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Course Description

This capstone seminar allows senior students the opportunity to examine and explore aspects of theatre during which students will be required to bring together interests and skills developed in previous courses and experiences. We will follow our theatrical productions from beginning to end: auditions, building and painting sets, working with costumes, and running the show. We will accomplish the above by observing rehearsals and keeping a journal of observations throughout the semester, learning about the different professions within theatre during class, watching a professional NYC production, making an oral presentation of your favorite artist, and researching a specific topic of theatre and adding to its Wikipedia article.

Course Objective

Students will leave the course with a clear understanding of how live theatre productions are created and the creativity required to do so. They will identify ways they can apply the learned skills to their own lives and professions.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of the semester students will

- Develop an understanding about the specific elements required to produce live theater,
- Increase their knowledge of technical stagecraft through hands-on experience,
- Increase their understanding of the creative process in general,
- Learn the importance of communication and teamwork in a theatrical setting,
- Expand their knowledge in a specific area of the field,
- Learn how to research theatrical concepts and share those on Wikipedia,
- Cultivate their own creativeness.

Prerequisites

Senior standing.

Class Policies

Assignments

Work Hours: Over the course of the semester, you will log 10 hours helping the production team with building sets, lighting, props, costumes, etc. Some of these hours will be during class time. A few will be on your own time. If you need to make-up hours or wish to do more, contact Greg Paul at grp52@scarletmail.rutgers.edu.

Rehearsals: You will need to attend at least 2 hours of rehearsal and 1 hour of tech for *Legally Blonde* and at least 2 hours of rehearsal and 1 hour of tech for *Closing Night Party* to observe the rehearsal process. Your observations will be entered into your journal.

Presentation: You will give a 4-6 minute presentation about an artist who inspires you. This can be a theater artist, music artist, visual artist...anyone who you see as creative and who inspires you. This presentation should have visual elements such as slides and/or video.

Journal: You will keep a journal of 1 entry a week which should total 13-18 pages by the end of the semester. This journal should include discoveries you have about theater, what being creative means to you, revelations about how the skills you have learned that relate to your major, as well as reactions to seeing any live performances.

Wikipedia Project: Over the course of the semester, you will find a Wikipedia article related to theater and make significant improvements to it by adding information, sources, an image, and removing any unneeded text.
