Course Goals:

In this course you will learn to:

- ◆ Expand your world view while doing common tasks such as driving, cleaning and exercising.
- ◆ Practice oral presentations and working in groups.
- ◆ Share your thoughts and ideas about stories and books with others.
- ◆ Research genres to find the types of stories and books you enjoy.

Assignments & Grading:

Individual Book 1 Presentation – prepare a presentation about the book you listened to. More details about the presentation are in Canvas. Purpose: synthesizing reading and research into a presentation; public speaking.	8-10 min.	10*
Individual Book 1 Review – write and publish an online review of your book in Audible. Submit a screenshot of the review to Canvas (due Oct. 28). Purpose: writing book reviews; participating in online forums.		5*

Group Book 2 Selection Process Presentation – with your group, describe how you chose a common book to listen to. End with a brief description of the book you chose. Purpose: vocalizing group decision-making process; public speaking.	4-6 min.	5
Chat GPT Generic Screenplay – with your group, select a genre. Then use ChatGPT to generate a brief screenplay in that genre. The group will read the play in front of the class. Purpose: using AI creatively; play reading with an audience.	8-10 min.	5
Group Book 2 Presentation – with your group, prepare a presentation on your book. More details about the presentation are in Canvas. Purpose: discussing books in groups; group research; public speaking.	8-12 min.	10*
Individual Book 2 Selection Process Presentation – using Audible, describe the books you were considering for your first individual book. Conclude by describing which book you chose and why. Purpose: vocalizing thought process; idea sharing; public speaking.	2-3 min.	5
Future First Book Selection – students will work in groups to review and discuss possibilities for future class first group books. The group should make a presentation of all the books they considered and the one they recommend. Purpose: group work, public speaking, choosing books for future semesters.	4-6 min.	5
Individual Book 2 Presentation – prepare a presentation about your book. More details about the presentation are in Canvas. Purpose: synthesizing reading and research into a presentation; public speaking.	8-10 min.	10*
