTED TO THE HISTORY OF 20<sup>™</sup> CENTURY BRITAIN.
- 3.1 Use primary and secondary sources to show how historical problems ARE CONFRONTED.
- 3.2 CONDUCT RESEARCH AND EXPLORE RELIABLE RESOURCES ON THE HISTORY OF 20<sup>TH</sup> CENTURY BRITAIN.

### METHODS OF INSTRUCTION:

INSTRUCTION WILL CONSIST OF LECTURES, VISUAL AIDS, CLASS DISCUSSION, IN-CLASS STUDENT PRESENTATIONS, AND THE VIEWING OF TELEVISION SHOWS, FILMS, AND DOCUMENTARIES.
