COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description: Role and purpose of applied statistics. Data visualization and use of statistical software used in course. Descriptive statistics, summary measures for quantitative and qualitative data, data displays. Modeling random behavior: elementary probability and some simple probability distribution models. Normal distribution. Computational statistical inference: confidence intervals and tests for means, variances, and proportions. Linear regression analysis and inference. Control charts for statistical quality control. Introduction to design of experiments and ANOVA, simple factorial design and their analysis.

COURSE GOALS

Course Objectives:

- This course will acquaint students with statistical techniques, with emphasis on applications: Turning data into information.
- Assessment of objectives is achieved through homework assignments and two examinations: a midterm exam and a comprehensive final exam.

Course Outcomes

On successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- Explain and apply statistical methods for displaying, summarizing and describing data
- Explain and perform basic probability calculations
- Define and explain sampling distributions and the central limit theorem
- Perform statistical calculation of sampling distributions
- Perform statistical analysis including estimation, hypothesis testing, and analysis of variance
- Communicate results of data examination, analysis, and inference.

Assignments

Homework assignments will be posted early each week, with the due date set as Tuesday evening of the subsequent week. Assignments are in three parts: two “assignments” and one “discussion”. The assignment labeled “A” is an Achieve assignment. Those are largely multiple choice/compute and enter a value/fill in the missing term. Those are graded by the Achieve algorithm. The other assignment requires you to write solutions, scan and convert to pdf, and upload to Canvas for me to grade. The discussion is to get you “talking” with each other about the course material.

For the uploaded assignment responses, PDF format is required. A naming convention is also required:

M661 <LAST NAME>, <FIRST NAME> HW<number>

(Some prefer to upload each question separately - that is a help to me in navigating your work - just be sure to add the question number, something like “Q3”, to the file names.)

Assignments will usually be graded by Thursday and marked up files available in Canvas by the end of the day. Solution notes are posted at the same time. The assignments include a substantial amount of practical work - you will need a computing environment to accomplish the tasks. Choice of computational tools is up to you: see the note posted on the Canvas course page.

The weekly homework assignments will include exercises to:

- Practice the tools: including boxplots, histograms, scatterplots for summarizing and displaying data
- Practice the calculations: computing probabilities by applying the rules of probability for dealing with compound events formed by combining simple events; applying the central limit theorem to sample data; compute summary statistics of sampling distributions
- Practice the statistical analysis of single variable data: computing confidence intervals; testing statistical hypotheses
- Practice the statistical analysis of multi-variable data: assessing strength and direction of relationships; comparing data distributions in terms of shape, location, and spread
- Practice the statistical analysis of multi-sample data: computing confidence intervals for differences in means and proportions; testing statistical hypotheses on differences in means and proportions.

Additional, optional, practice with data exploration and analysis tools, statistical analysis tools and inference techniques is available with the course text publisher application Achieve (student subscription required as part of the course).

Discussions

You are required to make an initial contribution by Sunday 11pm of the assignment week, to give others the opportunity to respond before the assignment deadline of Tuesday at 11pm. Instructor replies will be made throughout the discussion.

Questions

Questions about the course or material may be communicated through a Canvas discussion or email. (The Canvas email is preferred over direct NJIT email - an automatically generated course identifier is included.) Email questions are typically answered within 1 business day.

Respondus Lockdown Browser and Monitor

Respondus LockDown Browser is a locked browser for taking assessments or quizzes in Canvas. It prevents students from printing, copying, going to another URL, or accessing other applications during a quiz. If a Canvas quiz requires that LockDown Browser be used, students will not be able to take the assessment or quiz with a standard web browser. Students may be required to use LockDown Browser with a webcam (Respondus Monitor), which will record students during an online exam.

The webcam can be built into your computer or can be the type that plugs in with a USB cable. Watch this [short video](#) to get a basic understanding of LockDown Browser and the webcam feature. A student [Quick Start Guide \(PDF\)](#) is also available.

Respondus Lockdown Browser and Monitor does not work with Linux and Chromebooks at this time. Please visit the [Respondus Knowledge Base article on computer requirements](#) for additional information. There are two quizzing engines currently available in Canvas, “classic” quizzes and “new” quizzes. Respondus works with both.

For “Classic” Quizzes in Canvas:

1. The LockDown Browser integration with Classic Quizzes still requires students to (1) manually start LockDown Browser, (2) log into Canvas, and (3) navigate to the quiz that requires LockDown Browser.
2. Download and install either the [Windows version of LockDown Browser](#) or the [Mac version of LockDown Browser](#).
3. Once your download and installation has finished, locate the “LockDown Browser” shortcut on your desktop and double-click it. (For Mac users, launch “LockDown Browser” from the Applications folder.)
4. You will be brought to the Webauth Authentication Service page, where you can log in with your NJIT UCID and password.
5. From your Dashboard or under “Courses”, click on the course in which you have to take the exam that requires LockDown Browser.
6. After you enter the course, find the exam and click on it.
7. Click the “Take the Quiz” button. Once a quiz has been started with LockDown Browser, you cannot exit until the “Submit Quiz” button is clicked.
8. If you are required to use a webcam (Respondus Monitor), you will be prompted to complete a Webcam Check and other Startup Sequence steps.

For “New” Quizzes in Canvas:

If a New Quizzes assessment requires the use of LockDown Browser, it will automatically launch from the student’s regular browser session. At the end of the quiz, LockDown Browser will close, allowing the student to continue with their standard browser. To be clear, the LockDown Browser application must first be installed to the computer or device. But once installed, it will automatically launch (and close) as needed with New Quizzes.

1. Download and install either the [Windows version of LockDown Browser](#) or the [Mac version of LockDown Browser](#).
2. Once your download and installation has finished, log into Canvas using your standard browser.
3. From your Dashboard or under “Courses”, click on the course in which you have to take the exam that requires LockDown Browser.
4. After you enter the course, find the exam and click on it.
5. A new tab will open with a message stating “Assessment Loading”. You will also see a pop-up window asking you to open Lockdown Browser. Click “Open Lockdown Browser”.
6. Lockdown Browser will automatically launch and your quiz will be loaded into Lockdown Browser. Click “Begin”

to take the quiz. Once a quiz has been started with LockDown Browser, you cannot exit until the “Submit Quiz” button is clicked.

7. If you are required to use a webcam (Respondus Monitor), you will be prompted to complete a Webcam Check and other Startup Sequence steps.
