## DD301-04 Acting Fundamentals for Animators T/Th 10:00a-11:20a Weston Hall, MoCap Room (Room 250)

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## **Course Description**

Introduction to the historical contexts of acting. Survey of acting techniques and principles and their relationship to successful visual storytelling. Topics covered include movement, empathy and dialogue. Application of acting to two-and three-dimensional animation. Students will study examples from animation as well as theater. Required projects include both in-class acting exercises as well as directed computer graphics character animation.

## **Course Objective**

Students will learn how to create more advanced animations by increasing their knowledge about acting and storytelling as a means of reference tools.

## **Course Learning Outcomes**

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- Identify the attributes of an honest acting performance, such as a clear character objective and obstacle and believable behavior within imaginary circumstances.
- Identify and perform traditional acting and animation conventions and techniques.
- Identify and implement storytelling techniques and manipulate them to create a coherent narrative event.
- Analyze fictional character development.
- Assess strengths and weaknesses in peer, self, and professional work.
- Animate digital characters to express a wide range of emotions.
- Perform scenes to gain experience and insight to draw on while animating

### **Prerequisites**

Basic background in the use and application of digital media in design.

### **Class Policies**

## **Assignments**

- Acting Assignments: There will be in-class acting assignments, as well as 2 major acting assignments that will need to be rehearsed outside of class. One will be a solo scene. The final assignment will be a 2-3 minute acting scene from a play with a partner.
- Animation Assignments: There will be 3 major animation assignments that will be completed throughout the semester that increase in complexity. The first animated scene will include incorporating the 12 Principles of Animation. The next scene is an exploration of facial emotions. The final scene should be a short, silent scene with two characters who interact with each other.
- Analysis Assignments: You will watch 2 animated shorts or features throughout the semester and write a 2-3 page analysis of them focusing on the styles of aspects of animation used. You will also evaluate what traits are used to develop their characters and tell the story and evaluate whether or not this is effective
- Extra Credit (Up to 2% of final grade): Attend a live performance and write a 2-3 page reflection paper. This paper should not be a summary of the show, but rather a critical analysis about the show from an acting standpoint. What did you notice about the acting in the show? Was there a specific moment or character that stood out to you? Why? Was there something you think that was not performed well? What could that actor have done to make it better? This opportunity is for 1 performance only.
